COOK'S REPLACEMENT

Hal Ratcliff Tabbed For FHS Principal

WE WOULD LIKE to salute this week the community of Bovina, which is welcoming Dr. Alfred Bolch to its medical clinic. The new doctor is being honored with a reception there Saturday morning, May 3.

The citizens of Bovina, in particular the Chamber of Commerce's doctor's procurement committee has made this their number one goal for the past two years, and in spite of a number of frustrations, their efforts finally paid off.

The staff at Parmer County Community Hospital is looking forward to working with the new doctor. It will be considered a relief to the hospital's staff of doctors to have an MD for the Bovina community.

FHS Trio Makes Bid At State

Friona High School debaters Mark Blankenship and Mark Zachary, silver medal winners at the regional meet, along with prose reader Sharla Duggins, also a silver medal winner at Lubbock, are competing this weekend at the state UIL Literary meet in Austin.

There will be 12 debate teams, along with the same number of prose readers, as the surviving members of the FHS forensics team has their final competition for the year.

Accompanying the students to Austin was speech coach Joy Morton.

Hal Ratcliff has been named as the new principal of Friona High School, it was announced this week.

Ratcliff will replace John R. Cook, who retires at the end of the school term. He will assume his new duties on July 1.

The new FHS principal is 37 years old, and is married to the former Charlotte Bock, a Friona High School graduate. Ratcliff graduated from Dimmitt High School in 1960, received his BS degree from Texas Christian University in 1964 in Education, and his MA degree from TCU in 1970. He has done post-graduate work at Texas Tech.

Ratcliff taught and coached at Atkins Junior High School in Lubbock for three years, served as assistant basketball coach at TCU for three years, and then taught and coached at Coronado High School, Lubbock, for a year.

He spent six years in the Levelland school system, two as an assistant principal, two as principal of an elementary school, and two as principal of Levelland Junior High School.

Ratcliff has spent the past three years as principal at Hartley High School.

County Jail Gets TCJS Certificate

The Parmer County jail was issued a Certificate of Compliance Tuesday from the Texas Commission on Jail Standards. It became the first jail in this area, and only the 40th county jail in the state to be so certified.

The presentation was the culmination of efforts by county officials to get their jail to comply with state requirements.

Joe Slater, supervising inspector for the TCJS, presented the certificate to county officials Tuesday. He commented:

"On behalf of the Texas Commission on Jail Standards, I am proud to present this certificate of compliance for the Parmer County Jail.

"Parmer County officials, Judge Porter Roberts and the four county commissioners, Sheriff Charles Lovelace and his able staff, are to be commended on this splendid accomplishment.

"This is not due to the efforts of any one person, rather it is the combined efforts of all working together to achieve this result.

"The taxpayers should be proud to have elected officials of this caliber, who are able to achieve this result with minimum costs.

Slater said that having achieved compliance with the TCJS board, and with continued operation at this level, would assure the county that frivolous complaints and lawsuits against them would not be looked upon favorably by the federal courts.

"Your compliance with the laws of the State of Texas serves to protect you, as these rules and statutes have been tested and upheld on numerous occasions in the federal courts.

"I would like to add my personal congratulations to you. It is a pleasure to work with each of you," Slater said.

The intent of the TCJS is to provide written rules reflecting minimum standards for the construction, equipment, maintenance and operation of county jails; for the custody, care and treatment of inmates in county jails; and for programs of rehabilitation, education and recreation in county jails; rules providing for the reasonable enforcement of such minimum standards; rules providing for

consultation and technical assistance to local government officials with respect to county jails, including review and comment on plans for the construction and major modification or renovation of county jails; rules for regular inspections of county jails and reports from local government officials on the condition of each county jail; and rules of procedures and practices before the Commission.

Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe said that there were a number of applicants for the position, and added "We feel that we were able to get the best quality of the applicants."

The new principal's parents, Mr. and Mrs. A.G. Ratcliff, live at 713 W. Lee in Dimmitt.

He is a member of the TSTA, the NEA, the Texas Assn. of Secondary School Principals and the National Assn. of Secondary School Principals.

He was named to the first team all-state high school football team in 1959, and the first team all-state basketball team in 1960. He participated in three post-season high school all-star games in 1960, when the Bobcats won the state title.

Ratcliff was on the dean's honor list at TCU four years. At Hartley, he has been active in Lions Club work, and serves as a member of the administrative board of the Hartley Methodist Church and is chairman of the council of ministries.

Party Primaries Saturday, May 3

The Democratic and Republican primaries are being held Saturday, May 3 in Parmer County and across the state.

Friona Democrats are voting at the high school, and Friona precinct Republicans are voting at Friona State Bank.

Black Demos vote at the old Tri-County Elevator; Rhea votes at the Lutheran Church parish hall and Lakeview votes at the Otho Whitefield residence.

Democratic precinct conventions are at 2 p.m. at the polling places. The GOP conventions begin at 4 p.m.

A race for the unexpired term of County Judge is expected to swell the vote totals on the local level.

Porter Roberts, who was appointed to serve until the General Election, is opposed on the Democratic ballot by Jo Buchanan for the nomination.

Also drawing considerable interest is the race for Democratic nomination for the state senate,

where Bill Sarpalius and Gerald McCathern, two Hereford residents, are facing each other. The winner of this showdown will face incumbent Bob Price in November.

Those are the main races which will concern local voters. The residents in Precinct 3 (Farwell and Lariat) will nominate a commissioner from among three candidates. Incumbent Archie Tarter is opposed by Cecil Atchley and Max Crim.

Otherwise, the main statewide race which has drawn attention is the Railroad Commission race where incumbent John Poerner and Buddy Temple have been waging a heated campaign.

A smattering of other state offices feature contested races.

The Democratic ballot features a non-binding presidential preference "straw vote," but the Republicans will actually be giving delegate votes to either Ronald Reagan or George Bush.

Commission Passes Issue To Board

Despite a report published last week by Farwell's State Line Tribune, the county commissioner's court has NOT accepted an anonymous gift of \$50,000 to build an office for the Parmer County Tax Appraisal's Board in Farwell adjacent to the court house, County Judge Porter Roberts said this week.

Roberts said that the commissioners discussed the matter in an impromptu, specially-called meeting last week, at which commissioner Archie Tarter gave the proposal, which called for the new office to be built on the northwest corner of the courthouse property in Farwell.

The gift, supposedly would be a "no strings attached" proposition, except that the county would have to pave around the new 30x40-foot building.

"We agreed to present the matter to the tax appraiser's board, and then if they approve of it, we will put this on the agenda for a regular meeting of the commissioners," Roberts told the Bovina Blade this week.

The Parmer County Tax Appraisers Board is a newly-formed group which will be making appraisals for all of the taxing entities within the county. It is made up of E.A. Parham, Lawrence Jamerson, David Grimsley, D.C. Herring and Gilbert Kaltwasser.

The next meeting of the board will be held on May 5, and Roberts said that if the board favorably considered the proposition, the commission

would place the matter on the agenda for its regular meeting May 12.

Commissioner Jack Patterson said it was his understanding in visiting with members of the tax board that they had been looking for office sites already, and had considered locations in Friona, Bovina and Farwell.

Roberts, as official spokesman for the court, said he wished to assure residents of the county that no official action had been taken, contrary to reports which had circulated throughout the county, and that it would not be officially considered except under the situations outlined above.

Transportation Week Slated May 11-17

A whole week of events—speeches, a balloon race, dedications—will mark National Transportation Week, May 11-17.

All the hoopla is to remind Texans that practically every human endeavor is affected by, or downright dependent on, transportation in some form.

One of the most unusual events in Texas during the week is a balloon race which will be a feature of the observance in Amarillo.

There also will be the dedication of a restored Congress Avenue bridge, a historic structure on the avenue which leads to the state's capitol building in Austin.

Many other Texans will get personally involved. The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation will suggest to its employees that each of them try an alternative means of getting to work one day during the week.

For most of the department's employees in the state's larger cities who now drive personal vehicles to work, it will mean trying public transportation.

Others will carpool. Some may try jogging, walking or cycling.

Rumor has it, though, that some highway and public transportation workers will saddle Old Paint and ride, or roller skate or maybe even pogo-stick to work during the week.

The week is a traditional activity of public and private organizations involved in transportation.

These include the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials, of which the Texas State Department of Highways and Public Transportation is a member. The U.S. Department of Transportation also is a major participant.

From the private sector, members of Traffic Clubs International will join in National Transportation Week activities in their own localities.

And the Texas Good Roads/Transportation Association will lend its support along with other transportation-oriented groups.

Follow-Up Drive Made

Census District Manager, William E. Soule, reports good progress in this area of the follow-up phase of the 1980 Census of Population and Housing. Census takers are following-up on missing census questionnaires by visiting addresses from which householders have not yet mailed theirs back, as well as telephoning most households from which questionnaires were returned inadequately filled out.

The manager asks householders to welcome these census takers when they call and to give them full cooperation in supplying the required census information. But you should always ask to see their official credential before admitting them to your home. It is a red, white and blue ID card bearing the U.S. Department of Census seal.

The manager stressed that, because the count of the Nation's population was to be for one day, April 1, everyone who was in the household on that day should be listed on the questionnaire, but not anyone who has moved in since.

"The information given the Census Bureau cannot be used to identify anyone in any way at all," the manager said. "Facts about individuals are lumped together to arrive at statistical totals, averages and percentages, figures in which no one can be identified."

Employers Value Basic Work Skills

Basic skills developed during years of housekeeping and farming are among skills most valued by employers, a rural job specialist said at a Texas Green Thumb meeting last week.

Green Thumb On-the-Job Training Specialist Susan Armstrong, Waco, said people with basic abilities—such as dealing with people, staying calm in a crisis, giving good directions, following instructions or using the eyes and hands to adjust controls—are needed in many jobs such as aides, clerks, dispatchers, house officers, guards and machine operators.

Ms. Armstrong explained Green Thumb's training program as an opportunity for advancement into private employment for the older worker now on the Green Thumb program or for other older Americans needing job opportunities.

"Green Thumb has an on-the-job training program which benefits both the older job seeker and the employer," Ms. Armstrong said. "An employer gains a valuable employee when hiring an older worker in addition to receiving partial reimbursement of the wages paid to that worker during the first few months. The older job seeker receives assistance in finding a suitable position and the opportunity to enjoy needed financial and personal rewards."

Green Thumb helps older people discover what skills they have or develop new skills needed to pursue their job interests.

Older Americans are also encouraged by Green Thumb to assert themselves and to express their needs and problems in society. During the recent meeting, local workers were encouraged to attend local forums on the White House Conference on Aging.

"Local forums will provide the best opportunity to express to our government what problems or needs older Americans have regarding employment opportunities, adequate incomes, independence, dignity and

quality of life," said Karen Barlow, Green Thumb Rural Job Development Specialist, Waco.

The Area Agencies on Aging are coordinating community forums and Green Thumb workers are encouraged to contact their local AAA's for information.

Ms. Barlow, also a speech pathologist, spoke to the group on "Speech Disorders and Aging." She particularly addressed problems associated with strokes and gave advice on communicating with family members or friends when there are speech or language problems.

Local Green Thumb workers and sponsors attending the seminar at Rhoades Memorial Library, Dimmitt were: Pat Fallwell, a Green Thumb worker from Friona, who is director of the senior center; Emiliana Martinez, a Green Thumb worker from Bovina, who provides telephone reassurance to her community and Pearl Cervantez, sponsor for Mrs. Martinez, from the Community Action Center.

Malouf, Mile Relay Team Eye 'Playoffs'

Friona High School's Chieftain track and field team will be represented at the state meet May 9-10 in two events, and except for some very bad luck it probably would have been three events.

The Chiefs placed first in the long jump event and second in the mile relay at the regional track meet in Lubbock last weekend.

Joe Malouf won the long jump, breaking the school record in that event for the third time this spring. Malouf soared 22-8 3/4 to capture the regional gold medal and nail down a ticket to the state track and field meet in Austin.

Malouf won his gold medal, in spite of feeling bad physically. "I had been sick with a stomach virus or something, I still have it. I wasn't feeling too well at all," Malouf said.

But in spite of his physical condition, Malouf got off a good series of jumps. On his first effort, though, he scratched on a jump that would have been around 22 feet.

On his second try, to make sure he didn't scratch, Malouf took off about a foot behind the line, and still got a jump of 21-10 3/4.

On the third try, having his steps "down" on the Texas Tech jumping pit, he got his winning effort of 22-8 3/4. The Chieftain track star said the facilities at the Tech track were a big help, a considerable improvement from those at Olton's district meet, when he failed for the first time this year to win his event.

In the final round of jumps, Malouf scratched, got off a 22-3 3/4, and then, having the event won, just "ran through" the pit on his last turn.

The mile relay foursome of David Fleming, Robert Alexander, Rod Owen and Chitto Caballero placed second in their event to Slaton with another school record performance of 3:22.6.

The team had run a 3:29.1 in Friday's preliminaries, but cut almost seven full seconds off that time in Saturday's finals.

The breakdown in the finals showed Fleming, the leadoff runner, turning in a 51.2; Alexander following with a 51.7; Owen sparkling a 50.4, and Caballero bringing it home with a nifty 49.3--not a bad foursome of quarter-milers in anyone's book.

These four track performers have comprised Friona's mile relay team for the past three years, during which time they have won a trophy case full of trophies and their losses can be counted on the fingers of one hand.

The heart-breaking part of the regional meet news was the fact that Friona should be taking not one but both of their relay teams to the state meet, except for suffering the calamity of all calamities for a relay

team--a dropped baton by the 440-yard relay team, in Friday's preliminaries.

Running in cold, windy conditions, the team was off to a brilliant start after three legs. The team completed its third leg out in front of the field, but the bobbled baton cost the team a spot in Saturday's finals.

The tough part was that the Frenship team, which Friona was leading going into the final exchange, went on to win the regional gold medal on Saturday.

Prior to the accident on Friday, the 440-yard foursome of Michael Gowens, Mike Hubbard, Rod Owen and David Fleming had won first

place in all six track meets they had entered this spring, and were undefeated.

They went into the regional meet with the best time of any of the 16 Class AA sprint relay teams, a 42.9 recorded at Dumas on Easter weekend.

"I especially regret this for the sake

of Gowens and Hubbard. They have worked hard all year, and deserve to be running in the state meet, but now they won't get to," said a dejected Coach Robert Mears.

The bad turn of fate for the sprint relay team took a great deal of lustre off the achievements of the other performers, good as they were.

"You always have that dread, in the back of your mind, about a dropped baton, but this was one thing we had never had to contend with before. But it can happen to the best of teams, and it always seems to hit when it hurts the most," Mears continued.

The success by the 440-yard relay team in 1980 was the best showing by a Friona sprint team in 16 years. The foursome named above erased the school record set by the Chiefs' 1964 sprint relay team with their clocking at Dumas.

David Fleming also entered the 440-yard dash at the regional meet, and ran a 53.0 quarter in Friday's preliminaries, to qualify for the finals.

But after the bad luck by the 440-team, Coach Mears scratched Fleming in the finals, in order to conserve his strength and perhaps save an injury which might have also cost the Chieftain mile relay team a trip to Austin.

As stated, the Friday preliminaries were run in biting cold conditions, with the temperatures in the 30s and a north wind blowing in the face of the participants. Saturday's weather was somewhat better, although a long shot from ideal.

It could, however, be considered "average" weather for the 1980 season, which has produced a motley collection of Fridays and Saturdays for track conditions, and even cancelled two meets in which the Chieftains were to have been involved, including their own invitational meet.

Farmers To Get Questionnaire

During late May and June, many Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service or will be personally interviewed by the Service's field staff. The information gathered through the questionnaires and interviews provides the basis for determining the acreage devoted to the various crops and midyear livestock numbers for the state of Texas and for each county.

Crop and livestock reports provide a dependable, unbiased picture of Texas' most important industry—agriculture. The estimates in these reports are tools to help farmers and ranchers work out their planting, breeding, feeding, storing, producing and marketing plans.

Farm organizations and legislatures use them in planning programs. The estimates are also used in establishing the various government program acreage and payment levels to farmers for the state and county.

Extension economists and private farm and ranch management consultants use them as a basis for advising farmers and ranchers.

Exporters use them in planning and promoting the sale of agricultural products abroad.

Prompt and accurate completion of the survey forms provides for more reliable estimates and helps to reduce survey costs.

All individual farm and ranch information is kept confidential, and only state and county summaries become part of the final published estimate.

This is a cooperative effort of the USDA's Economics, Statistics, and Cooperative Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

To ripen fruits faster, place them in a perforated plastic bag.



Assistance Offered For Slow Learners

Parmer County will be offering services for children three to five years of age who may need pre-kindergarten preparation. This will involve no cost or tuition to the parents.

To be eligible for these services the child must have a developmental lag or a learning problem. The child must be three years old prior to September 1, 1980.

If you have a child and can answer yes to several of the following questions, you are asked to bring the child to the location listed below during the time and date shown.

- *Has the child ever suffered a head injury?
- *Does the child resent all corrections?
- *Does the child have poor coordination?
- *Does the child have some problem keeping their balance?
- *Does the child have problems speaking clearly?
- *Is the child constantly repeating mistakes that have been corrected before?

If you see these problems, please, bring your child for less than an hour for some short readiness tests.
