And they lived happily ever after. But the little red hen's neighbors wondered why she never again baked bread.

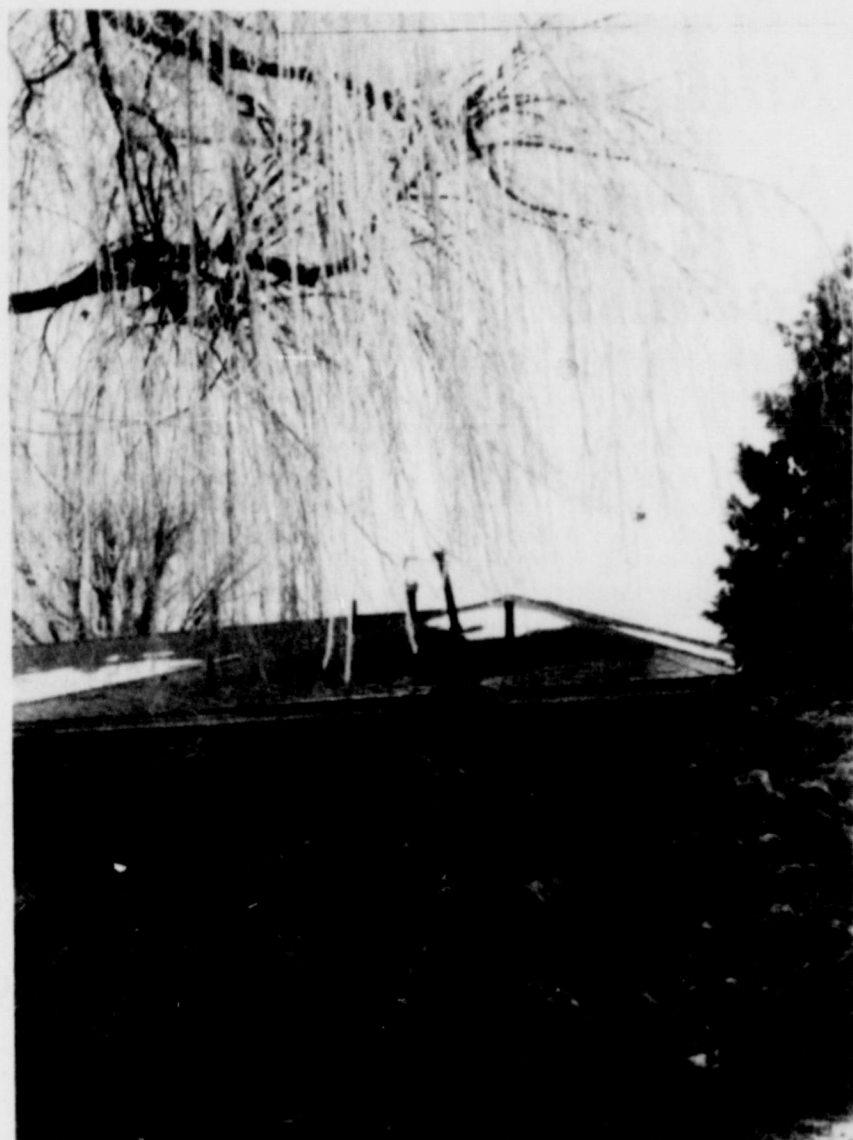
## Wastewater Plans OK'd By Committee

Mayor B.K. Buske and City Manager A.L. Outland attended a meeting of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC) review committee last Thursday in Amarillo.

The committee reviewed Friona's "step one" application for City of Friona wastewater plant improvements, and the application was given favorable consideration for passage on to the PRPC's review board on January 31.

If approved by the PRPC's review board the application will go to the state for final approval in order that plans and specifications for the project can begin.

If all approvals are favorable, it is expected that construction on the improvements to the city's wastewater plant can get underway early in 1981.

## County Attorney In Bid For Re-election

Johnny W. Actkinson, a Farwell attorney, has authorized the Friona Star to announce his candidacy for re-election as Parmer County Attorney, subject to the Democratic Primary in May. Actkinson has served as county attorney since January of 1975.

A 1965 graduate of Farwell High School, Actkinson received a BBA in accounting from Texas Tech University in 1969 and his doctor of jurisprudence from Tech's law school in 1973. He also is a certified public accountant.

As a member of the State Bar of Texas, he is a member of the Family Law Section and also serves on the District 13 Committee on Admissions and the subcommittee on Texas inheritance tax marital deduction of the Taxation Section. He is past president of the 154th Judicial District Bar Association.

As a member of the American Bar Association, he is a member of both the Taxation Section and the Banking Section.

Actkinson is involved in numerous civic activities. He is a past president of the Farwell Chamber of Commerce, a charter member of the Farwell Jaycees, president of Farwell-Texico Rotary Club, and on the board of trustees of Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church.

He and his wife, the former Diane Bryant of Muleshoe, have two sons and one daughter, Jeff, Greg and Jill.

In announcing his candidacy, Actkinson said, "Since taking the office in January of 1975, I have followed a program of progressive and vigorous prosecution of misdemeanor and juvenile cases.

"My goals for the following years would be to continue progressive prosecution of all cases filed, both juvenile and adult, to keep Parmer County a good place to raise a family. "I also will continue to work with Judge Roberts and the commissioners for continued fiscal responsibility."

## Friona Man Is Pheasant Champion

A Friona area resident, Dee Willard, has claimed the Parmer County pheasant tailfeather contest title, it was announced this week.

Willard had won the Friona title with his feather which measured 26 1/4 inches, and that feather won the county championship by an eighth of an inch.

Runnerup in the county was Randy Kirkpatrick, with a feather measuring 26-1/8 inches, and third was won by Roy Lovelady of Farwell, whose entry measured 25-13/16 inches.

Willard is scheduled to receive an award from the Parmer County Game Management Association for his prize feather. It was the first time in five years Friona's winner took the county title.

Second place in the Friona contest was claimed by John Taylor, who had a feather measuring 25 and 5/8 inches, while two hunters, Jim Taylor and Terry Copley, tied for third with feathers measuring 25 1/4 inches.

## Area Gets Moisture, Fireworks

The Friona area received its first measurable moisture for the calendar year, and most since October 30-31, 1979.

The "melt" at the official Friona weather station amounted to .42 from the strange combination of rain, freezing rain and sleet, which began falling in earnest about midnight on Saturday, January 19.

The front moved across the area and was accompanied by thunder and lightning, which awakened residents and made them wonder if it really was January.

The measurement on Saturday morning at the weather station had been .01 inches, with another .01 on Monday, making the weekend's total .44 inches of moisture. The freezing conditions left motorists of the area having to take it easy on Sunday and again early Monday, as streets and yards were frozen over.

The moisture was the most since a total of .83 inches were logged back on October 30, 1979, from a combination of snow and pea-sized hail which fell October 30-31.

Farmers welcomed the moisture, particularly for their winter wheat, which was needing a boost.

The rainfall total for 1979 in Friona was 15.66 according to Jake Outland, weather recorder.

From 1973 through 1974, Hand worked for USDA as Livestock Inspector in Parmer County, enforcing State and Federal laws pertaining to livestock. Then from 1974 to 1977 he served as Federal Meat Inspector.

In 1976 Hand attended the Reserve Peace Officer Certification School in Hereford. In 1976 and 1977 Hand served as a Reserve Officer for the Friona Police Department. From November 1977 to the present time he has served as a full time Commissioned Peace Officer with the Friona Police Department.

In January of 1978 Hand graduated from the S.P.A.G. Law Enforcement Academy in Lubbock, Texas. He holds his basic certification in law enforcement and ten certifications in law enforcement.

The thirty year old peace officer and his wife Janet, live at 1311 Jackson Avenue in Friona. The couple has one son, Lynn, and they are members of the Friona Sixth Street Church of Christ.

# FRIONA FLASHBACKS

**50 YEARS AGO—JAN. 31, 1930**  
Weather in the vicinity of Friona for the past three weeks has been decidedly winterish. In fact, it has been claimed to be the coldest we have had since the winter of the big snow about ten years ago. Sometime during the night of January 16, the wind whisked to the north, becoming very cold and blowing fiercely. This continued throughout the day Friday, with some flying thickly part of the day, and during the night on Friday some thermometers in Friona registered as low as 14 degrees below zero.

**45 YEARS AGO—FEB. 1, 1935**  
At the regular meeting of the County Commissioners Court at Farwell Monday, one of the items of business attended to was the provision of the court to pay a bounty of two cents a head for all jackrabbits killed within the county during the period of February 1 to February 16. This action was taken in an effort to so decrease the number of rabbits in the county that they will cease to be a menace to the growing crops.

**40 YEARS AGO—FEB. 2, 1940**  
The local Chamber of Commerce elected officers to serve the organization for the coming year at its meeting last Friday night. J.A. Blackwell was re-elected as president, Ray Landrum is vice president, Dan

Ethridge is secretary and Lloyd Brewer is treasurer.

**35 YEARS AGO—FEB. 2, 1945**  
A machine has been invented and a working model of it now being built in Friona which will solve the problem of man shortage in the handling of threshed grain on the farm. Roscoe Parr is the inventor of the machine, a diagram of which is already filed with the U.S. Patent Office along with an application for a patent.

**30 YEARS AGO—JAN. 27, 1950**  
Political announcements carried in the Star included A.D. Smith, for reelection as County Judge; W.L. Edlmon as his opponent; Loyde A. Brewer as county and district clerk; Charles Lovelace for sheriff and tax assessor-collector and Emmett Day, for re-election as county commissioner.

**25 YEARS AGO—JAN. 28, 1955**  
Fifty-four irrigation well permits have been issued at the local water committee office during the last two weeks, Secretary Raymond Euler stated today. Considerable land sales activity is reported by the real estate dealers, the irrigation of course being a major factor in both rapid sales and higher price.

**20 YEARS AGO—JAN. 28, 1960**

**15 YEARS AGO—JAN. 28, 1965**  
G.S. Looper escaped injury Tuesday morning when the pickup truck he was driving was struck by a westbound freight train at the crossing on South Main Street in Friona. Looper, an employee of Kendrick Oil Co., said his brakes locked and the pickup skidded on the ice which had accumulated from the previous night's snow. The vehicle skidded through the wooden warning arm and into the path of the train, almost clearing before being struck on the left rear and spun completely around by the impact.

**10 YEARS AGO—JAN. 29, 1970**  
Contract has been awarded for the 60-unit apartment project to be built at 1300 Walnut Street in Friona. High Plains Building Co. of Amarillo is the general contractor, and hopes to be on the site in the next three weeks. Completion of the project is expected to require some nine months. When the work is in full swing, there will be between 60 and 90 people employed on the project, according to K.S. (Bud) Reynolds, a spokesman for the contracting firm.

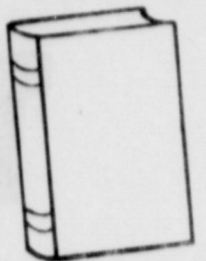
## Rites Held For Father Of Bovinians

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## Public Hearings Anticipated For Hwy 60 Project

(From the Hereford Brand)

Public hearings on the possible upgrading of U.S. Highway 60 between Amarillo and Clovis, N.M. may begin in Hereford in three or four months, the district engineer with the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation told Hereford city commissioners this week.

A.L. McKee of Amarillo attended the regular commission meeting to inform Hereford city officials of a forthcoming feasibility study by Houston engineering firm Wilbur Smith and Associates.

The study will begin in the next few weeks and will take approximately two years to determine the feasibility of upgrading U.S. 69. McKee said a federally-funded project may include construction of a loop around the city of Hereford and transforming the highway into a major interstate.

"I do not know if a loop around Hereford will be indicated by the study," McKee said. "But, they will be studying anticipated additional volumes of traffic on this route if it is upgraded all the way from Amarillo to Las Cruces, N.M."

U.S. 60 turns into U.S. 70 at Clovis, and U.S. 70 "This is the shortest route from Amarillo to the West Coast," McKee said.

He informed commissioners that area chambers of commerce, including the Deaf Smith County C of C, pressured Congress to reverse an earlier decision by the U.S. Department of Transportation, which rules that the project was not eligible for federal funds.

"Then, Congress passed a bill to give this special consideration. So, the highway department hired consultants for a study," McKee said.

Highway department studies in the past have shown that U.S. 60 from the western Deaf Smith County line to Farwell should be made a four-lane highway, McKee said.

"That's the one thing we are sure about. It will definitely be recommended as a part of this study," he told the commission.

"We do not know about constructing a bypass around Hereford. When you say bypass, a lot of people get very concerned. But, I think it would behoove all of us to look at all aspects of this."

The study, according to McKee, will determine the anticipated traffic flow through Hereford in the year 2000, and any recommendation will be based on the consultants' projections.

"They'll be looking at the increased truck traffic and the amount of hazardous materials being hauled through Hereford before they decide whether a loop is needed," McKee said.

He added that no decision will be made until local residents and officials in affected communities are consulted.

"These public hearings should begin in the next three to four months," McKee said.

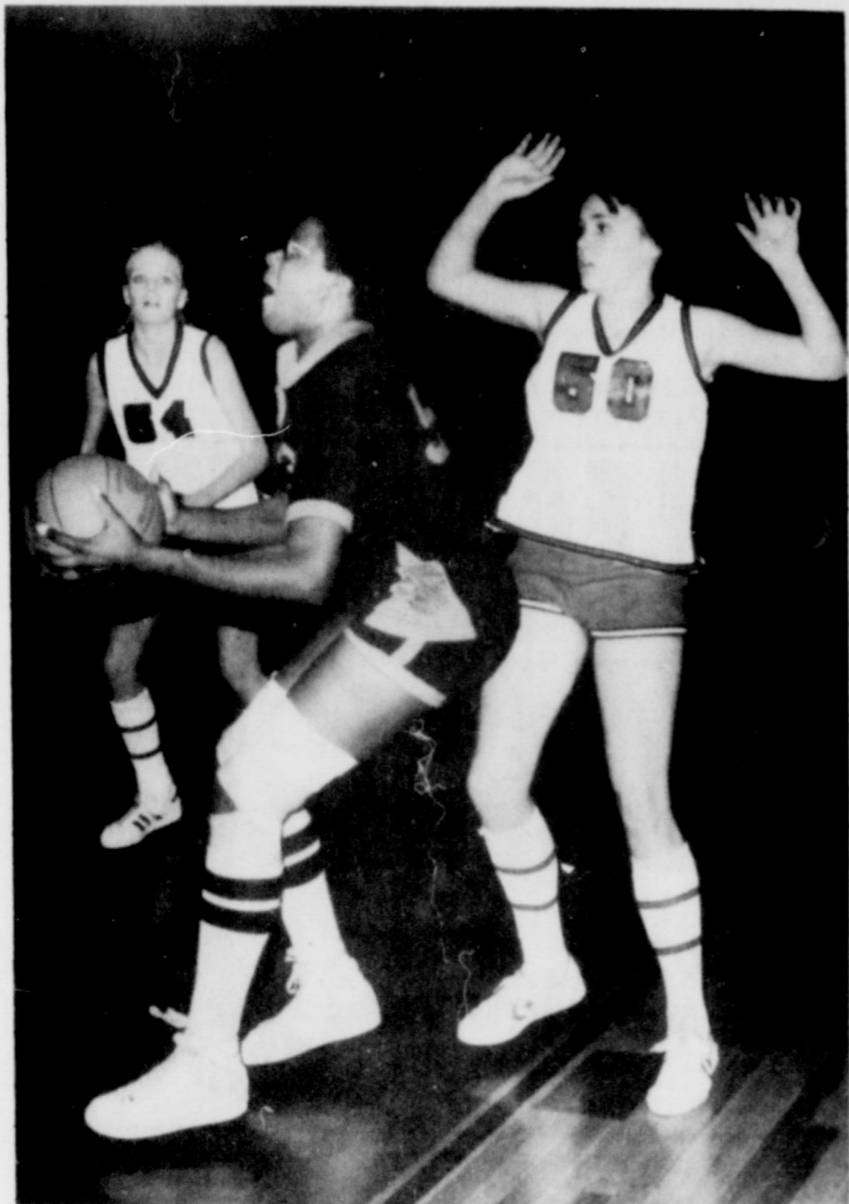

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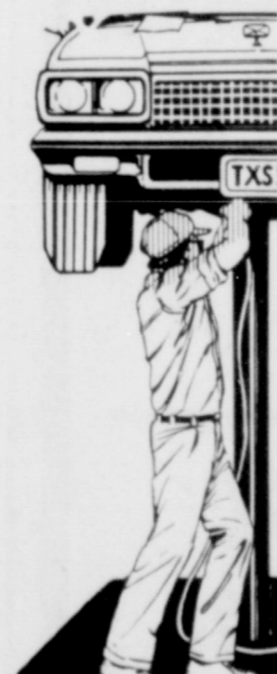

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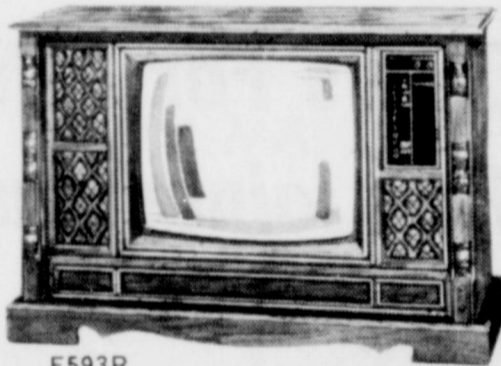

The highway department engineer told the commission that the federal government, should it decide that the project should be funded, will purchase 75 per cent of the necessary right-of-way and the state will buy 25 per cent.

"Since this is a special priority primary connector route, the federal government will buy the right-of-way and cities and counties won't have to," McKee said.

### NOTICE TO FRIONA RESIDENTS

The following extract of City Ordinance No. 87, as amended, is quoted for your information:

"Charges for water service furnished or rendered by the City Water Works of the City of Friona, shall be due and payable on the first day of each month at the office of the water department of the City of Friona, and if not paid within ten (10) days after the same becomes due and payable, a 10 percent penalty will be added to the bill, and if not paid by the 15th day of the month, the city reserves the right to cut off and discontinue water service to the premises without further notice. This is to inform you that if your bill is not paid by the 10th day of the month following the billing, that your service will be discontinued on the 15th day, and a five dollar service charge will be made for the re-connect. With delinquent accounts running between 175-200 per month, more time and effort is spent in collecting than making the billings.

With 1418 water customers in Friona we cannot afford to make exception to the above Ordinance.
