Party Primaries Set Saturday, May 3

THE UNITED STATES seems to be working itself into a bad situation from a standpoint of foreign affairs.

The hostage situation with Iran has now brought on the breaking of relations with that country and a call to our allies to do the same. A few of America's friends have followed suit, although most appear to want to stay out of the squabble.

Then there is the invasion of Afghanistan by Soviet Russia, which has caused almost as big a stir in our country as the hostage situation.

The U.S. has protested the Afghanistan invasion to the point of pulling out of the 1980 Olympics, and is just now beginning to get some support from some of America's allies.

Some observers say that Russia is now building up its border with Iran, much the same as it did on its border with Afghanistan, before it invaded that nation. This leads some to think that a Russian invasion of Iran might be their next step.

It would seem to the casual observer that the world's nations are almost in the process of "choosing up sides," for an ultimate conflict.

Our nation can ill-afford another Vietnam, so we are hoping that the threatened conflict never comes.

The hostage situation has become a frustrating issue. It must really be frustrating for those with friends and relatives in Iran, due to the way their hopes have risen and fallen practically with the tides.

Had you realized that Barbara Tim, hostage mother who was finally successful in seeing her son this week in Iran, had originally applied to Iran for a visa as early as January?

Mrs. Timm's application was put off, ignored or given the runaround, until the VERY DAY that President Carter made his edict against travel by Americans to Iran. Then, within hours, Mrs. Timm received her okay on her visa application.

It was evident that the Iranian leaders want to force Americans in general and the hostage families in particular to go against the president's wishes regarding foreign policy.

The international "chess game" continues, and one wonders where it will end. It is frightening to realize that at stake are not only the lives of the 50 hostages, but perhaps another group of thousands of young lives if the nation should be plunged into another war situation.

We certainly are not an expert on foreign policy, so we have no quick answers to our problems. We doubt that there are any easy answers.

But we are working ourselves into a very serious set of circumstances, and the deeper we go in each situation may mean the harder it will be to come out without a confrontation of some kind.

A WEEK FROM SATURDAY, the precinct conventions will be held by both the Democrats and Republicans.

These conventions mark the beginning of "grassroots democracy," and are very important.

Resolutions which voters would like to see adopted by their respective parties must first be adopted at the precinct level, and then passed on to the county level.

If you never have attended a precinct convention, why not do so next Saturday. It's a good experience, and as someone commented this week, may be just as important as voting. By the way, in order to attend a convention, you must have voted that day, which is no trouble since the conventions are held at the polling places.

BUTCH McCAIN, Bovina native who spins records on station KGNC, Amarillo, must be like most of us when it comes to dreading Mondays.

This week, Butch commented "Mondays are a heck of a way to spend one-seventh of your life." Another time, we had heard him comment: "Mondays are the crab grass on the lawn of life."

The Democratic and Republican primaries will be held next Saturday, May 3 in Parmer County and across the state.

A race for the unexpired term of County Judge is expected to swell the vote totals on the local level.

Porter Roberts, who was appointed to serve until the General Election, is opposed on the Democratic ballot by Jo Buchanan for the nomination.

Horton also announced that the Democratic precinct conventions will be held at 2 p.m. at each polling place. Only those who have voted may attend the precinct conventions, where resolutions will be made and passed on to the county convention.

The county Democratic convention will be held at 2 p.m. May 10 at the First State Bank in Bovina.

Absentee Vote For Mayor Race

Absentee voting in the Friona mayor's race will begin on Monday, April 28, and continue through May 17, at the City Hall in Friona.

The special election will be held on Tuesday, May 20. Candidates on the ballot are B.K. Buske, the incumbent, and W.L. Edelson.

where Bill Sarpalius and Gerald McCathern, two Hereford residents, are facing each other. The winner of this showdown will face incumbent Bob Price in November.

Those are the main races which will concern local voters. The residents in Precinct 3 (Farwell and Lariat) will nominate a commissioner from among three candidates. Incumbent Archie Tarter is opposed by Cecil Atchley and Max Crim.

Lazbuddie voters will cast ballots at the high school cafeteria, with the precinct convention to begin at 5 p.m.

Bovina will vote at the high school cafeteria, and their convention starts at 4 p.m.

Farwell's GOP will vote at the City Hall.

Bird Season Will Shorten

Jack Patterson and Reagan Looney flew to Austin last Thursday to meet with the Park and Wildlife Commission to fight for the nine day pheasant hunting season.

Patterson said they had to settle for a 16-day season. The representatives from Hereford asked for 16 days and the commission went along with them.

According to Patterson the bag limit will probably stay the same, although it hasn't been decided definitely.

The game biologist claims about 70 per cent of the birds were killed the first weekend and if the limit was raised it would probably thin the birds too much.

Patterson and Looney returned home Saturday.

Otherwise, the main statewide race which has drawn attention is the Railroad Commission race where incumbent John Poerner and Buddy Temple have been waging a heated campaign.

A smattering of other state offices feature contested races. (See the sample ballot on Page 5).

The Democratic ballot features a non-binding presidential preference "straw vote," but the Republicans will actually be giving delegate votes to either Ronald Reagan or George Bush.

The GOP also features a race for the Railroad Commissioner nomination, between E.W. Kidd, Hank Grover and John T. Henderson.

The GOP ballot contains two referendums, one to determine if the state should have Initiative and Referendum as a way for the public to vote directly on issues and make law in elections rather than depending only upon legislators.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. on election day. See separate story for election places.

In addition to their competition at Arlington, the band members were slated to have two days of entertainment at Six Flags, including a special Friday night concert by Doc Severinson, conductor of the Tonight Show orchestra.

Scott Houston is director of Friona bands, assisted by Nancy Ray.

Ticket Sales Underway For J.R. Cook Day

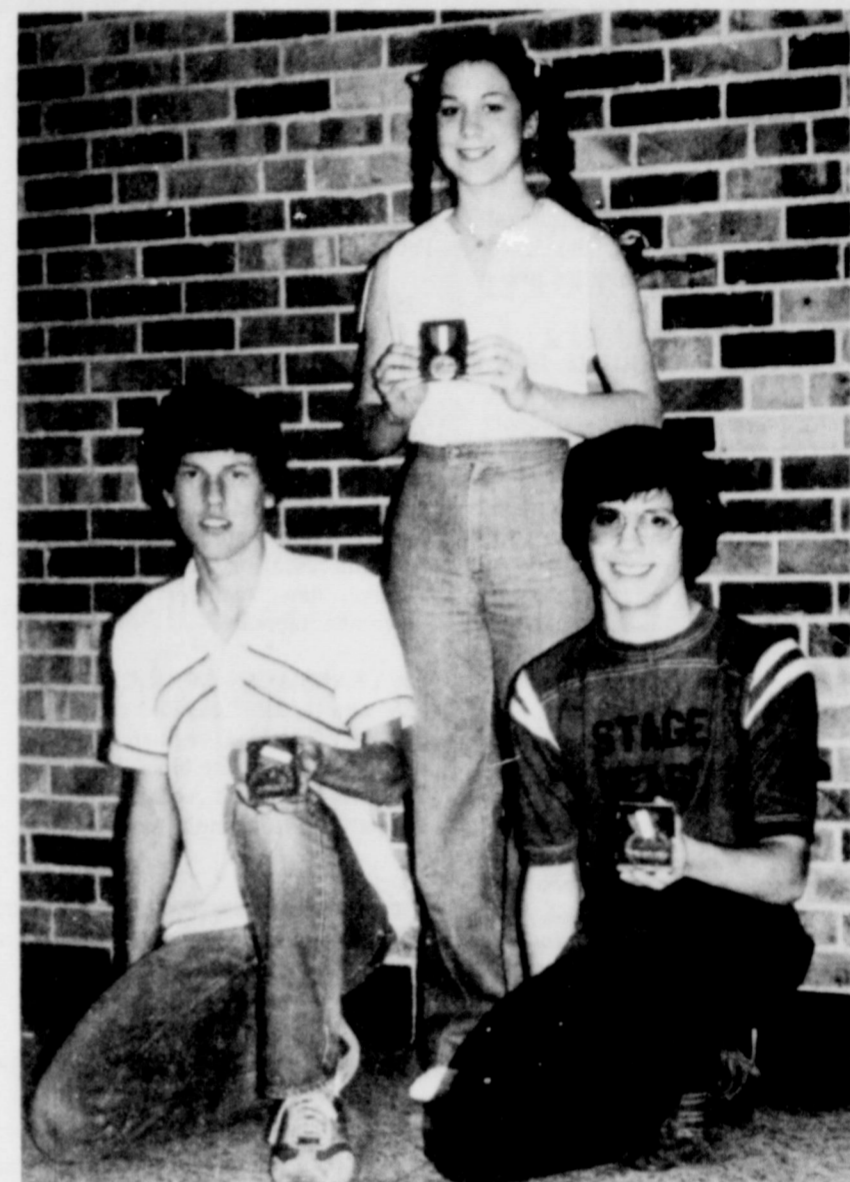
The ticket sales continue for the John R. Cook appreciation dinner, which will be held on Saturday, May 10 at 8 p.m. at the Friona Community Center.

Friona Feeders Tell Of DES Implants

Friona Industries, Inc. announced Tuesday, April 22, that it has notified the Food and Drug Administration that approximately 10,800 head of cattle at its feedyards were implanted with the drug diethylstilbestrol (DES) after November 1, 1979.

Spring Your Clock Forward

Sunday is the "time change" day, when the nation goes back to Daylight Savings Time for six months.

Residents of the area are reminded to set their clocks forward an hour when they go to bed Saturday night, or else they will find themselves an hour behind times when Sunday morning comes.

Standard time will return the last Sunday in October.

The FDA contends that such use of the drug constitutes a violation of its regulations.

The Company has elected to participate in the FDA's reconditioning program which involves removing the DES implants from the cattle and withholding the cattle from market for prescribed periods of time. Under FDA regulations cattle must be withheld from market a minimum of 61 days following implant removal if the entire animal is processed, or a minimum of 41 days if the liver and kidney are discarded.

The Company estimates that it will be necessary to feed approximately 3,000 head of cattle for longer periods than normal, depending upon the weight of the cattle and the number of days on feed.

The Company is unable to estimate the amount of losses, if any, it may incur due to the reconditioning program, but believes that any loss that occurs will not have a material adverse effect on the financial condition of the Company.

The cattle implanted with DES comprise about 14 per cent of the total 75,247 head the Company currently has in its three feedyards.

Friona Common stock is traded on the American Stock Exchange under the symbol FI. The Company is engaged in the manufacture and sale of commercial cattle feeds, retail marketing of animal health supplies, custom cattle feeding, the sale of Company owned cattle, operation of grain facilities, and the processing, packaging and distribution of ground beef.

The late Friday storm, which spawned tornadoes over a wide section of the Texas Panhandle, caused thousands of dollars of damage in the Lazbuddie area alone, in addition to the loss of life. The Morris home, which is located about 1.5 miles east of Lazbuddie on Farm Road 145, was completely destroyed by the funnel. Also destroyed was a small house immediately behind the Morris' brick home, in which Morris' mother lived, as well as barns, trucks and farm equipment. Morris and his daughter were treated for injuries at the West Plains Memorial Hospital in Muleshoe. Mrs. Morris was dead on arrival at the hospital.

5 YEARS AGO--APRIL 20, 1975

The community fund drive, designed to raise \$150,000 to equip the proposed Nursing Home for Friona was off to a roaring start, according to Charles Allen and Hollis Horton, fund drive co-chairmen. 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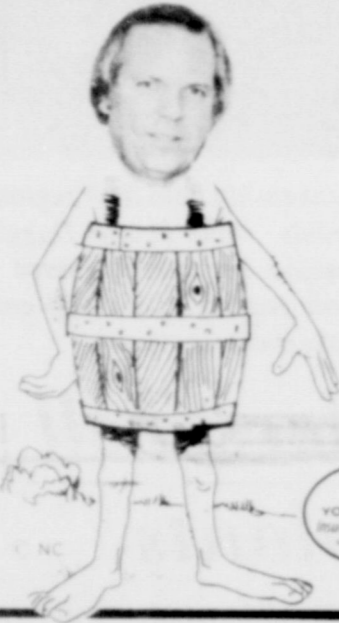

Electric Company Gives 1979 Feedlot Figures

Sam Thomas, manager of agricultural development for Southwestern Public Service Company in Amarillo, has announced that 4,891,492 fat cattle were produced in 1979 in the 45,000 square mile area served by SPS. This is a decrease of 1.67 per cent over the previous year but is still the third largest number ever produced in a 12 month period.

These facts were shown in a survey conducted by SPS each year since 1963. The survey is quoted throughout the United States as the most authoritative source as to the production of fat cattle in the Southern Great Plains area.

"During the 1979 period, the feedlot capacity came to 2,718,549, which reflects a reduction of 9851 head over 1978," Thomas said. "The total impact of the feedyard industry on the business community exceeded 13.8-billion dollars and the farm sale value exceeded 5,595-million dollars."

Thomas said, "Over production of pork and poultry have caused prices on these products to drop and also caused the price of beef to drop. Beef prices are difficult to maintain at more than 1/4 that of pork. If this glut of pork and poultry continues,

fat cattle prices could drop to 45 cents.

The survey has made a major contribution to the development and growth of the industry and has been especially valuable in the vertical integration that has occurred in the SPS service area.

"Copies of the survey will be available at Southwestern Public Service Company offices in about 60 days," Thomas said.

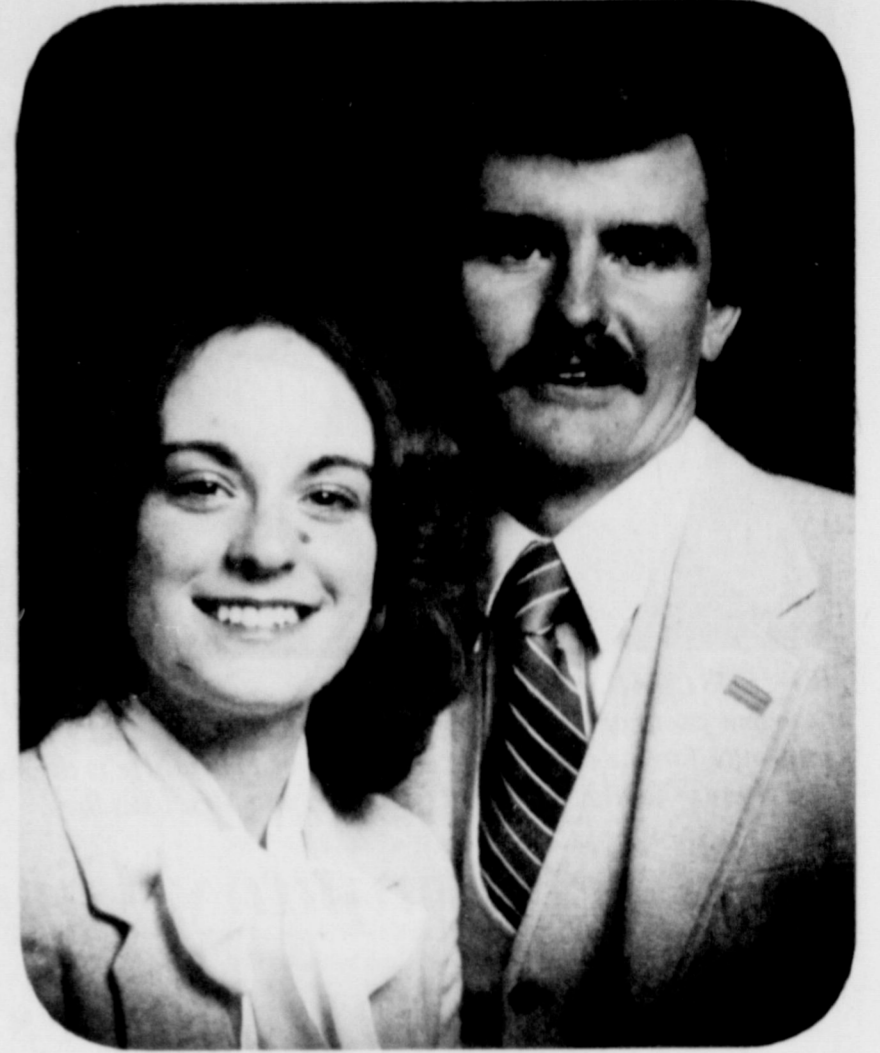

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Chieftains' Depth Yields 3-AA Title

The Friona Chieftains won their third consecutive track and field district championship last Saturday at Olton, qualifying for the regional meet in five events, but the team's failure to qualify more for the regional meet took some of the lustre off their district win.

The Chiefs qualified both of their relay teams, which turned in the only two first place efforts of the meet for Friona.

The 440-yard relay team ran a 43.8, with Michael Gowens, Mike Hubbard, Rod Owen and David Fleming running the legs.

The mile relay team of David Fleming, Robert Alexander, Rod Owen and Chitto Caballero ran a 3:29.5 to beat Muleshoe by ten yards in the last event of the day.

Also qualifying for the regional meet was Joe Malouf, who jumped his personal best, 22-2½, improving on his own school record set earlier at the Dumas meet. However, Malouf had to settle for second place, as Littlefield's Joe McCanic jumped 22-4 for first place.

Robert Alexander placed second in the 880-yard dash with a time of 2:04.7, to qualify for regional.

The 440-yard dash produced somewhat of a surprise. Two-time district champion David Fleming placed third, behind Muleshoe's Jim Norman who won the event, and teammate Rod Owen. Owen was timed in 51.5 and Fleming in 51.6.

Owen had been held out of the long jump due to a groin muscle which had tightened in workouts the previous Wednesday, but did not show effects in this race or in the relays.

Chuck Nichols, who has been consistently clearing 12 feet in the pole vault for the Chieftains, and who won the event in 1979 and competed in the regional meet, cleared only 11 feet and had to settle for third place.

Chitto Caballero, who has run the hurdles races at regional twice before, placed third in both races. He had a bad start in the 120-yard highs, and his 15.3 time was third best.

Caballero apparently had second place nailed down in the 330-yard

intermediate hurdles race, but Muleshoe's Mike Northcutt dived for the tape and hit it a split second ahead of Caballero, who was timed in 40.9.

The Chieftains had hoped for a regional qualifier in the high jump, with seniors Scott Fangman and Bret Moore being consistent this spring. The two were among four finalists who cleared the bar at six feet, Fangman making it on his last attempt.

But neither of the FHS jumpers could make 6-2, and Friona had to settle for third place (Moore) and fourth place (Fangman).

Michael Gowens lived up to his pre-district meet billing by taking third place in both of the sprints. Gowens had an 11.4 timing in the 100-meter dash, and a 23.4 in the 220.

But despite the team's failure to win more first and second places, their depth carried them to the district title, which gave the seniors the record of winning district every year since they were in the seventh grade.

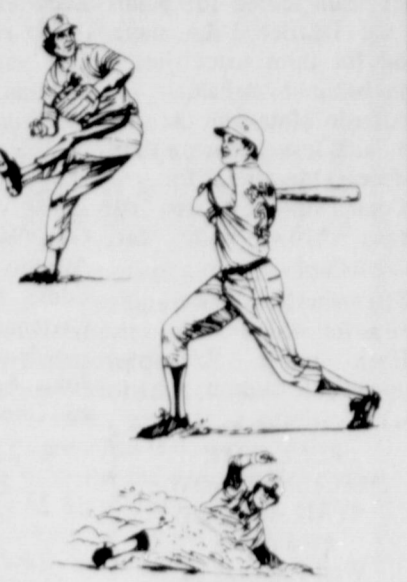

City Man Indicted On Tax Evasion

A federal grand jury in Midland has returned a six-count indictment against an Amarillo man, charging him with felony income tax evasion and with willful failure to file a tax return.

Austin B. Tibbetts, who is listed in the white pages of the telephone directory as a doctor with offices at 29-A Western Plaza, had not been arrested last night and was being sought, federal agents said.

Tibbetts, former president of United Tax Action Patriots—a tax protest group—is charged with three counts of felony income tax evasion and with three counts of willful failure to file income tax return Forms 1040 for the years 1974, 1975 and 1976.

The indictments allege that Tibbetts attempted to evade payment of the taxes by:

- *Failing to make a proper income tax return.
- *Failing to pay his income taxes.
- *Discontinuing use of checking accounts, using currency, money orders, and cashier's checks to cover his transactions.
- *Preparing and causing to be filed a protest-type Form 1040 in which he failed to disclose his income, expenses and deductions.

*Admitting orally and in writing that he intended not to pay income taxes.

Tibbetts' home address is not listed in the telephone directory, and there is no listing in the Yellow Pages identifying the type of doctor he is. A sign at 29-A Western Plaza says "Physicians-Surgeons, D.O."

Efforts to contact him for comment late last night were unsuccessful.

Tibbetts, who reportedly was in Midland when the indictments were returned Tuesday, has lectured in several states on the issue of federal income tax and was quoted at a tax revolt meeting two years ago as saying that the "best kept secret" by the Internal Revenue Service is that the tax protest movement is gaining.

He claimed then that the federal income tax is illegal and is a violation of Constitutional rights set down by the country's founding fathers.

The IRS apparently disagreed, because its agents from Midland and Lubbock reportedly spent several thousand hours investigating Tibbetts.

Should Tibbetts be convicted of the federal criminal charges, he would face a maximum penalty of 18 years in prison and a \$60,000 fine.

Political Dissident Indicted

"I believe there are more instances of the abridgement of the freedom of the people by gradual and silent encroachment of those in power than by violent and sudden usurpations." —James Madison.

"City man indicted on tax evasion" was a front-page headline of the Amarillo Daily News, Feb. 28. Many important details of this case were overlooked by the local media. Few people realize that his case is yet another subtle step in the steady progression toward a police state.

The Amarillo Daily News reported, in short, that Austin B. Tibbetts, former president of a tax protest group called the United Tax Action Patriots, has claimed that the federal income tax is illegal and a violation of his Constitutional Rights. The IRS disagreed and "reportedly spent several thousand hours investigating Tibbetts."

Consequently, an indictment issued by a Federal Grand Jury in Midland, Feb. 26 charged Tibbetts with three counts of felony income tax evasion and three counts of willful failure to file income tax returns for the years 1974, 1975 and 1976. He allegedly attempted to evade payment of taxes by:

- Failing to make a proper income tax return.
- Failing to pay his income taxes.
- Discontinuing use of checking accounts, using currency, money orders and cashier's checks to cover his transactions.
- Admitting orally and in writing that he intended not to pay income taxes.

The unstated fact, however, is that,

though technically charged with tax evasion, Tibbetts is going to be tried actually for his political dissension. He surrendered to a local magistrate two days after the indictment was issued and was released on \$100,000 bond. Compare that to Alvin Corbin Bicknell, indicted last month for criminal solicitation of capital murder, who was released on a mere \$5,000 bond.

During the years 1974, 1975 and 1976, Tibbetts filed 5th Amendment-type returns. This means, simply, that he furnished no information concerning his income or expenses, stating that the 5th Amendment guaranteed his right not to act as a witness against himself. Emphasis must be laid on the fact that he did not make a fraudulent return; he merely asserted his constitutional rights.

By contrast, millions of Americans—trying only to save a few meager bucks from a system that is slowly bleeding the middle-class dry—routinely fail to report portions of their earnings to the IRS. A 5th Amendment-type return is far more honest.

The IRS has prosecuted tax protestors who filed 5th Amendment returns for willful failure to furnish information, a misdemeanor offense under Internal Revenue Code, section 7203. Tibbetts is the first Patriot to be prosecuted for felony tax evasion, IRC-Section 7201, for filing a 5th Amendment return.

The IRS initiated no civil action to collect the \$3,435.40 of income tax that Tibbetts allegedly owes. He never received a notice of tax liability, the notorious 90-day letter. He only

received letters from the IRS which informed him that his tax returns for the years in question were unacceptable and which threatened him with prosecution under IRC Section 7203—failure to furnish information, a misdemeanor offense.

In response to those letters, Tibbetts appealed to the IRS for help. He informed them that he would amend his returns to meet IRS approval, if they would show him how to do so without violating any laws or waiving his constitutional rights. He also offered to pay any taxes he justly owed.

The IRS did not reply to his entreaties, so he made the same appeals to the Justice Department, who also failed to respond.

Armed with nothing more than arbitrary assessments of delinquent taxes, and ignoring the customary civil procedures generally applied to enforce such assessments, the IRS has construed Tibbetts' assertion of constitutional rights as felonious tax evasion.

Compare that to the case of Cohen v. Commissioner of Internal Revenue 266 F 2d 5. Lesly Cohen was arbitrarily charged with a tax deficiency of \$1,193,511.18, plus a 50 percent penalty for fraud of \$596,755.59—a total of \$1,790,266.77. The total deficiency was re-evaluated by the U.S. Tax Court as follows—deficiency—\$168,533.92, penalty \$91,127.42, total—\$259,661.34.

Though Cohen's tax deficiency—incurred by fraudulent return—was 75 times that of Tibbetts, the IRS initiated civil procedures to collect the taxes from Cohen. Cohen, however,

wasn't an out-spoken tax-protest leader bent on exposing unconstitutional methods of the government and the IRS.

When the right against self-incrimination becomes a crime in itself, as the IRS is trying to establish with Tibbetts—the court system will regress to a pre-Magna Carta inquisition.

When the right to privacy is trampled by such devices as the IRS audit—individuality will diminish, and the government will become supreme.

When the right to free enterprise is belittled by a heavy, graduated income tax that forces the burden of extravagant social programs solely onto the middle-class—Marxism is imminent.

T. Coleman Andrews, who resigned as commissioner of the IRS because he was disgusted by the police-state tactics used by that agency, stated that Congress, in implementing the 16th Amendment, had effectively repealed Article IV of the Bill of Rights by empowering the tax collector to do the very things from which that Article says we were to be secure.

Congressman H.R. Gross once said, "This nation...cannot continue to fill all the tin cups that are held out and grease all the hands extended palms up...Apparently only a taxpayers' revolt or a purge of Congress can stop it."

Painfully aware of encroaching tyranny in this country—an ever-tightening web of control, Tibbetts is leading by example the fight to maintain liberty. For that, he is being prosecuted.

Jasper & Lucille Gates

So many tragedies have resulted from IRS despotism that it is impossible to chronicle even a small proportion of them here. However, one or two have recently come to my attention which seem worthy of note.

First, there was the case of Jasper and Lucille Gates of Denver, who have been utterly destroyed. They do not know why the tragedy occurred, and no one seems able to help them in any way.

The trouble began in 1973, when they received a letter from the IRS stating that they were entitled to a refund of \$1,197 on their 1972 return. However, no check ever arrived. Worse, on June 4, 1974, they were notified that they owed an additional \$4,481.

But this was only the beginning: Without giving any explanation for the increased levy, IRS sent them a notice the following October that they owed \$13,700. In November, the amount rose to \$15,000; and in October, 1975, to more than \$16,000. Then, in August, 1978, the tax agents seized their debt-free home, worth \$100,000, and sold it at auction for \$16,000. When the couple was evicted, Mrs. Gates was in a wheel chair.

On being questioned, IRS officials declared that because of the provisions of the Privacy Act, they could not discuss or comment on what had occurred. In addition to seizing and selling their home, the

IRS had taken another \$30,000 of bank deposits and other assets. Thus, to satisfy an alleged obligation of \$16,000, the IRS confiscated property worth \$130,000.

Mr. and Mrs. Gates declared that they had never been audited; that, to the best of their belief and knowledge, they had paid all taxes due; that they had never been tax protestors; and that they do not have the slightest inkling as to the reasons behind the IRS actions. But they are stripped of all their possessions; they have no place to live and no income; they have been totally unable to obtain help from anyone and their life has become a complete nightmare.

Hansen Raps Carter On Collection Practices

Buried in the appendix of President Carter's 1981 budget is a provision which would allow the Internal Revenue Service to arbitrarily collect funds any way it can, blithely disregarding any laws passed by the Congress.

On page 775 of the appendix of the budget, the president proposed that the general provisions governing Treasury Department appropriations be altered to delete the requirements that IRS personnel comply with certain provisions of the Fair Debt Collection Practices Act.

The effect of this proposed deletion would be to license the practices forbidden by the act, which include

"the use or threat of use of violence or other criminal means to harm the physical person, reputation or property of any person," and "the use of obscene or profane language or language the natural consequence of which is to abuse the hearer or reader" and "causing a telephone to ring or engaging any person in telephone conversation repeatedly or continuously with intent to annoy,

abuse or harass any person at the called number."

Rep. George Hansen (R-Idaho) told his colleagues on February 5 that, "in an age when the great cry is for more responsible and responsive government, it comes as something of a surprise, even a shock, to have the president propose an appropriation for the purpose of harassing, oppressing and abusing taxpayers. Incredible as it might seem, the budget of the U.S. for fiscal year 1981 contains such a proposal."

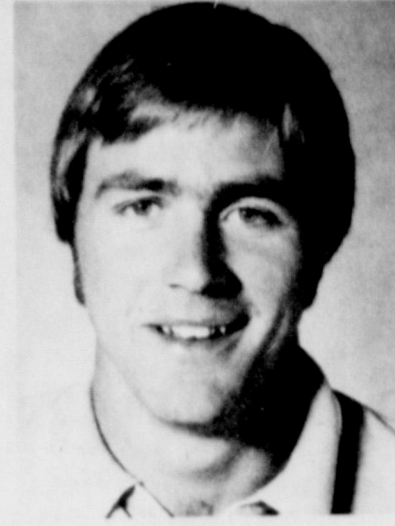

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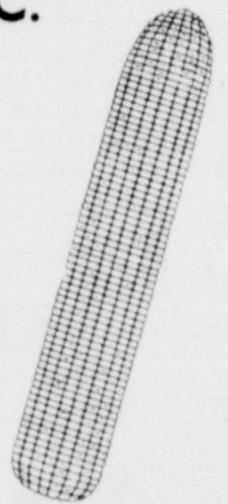

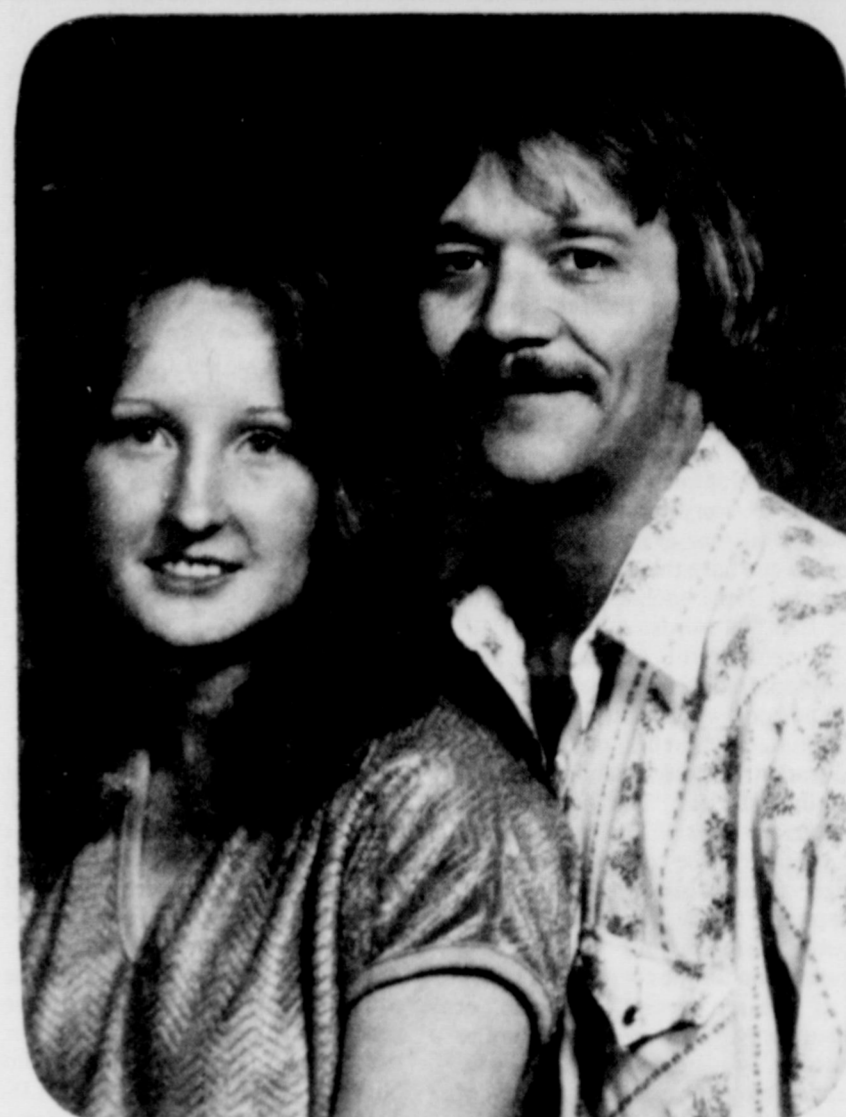
