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ONE OF THE TOPICS which we have brought up occasionally in this column was espoused in a couple of other places this week. Maybe it is an idea whose time has come or will come someday, if we ever decide that tradition is worth breaking.

The topic to which we refer is the "secession" of the Panhandle area from the rest of the state.

The latest champion of this cause is Buck Ramsey, who argues in its favor in the current issue of "Accent West," a magazine which preaches the virtues of the Amarillo area.

Ramsey points out that back as early as 1853, Governor Elisha Pease had drawn up his own plan for dividing up the state, and began trying to sell it off to the Federal Government for use as an Indian Reservation.

Fortunately for us, he did not succeed, but unfortunately, as Ramsey points out, this attitude toward the Panhandle seems to have held sway downstate ever since.

Ramsey's tongue-in-cheek article points out that if such a new state were created, the traditional southern boundary would be a line roughly from Lazbuddie to Kress to Quitaque. "But we might want to drop down another tier of counties, and make the boundary posted by Maple, Lum's Chapel, Roaring Springs and Chalk," Ramsey says.

He points out that the proposed 51st state would not be a great populated area, containing an estimated 430,400 souls according to recent estimates. That would rank it only 49th, ahead of Alaska and Wyoming--we'd be one of those sparsely populated western states. Area-wise, the new state, dubbed "Cheyenne" by the magazine would contain 31,289 square miles, and this would be close to "average" in size, ranking 39th, ahead of such states as

Shortly thereafter, I started receiving notices from the Stonewall Historical Commission urging me to write our family history and mail it so we would be included in the Stonewall County History book. I just kept putting it off until it was too late. Now, the book is out and our family isn't represented in it.

"I have nothing to hand down to our grandchildren and friends showing what we did for the county where we lived and worked so long.

"I am sorry that I did not respond to the letters sent to me. Since we were married here and I live here now, I plan to contribute to the Parmer County History book, and

urge all others who live here now or have lived here in the past, to do likewise."

Anyone who desires to write about deceased parents, has several options available. The parents may be included in the 500 words of free space, or special spaces may be purchased for memorials or tributes.





The radio personality pointed out that creating new states is a topic of conversation in at least five states. He mentioned California, Florida, New Jersey and Michigan in addition to Texas. He mentioned Texas' unique five-way proviso, so apparently the secret is out.

California has, due to its extreme length, a North-South situation, with population centers for each. Florida has an East-West difference of opinion, with a Panhandle of its own. Michigan has a natural division, with Lake Michigan dividing the state not quite in half.

New Jersey residents have circulated a petition asking for a proposition to place the voters on the matter of dividing. So, this may be the first real "test case."

What will the U.S. map look like in 20 years? Will it be the same, or have some changes? Tune in around July 1, 2000, and we'll tell you.

this week, as citizens were reminded to help with conservation of city water.

Residents of the city were in the second week of water rationing, after two city wells ceased to function on the afternoon of June 22, placing the city's water system in a bind.

Residents of Friona who live to the west of Grand Avenue have been asked to water their lawns and gardens only on the even-numbered calendar dates. Residents living to the east of Grand Avenue are asked to do their watering only on the oddnumbered calendar dates.

All residents are urged to be as conservative as possible with city water, and cut back water usage as much as possible.

City manager Jake Outland said that the water rationing plan has helped the city have enough water to go around for the "bare necessities," but that it has been virtually impossible for the storage facilities to regain anything resembling their usual capacity, due to the continued

produce, the other five city wells have been running non-stop in an attempt to produce the needed water for Friona residents.

The city's consulting engineer, M.R. (Red) Smith of Lubbock was in the city this week performing engineering tasks relating to the drilling of the new well and tying it into the city's water system.

Outland said that drilling and piping the new well would not take as much time as tying the well into the city's system. The entire process is expected to take five or six weeks, putting it into August before

Outland said that preliminary tests on the new well site indicate a production of approximately 300 to 350 gallons per minute. "We had hoped for a 400 gpm well," Outland said.

Big T Pump Co. is also working to reclaim the well at 9th and Grand. It is hoped that some production can be salvaged from that well, which was dug in 1970.

Meanwhile, residents have been sweltering under a second week of high temperatures which topped the 100-degree mark.

5 YEARS AGO-JUNE 15, 1975

The contract for purchase of 7.81 acres of land for the location of the Friona Nursing Home was signed this week, with the City of Friona purchasing the land from Tommy Jones. The property is located just north of the present city limits, bounded by Main Street on the West and Welch Acres on the East. The council was also shown the architect's drawing for a 60-bed facility. The drawings included the floor plan and a front elevation.

Joint services for Bobby F. Everson, 32, and his wife, Judy Ann, 30, who were killed near Lubbock in a collision involving a dune buggy and a pickup truck were held Wednesday in Spearman.

Officiating was the Rev. Russell Pogue. Burial was in Gruver Cemetery by Boxwell Brothers Funeral Home.

Also killed in the accident was Daniel Benson, 17, of Lubbock, driver of the dune buggy in which the Eversons were passengers.

Lubbock resident Thomas Cook, 36, driver of the pickup involved in the collision at 8:20 p.m. Sunday, remained in critical condition at Lubbock General Hospital, a spokesman said.

Jerry Brock, 27, of Snyder, also a passenger in the dune buggy, was reported in serious condition in Lubbock General.

A.J. Hamlin, 43, of Woodrow, a passsenger in the truck, was treated and released from the hospital.

A Texas Department of Public Safety spokesman said the dune buggy was westbound on a country road west of Woodrow, about ten miles south of Lubbock, and the pickup was eastbound when the headon collision occurred. Investigators said the dune buggy,

a converted Volkswagen, apparently ran off the road and onto the right shoulder, then swerved back onto the roadway and into the path of the pickup.

Everson was born in Pampa and had resided in Spearman 13 years. He was employed by H&H Water Well Service and was a member of the Moose Lodge.

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
He and Mrs. Everson were married in October 1967 in Spearman.


Mrs. Everson was born at Shattuck, Oklahoma, and had resided in Spearman nearly all of her life. She was a member of the First Baptist Church.

At a time when our economy is suffering from a shortage of saved money for homeowners and businesses to borrow, it is completely absurd to take an action guaranteed to make the problem even worse. Yet that is what the Administration proposes to do - by requiring that 15 percent of interest or dividend income be withheld for income taxes before the recipient gets the money.

The people of Texas are unhappy about the proposal and I don't blame them. In fact, in the last week of May alone, I received 1,047 letters on the subject - each one individually composed by a concerned citizen. I don't remember any other single issue drawing that kind of response. I couldn't be more pleased that you see the proposal for what it is.

The rate of savings in this country has dropped to the lowest level ever. That has added to inflation in two ways. First, interest rates went up because investors had to compete more for fewer dollars available from the pool of saved money. Second, money that isn't saved or invested is spent, causing more dollars to be in circulation and driving up prices. One of the best ways to fight inflation is to encourage people to save more, not less. That's what we in Congress were trying to do when we passed a tax exemption for the small saver and investor. The Administration's proposal to withhold taxes from that income is directly contradictory to that legislation. I am at a loss to understand this apparent confusion of purpose.

Furthermore, the withholding requirement is tantamount to forcing retired citizens or others whose income comes from invested money to make interest-free loans to the government out of their savings accounts. Although the Administration insists that it will develop an exemption plan for people who aren't liable for income

taxes, the individual would have the burden of having to file forms with every source of interest or dividends and of keeping detailed records.

Finally, the record-keeping requirements of financial institutions and corporations would be increased greatly by the new requirement. Naturally, these increased costs would be passed along, in whole or in part, to the consumer

What is the purpose of a plan with such obvious bad effects? The stated goal is to catch tax evaders, but quite likely it won't do that. It would, however, be the functional equivalent of a tax increase, falling primarily on the middle class and our senior citizens.

None of us condones evading our fair share of taxes. However, most people do pay the taxes due on the interest they earn annually. Already the IRS can check to see if interest and dividend income is being declared, since it receives a copy of the "information return" sent by each institution that pays interest and dividends. Withholding an arbitrary 15 percent - which may not begin to approximate the actual percentage due from an individual taxpayer - simply raises revenue for the government. Its only use would be to help "balance" the budget without reducing excessive government spending.

The tax-writing committees of both the House and Senate have expressed their strongest disapproval of the President's withholding proposal. I am cosponsor of a Senate resolution condemning the proposal as the potentially disasterous disincentive to savings that it is. In the unlikely event that the proposal actually reaches the full Senate, I certainly will make the strongest effort to give it a swift burial.
