## Lazbuddie Sweeps Top Show Honors

Last Friday's results in the championship judging in the Parmer County Junior Livestock Show could have been termed an "Orange Crush."

The outcome definitely had an "orange" flavor, as Lazbuddie exhibitors swept championships in all three divisions of the show, and added to their already impressive list of honors won at the county livestock show.

Scotty Windham, vo-ag instructor at Lazbuddie, said it was the first time since the grand champion sheep award was re-instated that exhibitors from Lazbuddie had swept all three of the championships awarded in the show.

Vandi Tarter captured the most competitive championship--the barrow award, with a 244-pound Duroc entry which was champion of its breed. There had been a total of 312 entries in the barrow show, a record number, and judging took a total of eight hours, from 8 a.m. Friday until 4 p.m.

Miss Tarter's win gave her community its 18th barrow title in the past 20 years, and 21st in 33 county shows. The win by the Duroc knotted up the standings once again for individual breeds. Durocs and Hampshires have each won eight county titles.

Reserve champion barrow was exhibited by Mark Petchinsky, Friona FFA member, who had the champion crossbred barrow.

The judge, Marcus Phillips of Hereford, complimented the Parmer County showmen on their projects. "I tried to evaluate each animal in the show. You have all done well,"

Phillips said. He indicated his final choice was a close one between the Duroc and the Crossbred barrows.

Sean Mason of Lazbuddie exhibited the grand champion sheep, a medium wool entry which had earned breed champion honors in preliminary judging.

Reserve champion lamb was exhibited by Tim Garner of Bovina, whose 126-pound lamb had been reserve champion in the medium wool division behind Mason's animal.

Phillip Jesko of Lazbuddie their "sweep" in the show, when his 1156-pound Angus was tapped for Grand Champion honors in the steer show Friday night.

Jesko's animal had earlier won the light heavyweight class in preliminary judging.

Keeping the honors in the family, Jeff Jesko won the reserve champion honors with a 1217-pound Hereford Cross steer.

Other class winners were Holly Tatum of Friona and Doug Roming of Bovina.

Other breed champion honors in the barrow show were won by Tommy Mesman of Farwell, Yorkshire; Matt Howell of Bovina, Chester White; Sharlet Johnson, Bovina, Berkshire; Russell Windham, Lazbuddie, Hampshire, and Sherrie Seaton, Lazbuddie, Poland China.

In the sheep show, Guy Ellis of Friona had the champion fine wool cross, Brian Glover of Lazbuddie had the champion fine wool lamb, and Sheldon Mason of Lazbuddie had the champ Southdown.

Showmanship awards were won by Charles Johnson of Bovina in the

## Nice Crowd Attends Clayton Fete Here

A near-capacity crowd attended the Bill Clayton appreciation dinner Monday night at the Friona High School cafeteria. The event was sponsored by Clayton's friends in Parmer and Bailey counties.

Clayton presented a patriotic-type speech, and thanked those attending the banquet.

"I can reflect back over the last number of years, and relate to you a lot of things which have happened in Bailey and Parmer Counties, of which we have been a part. And it has been good," Clayton said.

"We have seen during the past two decades a great change in this area of the state. We have seen a change in the entire state, but I feel that there has been more accomplished in this area of the state in the last 18-20 years," Clayton said, pointing to the progress.

"I would like to say that I have been pleased to have been a part of this area of the state, and to have been friends and neighbors of those who inhabit this land we call ours. I am particularly grateful to you tonight, who have given me the opportunity to serve you in Austin as your state representative, and to have been a part of the area; to see industries spring up and jobs become available, to see people happy and

optimistic. "You have been a part of my life. You have helped me to grow, and to realize what it truly means to be a Texas, a West Texan, and an American," Clayton said.

"We need to recall what our forefathers did that we might have the freedoms that we have today...the price that Americans have paid in two centuries for the freedoms we enjoy," he added.

Referring to the recent bribery charges which have been brought out in the news against him, Clayton said "Sometimes it's not easy. Sometimes it gets discouraging. But I'm optimistic. I believe in people. I believe in Texas and I believe in America."

# Grain Reserve Program Changes

Following the January 7 suspension of grain shipments to the Soviet Union, changes were made in the Farmer-owned Grain Reserve. These changes affect entry, loan rates, storage payments and release and call levels.

## For Grain Entering The Reserve After January 7, 1980

Only good quality corn, wheat, grain sorghum, and oats produced on participating farms is eligible.

1979 national average loan rates per bushel are: corn-\$2.10; wheat-\$2.50; barley-\$1.71; oats-\$1.08; and sorghum-\$3.57 per hundredweight.

Interest is waived for the second and third years of the three-year reserve loan agreement. In addition, the first year interest will be waived for the first 512 million bushels of corn to enter the reserve.

Annual payments for storage per bushel are now 20 cents for oats and 26 1/2 cents for other grain.

The release levels (when the producer may repay the reserve loan and sell the grain without penalty) for grains entering the reserve after January 7, 1980 are:

## For Grain Under The Reserve Agreement Prior To January 7, 1980

Farmers may: (1) elect to leave grain under the existing agreement or (2) visit the local ASCS office and execute a new reserve agreement under the new rules.

The new storage payments of 20 cents per bushel for oats and 26 1/2 cents per bushel for other grains also apply to grain left under old agreements (except for agreements approved prior to February 9, 1978).

An additional loan disbursement, based on increased loan rates, may be obtained for 1979 crop grain.

Release and call rules remain the same and release and call levels are:

In addition to higher storage payments and higher loan advances for 1979 crop grain indicated above, a new agreement would also mean new release and call level rules and an extended storage period.

One year's interest charges must be paid by the producer. But those interest charges paid under old agreements are credited toward this requirement. However, for corn entering the reserve between October 22, 1979 and January 7, 1980, first

year interest accruing after January 7, 1980 will be waived, providing new agreements are made prior to March 31, 1980.

Producers with grain eligible for the reserve or already under agreement are encouraged to see their county ASCS officials and determine how the current grain reserve options and benefits apply to them.

## Local Exhibitors Take Honors In El Paso Show

Young exhibitors from Lazbuddie showed placing animals in various classes at the 1980 Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show in El Paso. Area young exhibitors are members of 4-H Clubs or FFA Chapters in Parmer County.

Local winners include: Sherrie Seaton, fifth junior barrow 231-250 pounds, Berkshire; Sherrie Seaton, second junior barrows 231-250 pounds, Poland China; Sherrie Seaton, reserve champion Poland China barrow; Russell Windham, second junior barrow 216-230 pounds, Yorkshire.

The Junior Division of the Stock Show included entries in the steer show, breeding beef heifer cow, dairy show, breeding sheep and market lamb show and barrow show.

During the Sale of Champions--steers lambs and barrows--which was held on the last weekend of the 84th annual exposition, \$266,868 was rendered to the young exhibitors for their animals. Premiums paid by the Stock Show and various livestock breed associations totaled \$56,101.

## 50 YEARS AGO--FEB. 28, 1930

W.H. Warren has the masonry work done on his new building on Main Street, with fair prospects of completion within the next two weeks. The building will be 26 by 60 feet, one story high, divided into three offices. One of these rooms will be an office for Dr. Wills, and another to be occupied by the Friona Star. The third is as yet unrented.

## 40 YEARS AGO--MARCH 1, 1940

Our people received word with regret which informed them that Dan Ethridge has arranged to move from our city to Lubbock, where he and Mrs. Ethridge will make their home in the future, although they extend congratulations to Dan for the promotion he has received by his appointment as special agent for the Cravens and Dargan Insurance Brokers, of Houston.

## 35 YEARS AGO--MARCH 2, 1945

The Friona Squaws became champions of District 19 after beating four good ball clubs at the tournament February 23 and 24 at Claude. The Squaws downed Lazbuddie in the opening round, 25-14, and then Lakeview, 28-20. Friona downed Claude, 19-14 in the semi-finals, and then outplayed the Quail Bobwhites, 31-24 in the finals. The Squaws are eligible to attend the state tournament in Hillsboro by virtue of winning this tournament.

## 30 YEARS AGO--FEB. 24, 1950

At a meeting of the directors of the Friona Wheat Growers, Inc. Tuesday night it was definitely decided to build more elevator and storage space for the wheat growers, and a contract was let to A.F. Roberts for the erection of another concrete storage elevator. The new elevator will have a capacity of 600,000 bushels of grain, and construction will begin in the near future.

## 25 YEARS AGO--FEB. 25, 1955

Friona businessmen desiring direct motor freight service with Lubbock are reminded this week by Chamber of Commerce president Dillie Kelley

that intensified efforts in this matter should be made by next week. A Lubbock meeting with the Interstate Commerce Commission and the Lang Transit Company has been arranged for Thursday, March 3. Several local firms have already made plans to be represented at the meeting.

## 20 YEARS AGO--FEB. 25, 1960

A farmer and rancher, and a farmer's wife were named the Outstanding Man and Woman of the Year by the Friona Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture at the annual banquet held Friday night at the school cafeteria.

A.L. Black, prominent farmer and rancher, and an active member of the Soil Conservation District's board of directors, was named Man of the Year, and Katy Osborn, long-time resident of the Friona area and wife of Claude Osborn of Friona was named Outstanding Woman of the Year.

## 15 YEARS AGO--FEB. 25, 1965

The clock finally struck "midnight" for the Friona Chieftains, and their "Cinderella" basketball season Tuesday night at Whiteface. The Chiefs, in the basketball playoffs for the first time

in 20 years, ran into a polished herd of Denver City Mustangs, and the playoff-experienced Mustangs made off with an 81-66 victory to win the right to advance to the regional semi-finals Saturday.

## 10 YEARS AGO--FEB. 26, 1970

Exhibitors from Lazbuddie had another field day at the 36th annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show last weekend. Lazbuddie claimed the grand champion award in the barrow show for an unprecedented 10th consecutive year, won four of five trophies in the sheep show, and then surprised by taking the steer championship on Saturday.

## 5 YEARS AGO--FEB. 23, 1975

The sale totals at the 27th annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show came within \$200 of beating the all-time mark established at the 1974 show. Prize animals sold for a total of \$60,195.78 last Saturday, compared to \$60,387.33 the previous year.

A crowd of 57 people attended a meeting in Friona Monday night, in response to a request by the Friona Chamber of Commerce to determine the interest in building a Rest Home in Friona.

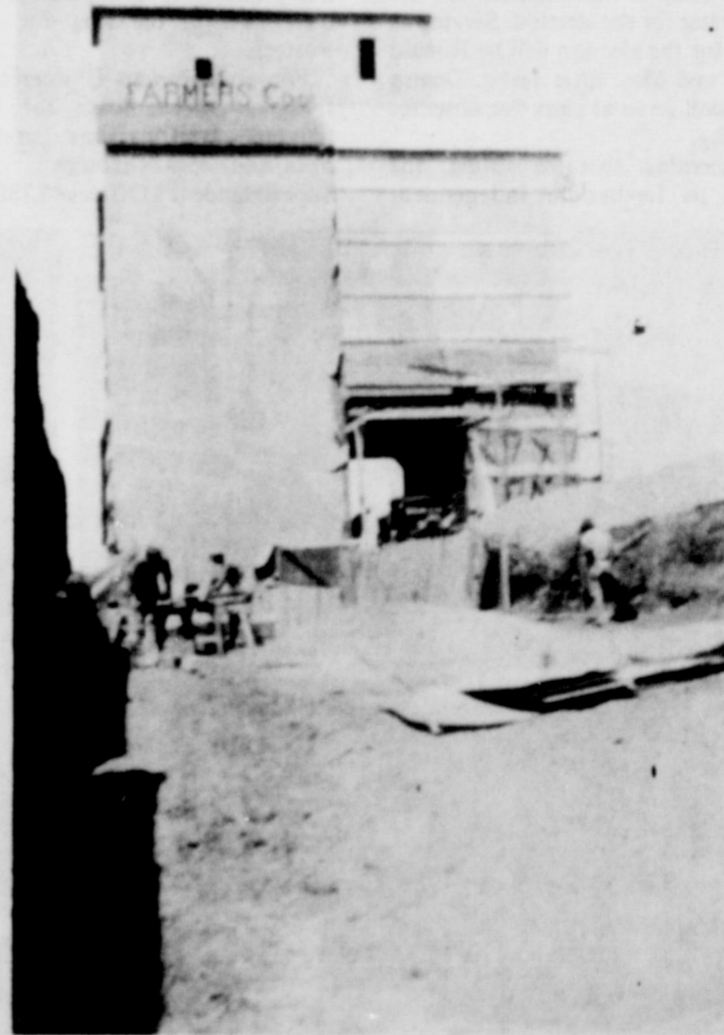

## Friona Gets Sales Tax Rebate Check

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday said Texas cities will receive more than \$36 million in February in rebates from the optional one-percent city sales tax.

Bullock said the February allocation is about \$11 million more than cities received during the same period last year.

He said more efficient deposit procedures in his agency have resulted in larger rebate checks to cities during the past few months. Friona's share in the current rebate was \$6,341.96, which compared to \$5,179.43 for the same period a year ago.

Dallas will get a check for \$4.6 million, bringing that city's total for 1980 to about \$7.3 million.

Houston's rebate for this month will be \$7.3 million, compared to \$5.4 million during the same period last year. Houston's 1980 rebates total more than \$12.4 million.

San Antonio will receive a February check for \$1.8 million, raising that city's 1980 payments to date to \$3.2 million.

Fort Worth's check will be \$1.5 million, bringing the city's 1980 payments to date to \$2.4 million.

The city sales tax is collected by merchants and businesses along with the state's four-percent sales tax and is rebated monthly by the Comptroller's office to cities where it is collected.

## Farmers To Be Polled On Hauling

Texas grain farmers have a unique opportunity to be heard on grain transportation issues through a poll announced recently by Pioneer Hi-Bred International, Inc. Polling will continue until about March 20th.

The "Pioneer Poll on Grain Transportation" is being conducted in 16 major agricultural states. According to Jim Lindsey, president of the company's Southwestern Division, the poll is designed to gather farmers' opinions on the current grain transportation situation.

"The purpose of this poll is to find out exactly how serious our current transportation problems are," Lindsey said. "We want to know how these problems are affecting farmers in various regions of the country and what farmers think should be done."

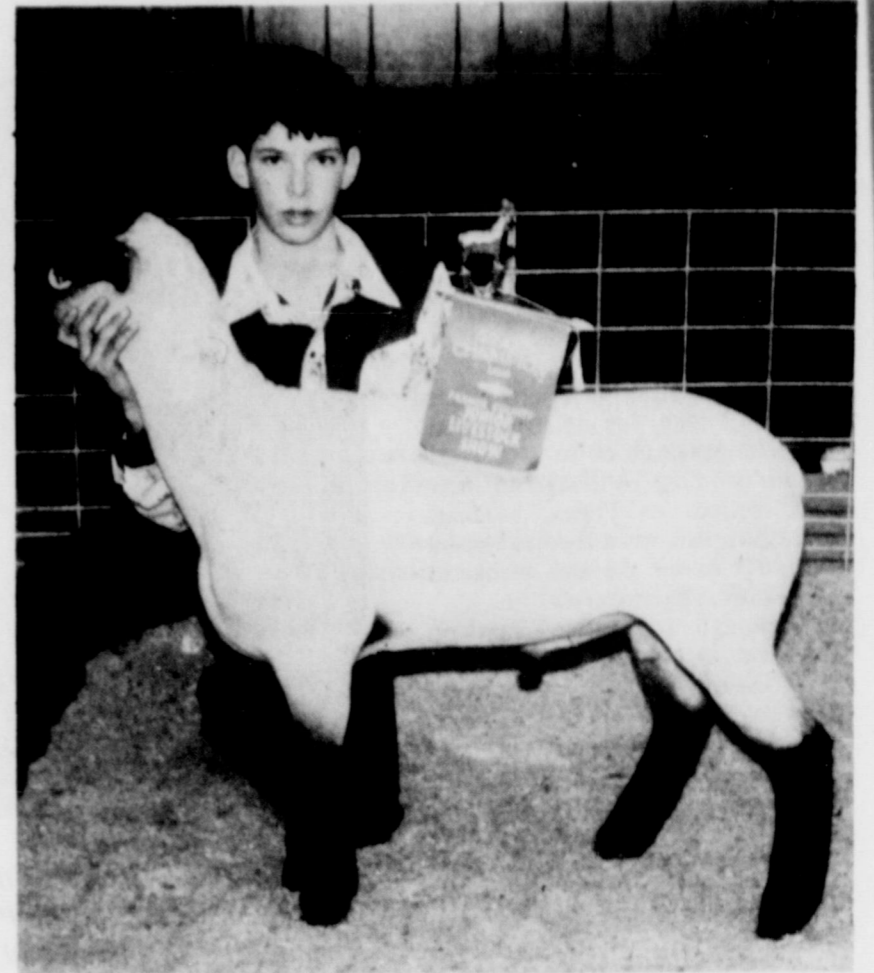

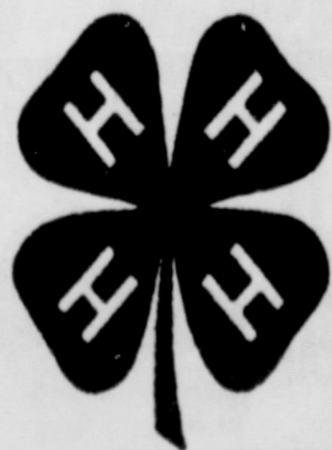

## Several Burglaries Reported By Sheriff

Charles Peace of Friona reported that he had lost a license plate while in Mexico, but according to Lovelace, because of the location of the loss it was out of Parmer County jurisdiction.

John Sanders of Muleshoe reported to the sheriff's office that "someone scraped his car between Farwell and Muleshoe," but investigation shed no light into the matter as to who may have been responsible for the incident.

The service will include scripture readings, Father McGovern's speech, and conclude with a time of fellowship in the Parish Hall of St. Teresa's Catholic Church.

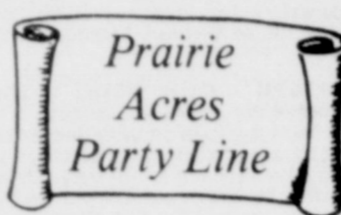

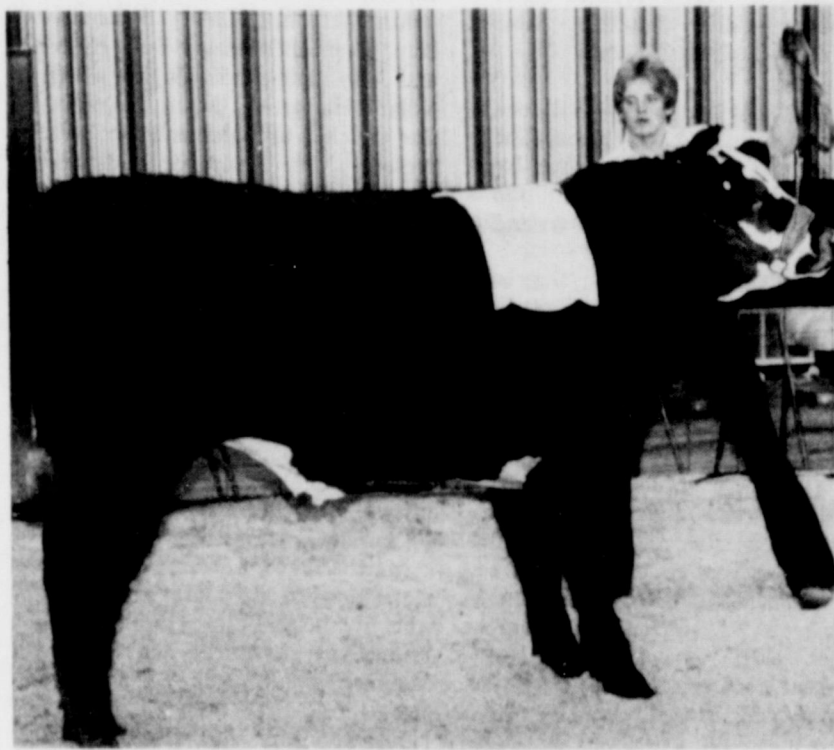

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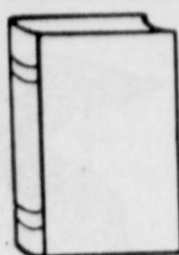

A PCG staff member will conduct the election, review current events and PCG activities of importance to High Plains cotton producers and agribusinessmen.

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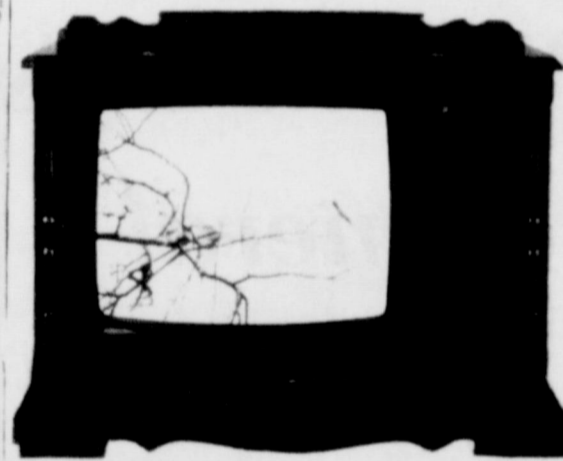
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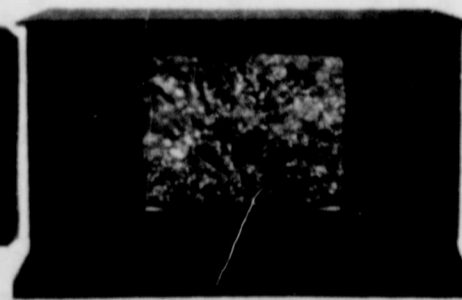
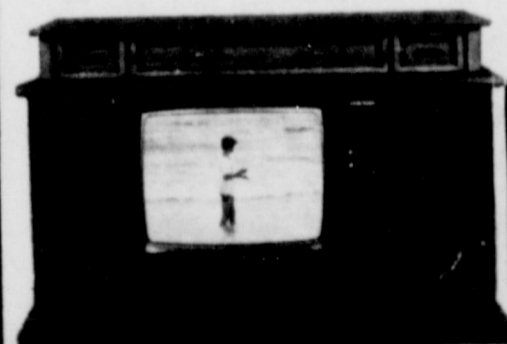
