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High Laid Low, Just Is No More

HIGH, Tex. (AP) — First the school consolidated. The highway moved over north two miles. Then the last store closed.

And finally, with the close of fiscal year 1972, the U.S. Postal Service has laid High low. The old High Post Office, now, too, is no more.

The retirement of Miss Irene Branum, the High postmaster for almost 24 years, triggered the demise of the little Class IV post office in Northeast Texas. Postal officials have hauled away the furniture and the records. The final few patrons at High will be served out of Roxton and Brookston.

In recent years, the High Post Office has provided a few boxes, general delivery, stamps and such to the families living in the area. A lot of oldtimers like Roscoe McClure remembered when High was a bustling little community on Highway 82. McClure still used the Post Office regularly.

The High rural route went to Brookston several years ago. Miss Branum eventually closed the general store but kept the Post Office open.

High first got its Post Office on Feb. 26, 1891, and the name came from a prominent family in the area at the time. A fellow named McDaniel High was, in fact, the first postmaster.

The aging building that housed the High Post Office for many years still stands, the last vestige of downtown High. But in the name of economy and progress, the Postal Service has exiled ZIP Code 75445 to wherever old ZIP codes go.

Acupuncture Clinic Closed

NEW YORK (AP) — An acupuncture clinic that opened one week ago has closed down in the face of a state ruling that nonphysicians who administered the needle therapy were practicing medicine illegally.

Dr. Arnold Benson said Wednesday that he was closing the Acupuncture Center of New York but planned to fight the ruling by the State Department of Education, which regulates the practice of medicine.

The clinic employed four Chinese-trained therapists working under the supervision of Benson, a licensed physician. In the few days it was open, some 300 persons were treated for a variety of ailments.



'Athletic Heart'

Your Good Health

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Due to weight lifting, I developed an athletic heart, and wish to know if this is dangerous. I had an electrocardiogram taken, and the doctor said I had an enlarged left ventricle. — P.J.F.

That he noted a preponderance of what is called "the electrical axis in the left ventricle." This is not abnormal. Assuming that you have had no heart disease (rheumatic fever, coronary disease, or congenital defect), such a reading does not imply enlargement of the heart. Just exactly what did the doctor say? Did he just drop a casual comment, or what? If he said he found an abnormality and you ought to keep track of it with further checks, that would be something else.

Love Life Loss

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP) — An elderly couple who claimed a transfusion of the wrong type of blood ruined their love life has been awarded \$27,500 in damages.

A Circuit Court jury deliberated four hours before returning the judgment in favor of Paul and Lena Piccirillo of Dania.

The Piccirillos' suit against Memorial Hospital in Hollywood claimed that Piccirillo was given the wrong type of blood in June 1969, sending him into shock and requiring a month of hospitalization.

Mrs. Piccirillo, 62, testified that she and her 64-year-old husband had sexual relations four or five times a week prior to his operation. Since the operation, she said, her husband goes to bed early and they have relations only once every five or six weeks.

The couple has been married for 35 years.

Sir, your friends are giving you some very faulty advice, because those vegetables aren't going to affect your blood pressure one way or the other (and egg plant is hardly a "leafy" vegetable).

You'll do much better for yourself to get some information on what really does or doesn't affect your blood pressure, and I suggest that you read my booklet, "Controlling Your Blood Pressure." Send 25 cents and a long, self-addressed envelope and I'll send you a copy.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I have been told that baked apples are fattening. Is this true or false? — H. J.

Baked apples usually have sugar or syrup added, and that means extra calories. Nothing, eaten in moderation, is "fattening." It's when too much of anything or everything is eaten that we get fat.

Why Did Boy Stop Growing At Age Of 3?

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — The more the doctors study Sergio Pacheco, the more baffled they are. Why did the 14-year-old youngster stop growing at the age of 3?

After two months of study Dr. David Chadwick, who heads a team of researchers on the case, says, "I'm afraid our research so far has raised more questions than it has answered."

The dark-eyed Mexican boy was born in a hovel on the southern fringes of Tijuana. He grew normally for three years. Since then, he and his family say his normally apportioned body has changed only a fraction of an inch.

Doctors say he is 33 inches tall, weighs less than 40 pounds and actively competes in sports.

Sergio, a sophomore who does well in high school, gets along with his brothers and sisters, whose growth has been normal, and with his friends.

A campaign in San Diego has raised \$1,000 to finance the research tests which Chadwick, a specialist at Children's Hospital, said have turned up "nothing to explain adequately his physical problems."

At first, it was thought Sergio either lacked sufficient growth hormones or suffered from a pituitary gland problem.

"Maybe it is something missing in his tissue structure that keeps his body from growing," Chadwick said in an interview Wednesday. "It could be a new missing factor as far as medical science is concerned."

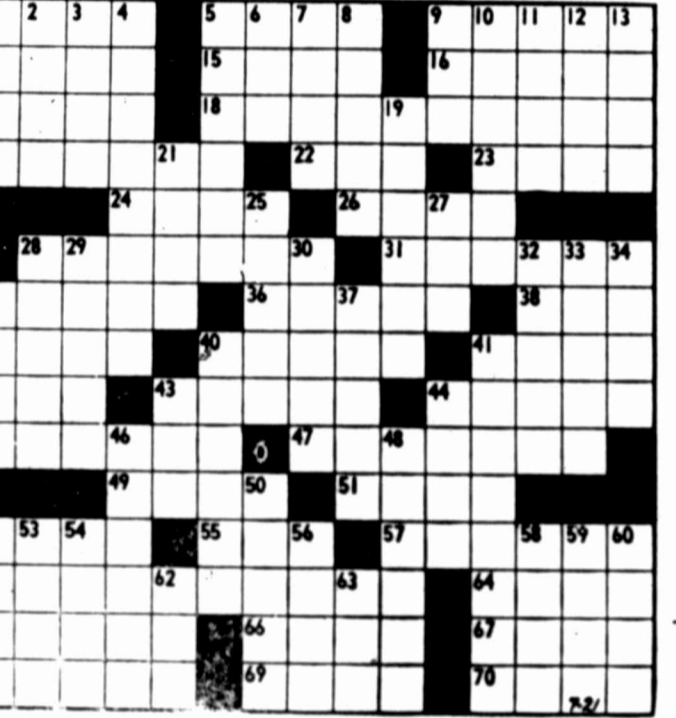

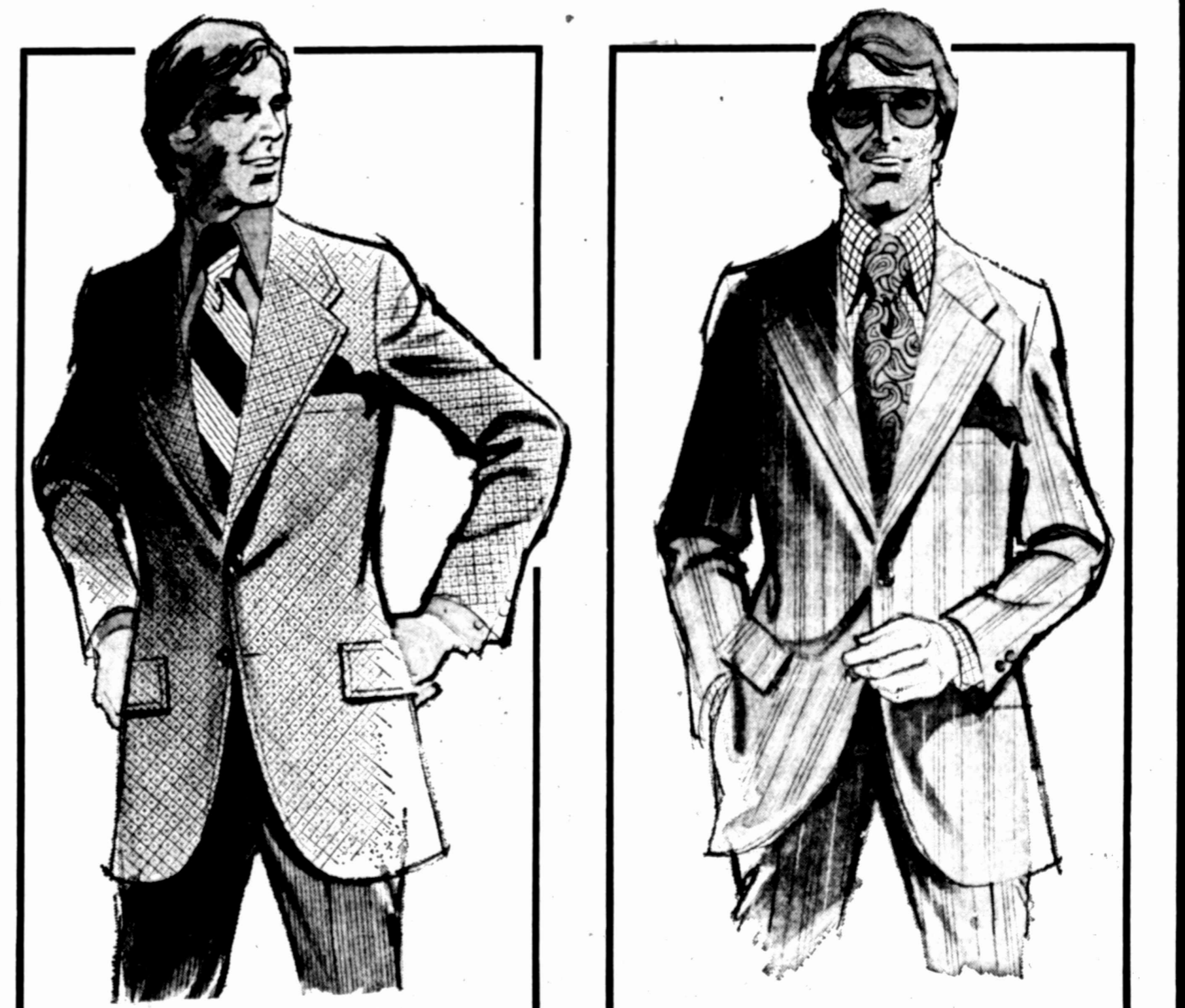
