ONE OF OUR Ellis cousins, Linda Patton, lives in Chehalis, Washington, and gave us a first-hand report by telephone this week of the Mt. St. Helens volcano eruption and the aftermath, which has been much in the news this week.

Linda lives at Chehalis, Washington, which is just 38 miles northeast of the volcano. No one is allowed to go farther west than her town.

Linda said that she was monitoring her ham radio on Sunday, when she heard a broadcast by a man on the mountain. The man said "It's about to blow!"

She and her family went out into their yard, and had a ringside seat for the "volcano show." Sunday was a sunny, clear day in the area, which made the sight even more impressive.

"The television pictures just don't do it justice," Linda told us. "When we saw that dark blue-grey cloud coming up out of the mountain, it gave you an eerie feeling, like it might be the end of the world," she said.

The cloud, which experts said rose nine miles high and was 35 miles wide, gave off flashes of lightning as it rose into the air, due to the tremendous heat from the volcano.

Linda said that a number of people, including sight-seers, tourists and adventurers, were in the area at the time of the eruption. People had been warned not to go too near the mountain, but went anyway, and a number suffered burns, and of course, several deaths have resulted.

The ham radio broadcaster which Ms. Patton heard is presumed dead, as is Harry Truman, the old recluse who had lived all his life on the mountain.

She was pointing out how much the appearance of Mt. St. Helens has changed since the volcanic activity this spring. It has gone from a pointed top to a "flat top," and has lost 1300 feet in height since the activity began.

Linda said that they had been fortunate from the standpoint of not getting the volcanic ash which much of that area received. The prevailing wind carried it west, and away from their home. The ash has killed all of the fish in the river which runs close to where they live, however.

Our informant said that some residents of the area had bottled up some of the volcanic ash, and were sending it out to residents in other parts of the country as souvenirs of the volcano.

"Since the wind has carried the ashes all across the country, it appears that a number of people will be getting souvenirs of the volcano by 'air mail,'" Ms. Patton said.

Absentee Voting Begins

Parmer County Clerk Bonnie Warren has announced that absentee voting for the runoff election for the democratic primary, to be held June 7, will begin on May 28 and run through June 3. Absentee voting will take place on weekdays from 8:30-5.

On the county level, there is only one race on the runoff ballot. That is for the place of County Commissioner, precinct three. The contestants are Archie Tarter and Max Crim.

Three state races are also contested.

J.P. (Jim) Wallace and John C. Phillips are seeking the Associate Justice of Supreme Court, Place 1.

For the Court of Criminal Appeals, W.T. Phillips and Mike McCormick, Place 2, are candidates. For the Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 3, Tom Davis and Edith Roberts are the runoff candidates.

Buske Is Elected In Mayor's Race

B.K. Buske was re-elected as mayor of Friona on Tuesday, in a better than average turnout of voters in the special mayoral election.

Buske was sworn in on Tuesday to end a 30-day period during which the city had no officially-elected mayor, following the strange turn of events on the regular city election in April.

With a turnout of 319 voters, Buske received 203 votes, to 78 for former mayor W.L. (Preach) Edelson.

Since write-in campaigns have become the order of the day, we had one this time, too. E.G. Phipps received 35 write-in votes, Jerry Brownnd received two, and Beverly Mars one, to complete the voting.

Dates Told For Annual Drama Fete

Dates for Friona's annual Summer Drama Workshop were announced this week by Deke Kendrick, spokesman for the Friona Fine Arts Council. The workshop will be held from July 6-12.

The workshop will be just a one-week affair this summer, due to a busy time for workshop clinician Del Lewis.

"Del is slated to become the head of the undergraduate acting program at the University of Wisconsin at Madison, and will be in the process of moving during the summer," Mrs. Kendrick stated.

More details on the annual workshop will be announced in the near future. It is expected that the annual tuition fee will be adjusted due to the shorter schedule. The age groups will probably remain the same. Registration is expected to be held on Sunday, July 6, which will also serve as a workshop day.

The Friona Fine Arts Council is made up of representatives of the various clubs and organizations in Friona. Any group which is not represented on the council is certainly invited to join, and may secure additional information from Mrs. Kendrick, Charles Allen or Mrs. John R. Cook.

Buske said he wished to thank all of the people who turned out to vote in Tuesday's election.

"Now comes the time to put personal prejudices and politics aside, and go forward together to continue building a better Friona," Buske stated.

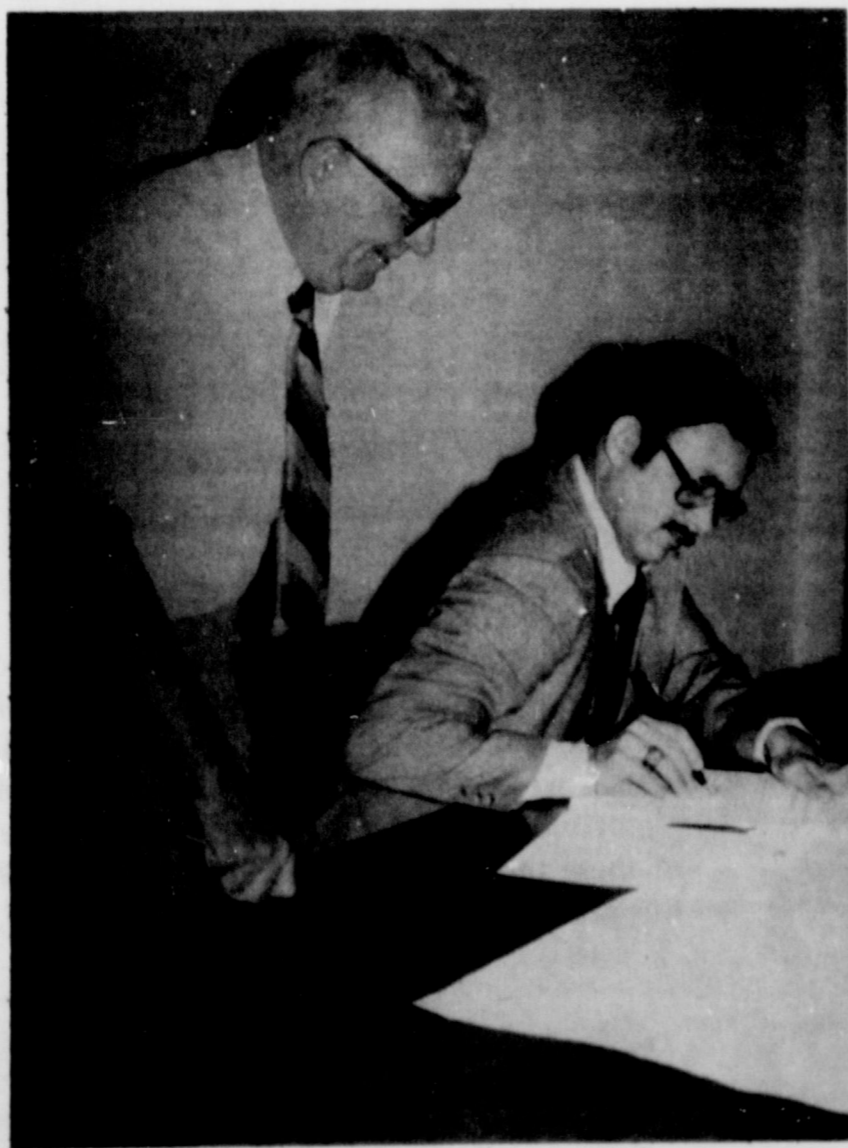
Buske was sworn in at a special meeting of the Friona City Council Thursday afternoon.

The special election had been brought about as a result of a write-in campaign during the regular city election, in which Charles Caudill received more votes than did Buske in the very tight turnout, in which Buske and the two incumbent aldermen were unopposed.

However, Caudill refused to accept the position, leaving the mayor's position legally unfilled. Mayor pro-tem Jerry Brownnd has served as acting mayor for the city during the interim period.

Bid Items Occupy Commission Agenda

Awarding of bids for a new automobile for the sheriff's department and the items offered for sale by the county were the main items of business at the regular meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners at their regular meeting May 12.

The bid on the new vehicle for the sheriff's department was awarded to Friona Ford Sales on a bid of \$6,031, with trade.

Bids were opened for the water tank offered by Precinct 2. A bid of \$300 by Norbert Schueler was accepted. Deckard Equipment Company of Amarillo was given the bid for two tractors, on a bid of \$2152.00.

A welder, which had been taken in by the sheriff's department from a burglary arrest, went to Ernest Anthony, on a bid of \$165.

Thefts Bug Area Citizens

Parmer County Sheriff Charles Lovelace reports several separate incidences of batteries being stolen from vehicles around the county in the past week. Big Tex Grain Company in northeast Parmer County reported about \$800 worth of batteries stolen from trucks, tractors and pickups Sunday night. West Friona Grain Company reported about \$150 worth of batteries stolen the same night as did Parmer County Implement Company who had an undetermined number stolen. There were also several farmers in the county who reported batteries stolen from their vehicles the same night, according to Sheriff Lovelace.

In other action, Johnny Stewart Motors in Farwell reported a 1966 four-door Chevrolet stolen from its lot on Tuesday. The owners feel that someone had the keys to the car, according to the sheriff.

The Dale Widner farm, about four miles southwest of Friona, reported a barn robbery on Friday, May 16. According to Sheriff Lovelace, about \$1000 worth of tools were taken from Widner's barn.

J.J. McDonald, manager of Farwell Gin, reported that someone broke into the gin office Sunday night. Lovelace says that all that appears to be missing are some empty cola bottles and possibly some full ones.

The court approved payment of \$180 to Mrs. Ruth Parsons of Friona for child care expenses.

Representatives of the Protective Services of the Child Welfare Department met with the court and explained the contrast with the Texas Department of Human Resources.

Six items were approved for soil conservation work in the county. They were Arnold Dailey, \$25.00; Keith Knight, \$62.50; Owen Seamonds, \$100; John F. Dixon, \$50; Bill Christian, \$62.50 and Floyd Coates, \$75.00.

Approval was given to Farwell's Border Town Days committee to use the courthouse lawn for concession stands and booths during the annual celebration.

A request for the county's support to the Legal Services Corp. Act was denied, and the court passed a resolution asking that the act not be renewed.

Both county extension agents attended the meeting, and reported on their various activities.

Next meeting of the court will be on Tuesday, May 27, due to the Monday holiday.

July 4th Events Are Discussed

July 4th activities were the main item of discussion at the regular meeting of the board of directors of the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture on May 13.

A fireworks display will again be held this year, and will be funded by donations from the Friona Evening Lions, Friona Noon Lions, Progressive Study Club and the Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

Also on tap during the July 4th activities will be a tennis tournament, a ping-pong tournament and a domino tourney. Trophies will be awarded to winners of these events.

Ribbons will be awarded to winners in other events, involving the youngsters.

The tennis tourney will be mixed doubles only. Anyone wishing to enter should contact the Chamber office.

The date for the 1980 Maize Days has been set for September 9-13.

A letter was sent to A.E. Little Company, recommending Friona as a possible site for the proposed gasohol plant in this area.

Discussion was also held on the spring clean-up campaign sponsored by the Chamber.

Next meeting of the board will be on Tuesday, June 10 at 6:30 a.m. at the Parmer House Restaurant.

Stores Set Monday Off

A number of Friona businesses will be closed Monday, May 26, in observance of Memorial Day.

A spot check by the Chamber of Commerce showed that Friona State Bank, Tri-County Savings, Friona Credit Union, the post office, Southwestern Public Service Company and Pioneer Gas will be closed.

Others closing include Poarch Furniture, Foster's, Gib's Cleaners, City Body Shop, Perry's, White's Super Market and Friona Star.

Bi-Wize Drug will be open until noon. Piggly Wiggly and Houser's will be open all day.

The City office will be open on Monday, and will observe the traditional Memorial Day on Friday, May 30.

50 YEARS AGO--MAY 9, 1930

Steel workers have arrived in Friona and started work on the new elevated water tank, which is to supply the water works system. When completed the tank will have a capacity of 50,000 gallons. It is known as the hemispherical bottom type. Elevated storage will give Friona a water system which will be economical to operate and efficient in service. A small pumping unit fills the tank in a short time and will be able to keep it full at all times to meet the demand. This reserve flows by gravity to all parts of the system. The tank is to be elevated to a distance of 92 feet above the ground which means the water will always have a gravity pressure of at least 40 pounds.

45 YEARS AGO--MAY 10, 1935

The Baptist congregation has purchased a part of the J.L. Landrum building on Euclid Avenue and moved it to the lot adjoining their church property. The building is being converted into a cottage to be used by the pastor as a parsonage. The carpenter work is being supervised by Rev. E. Ray Lansdown, assisted by members of the congregation.

40 YEARS AGO--MAY 10, 1940

Paul Spring, arts and science junior at Texas Technological College, has been elected president of the American Chemical Society to serve during the next school year. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. F.L. Spring of Friona.

35 YEARS AGO--MAY 11, 1945

Two Friona girls, Misses Anna Lee and Eula May White, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Ed S. White, were injured near Black Tuesday night, in a car wreck when the car in which they were riding turned over. A blow out on one of the tires was the cause of the mishap. Anna Lee received a severe cut on the leg, but her sister received only minor scratches and bruises.

30 YEARS AGO--MAY 5, 1950

Work is now underway on the \$60,000-\$70,000 church building being built for the First Baptist

Church in Friona. The new unit will consist of auditorium with seating capacity of 500, offices and additional Sunday School facilities. Steel, concrete and brick are being used in this modern functional-designed building. Being supervised by G.G. Gilliland, the plans are from the drawing boards of architects Shaffer and Merrill of Clovis, Rev. Tommie B. Allen is the local Baptist minister, being here since May, 1947.

Contract was let Tuesday morning for a new 250,000 bushel elevator for the Black Grain Company, according to announcement just made by J.R. (Pete) Braxton, manager. This will more than double the present capacity of 200,000 bushels in the elevator just completed.

25 YEARS AGO--MAY 6, 1955

Announcement of the honor students of the high school graduating class was made this week by Principal Dillie Kelley. Valedictorian is Gay Cass, who has a four-year grade point average of 95.6. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kenyth Cass. Zelma Fay Beaty is salutatorian with a grade point average of 94.5. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Beaty. Deniese Magness was in third place with an average of 93.3. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H.T. Magness.

20 YEARS AGO--MAY 5, 1960

Jackie Hight, a senior student in Friona High School, was injured in a car-pickup wreck about four miles west of Friona on FM 1731 Saturday afternoon about 3 p.m. David Kelley, who works for Doris Buske, was traveling west on the road and stopped at the twin lakes to see how the fishermen were making out. While he was stopped, Hight rammed into the rear of his pickup. Witnesses said the visibility was impaired by dust. The Hight auto, a 1955 Chevy, was a total loss. He was taken to Parmer County Community Hospital, where he was treated for head injuries.

15 YEARS AGO--MAY 6, 1965

Danny Murphree will be entered in the Class AA 220-yard dash at the

state track and field meet in Austin this weekend. Murphree, who has a 21.0 timing this season, one of the fastest in the state, left on Wednesday, with his coach, Bob Owen.

10 YEARS AGO--MAY 7, 1970

Archie Tarter was elected to a full term as county judge in Parmer County in the race which highlighted the primary voting locally last Saturday. Tarter defeated W.L. (Preach) Edelman of Friona by a total vote of 964-537. Edelman was given majorities only at Friona and Black. Tarter won the other six precincts, as well as the absentee box.

5 YEARS AGO--MAY 5, 1975

The 1975 delegates from Friona to the Boys' State and Girls' State conventions were announced this year by the Friona American Legion Post 206 and the American Legion Auxiliary. The Boys' State delegate will be Kent Miller, a junior at Friona High School and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ross Miller. Library Participates In Texas Reading Club

The Friona Public Library is among nearly 400 libraries throughout Texas participating this year in the Texas Reading Club. The program is sponsored by the Texas State Library and participating libraries.

Young readers will take part in activities built around "Sports Splash," the theme selected for 1980. The nearly universal interest in sports that range from solitary activities like jogging to team sports like baseball and football gives them appeal for most young readers. And libraries have books about sports that range from books on how to play the games through biographies of famous players to novels and stories with sports themes.

Most important of all, young Texans who participate will sample the fun of recreational reading. Today's public libraries include a wide range of books and other printed materials for young readers. Summertime is vacation time, but

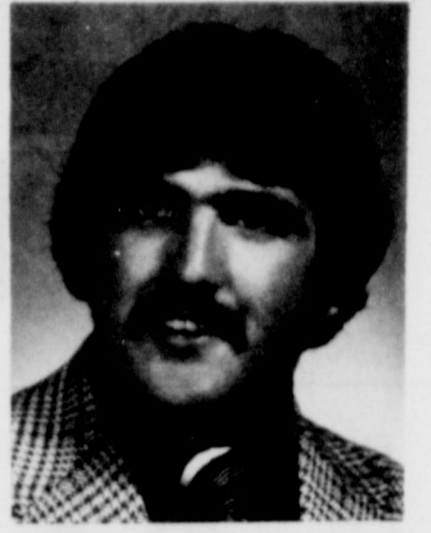
skills honed by vacation time reading will be sharp for the year ahead.

"One of the most serious problems we face today is the deterioration of reading ability among young people," said Dr. Dorman H. Winfrey, director of the Texas State Library. "We know, however, that people of all ages who develop the habit of reading for recreation become good readers. Reading is a recreational activity with both immediate and long-term benefits."

In recent years school libraries and learning resource centers have undergone major improvements. As a result many youngsters have developed sophisticated skills in using libraries. The Reading Club encourages them to use these skills and the library materials they find for recreational purposes.

Special activities that encourage regular visits to the library have been planned by James L. and Carol H. Thomas of Denton. He teaches in the North Texas State University School of Library and Information Sciences, and she recently completed a doctorate in special education at the University of Virginia. They are the parents of two sons.

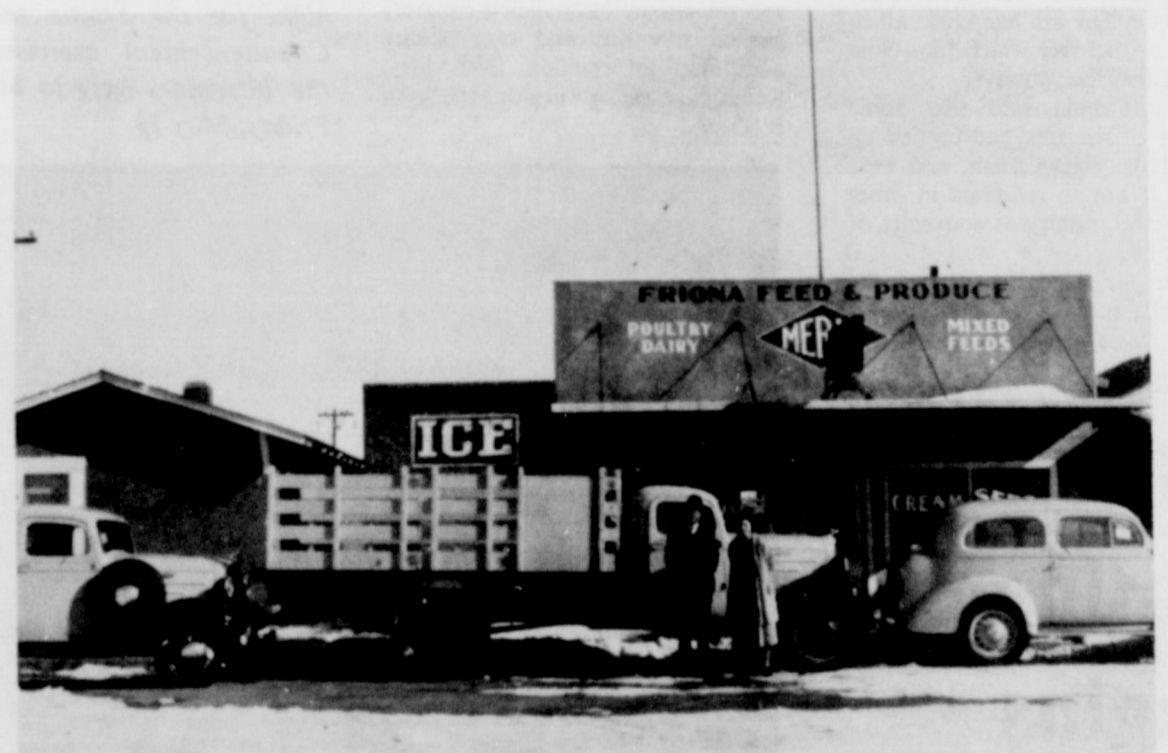

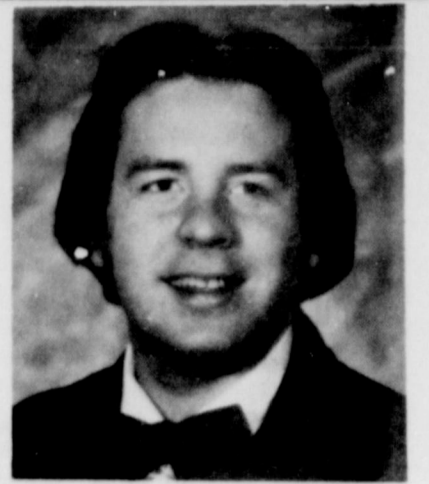
Phillip Duggins Earns Degree

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CAPITOL UPDATE

We're hearing a lot in Washington these days about cutting the budget, as well we should. But cutting a service that benefits every man, woman and child in this nation by more than 15 percent is not the way to go about it.

And that is what eliminating Saturday mail delivery would do.

Delivering the mail was one of the first concerns of our national government. Next to defending our shores, it probably is the most basic thing the government does. The Postal Service used to take pride that "neither snow, nor sleet, nor dark of night" stopped the delivery of the mail. What has happened to our government if we can forget this obligation, and make it a scapegoat for our national budgetary problems?

Long distance telephone aside, mail still is one of the primary ways Americans communicate with each other. Your newspaper may come to you in Saturday's mail. Or a long, newsy letter from a faraway relative. Or even a bill that needs to be paid.

But the problems in eliminating Saturday delivery go beyond the fact that the mailbox would be empty on that day. The question of what happens on Monday also needs to be considered. Already, the Postal Service must cope with the buildup of mail that comes from not having delivery on Sunday, though mail is in the system. The glut of Monday mail caused by a two-day suspension in service every week would be an intolerable overload—especially to a system already plagued by too many delays in service.

I have always believed the primary tests to the value of government spending are the number of people who benefit, and whether the service could be provided by the

private system or a more local level of government. The Postal Service benefits every citizen, and it can't be provided by any other agency or government level—so its service must remain intact.

That is not to say we shouldn't demand that the Postal Service exercise economy. We in the Senate have approved a high enough subsidy to allow continued Saturday delivery. But we also must demand that the Post Office improve its productivity. When the Congress created the Postal Service as an independent agency, the idea was to improve its management and efficiency. I don't know anyone who would argue that their mail service has improved since that action was taken. I am convinced considerable economies can be achieved in Postal Service operation, and that service can be made better.

But we should not allow vital postal service to become a scapegoat to our national budget ills. We are in a financial crisis. Even the most avid spenders on Capitol Hill have become budget conscious. The problem is that many politicians in Washington are indebted to special interest groups for their next election. That makes it difficult for them to vote against large amounts of money for programs that benefit only small numbers of vocal people.

The only way taking budget cuts to make sure this doesn't happen is to make your voices heard in Washington above the din of special interest lobbyists clamoring for a larger piece of the tax pie.

With your help, we can keep adequate mail service. And we can keep other truly vital federal spending intact without busting the budget.

In the interest of prudent management, the space will be utilized productively for offices and computer billing equipment.

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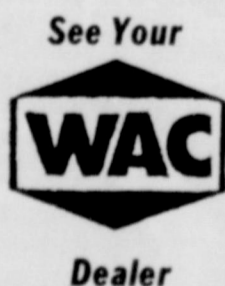
