Sunny Horton Is 1980 Maize Queen

IF YOU ARE A fan of the Dallas Cowboys, then you thoroughly enjoyed the inaugural (excuse that) Monday night game this week, in which the Cowboys prevailed, 17-3 over their rivals, the Washington Redskins.

It was a nice feeling to see the Cowboys win even though Roger Staubach had retired—the team isn't ready for the junk heap just yet, thank you.

Cowboy fans who take the weekly Dallas Cowboy Weekly newspaper should have especially savored the win, if they read the feature article in the current issue on "Why the Redskins Hate the Cowboys." or "Mamas, don't let your babies grow up to be Redskins...they'll die of broken hearts at Cowboy games."

The article was written by William Gildea, a Washington Post writer, who went into great detail to explain how the Washington-Dallas feud has developed to the point that it practically is the most heated in the NFL today.

Gildea pointed out that practically every time the 'Skins have had a chance to get into the NFL playoffs, the Cowboys manage one of their unbelievable come-from-behind wins, which dashes Washington's hopes.

The most recent example of this came in the last regular season game of 1979, after Washington had a 13-point lead late in the game, only to have Staubach engineer one of his patented comebacks which resulted in a 35-34 Dallas win, and the Redskins had to pack away their uniforms.

He quoted Redskins coach Jack Pardee as saying "That was the most disappointing loss I've ever had as a player or a coach."

But as bad as last season's last-minute loss was, Redskins fans still remember Thanksgiving Day of 1974, when their team was 35 seconds away from victory and a spot in the playoffs.

Roger Staubach had been injured, and was replaced by a little-known rookie from Abilene Christian, Clint Longley. ("What's a Clint Longley?" someone asked in jest.)

That particular day, Longley was a hero. He cranked up on a 50-yard scoring toss to (who else) Drew Pearson, and the Cowboys won, 24-23. Washington again had to forget about any post-season activity.

Gildea points out what many Cowboy fans probably had forgotten: In Dallas' first year of professional football, 1960, the team didn't win a game, but it did manage to tie the Redskins, somewhat of a humiliation, as Washington had to share last place with Dallas in their division.

Dallas must have decided they liked to play this particular team. At one point in the 1960s they had beaten Washington six straight times.

The 'Skins hired George Allen away from Los Angeles primarily to stop this Dallas domination. And, although ole George did manage a couple of timely wins over the Cowboys and appearances in the playoffs, he didn't exactly master Tom Landry's team, and Allen's seven-year contract was not renewed after 1977.

These writers and media people in Washington apparently have blown this anti-Dallas sentiment into extraordinary proportions. "Honest to God, the only thing I hate in this world is the Dallas Cowboys football team," an otherwise sweet Washington housewife was quoted as saying. Those die-hard fans all rose up with one voice after last year's heartbreaker: "Wait 'till next year," they said.

And, sure enough, "next year" arrived for them this past Monday night, but unfortunately for all the Cowboy-haters, the results were the same.

Board Calls Bond Vote September 30

The Board of Trustees for the Friona Independent School District met on Tuesday, September 9, and officially called a \$1.4 million bond issue for Tuesday, September 30.

The school bond issue, first since 1964, will be for six new classrooms on the grade school level, and for renovation of the junior high complex, whose main building was built in 1931.

Superintendent Tom Jarboe said that the proposed issue could increase school taxes by ten cents per \$100 evaluation.

The bond election will be held at the Friona Fire Station. Absentee voting will be conducted at the superintendent's office beginning Monday, September 15, through September 26, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. daily.

"We encourage the taxpayers in the school district to come and take a first-hand look at the school plant. We are thinking in terms of having an open house on September 28, so patrons can come and see our

problems, and then decide for themselves if they warrant passing the bond issue," said Tom Jarboe, superintendent.

Proposed improvements to the school campus includes the construction of six new classrooms. The old cafeteria on the grade school campus will be remodelled and added to, in order to get the new classrooms.

A new cafeteria will be constructed in front of the present cafeteria.

"Our present grade school cafeteria is very outdated and inadequate. With its concrete floors, it is hard to keep sanitary. It needs replaced very badly," Jarboe says.

By adding the new classrooms, the fifth grade will be moved out of the junior high building and into the grade school, where many have felt it belonged all along.

Otherwise, the issue will: provide new ceilings, insulation, new lighting and improved wiring for the junior high building. The building will get a new paint job, and will have its steam heating system renovated.

Jarboe said that replacing the lighting system incandescent to fluorescent lights would not only greatly improve the lighting, but that experts say that the more modern lights will pay for themselves in a few years through energy efficiency.

The lights also are to be replaced in this manner in the junior high and high school gym.

The junior high gym is slated to get a new floor, plus new exterior and interior doors; the dressing rooms are to be refinished, and new windows installed.

The junior high auditorium is to get an air conditioning system from the bond issue, an improvement move many have thought necessary for years. The sound system also is to be upgraded.

The grade school building will get improved insulation, lighting and electrical changes.

More will be presented on the bond issue in succeeding weeks.

Maize Days Heads Into Final Day

Friona's 1980 Maize Days celebration heads into its final and biggest day on Saturday, with a number of events on tap.

The American Legion is sponsoring breakfast from 5:30 to 8 a.m.

The Maize Days parade will begin at 10 p.m. on Main Street. A number of floats and other entries are expected.

The Sky Diver's show will be at 11 a.m., and can be viewed from anywhere in downtown Friona.

The barbecue will be served at noon at the City Park. This year for the first time, the beef will be pit cooked. A charge of \$2 per person will be made. Members of the Friona

Fire Department will once again assist with the serving duties.

Other events on tap include the Dixon Six-mile race beginning at 8 a.m.; the pet show beginning at 2 p.m. at the Public Library lawn; an open barrel racing and steer roping at 6 p.m. at the Rodeo Grounds, and a Square Dance on the south side of the park starting at 8:30 p.m.

The Parmer County 4-H project fair will be held from 10:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. at the Community Center.

"The Country Four," featuring Holly Hodges, will entertain during the barbecue.

As usual, it will be a big wind-up for the city's 24th annual celebration.

Council Compromises

The Friona City Council, after hearing comments from a number of citizens at Monday's council meeting, proposed a "compromise" water ordinance which will establish a rate of 60¢ per thousand gallons of water.

The council came off their original rate, which would have set the rate at basically \$1.00 per thousand gallons.

Mayor B.K. Buske pointed out that the newest proposal would put the city's water rate equal to that of other neighboring towns of Muleshoe, Hereford and Dimmitt.

The new rate will be an increase of basically 50 per cent from the old rate, which has averaged 40¢ per thousand gallons since September of 1969.

"During this 11-year period the cost of pumping water and drilling

new wells has almost tripled," Buske said.

Buske assured those attending the hearing that the city had initiated plans to secure additional water rights outside the city. "We have been holding meetings regarding the problem for the past three months, and we will continue until we can come up with a solution," Buske said.

Those attending Monday's hearing expressed the belief that they had cut down on their water usage as much as possible. A recommendation was also voiced for the city to crack down on flagrant wasters of water through such means as stiff fines.

In other business at Monday's meeting, the council appointed Jo Blackwell as administrator of Prairie Acres nursing home, due to the death of Dora Nittler.

The council also approved the city's 1980-81 budget, and passed ordinances setting the tax rate, and providing for exemptions of certain properties.

Otherwise, the council approved a request by Allen Stewart on a fence he proposed to build; approved participation in the National Flood Plain insurance program, authorized Glover, Graham & Brown to conduct the city's audit, and passed a required resolution dealing with EPA standards regarding the city's drinking water.

Representatives of General Telephone Co. met with the council and discussed problems relating to the company's service.

50 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 15, 1930

The contract for transportation of pupils to and from school has been let to F.W. Reeve, who had the contract the past three years. Mr. Reeve is having all his chassis equipped with new bodies that will be attractive and comfortable for the inmates. This work is being done at Clovis and all ten busses will be in readiness for the beginning of school September 8. Mr. Reeve will supply the busses and superintendent their operation and the school board will provide drivers.

45 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 16, 1935

The Southwest Associated Telephone Company has had men at work building the lines and installing the phones on the party lines between Friona and the Lakeview community and from Friona to Rhea. More than a dozen new patrons will be added to the Friona central list.

40 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 16, 1940

What might have easily been a serious affair happened at the home of Mr. and Mrs. James Bragg, south of town Saturday, when their small son, Clyde Ray, fell from the tractor on which he was riding with his father. The little fellow fell from the tractor in front of the disc drill and before the tractor could stop the plow was upon him. Fortunately, a disc passed on either side of the little body and he escaped with only a bad cut on one foot and a few scratches and

bruises on other parts of his body.

20 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 11, 1960

Two Hereford youths died almost instantly Saturday morning when

their car ramed a tree two and one-half miles east of Bovina on Highway 60. The dead were identified as Bobby Gene Province and Harley Earl Davis, both 20. Investigating officers said the driver apparently went to sleep at the wheel since there were no skid marks before the crash.

Ministerially Speaking....

Although we have lived here for three months, I must confess that I still have some boxes that have not been unpacked. In fact, I have boxes from a previous move that have not been unpacked. The main reason for this is because there are a lot of other things I had rather do than unpack boxes. The reason I allow this to continue, however, is because I don't need most of the stuff and it is easier to handle this "junk" by keeping it in the boxes.

Well, that's not too earth-shaking of a revelation. What is harmful is that we tend to do the same thing with people. We put them in boxes and

leave them there. We have boxes labeled black, brown, white, women and men, athletes, intellectuals, conservatives, liberals, old, rich, poor, single adults, church members, non-church members, preachers, farmers, bosses, laborers--just to name a few. By categorizing people or pre-judging them we create boxes for certain people and expect all people in each box to be alike. One of the reasons most of us leave people in these boxes is the same reason I haven't unpacked all of my boxes. We see people as things that we don't need and it is easier to deal with them by keeping them boxed in.

Christians to be about the business of tearing down walls, emptying boxes, and restoring relationships; of replacing alienation with reconciliation. "(He) hath given to us the ministry of reconciliation." II Cor. 5:18. How can we do this? Here are some suggestions.

-Be aware of your strong points. Self-confidence is sometimes the catalyst needed to risk accepting another person or to reveal oneself and become vulnerable. God has loved us and has forgiven us. What greater word of assurance and acceptance do we need?

-Identify things we have in common. We ALL are created in the image of God. We ALL have failed and made mistakes. We ALL have basic needs such as survival and a sense of belonging. We are alike in many more ways than we realize.

-Expose yourself to other people's ideas and life styles. Walking a mile in the other person's shoes is one of the fastest roads to understanding. This does not come easy and sometimes we must be forced into this exposure. However, we can also force ourself into this experience through reading, sharing groups, study seminars, and other growth opportunities.

-Be open. Being judgemental and standing up for your convictions are not the same. Having a strong and solid faith is often the very thing that allows us to be open to new ideas and new people.

What do you say? Isn't it time we started unpacking boxes around here?

The sad part of all of this is that we do need each other and our boxes limit us severely in our choices of who can help and support us. We expect people in each box to act a certain way and never really get to know each other. In fact, we sometimes even feel hostility and hatred simply because of the boxes we maintain.

Not only do we box others and limit our relationships, but we also box ourselves and limit who we can be. An easy example are the boxes of women and men. As men we often feel we must be strong and unemotional. As a result we keep ourselves from revealing many things: the feelings of weakness and failure, the expressions of tenderness, the need to cry. By hiding this part of ourselves we miss out on the support and intimacy which we need. On the other hand, women often feel that they should not be strong or assertive. They therefore fail to contribute their creative leadership when it is needed, or feel guilty when they do.

We also box-ourselves-in by building protective walls. If we have been hurt we tend to build a wall around us to protect our vulnerable areas. Some wall building may be positive and some "defense mechanisms" may be necessary for some people to make it through the day. However, there are times when these protective walls become prisons. They not only keep others from getting to our weaknesses, but also keep us from growing out of our weaknesses. Shutting others out also shuts us in.

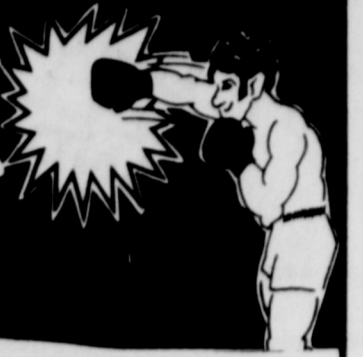

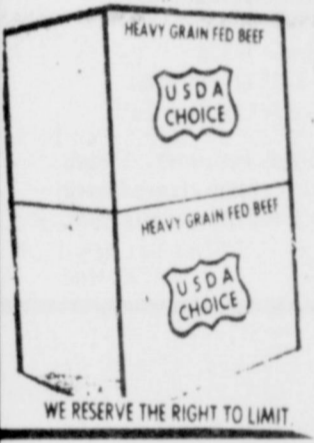

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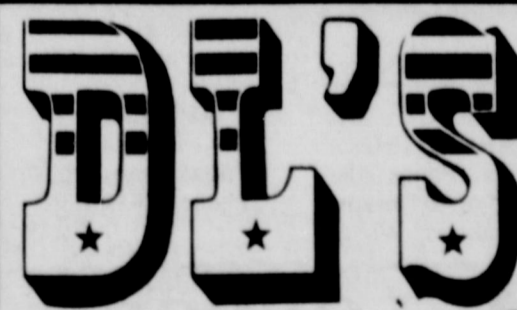

ORANGE MARMALADE KRINGLE

- 2-3 C. warm water
- 2 pkg. active dry yeast
- 1 C. warm milk
- 1/2 C. sugar
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/2 C. softened butter
- 2 eggs
- 5-6 C. unsifted flour
- 3 C. Homemade Orange Marmalade, divided (See below)
- 1 C. chopped pecans, divided

In a large warm mixing bowl, pour in water and yeast, stirring until dissolved. Add warm milk, sugar, salt, butter and eggs. Stir in 3 cups flour. Beat vigorously until smooth (150 strokes). Add remaining flour to make a soft dough. Turn out onto lightly floured board and knead until smooth and elastic, about 10 minutes. Place in greased mixing bowl. Turn dough over, cover with waxed paper and towel. Let rest 20 minutes. Divide dough into 4 equal parts. Roll out first part in greased baking pan. Spread 1 1/2 cups marmalade and 1/2 cup pecans evenly on dough. Top with another layer of dough. Cover dough with waxed paper and towel and let rise about 20 minutes. Place in 375 degree F. oven for 20-25 minutes. Remove from pan immediately after baking. When cool, glaze with confectioner's sugar icing. Decorate with pecans and orange marmalade pieces. Makes two cakes. Cut in serving pieces.

Homemade Orange Marmalade

- 3 oranges (unpeeled)
- 2 lemons (unpeeled)
- 5 C. sugar
- 5 C. water

Wash fruit and cut crosswise into thin slices, removing seeds. Put slices into deep pan, add water, and let stand in refrigerator 36 hours. Heat to boiling point, and boil (NOT simmer) two hours. Add sugar, and boil one hour more. Pour into sterile jars and seal.

BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE FRIONA INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

SECTION 1: That an election shall be held on the 30th day of September, 1980, in the FRIONA INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT for the purpose of submitting to the resident qualified electors of said District the following propositions:

"SHALL the Board of Trustees of

the FRIONA INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT of Parmer and Deaf Smith Counties, Texas, be authorized and empowered to issue the bonds of said District to the amount of \$1,400,000 for school building purposes, to wit: the construction and equipment of school buildings in the District and the purchase of the necessary sites therefore, and shall there be pledged and levied, assessed and collected annually ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the District sufficient, without limit as to rate or amount, to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds as the same become due, said bonds to be issued in one or more series or issues, to mature serially or otherwise not more than FORTY (40) years from their date, and to bear interest at such rate or rates as in its discretion the Board of Trustees shall determine?"

SECTION 2: That the entire District shall constitute one election precinct for this election and the polling place shall be the Firemen's Meeting Room, City Fire Station, 102 East 8th Street, Friona, Texas. The persons hereby appointed to serve as officers of this election at said polling place are as follows:

ALTERNATE PRESIDING JUDGE
The Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two (2) nor more than eight (8) qualified clerks to serve and assist in holding said election; provided that if the Presiding Judge herein appointed actually serves, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall be one of the clerks.

On election day the polls shall be open from 7:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.

Oneida Allen is hereby appointed the Clerk and Carolyn Owen as the Deputy Clerk for absentee voting for said election, and the Board Room, Friona High School Building, 7th and Etta Streets, Friona, Texas (Mailing Address: P.O. Box 607, Friona, Texas 79035) in said District, is hereby designated as the place at which absentee voting shall be conducted for said election. For the period absentee voting is permitted by law, the hours designated for absentee voting by personal

appearance shall be from 8:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M. on each day except Saturdays, Sundays and official State holidays.

SECTION 3: That paper ballots shall be used for said election, which ballots shall be prepared in accordance with the V.A.T.S. Election Code so as to permit the electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid proposition which shall be set forth in substantially the following form:

"THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS IN THE AMOUNT OF \$1,400,000 AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

The word "FOR" and beneath it the word "AGAINST" shall be made to appear on the left of the proposition. A square shall be printed on the left of each of the words "FOR" and "AGAINST," and each elector shall place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way he wishes to vote.

SECTION 4: All resident qualified electors of the District shall be permitted to vote at said election. Joop Buurman, of Der Haag, is in the midst of a cross-country trip. That's not so unusual in itself, but his mode of transportation for such a trip raises a few eyebrows. He's going by bicycle.

Buurman, an architect, said he had read a book about a similar trans-America adventurer, and as he began to decide on what his vacation for 1980 would be, he decided this would be his project.

He flew from Amsterdam to New York, arriving July 27, and then departed Richmond, Virginia by

He expects to fly home from Los Angeles on October 18.

Buurman says the weather was a problem at first, as it was so hot when he first started out. He said that Wednesday's rainfall was the most rain he had encountered on his trip. This caught him between Amarillo and Hereford.

The young Dutch cyclist made it to Poor Boy's Barbecue at about 10 a.m. Thursday for his break here. He expected to stay in Clovis that night.

He said he averages 60 to 65 miles per day, and finds an inexpensive motel in which to spend the night. He has had to camp out three nights since leaving Virginia.

Buurman says he finds Americans very friendly. "People are more likely to help you here than they are in Europe," he says. Buurman speaks good English, saying it is a requirement in Dutch schools.

He said that he had found living expenses in America somewhat less than in his home country. Gasoline is about three times as expensive there, he says. Most people in the Netherlands ride bicycles, as he does; hence the long bike trip would not sound as strange to people there as it does to Americans.

He said the average income in the Netherlands was around \$28,000 gilders, or about \$15,000, of which 40 per cent is deducted for taxes. Food also is more expensive there, he said. Steak costs in the neighborhood of \$5.00 a pound.

Buurman appeared to be enjoying his "American experiment." He said so far he had had no bad experiences and had ruined only one bicycle tire in more than 1,200 miles.

Who did he think would win the U.S. presidential race? "Probably Carter," was his prediction.

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1980

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to permit banks to establish and operate unmanned teller machines within the county or city where the banks are located and to share the use of teller machines on a basis consistent with anti-trust laws, if it finds such operation will serve the convenience of the public. The Legislature has already passed enabling legislation (H.B. 1510) for this proposed amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to authorize banks to use unmanned teller machines within the county or the city of their domicile on a shared basis to serve the public convenience."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 97 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the State and the accused the right to an interlocutory appeal from the following trial court rulings in criminal cases: pretrial rulings on the constitutionality of a statute; on a motion to quash, dismiss, or set aside an indictment; and on a motion to suppress evidence. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing appeal of certain pretrial rulings of a trial court in a criminal case by either the state or the accused."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 98 proposes a constitutional amendment that would require a single appraisal of all property subject to ad valorem taxation and would provide for a single board of equalization within each county. The con-

stitutional requirement that the county commissioners court sit as a board of equalization would be eliminated, and elected officials of the county or governing body of the taxing unit would be prohibited from serving as members of the board of equalization.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment requiring a single appraisal and a single board of equalization within each county for ad valorem tax purposes."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 18 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to authorize the conduct of bingo games by certain specified groups for charitable purposes, subject to the limitations that operation of the games must be approved in local option elections and that all proceeds must be spent in Texas.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize bingo games on a local option election basis if the games are conducted by a church, synagogue, religious society, volunteer fire department, nonprofit veterans organization, fraternal organization, or nonprofit organization supporting medical research or treatment programs and if the proceeds are to be spent in Texas for charitable purposes of the organizations."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 86 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to authorize the Governor to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of certain appropriated funds, subject to any conditions and limitations provided by law and subject to the ap-

proval of a budget execution committee that would be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, and Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Committee on Appropriations of the House of Representatives.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to grant the governor power to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of appropriated funds as provided by law."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Governor who appointed a previously confirmed official to remove that official from office subject to the advice and consent of the Senate; and if the Legislature is not in session, to call a special session of the Senate which may last no longer than 2 days for consideration of the removal.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the governor to remove appointed officers with the advice and consent of the senate."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 121 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize counties with a population of 5000 or less to construct and maintain private roads if they impose a reasonable charge for the work. The Legislature by general law may limit this authority. Revenue received from private road work may be used only for the construction, including right-of-way acquisition, or maintenance of public roads.

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 36 proposes a constitution-

al amendment that would change the jurisdiction and authority of the State's appellate courts. The amendment would change the name of the Courts of Civil Appeals to Courts of Appeal and provide that these courts have intermediate appellate jurisdiction over both criminal and civil cases. The amendment would change titles for the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court to Justices and would require members of the Supreme Court to be attorneys licensed in this state while holding office.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to change the name of the Courts of Civil Appeals and the names and qualifications of the Justices of the Supreme Court and to prescribe the jurisdiction and authority of the appellate courts."

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 54 proposes a constitutional amendment which defines separate property owned by either spouse as all property, both real and personal, of a spouse owned or claimed before marriage, and that acquired afterward by gift, devise or descent. Persons about to marry and spouses, without the intent to defraud pre-existing creditors, may by written instrument from time to time partition between themselves all or part of their property. Spouses may exchange a community interest in property owned or to be acquired for a community interest in other community property. The amendment would allow spouses to agree in writing that income or property arising from any separate property is to be separate property rather than as community property as it would be in the absence of an agreement. The amendment proposes that a gift from one spouse to another is presumed to include all income or property deriving from such gift.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment allowing spouses to agree that income or property arising from separate property is to be separate property."

PROPOSICION NO. 1 EN LA BOLETA

Resolución Conjunta #35 del Senado propone una enmienda constitucional que autorice a la Legislatura permitir a los bancos establecer y operar máquinas registradoras automáticas (teller machines) dentro del condado o ciudad en donde están los bancos compartiendo el uso de las máquinas registradoras de acuerdo con las leyes antimonopolistas, si acaso esta operación resulta conveniente para el público. PROPOSICION NO. 2 EN LA BOLETA

PROPOSICION NO. 3 EN LA BOLETA

PROPOSICION NO. 6 EN LA BOLETA

Tulia drove to midfield on its first possession, but a clipping penalty set the team back, and they had to punt.

But three plays lost six yards for the Chieftains, and Tulia took over again following a good Craig Lookingbill punt of 50 yards.

This time the Hornets drove quickly downfield, led by the running of Varl Travis, who went the last 32 yards for the score. A running try for points failed, and Tulia had a 6-0 lead with 5:42 left in the opening quarter.

Friona again could not move, and punted back to the Hornets. Tulia drove 70 yards in ten plays, capped by a four-yard run by Travis. The kick made the score 13-0, with 23 seconds left in the first quarter.

Tulia's main fault during the opening game was in the penalty column, and flags hurt the Hornets in the second quarter, when they were called for four penalties for 60 yards. This stopped their scoring machine, but Friona could not take advantage. The halftime found the score still 13-0 in favor of the visitors.

The Chieftains ran two plays following the second half kickoff, and fumbled, giving Tulia the ball on the Friona 31-yard line.

It took the Hornets five plays to convert the break into points, with quarterback Wade Littlefield going in on a keeper play, and Tulia had a 19-0 lead with just 2:52 gone in the third quarter.

This set the stage for the only play the home fans had a chance to cheer about. Nelson Jackson gathered in the kickoff on his own five yard line, and followed a wedge of blockers out to midfield, where he found himself almost in the clear.

He got one clearing block near midfield, then faked out his last defender at about the Tulia ten, turning in a 95-yard kickoff return,

one of the longest scoring runs ever registered at Friona High School.

Mark Montoya kicked the point, to make the score 19-7 with 8:50 left in the period.

Friona punter Craig Lookingbill gave the fans something to cheer late in the quarter, when he ran 17 yards from punt formation, after taking a high snap, for a first down. But neither team could add to their scoring total any more in the period.

Tulia broke the silence, after backing the Chieftains deep into their end of the field and taking over after a punt return to the Friona 30. Shannon Smitherman ran it in from 18 yards out for a 25-7 margin as the kick went wide. This was with 11:12 left in the final quarter.

The Hornets got their final touchdown with 7:29 to play, on a 21-yard jaunt by Roland Powell, for a 31-7 edge.

Friona's aerial attack was hampered after Mike Neill was

injured and missed much of the last quarter. The Chieftains tried 12 passes in the final quarter, but completed only three of them for 34 yards.

Travis had a total of 162 yards for the game, and was ranked second in class AAA for all rushers after one game.

"We were disappointed with our game in some places, but pleased in others," said Coach Pete Hubbard concerning the game which marked his debut as Friona head coach.

"We were disappointed with our defense, but most of these players had only played freshman football prior to last Friday. Naturally, we were disappointed with the 31-7 score," Hubbard said.

Hubbard praised the play of sophomore Mike Neill, who suffered a knee injury late in the game, and will be out of action for awhile. In addition to catching two passes (a third was erased by a penalty), Neill

pointed out that the entire receiving team did a great job to allow the runback. Anthony Brady set up a screen block to begin with, then went down to throw a clearing block at midfield.

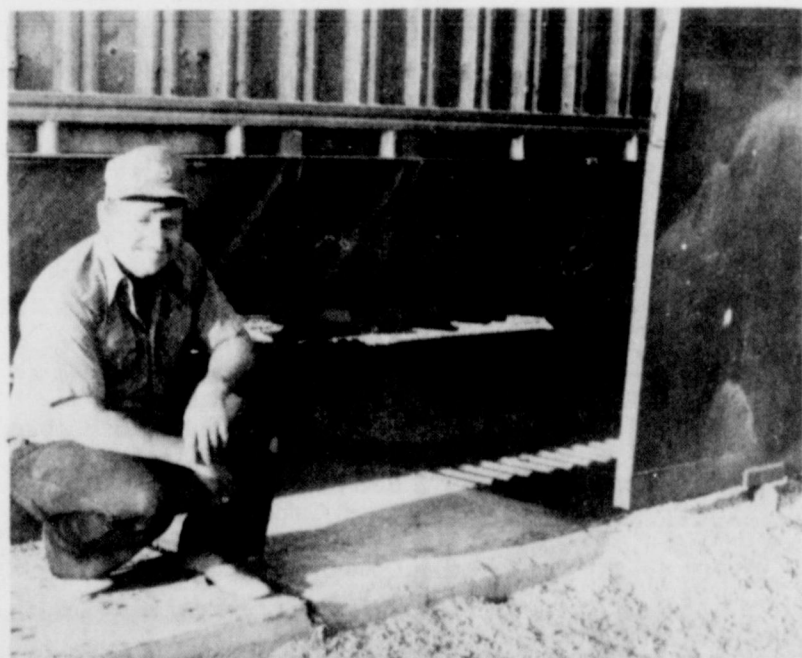

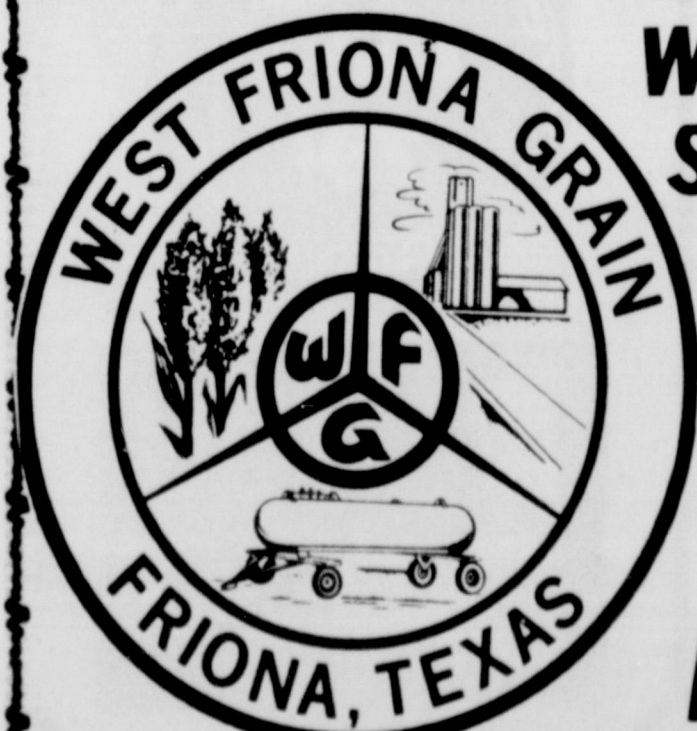

County OKs 1981 Budget

The Parmer County Commissioners approved the county's budget for 1980-81 during a hearing Monday in the County Courtroom in Farwell.

The new budget is in the amount of \$1,067,334, which is an increase of just \$18,883 over the current year's budget.

Bernie Gowens, the county auditor, went over the proposed budget line by line and explained the various funds, how they are arrived at; what the expenses are expected to be for 1981, versus the income.

The ad valorem taxes will be increased some 66 2/3 per cent, due to inflation which has snowballed in recent years.

County Judge Porter Roberts explained that the county had been allowing for inflation in recent years by using from the county's surplus funds in recent years. Now, these funds have been depleted, and in addition, the county has lost an annual payment from the lateral road program, and may not receive revenue sharing funds this year.

Despite the raise in the tax ratio (from 15 per cent of fair market value to 25 per cent), the county will still have to transfer some \$180,000 out of its right of way funds in order to have a balanced budget.

The 1981 budget provides for very few capital improvements, but does provide for salary raises of approximately 15 per cent for county employees, whose salaries have been sadly lagging behind comparable counties.

Only three county citizens showed up for the budget hearing. "We will be glad to discuss this budget at any time with any citizen. We hated to increase the tax ratio, but it was necessary if we carry on the county's work that has to be done," stated a member of the commissioner's court.

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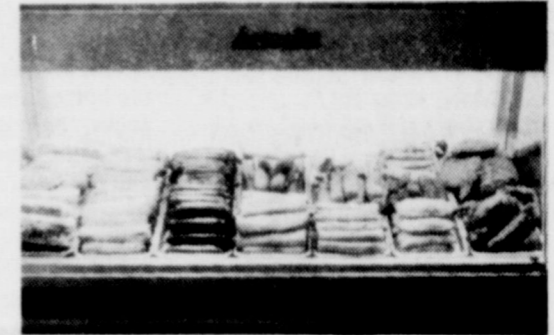

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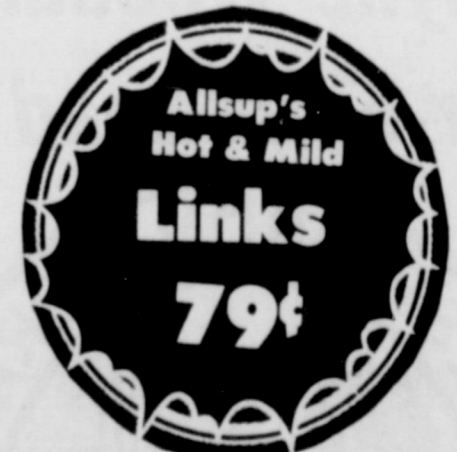

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

The Happy Homemaker

This week's column was copied from "Texas Morning," a column in the San Angelo paper, which is written by Rick Smith. I enjoyed it very much and hope our readers do likewise.

"When I wrote about endangered species, I left out one rapidly shrinking segment, points out Mildred Whitson of Menard, Texas.

"Consider the housewife," she began.

"Remember when there were more of them to the block than dogs."

She had me there.

"One kid tells another: 'My mommy doesn't work, she just stays home all day.' A debatable fact at best," Mrs. Whitson pointed out.

"In the Good-ole-days," she continued, "a housewife was the family cook, laundress, nurse, seamstress, referee, gardener, chauffeur, messenger girl, chore runner, Mother, wife lover (and not necessarily in that order.) But she didn't work.

"She was home when the family came in from school or work. She always had something for them to graze on, lest starvation set in.

"Meals were planned and the table often groaned. (Not from sandwiches and fast food, either!)

In her spare time the housewife was a den mother, Sunday School teacher, club president or active in volunteer work.

If she was a farm or ranch wife, she often ferried tea or coffee to the harvest fields or the corrals to the men. Or she ran impromptu errands for parts or vaccine.

But, she didn't work.

She often cared for Grandpa or Grandma when they were no longer able to live alone. Her own wishes often had to be put aside because 'first things come first!'

Nowadays, the child who says, 'My mommy doesn't work' means she is one of those rare endangered species.

Five days a week, the housewives of America pour into the stream of the 8 a.m. traffic, leaving the kids with the baby sitter (or in front of the

TV); notes to hubby on the refrigerator door; and a dejected dog peering through the yard fence.

Some housewives like to work. Kids, housework, etc. bores them to tears. Fine for them.

Some women have to work. More strength to them.

Me, give me the life of a plain ole housewife. Even one that 'works.' They are definitely an 'endangered species.'

J. Ann Lang of San Angelo sympathizes with the plight of the remaining few housewives.

But she claims that life is easier now that school has started.

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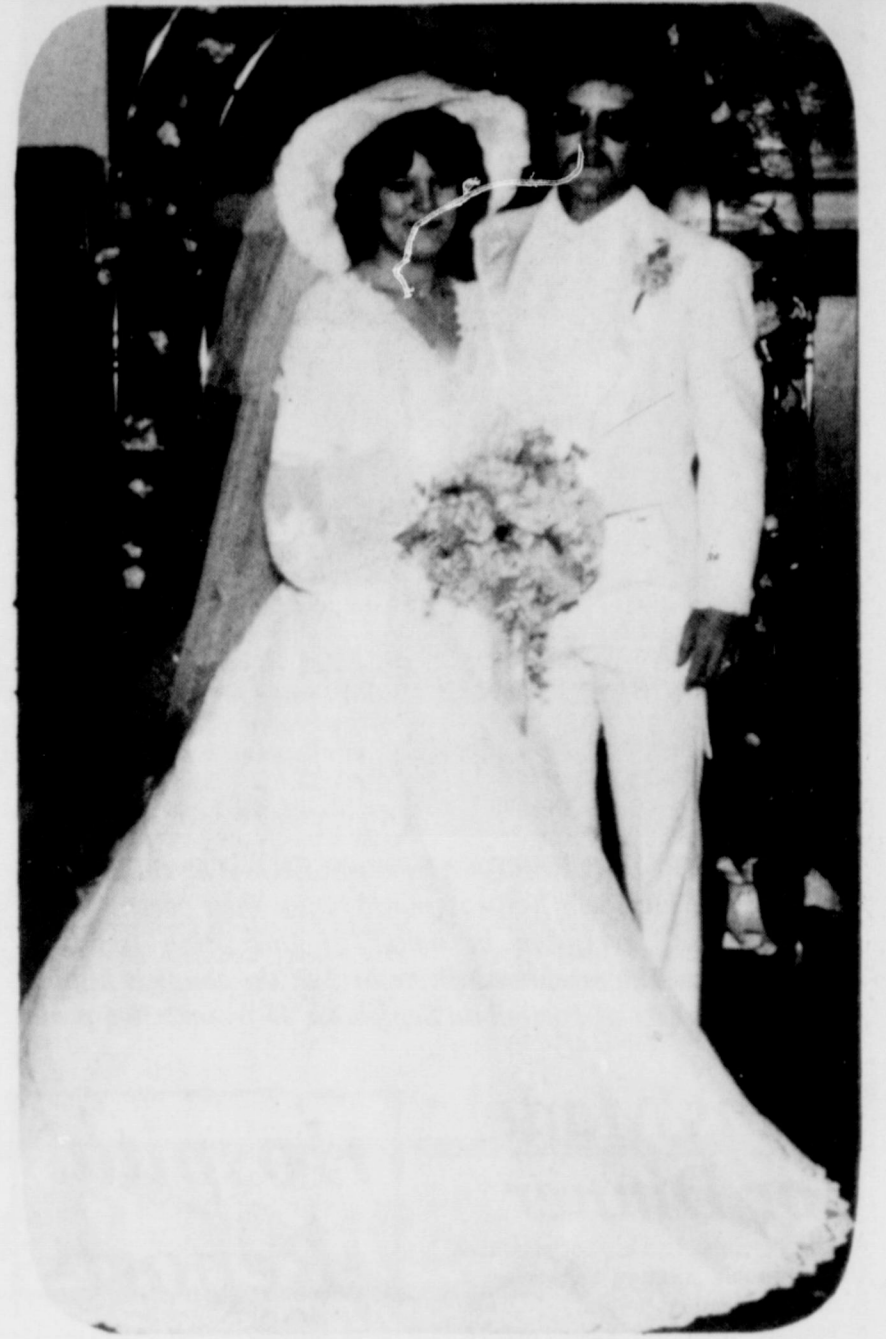

ORDINANCE No. 543

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CITY ORDINANCES #87, 1 Dec '52; AND ORDINANCE #95, 2 Nov '53; AND ORDINANCE #323, 6 Jul '59; AND ORDINANCE #343, 3 Jan '61; AND ORDINANCE #424, 7 Jul '69; PROVIDING FOR A NEW CONSUMER RATE; ESTABLISHING A NEW WATER SERVICE DEPOSIT FEE; PROVIDING FOR A NEW WATER SERVICE TAP FEE; DOUBLING THE CONSUMER WATER RATE FOR CUSTOMERS OUTSIDE THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY; PROVIDING PENALTIES IN ANY AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED TWO HUNDRED DOLLARS(\$200.00) AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE AFTER PUBLICATION.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FRIONA, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That Section 1 of Ordinance #424, 7 July, 1969, is hereby revoked, cancelled and rescinded and said section 1 shall henceforth read as follows:

Each water consumer shall put up a meter deposit at the city office in accordance with the following rates or schedule, to wit:

Renters of residential properties	-----	\$25.00
Lessees of Commercial Properties	-----	\$50.00
Owners of residences or commercial property	-----	No Deposit.

The above deposits may be applied to the payment of any unpaid bills and when so used the deposits shall be restored to the original amount. Any unused portion of the deposit shall be refunded at any time the account or service is discontinued.

SECTION 2. That Section 2 of Ordinance #424, dated 7 July, 1969, is hereby revoked, cancelled and rescinded and said section 2 shall hence forth read as follows:

"The following uniform monthly rates shall be charged all persons, firms, or Corporations for City Water Service within the Corporate Limits of the City of Friona, Texas":

Min. 2,000 Gals	\$3.50	3.75	4.40	5.10	6.25	8.25	38.50

ALL OVER 2,000 GALLONS, Sixty-Cents (\$.60¢) PER THOUSAND RESIDENTS OR SERVICES OUTSIDE THE CORPORATE LIMITS, 100% INCREASE OR DOUBLE THE ABOVE RATES.

SECTION 3. A water tap fee is hereby established in the amount of One Hundred, Ten (\$110.00) Dollars for a standard 5/8"x3/4" inch service. The fee shall be payable with the building permits for a new installation and/or the time of the request for service.

The charge for the installation of an oversized (larger than the standard size above) water service shall be the actual cost of the meter, parts, and labor for making the water service.

SECTION 4. That from and after the publication and effective date of this Ordinance, any person, firm, partnership, association of persons, or corporation, or any agent or employee thereof, who shall violate any of the rules, regulations or provisions of this ordinance, or any part of it or portion thereof, by any act either of omission or commission or cause the same to be done, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine in any amount not exceeding \$200.00 for each and every such violation. Each violation or each part or any part of this Ordinance shall be and constitute a separate offense and where such violation is a continued act, each day such violation is continued, or permitted to continue shall be and does constitute a separate offense and be punishable accordingly.

SECTION 5. The effective date of this Ordinance shall be after its approval, publication thereof, and upon the 1st Day of October, 1980.

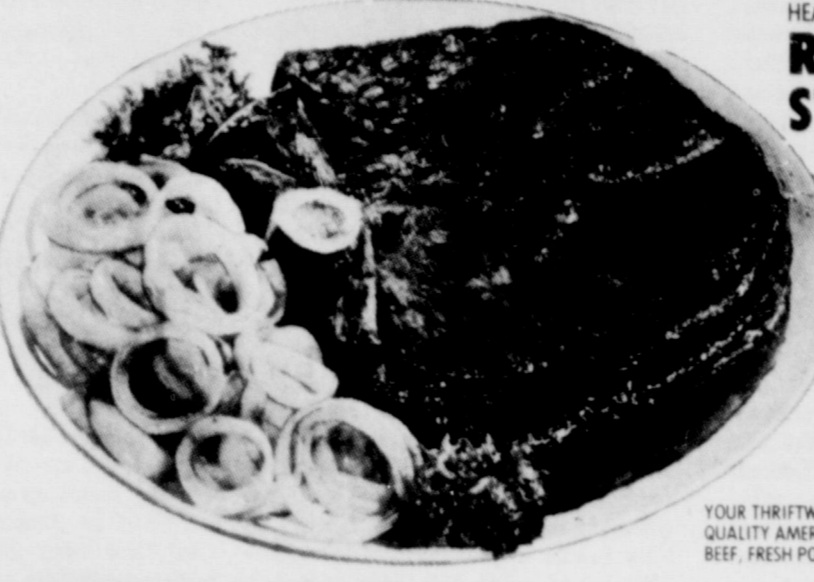
