In addition to having your family history published, it is possible to have a memorial page for your loved ones who have passed away, or a tribute page for a living loved one.

Businesses also may have their histories published, through purchasing a page or a portion of a page for their write-ups and pictures.

If you remember how nice it was when the first volume of the Parmer County history came off the press, then that is an idea of how nice the second one will be.

Do your write-up now, and mail it to Box 577, Friona. The deadline is September 1.

**OTHER DEADLINES** will be coming up soon, in conjunction with the city's Maize Days celebration, which will be held September 9-13.

Businesses and organizations planning to sponsor girls in the Maize Queen contest, or the Little Miss contest must get their entries in by August 29, and that is less than a week away.

For the first time in 31 years, a new man is at the helm as principal at Friona High School, as Hal Ratcliff takes over the post vacated by longtime school administrator John R. Cook.

Ratcliff is a Dimmitt native and a graduate of Texas Christian University. He has 16 years experience. His wife is the former Charlotte Bock.

Mrs. Ratcliff (Charlotte) will be a teacher in the fifth grade in Friona schools. She is a graduate of Friona High School and Texas Tech, and has

11 years teaching experience.

Other new staff members include: Lisa Hathorn, junior high social studies and physical education. She is a graduate of Boling High School and LCC. This is her first teaching experience.

Rita Stephenson returns to the Friona school system as a special education instructor. She is a graduate of Wingate High School and McMurry College and has 22 years teaching experience.

Wanda Burney is a new junior high instructor, teaching science. She is a graduate of Adrian High School and WTSU and has a year's experience.

Joanne Hairgrove will be a speech therapy instructor. She is a native of Anson, and holds degrees from

McMurry and WTSU. She has 16 years' teaching experience.

A new teacher in the elementary school will be Dorothy Jamerson, who will be a special education teacher. She graduated from Goddard High School in Roswell, and Eastern New Mexico University. She has a year's experience.

Tom Johnson is the new boys basketball coach at Friona High School and also will teach social studies. A native of Lowell, Indiana, he received his degree from Wayland Baptist College. He has four years' teaching experience.

"We hope you will join the growing list of those who have submitted their family histories to be included in the new Parmer County History Book," Whitefield says.

The following story was presented as an example of one of the features to be included in the upcoming book:

Our great grandfather, Thomas B. Elder, worked as a cowhand and bronc buster on the XIT Ranch when he was a young man. He married May Murphy July 10, 1904 and they raised two boys and two girls.

One of their sons, B.O. Elder, is our grandfather. He and our grandmother Maudie and their only child, Laquita, bought a farm at Hub

and moved there in 1960. Our grandmother died in 1965 and a few years later our grandfather married Annie Cargile, a widow from the Lazbuddie community. They now live at Hub on our grandfather's farm.

Our mother, Laquita, attended school in Friona where she met our father, Conny Dodson. Dad lived at Cal Farley's Boys' Ranch from 1949 to 1957, then returned to Friona. He has an older brother, Ronald Dodson of Mineral Wells, Texas. He also has two sisters, Gail Fields of Amarillo, and Sandie Ward of Dimmitt. His mother and stepfather, Merle and Smiley Fulks, owned and operated a motel and cafe in Friona for many years.

We girls have attended Friona schools and lived in Friona all of our lives. Shae was born in 1962; Sheri, in 1964; Stacie, in 1969; Sunny, in 1971.

## Hereford To Host Area Reagan Rally

Governor Bill Clements and former Governor John Connally will kick-off a twenty-three city "Texas Round-up for Reagan-Bush" tour August 27, in the Texas panhandle.

Reagan-Bush Chairman, John Armstrong, said the tour--aimed at stimulating voter registration, get out the vote efforts, volunteer recruitment and campaign leadership identification--will draw participants from 195 counties.

Clements and Connally will fly from Austin to Hereford for the first of three panhandle rallies August 27 at 10 a.m. in the Bull Barn. They will hold a news conference immediately after the rally of Reagan-Bush supporters.

At 1 p.m., the campaign leaders will make an agricultural tour in the Hereford area.

A second rally and news conference are scheduled at the Tradewinds Airport in Amarillo beginning at 2 p.m.

Clements and Connally will attend a bar-b-que and rally in Pampa from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. at the M.K. Brown Auditorium.

Wayne Thomas and Garth Thomas are chairmen of the event in Hereford. Wales Madden III and Nadine Gregg are in charge of the Amarillo rally. Jim Campbell and Bobbie Nesbit head Reagan-Bush Round-up activities in Pampa.

Mayor Jerry Hodge of Amarillo, Regional Chairman for the Reagan-Bush Campaign, will coordinate the panhandle activities.

# FRIONA FLASHBACKS

....from the files of The Friona Star

### 50 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 15, 1930

The new brick and tile "flat iron" building owned by R.L. Hicks has been completed and is now in readiness to be occupied by various interests that will occupy it. The building contains five commodious rooms and faces on both Main Street and the State Highway. The central part of the building will be used as a storage room for cars, while the front part of the west side will be used by W.L. Beasley's filling station. The top of the building, being concrete, is to be used as a public skating rink.

### 45 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 9, 1935

The temperature here during the greater part of last week was unusually high for this altitude and one thermometer registered 110 in the shade one afternoon after hanging in the hot sun all the forenoon and still hanging against the sun-heated brick wall. However, the nights have been cool enough for sleeping, and the mornings have been nice and cool.

### 40 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 16, 1940

It now seems quite obvious that the Eighteenth Congressional District of Texas will have a candidate for congress, in the person of our esteemed Mayor F.W. Reeve. The mayor has consented to run for that office at the solicitation of many Republicans of the district. Republican County Chairman George McLean has circulated a letter around the district calling attention to this fact.

### 30 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 10, 1950

Lone Star Farmer awards were presented recently to three Friona boys for outstanding FFA achievement. They were Jimmie Gore, Tommy Jones and Keith Brock. To qualify, each boy must have completed all the vocational agricultural courses offered in their school for at least three years; must be able to lead a 40-minute group discussion, and must have earned at least \$250 on his supervised home projects, and the money must be in the bank or invested in livestock or equipment.

### 25 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 4, 1955

A greater Farmer County Fair, with considerable addition of entertainment, was assured this week by the Fair Board and by the Friona Chamber of Commerce. Dates are September 8, 9 and 10. A beard-growing contest has been announced. An old-fiddler's contest also is promised. A bigger-than-ever barbecue also is slated. Dick Habbinga will again be parade marshal.

### 20 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 11, 1960

Two Hereford youths died almost instantly Saturday morning when their car ramed a tree two and one-half miles east of Bovina on Highway 60. The dead were identified as Bobby Gene Province and Harley Earl Davis, both 20. Investigating officers said the driver apparently went to sleep at the wheel, since there were no skid marks before the crash, which occurred about 4 a.m.

### 15 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 12, 1965

Tragedy almost struck twice at the construction site of the new Friona High School this week, as an Abilene man fell some 20 feet between two walls in what will be the new

auditorium. Kenneth D. Latta, 24, is hospitalized with a broken shoulder bone and a concussion. A month ago, an Amarillo youth, David Austin, was electrocuted while working at the high school stadium site.

### 10 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 13, 1970

The Friona Star was presented the "Community Service" award by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce at the annual meeting of the West Texas Press Assn. last weekend in El Paso. The WT Chamber's award covers its 134-county membership area, which also overlaps the press association's boundary, including over 200 newspapers.

### 5 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 3, 1975

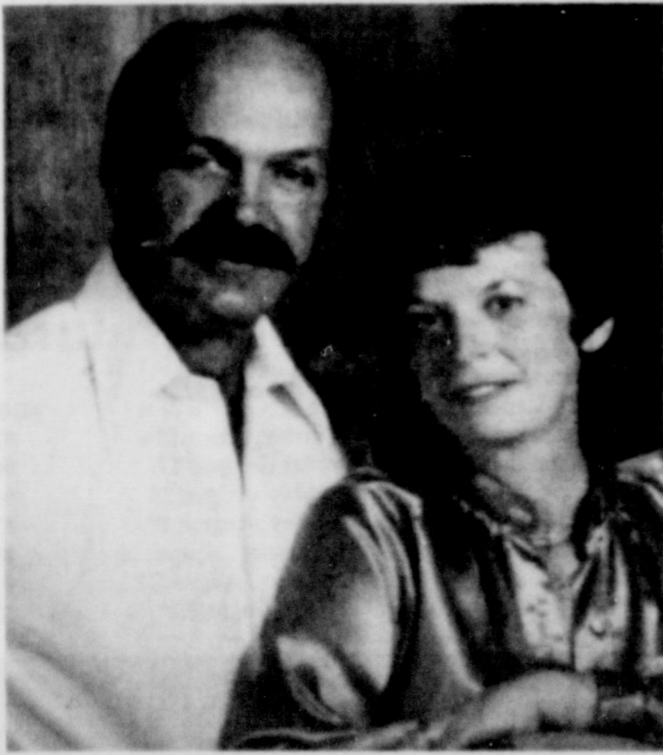

Someone once defined a busy person as a happy person. By that token, local homemakers should be happy ones right now. Just about every one you meet is rushing around trying to get fruits or vegetables pickled, canned, frozen or jellied.

I've been thinking for a number of years that it would be interesting to know the number of pints, quarts, pounds, packages, etc. of food which is "put up" by Parmer County homemakers during one summer season.

Right now there is a lot of fresh cabbage available and a lot of kraut is being made. Cabbage is quite versatile, but it seems that all too soon one runs out of recipes for doing something different with it.

My favorite cabbage slaw recipe is called "Twenty-Four Hour Slaw." Large head of cabbage  
2 large sweet onions  
3 cups sugar  
1 cup vinegar  
1 teaspoon celery salt  
1 tablespoon sugar  
1 tablespoon prepared mustard  
1 1/2 teaspoons salt  
1 cup Wesson oil  
Shred cabbage. Slice onions, separate into rings. Into a large bowl place layers of cabbage and onions, using all you have shredded and sliced.  
Sprinkle 1 tablespoon sugar over

this, lifting with fork so sugar can go to bottom of bowl.

Mix vinegar, salt, sugar, mustard and celery salt. Let mixture come to a boil; add Wesson oil. Pour hot mixture over cabbage-onion mixture. Cover with weighted plate. Let stand in ice box 24 hours. This makes a wonderful slaw for barbeque outdoor eating.

Another recipe I especially like, which calls for cabbage, is one Lillie Mae Baxter contributed to the J.W. Baxter family reunion cookbook, which is in its second printing.

Berrok German (Beer Rock)  
2 pounds ground beef  
2 large onions  
1 medium head cabbage  
salt and pepper to taste

Cook ground beef and onions in heavy skillet about 20 minutes with seasoning. Add chopped cabbage; let cook until cabbage turns color-about 20 minutes.

Using hot roll mix or refrigerator dough, cut dough into 6 inch squares, fill with ground beef, onion, cabbage mixture and fold corners together then pinch edges together.

Turn upside down in greased pan and bake immediately in 400 degree oven for 20 minutes.

Another recipe using fresh vegetables now and canned or frozen vegetables later is:

Okra Surprise  
2 cups sliced okra  
2 cups fresh corn cut from the cob, cooked  
4 or 5 large ripe tomatoes, peeled and chopped  
3 tablespoons melted oleo  
salt and pepper to taste

Thoroughly rinse sliced okra under running water; drain well. Combine okra and remaining ingredients in a large skillet; cover and simmer 15 minutes. Yield: 8 servings.

For a simple dessert with an unusual flavor, try:

Plum Kuchen  
Pastry  
1/2 cup butter, melted  
2 tablespoons white vinegar  
2 tablespoons sugar  
1 1/4 cups all-purpose flour

Combine butter and vinegar; add sugar and flour, mixing well. Roll dough out to fit a 10-inch pie pan; press evenly into bottom and halfway up sides. Prick bottom with a fork. Bake at 400 degrees for 10 minutes. Yield: one 10-inch pie shell.

8-10 medium size plums, about one pound

2 tablespoons all-purpose flour  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
1/2 to 1 cup sugar  
2 beaten eggs

Cut plums into eight inch wedges, discarding pits. Sprinkle 2 tablespoons of flour evenly in bottom of pastry shell. Arrange plum wedges side by side, overlapping slightly. Combine cinnamon and sugar and sprinkle over plums. Pour beaten eggs over top, covering entire surface evenly.

Bake at 400 degrees or until top is lightly browned. Yield: 6 to 8 servings.

## Law Extends New Program

In June, a bill extending the Great Plains Conservation Program (GPCP) from December 31, 1981, to September 30, 1991, became law.

The new legislation, Public Law 96-263, will increase GPCP funding from \$300 million to \$600 million and will raise the yearly cost-share limitation from \$25 million to \$50 million.

"This is a positive step to insure that farmers and ranchers throughout the Great Plains will have added incentive to apply conservation measures on their land," John Copeland, district conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture at Friona said.

Under the GPCP, landowners can speed up soil and water conservation work by signing agreements for 3 to 10 years. The contracts guarantee cost-sharing by the government to apply and maintain conservation measures. Contracts have been written for about half of the land eligible in the 10 states.

The Soil Conservation Service has administered GPCP since the program began in 1956. Through the program, working together with conservation districts, SCS has given technical and financial assistance to 55,000 Great Plains farmers and ranchers in treating critically eroded farmland and making appropriate land use changes.

"One hundred and seven landowners have taken advantage of the program on 49,486 acres in the local Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District," Copeland said.

Over the next 10 years, SCS and districts hope to help even more Great

"Despite a good record of success for work done under the GPCP, much work remains in order to combat serious droughts and persistent erosion problems," Copeland concluded.

## Hance Amendment Made To Protect Savings

U.S. Rep. Kent Hance successfully pushed legislation through the House of Representatives today which stops the federal government from withholding taxes from interest on savings accounts and dividends.

The action came in the form of an amendment to the appropriations bill for the Department of Treasury which was being debated on the House Floor. The amendment passed by an overwhelming 401-4 margin.

"At a time when we need to be encouraging people to save, it does not make good sense to require the withholding of taxes on interest earned on savings accounts," Hance said during floor debate of the amendment.

Hance offered his amendment as a response to a proposal made several months ago by the Treasury Department. The proposal, if enacted, would have required all financial institutions to withhold taxes from individual savings accounts and dividends.

The Texas congressman's amendment, in effect, stops government officials from both studying or implementing such a proposal.

Hance said his legislation did not affect current law which requires such withholdings for people who are not citizens of the United States, or for people who request withholdings.

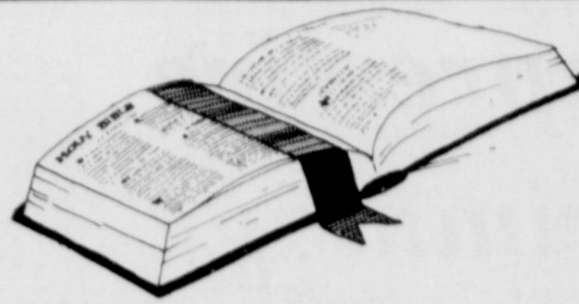
Burial was in Sunset Terrace Cemetery.

### OUR NEED TO FORGIVE

"I never forgive."  
"I wish I could forgive him but I can't."  
"I know the Bible says we must be forgiving but that's hard to do."

Three centuries ago Alexander Pope said, "To err is human to forgive divine."

There has been a great deal written about our need for forgiveness. It is something that confronts us daily and something that we speak about frequently in our churches. At the heart of the Christian gospel is the assurance that God forgives. We all need forgiveness. It is equally important that we be able to forgive.

In fact, according to the New Testament the two go together.

First, let us look at our need to forgive. We need to be forgiving for two reasons. One is psychological and the other theological. Psychologically, as we forgive we are freed from those negative attitudes that warp and twist the soul. Theologically, as we forgive we are able to receive forgiveness. When one makes a statement like the first one above, when one refuses to be forgiving he/she can accumulate

an awful lot of bitterness and resentment in one's life. The refusal to forgive results in resentment, bitterness, hatred, envy, loneliness and estrangement. To a certain extent we have all felt the destructiveness that not forgiving another can bring to our lives. It destroys creativity, separates one from others, and even can affect one's health. The person who harbors resentment and perpetuates hostility harms both himself and others. We need to be forgiving for our own sake as well as others, but it is not easy.

Forgiveness is not only a psychological need but a Biblical requirement. In many ways this may well be Jesus most difficult demand. Once when Simon Peter asked Him the question, "Lord, how often shall my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? As many as seven times?" Jesus said to him, "I do not say to you seven times, but seventy times seven." (Matthew 18:21, 22 RSV)

Jesus taught that our own forgiveness hinged upon our capacity to forgive others. In the Lord's Prayer which most of us repeat once a week, we say, "And forgive us...as we also have forgiven." In the sermon on the Mount, immediately following the Lord's Prayer He continues, "For if you forgive men their trespasses, your heavenly Father also will forgive you; but if you do not forgive men their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses." (Matthew 6:14, 15) Apparently even God cannot enter a life that harbors a bitter or resentful spirit.

No doubt this is a very demanding requirement and at times it almost seems like it is asking too much. Actually the opposite is true. Like most of Christ's demands, this is a demand that sets us free. When one forgives, one is free, free from bitterness, resentment, hatred, free

from that which makes our soul sick. As that sickness is removed, our soul grows and expands. Also we have the inner assurance that God does approve of one who forgives.

The question is, How do we learn to forgive as God would have us forgive? It is not easy. It will not come all at once. There are three things that help us attain this ability. 1) The first is to make every effort to understand. If we really understand how others feel, why they do some of the things they do, we would be less inclined to be critical and more willing to forgive. There is an old French proverb which says, "To know all is to forgive all." That isn't always true but there is great truth in it. 2) The second is to pray. In the sermon on the Mount Jesus taught us to pray for those who are our enemies, those who persecute us. It is difficult to be resentful toward those for whom we seek to love and for whom we pray. 3) Most of all it comes from the realization that we too need forgiveness, both by others, and by God. Others have had to endure our shortcomings, put up with our weaknesses, forgive our faults. The New Testament assures us that God, whose very nature is love, forgives us. Because we have been forgiven, we too can forgive. It is all summarized in one sentence, "Be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ forgave you." (Ephesians 4:32)

Now think of someone toward whom you may be harboring some anger or resentment, offer a prayer for his/her welfare, write a letter, make a call, do a favor--remember "To err is human, to forgive divine."

Passages for further study: Matthew 5:21-24; 18:23-35; Mark 11:25; Luke 6:37-38; 7:36-50; 23:33-34; 2 Corinthians 2:5-11; Colossians 3:13 and 1 John 1:9.

# Meeting Scheduled By Alcohol Coop

"It's coming right down to the wire," says Guy Austin and Grady Sorley, officers with Hi Plains Grain Products International Inc. "The site study is nearly complete, and very shortly we will know what size fuel alcohol plant we are going to be constructing in this area."

The final 'push' is on to obtain members of the GPI. Grower-members will determine just what size, from 30 million gallons-up for the fuel alcohol plant to be constructed somewhere in this immediate area.

September 2 is the final date to sign up to become a part of the multi-million dollar operation, according to Austin and Sorley.

They pointed out that since plans for the plant got underway, the price of fuel alcohol has increased to \$1.83, DDG has jumped in price to \$145 per ton and earnings on 100 pounds of corn have increased to \$6.77 while the earnings for milo have increased to

\$6.97. It is projected that by the time the plant is operational, earnings on corn will be \$8.30 per hundred pounds.

Dennis Johnson, planner and consultant from Arthur D. Little, consultants from Massachusetts, is currently narrowing down the proposed plant site to around two to three locations. Dr. John Nystrom is working on the mechanics of the plant and Bill Leavitt is working on a financial package for construction and operation of the multi-million dollar fuel alcohol plant.

The final meeting before actual signing of construction contracts is September 2 for all the general membership. Austin and Sorley said fuel alcohol is in great demand, and because of the lack of operational plants in the United States, most of the fuel alcohol consumed in the U.S. is still shipped to the U.S. from Brazil.

They are suggesting that current

members increase their membership before the cut-off date. According to the GPI officers, a note may be signed for the \$1,000 for each 10,000 bushels of grain to be taken to the plant. They said the note may be carried at 10 per cent interest and would be payable from the first dividend check, not later than September 2, 1983.

"We have the grain, so we have the ball, and how we play the ball game is entirely up to us," said Sorley. "Let's take the ball and run with it while we can."

Austin, of Farwell, is chairman of GPI and Sorley, of Bovina, is secretary-treasurer. Other board members include Bert Williams of Farwell; Tommy Whately and Jim Owens of Tulia; Bobby Redwine and Doug Bales of Muleshoe; Herman Wheatley and Rusty Andrews of Brownfield; Morris Millough of Muleshoe; James Higgins of Hereford; and Garvin Thorn of Hub.

Pay careful attention to clothing contaminated by pesticides. Some pesticides can enter the body through the skin. Wash clothes worn while applying pesticides daily, or store them in plastic bags to await laundering. Do not mix contaminated clothes with other laundry. Normal heavily soiled laundry procedures will remove pesticide from clothing. Follow this procedure:  
Use hot water, 130-140 degrees F, and normal or full water level. Pre-soak or pre-wash for extra heavily soiled garments.  
Use the manufacturer's recommended amount of heavy-duty detergent for heavily soiled laundry.  
Use chlorine bleach to aid in sanitizing and deodorizing if garments are bleachable. Check permanent-care labels for warnings against bleaching.

Thoroughly rinse with cold water.  
If possible, thoroughly dry in an automatic dryer at the regular fabric setting.
