Contestant Survives 'Bad Week'

After having a couple of weeks in which the scores were extremely good, the contest editors decided to go out and find some games which would really baffle the contestants in the Friona Star's football contest.

Judging from the scores of the past week, it looks as though the contest officials achieved their goal.

Bookmobile Program Faces Termination

For several years a Bookmobile Program has been operated in the four County area comprising Bailey, Cochran, Lamb and Parmer Counties. The program has enjoyed public support during those years, and has, in general, been very successful. But it now appears that it will have to be phased out and terminated about the end of this year—principally for economic reasons.

The Commissioner's Courts have, informally and reluctantly, agreed that such action has become necessary.

In the past the participating counties have shared the operating expenses, with minor deviations, on a population basis. And the operation budget for 1981 would require combinations as follows: Bailey, \$6,095.25; Cochran, \$4,353.75; Lamb, \$10,594.12; and Parmer, \$7,981.88.

But recently the Lamb County Commissioner's Court voted to withdraw from the program entirely, and they did not include the Bookmobile in their 1981 county budget.

The other three counties then had to decide whether to continue the program on a three county basis, or terminate it. Because of fixed expenditures, such as salaries, insurance, etc. the budget could not be reduced nearly enough to offset

the loss of Lamb County's \$10,594.12 contribution.

Therefore, as accurately as we can project, to continue it would require additional contributions from the three counties of Bailey, \$3,428.01 for a total of \$9,523.26; Cochran, \$1,201.49 for a total of \$5,555.24; and Parmer, \$3,393.13 for a total of \$11,375.01.

It appeared to the counties that this is simply too much, especially since costs will probably continue to increase. Also counties are experiencing serious financial difficulties and in some cases are having to impose severe tax increases. And the courts just don't believe they can afford to assume additional expenses at this time, if such can be avoided.

Therefore, near the end of this year, the books on hand will be divided among the four counties, to be placed in their local libraries. The Bookmobile will be sold and the money returned to each of the counties on the same percentage basis as when the initial purchase was made.

The Courts all deeply regret that this action has become necessary. But they want to thank the people for their splendid support and cooperation through the years.

Cooperatives In Spotlight

October is "Cooperative Month" in Texas, and across the nation.

Gov. Bill Clements, in his official proclamation, urged the people of Texas to "give special recognition to the constructive and responsible roles of agricultural cooperatives in the economic progress of our state."

"Texas has more than 440 cooperatives operating and serving over 133,000 members," according to Bruno Schroeder, executive vice-president of the Texas Federation of Cooperatives. "These cooperatives are doing a business volume of almost two billion dollars annually."

Cooperatives in Texas range from farmer-owned gins, elevators and compresses to marketing, supply and credit organizations. Health, housing, insurance, electric, telephone and other service cooperatives are becoming more and more important to all Texas citizens, Schroeder said.

School Bond Issue Passes

The \$1.4 million school bond issue passed by a good margin here this past Tuesday, September 30, with a good turnout of voters.

The final vote was 413 in favor of issuing the bonds, and 226 opposed, approximately a 2-1 margin.

The last school bond issue had been voted in 1964. In that one, which provided for bonds to build the high school complex, and for an almost identical amount of money, the issue carried, 374-227.

Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe said that it was gratifying that the bond issue passed, and by the margin that it did, which indicated the will of the voters.

Jarboe said that he was in the process of gathering data on the community at present, which indicated the community's growth and financial condition. A booklet showing this information will be prepared.

Representatives of the school will have to make a trip to New York to present this information to bonding firms, to seek as good a rating as possible on the school bonds.

After a rating has been secured, the bonds will then have to be advertised and sold. A tentative date of November 10 has been set as the date to sell the bonds.

"We are also hoping for a good interest rate. Interest has been down somewhat in recent months, and we had hoped to get the building

program sold while it could be done at the best possible rate of interest," Jarboe said.

The Friona school official said that it would possibly be sometime in the spring before any definite work could begin as a result of the passage of the bond issue this week. And, due to the nature of the proposed remodeling, most of the work on the buildings will need to be done in the summer months, while school is out.

The work proposed includes ten new classrooms, plus extensive remodeling to the junior high school building, the junior high gym and auditorium. A new cafeteria, to serve the elementary and junior high campus, will be built.

Crash Kills Hereford Man

A Hereford man was killed Wednesday morning in a head-on collision near Summerfield on Highway 60. Geronimo Ruiz, 23, was apparently killed instantly when his automobile was in collision with one driven by Wineberto Barron of Friona.

The accident occurred where the four-lane portion of Highway 60 becomes a two-lane highway.

Ruiz and his wife Rosalinda, 15, were eastbound in their Ford Mustang when they collided with an Oldsmobile Cutlass driven by Barron.

Deadline Approaches For Family History

The Parmer County Historical Society feels that everyone has someone who has touched their lives in a special way.

"Some loved ones may still be living, while others have passed away. Have you ever asked yourself, 'How can I let him/her know how I feel? How can I express myself?' If you have, we may have just the answer for you," says Otho Whitefield of the historical society.

"By purchasing a memorial or tribute page in the Parmer County History Book, you are able to express your feelings, and at the same time, preserve them for posterity. The deadline for family histories is October 15, less than two weeks away.

Whitefield says that to date, he has in his files a total of 245 family histories from the Friona-Black area; 93 from Farwell-Lariat; 80 from the Bovina-Rhea area; and 67 from the Lazbuddie-Clay's Corner area.

He quotes noted historian J. Evetts Haley of Canyon "Cherish the written record; there is nothing like it."

And also, popular columnist Ann Landers: "It is impossible to miss what we have. Only when we lose it do we appreciate its full value. This is one of the cruel ironies of life, and it happens to all of us."

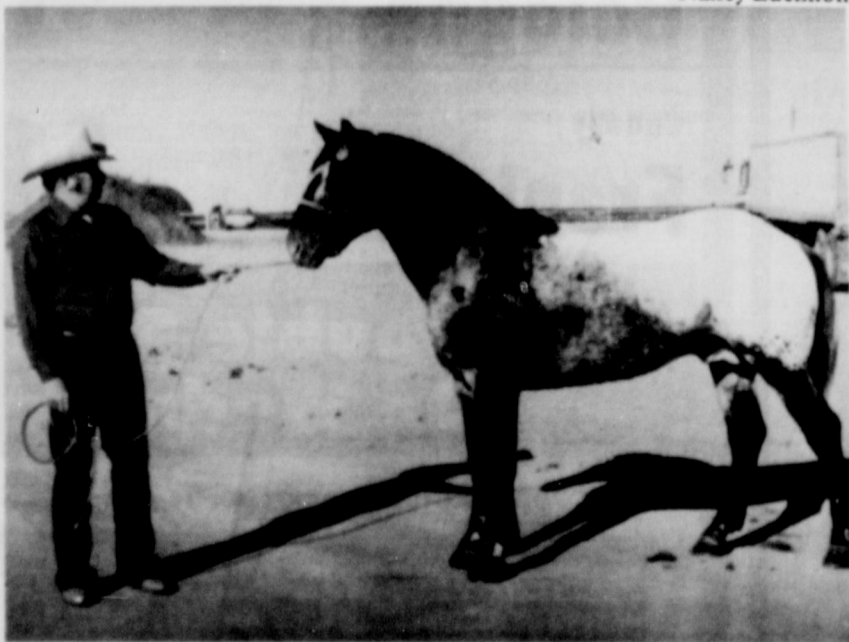
Zone 2 of the district includes all land in the north Friona and Black School Districts.

It was Farwell's first win over Friona in football since the season opener in 1969. The Steers had scored only three gridiron victories over the Chiefs in the past 17 years.

The Steers scored touchdowns in the first and second quarters of the game, and Friona was their own worst enemy, with three turnovers during the contest, which was played in almost a steady drizzle.

The Steers drove to Friona's 14 yard line after taking the opening kickoff, but committed one of their two fumbles, and Friona recovered to stop that threat.

The Chiefs got a first down from Nelson Jackson's ten-yard scamper, and then on a fourth down and one play, the team went for it, and Tony Jackson picked up the first down.

A similar play a few minutes later from Friona's 47 lost yardage, and Farwell took over on Friona's 45.

Just two plays later, the Steers were on the scoreboard. Jack Deaton covered the distance in two runs, one for 33 yards and then from 12 yards out for the score.

Mac Langford, whose previous role as spoiler in a local arena was in exhibiting grand champion steers which bested the Friona entries, proved he was talented at other things, by kicking the point-after, and Farwell had a 7-0 lead with 3:07 left in the opening quarter.

Neither team could move the ball in their next couple of tries, Friona having only four net yards eight offensive plays. Farwell took over following a punt on the Steer's 30-yard line.

Deaton, who was Farwell's leading ground-gainer, got loose on a 35-yard scamper up the middle, finally being tackled at the Friona 35.

It looked like Friona might hold, but on a fourth and seven play, the Steer quarterback lofted a long pass on which end Richard Carpenter made a nice catch at the goal-line, to light up the scoreboard again. Langford's kick made it 14-0 with 2:58 left in the half.

Quarterback Martin Mercado opened the second half with Friona's longest gain, a 30-yard run on a busted play, going from his own 28 to the Farwell 48, but Friona fumbled the ball away on the very next play.

Friona's best scoring chance came

in the fourth quarter, when the team blocked a Farwell punt and recovered it at the Steer 28.

However, Nelson Jackson was tackled for a ten-yard loss as the team tried a razzle-dazzle, and Friona faced fourth and 22 on the Farwell 40. Mark Montoya came on and tried a 56-yard field goal, which fell somewhat short.

The Chiefs mounted a mild threat late in the game, moving from their own 19 to midfield, helped by a pass from Mercado to Tony Jackson, and then a ten-yard run by Mercado. But the clock ran out on the drive, with the Chieftains coming up with too little, too late.

One thing which could be said for the young Chieftains was the fact that they went the entire game without a single yard in penalties, something of a rarity.

It was the team's first shutout loss of the season.

8th Graders Trample Vega, 42-6

Friona's Eighth Grade Braves scored on their first play from scrimmage when Alfredo Mata ran 40 yards for a touchdown, and went on to beat Vega Thursday, 42-6, for their third win of the season against only one loss.

Guy Wilkins scored on an end around run of about 35 yards, Sammy Saldina ran 60 yards on a sweep, Mata scored again on a 30-yard run, and then took a pass for 25-yards, as Friona ran up a 34-0 halftime lead.

During the second half, the second and third units saw action. Friona's final TD came on a 50-yard run by Mata, his fourth TD of the game. Trailing 42-0, Vega got their only score in the final quarter.

On defense, the Braves had an interception by Praxedis Chavez. The entire defense played well, the coaches said. The offensive line was complimented for a great job.

Next games for both teams will be October 16 against Dimmitt. The Seventh Graders are 0-2 on the season, but are coming along.

Greg Martinez and James Kelt are coaches for the Braves teams.

Town Talk

As I write this week's Town Talk, I'm sitting at a desk facing an east window in the second story of the Phillips Ranch home, which is located about eight miles north of Lewistown, Montana.

Directly in front of me I see about 100 feet of pretty green grass inside a white wooden fence. Four apple trees in various shades of yellow and green leaves with numerous red apples hanging from the branches are immediately to my right. (It is difficult for me to suppress my almost uncontrollable impulse to dash out and pick every apple before any of them freeze. However, native Montanans tell me a few light freezes improve the taste of the apples.)

Across the fence and to my left a row of tall trees sway gently in the breeze. Their leaves are so far untouched by the frost and the foliage is so thick I can't see through it.

Directly in front there are some shrubs and cattails between the yard fence and a boot shaped pond, which is fed by a spring. Several saddle horses are grazing across the pond.

Large red barns surrounded by white fences are farther out to my right. Several large stacks of round bales of hay and straw are beyond the barn. Then, farther out I see a large herd of cattle grazing in a valley where the grass is very green. Higher up the grass is brown.

Low rolling hills are between me and the eastern horizon, which ends with the Judith Mountains. A farmer is drilling wheat in the only field in sight. A large expanse of thick clouds between me and the mountain range makes the top and one end of it invisible.

A thin layer of clouds overhead makes the sun almost invisible, too. The outside temperature is almost 50 and a small amount of rain fell last night.

There has been some frost here, and the trees across the south side of the lawn are several different colors of yellow and orange. Looking that way one sees the Snowy Mountain range.

Frost has not touched the front flower bed, which is on the south side of the house. Alyssum, petunias and geraniums are blooming profusely and their green, white and red colors make a magnificent display.

Tomato plants on the east side of the house are still producing. They are covered each evening for protection from frost and the foliage still looks just like summer time.

Add to this setting our youngest daughter, Susan; her husband, Wes; and their two sons, Clint, 3, and Kory, 1, and it should be real easy to determine why the next few weeks are going to be most enjoyable for the Floyds.

We drove up by way of Elkhart, Kansas; then through Colorado and Wyoming. Except for irrigated fields it was dry all the way up. We saw a lot of antelope in Wyoming.

All the cattle we have seen have been in good shape, but this year's hay crop was very short and most ranchers are paying high prices for hay to winter their herds.

Central Montana was part of the black out several hours to-day. There was no electricity over a wide area. Probably merchants were more adversely affected than anyone else. They didn't have any lights and their

electric cash registers would not work.

The First State Bank at Elkhart had some interesting souvenirs made for customers and friends. They are thin white cardboard rectangles about 2 1/2" x 7 1/2". Under the caption LINCOLN-KENNEDY PENNY, which is near the top, are small drawings of the profiles of Abraham Lincoln and John F. Kennedy with an uncirculated Lincoln Head penny centered between them.

The penny has been stamped with a profile reproduction of John F. Kennedy looking at Abraham Lincoln.

This unusual commemorative piece is truly a collector's item.

The article about astonishing coincidences, which all of us have seen somewhere or other, forms the body of the souvenir. It goes like this:

Astonishing Coincidences

Lincoln was elected in 1860
Kennedy was elected in 1960
There are seven letters in each name
Both Presidents were slain on Friday
Both were slain in the presence of their wives
