game against rival Farwell was used
as a guage for the type of season the

For 17 consecutive years, the teams
met in the first game of the season. If
Friona won, they usually had a good
season. It they lost, it was usually less
than sucessfful.
The Chieftains had not lost a game
to their Parmer County neighors in
more than a decade, but Farwell did
something about that streak here last
Friday.

The Steers spoiled the Chieftains
Homecoming Homecoming Game, 14-0, in a rain-
dampered contest good crowd. It was Farwell's first win over Friona in football since the season
opener in 1969. The Steers had scored only three gridiron victories over the Chiefs in the past 17 yea

As I write this week's Town Talk,
