Residents of the city are invited to attend the regular meeting of the Friona City Council on Monday, September 8, and comment on the budget, if they wish. Residents also are expected to attend to voice their

Enrollment Figures Show Gain

Registration in the Friona school system on Tuesday, August 27 was 1,288, according to Tom Jarboe, Superintendent of Schools.

This was an increase of 23 students over the 1,265 figure on the second day of school a year earlier.

"We don't know for sure if this represents a true increase, or if it just means we are getting more students registered and started earlier this year," Jarboe said.

The superintendent indicated that traditionally there are a number of students who begin school for the first time after Labor Day. Jarboe said it would be interesting to see if the school picks up its usual number

of "late comers" this year.

The increase in numbers in the current totals come from the elementary and junior high. Elementary totals increased by 20 from the previous year, and junior high showed a gain of 22. High school classes showed a decrease of 19 students.

Following are the enrollment totals, with the 1980 totals given first, followed by the 1979 figures: early childhood special education: 5, 0; kindergarten 94, 91; first grade 117, 109; second grade 114, 113; third grade 101, 103; fourth grade 103, 99; special education, combination unit, 9, 8. Elementary totals: 543, 523.

Fifth grade 107, 91; sixth grade 108, 106; seventh grade 101, 105; eighth grade 101, 93. Junior high totals: 417, 395.

Ninth grade 92, 86; tenth grade 83, 86; eleventh grade 81, 86; twelfth grade 72, 84. High school totals: 328, 347. Grand totals: 1288, 1265.

opinions on the proposed new city water ordinance, which would cause a considerable increase in city water

The 1980-81 budget proposed by Outland is in the amount of \$671,753, compared to \$626,815 for the current fiscal year. This is an increase of seven per cent over the 1979-80 budget.

Outland said that the 1980-81 budget is balanced, and continues to depend upon city sales tax, franchise taxes and the Revenue Sharing Fund, which will be somewhat diminished (by 6.5 per cent) for the coming budget year.

In his annual budget message to the Friona City Council, Outland said that the necessity of the city having to drill a new water well during July of this year has had an adverse effect on the 1980-81 budget.

Included in the budget will be pay raises for city employees amounting to nine per cent, to attempt to compensate for inflation.

The City is expected to receive \$33,496 from Revenue Sharing during the coming year, and Outland has budgeted employee raises to account for \$23,496 of this amount. The other \$10,000 is budgeted for improvements to the Reeve Lake area.

Principal capital outlay items in the budget include a \$10,000 item for a new pumper for a city fire truck, as required by the state; \$12,000 for exchange of the fire chief's automobile, and \$8,000 for a new backhoe for the city water department.

The pledge center will be open


during the same hours as the telethon, from 8 p.m. Sunday, August 31 to 6:30 p.m. Monday, September 1.

Youth from the First Baptist Church, under the direction of Geary Brogden, are also pledge center volunteers.


