A COUPLE OF THINGS were evident by virtue of Ronald Reagan's landslide victory over President Jimmy Carter in Tuesday's General Election.

The first is that the American people, from the Redwood Forest to the New York Island, and from North Dakota to Texas, were disenchanted with Carter's administration, and were ready for a change of the guard, in hopes that Reagan can in some way stave off such things as the spiraling inflation which threatens to undermine the country's very foundation.

The second is that the country's major media, in particular the three major television networks, cannot be relied upon to fairly and truthfully reflect the mood of the American people.

Whether it is by accident or design, the truth of the matter is that the media "specialists" tried in vain to "talk us into" a toss-up election. "It's too close to call," the television boys have been saying for weeks.

Only longtime pollster Lou Harris finally dared to break with the opinion-shapers and came out on election eve with the forecast that Reagan might, in fact, unseat the president.

The fact of the matter was that he whipped the pants completely off the incumbent (Carter had a word for that, but we'll omit it in deference to his gracious concession speech). There was nothing what-so-ever "too close to call" about the election, and it is difficult to see how all of the networks could miss the national feeling so badly.

Could it be that they are too close to the national leaders, and completely turned off to the thoughts of the average voter? We would hope that this was the case, rather than the underlying suspicion that they were trying to make the race close for an unpopular president.

At any rate, perhaps the average television viewer will begin taking statements made by the national media with more of a grain of salt, rather than accepting them as "The Gospel."

This goes along with some things we have been saying about the networks for years. We think it's about time that these people stand back and take a good look at themselves, and figure out for whom they are giving the news, and strive to tell it a little more like it is.

## Nighttime Fire Ruins Adams Shop

Adams Drilling Company was hit by a destructive fire in the early morning hours Monday, November 3. The fire completely destroyed the company's shop area, ruining machinery, tools, etc.

The fire was discovered about 2:30 a.m., and by the time the Friona Fire Department arrived, the wooden structure was beyond saving. Firemen did prevent the blaze from consuming the other portion of the building.

However, the company's offices sustained considerable damage. A spokesman said the damage would run between \$75,000 and \$100,000, and might even top the \$100,000 mark.

"Luckily, we were able to save the company records, which go back several years," the spokesman said.

A temporary structure to be used for an office was being put in place on Friday, and the owners of the building say they are considering moving to property across the street west and building a new building.

Exact cause of the fire was not known, but was thought to have been related to electrical wiring in the building.

## Band Earns Top Marching Award

The Friona High School Chieftain Band scored a "Division One" rating at the University Interscholastic League's marching contests Wednesday at Texas Tech.

This rating is the first step toward the goal of every high school band—the sweepstakes trophy. To win that honor, bands have to achieve a similar ranking in marching, plus sight-reading and concert competition. The latter two contests are held in the spring.

The band received some good comments from the UIL judges, and various aspects of the band came in for special comment.

Judge Richard Crain complimented the band's percussion

feature, and the work by the flag corps. "A very entertaining show...you pulled it off, in my opinion," said Crain.

Also complimented were the trumpet, trombone and cornet soloists.

"I enjoyed it—a great band. Congratulations," were among the comments by judge Bill Bradley. "Band shows good planning, hard work and pride. Good job!" said Gerald Smith.

The band received the "1" rating from all three judges.

"I felt this was the best job we had done all season. I was real proud of the kids for their hard work," said FHS bandmaster Scott Houston.

## Voters Hard On Changes

Parmer County voters favored only three of the nine proposed constitutional amendments on the General Election ballot Tuesday.

Voters okayed numbers six (removal of certain appointed officials), 1671-1238; seven (county road work on private roads), 1856-1064, and nine (conversion of marital community property to separate property), 1604-1311.

Other totals included: No. 1 (unmanned bank teller machines) 1426 for, 1569 against; No. 2 (state's right of appeal) 923 for, 1902 against; No. 3 (centralized equalization board) 1123 for, 1724 against; No. 4 (legalized bingo) 1378 for, 1649 against; No. 5 (budget execution) 758 for, 2115 against and No. 8 (change names of appeal courts) 956 for, 1777 against.

## Reagan Wins Votes In County, Precinct

Parmer County voters went to the polls in record numbers Tuesday, and gave an overwhelming majority of their votes to the next president of the United States, Ronald Reagan.

Reagan won Parmer County's majority in a runaway, gaining 2640 votes, a whopping 77.7 per cent of the votes cast in the presidential column. President Jimmy Carter received 707 votes or 20.8 per cent.

Third-party candidate John Anderson's vote was insignificant in Parmer County, as he polled only 30 votes, and Libertarian candidate Ed Clark managed only 21 votes.

Bill Sarpalius, who won election over incumbent Bob Price with amazing ease across the area, was given a 67.1 per cent sendoff by county voters, who had given him 90 per cent of their votes in his primary victory over Gerald McCathern. The vote this time was 2199 for Sarpalius to 1075 for Price.

County voters were also electing a sheriff, and they gave present Chief Deputy Bill Morgan a near 2-1 win, 2167 votes to 1128 for his opponent, Nick Hand. Morgan won every voting box in the county except at Bovina, where he had a 25-vote margin, 282-257.

Congressman Kent Hance, who only had token opposition from J.D. Webster of the Libertarian party, lost only 61 votes to his opponent, although polling 409 votes less than the Reagan-Bush presidential ticket.

The Reagan ticket easily won every precinct box in the county. He scored 80 per cent margins or better in the five smallest boxes, including the absentee box. This included margins of 85.9 per cent at Lazbuddie, 286-36; 86 per cent at Lakeview, 43-7; 83.8 per cent at Rhea, 43-7; 83.2 per cent of the absentees, 198-38; and 80 per cent at Black, 44-9. Oklahoma Lane went 79.6 per cent in his favor, 144-30.

Helped by near-perfect weather for election day, which saw a sunny day with temperatures in the high 60s, a record number of voters marked ballots in Parmer County.

The total vote Tuesday was 3,519. This edged the former record of 3,482 set in 1976, and amounted to 77.96 per cent of the registered voters, considered excellent by voting officials.

The absentee vote had easily topped the former record by 60 per cent, with 259 early voters. This mark was helped by a special absentee booth in Friona on two days, which produced a large percentage of the absentees.

The Friona turnout was even better than the county's 78 per cent. If you add the 118 who voted absentee to the 1417 voting here Tuesday, the 1535 total represents 80.6 per cent of the number of qualified voters in the precinct, a great turnout.

Bessie Holt, local election judge, praised the turnout, and the work of her officials. She said the voting was off to a big start, with 463 people casting ballots in the first three and one-half hours. The pace continued fairly steady throughout the day.

In the Friona box, the Reagan-Bush team polled 1019 votes to just 297 for Carter-Mondale, a 76.6 per cent margin.

The Friona voters turned around and gave Democratic challenger Bill Sarpalius 995 votes to 310 for incumbent Bob Price, or 76.2 per cent. This indicated a considerable amount of "crossing over" on the ballot marking.

Sheriff-elect Bill Morgan, who put in a large amount of his peace officer experience at Friona, including serving as Chief of Police and later

# FRIONA FLASHBACKS

**50 YEARS AGO--OCT. 31, 1930**  
Farmers in the Friona territory say that their chances for a wheat crop this year look extremely good. There is plenty of moisture in the ground to bring the wheat to a good growth and with the usual amount of winter moisture they will be sure to make a good stand.

**45 YEARS AGO--OCT. 25, 1935**  
Monday was "Wheat Check Day" at Friona, when County Agent, A.R. Bateman and his assistants put in one full day here in the Maurer building delivering wheat checks to the wheat farmers of this locality. The checks that were delivered at that time were the last 1934 and the first 1935 checks, and those delivered totaled an estimated amount of \$80,000.00 for this locality. The total amount of money allotted the wheat farmers of Parmer County according to Mr. Bateman, is \$200,780.30, of which amount \$121,780.30 in checks has already been received at his office at Farwell.

**40 YEARS AGO--OCT. 25, 1940**  
Parmer County 4-H Club Beef Calf demonstrators have scheduled a Progress Show in the school bus barn in Friona Saturday afternoon, October 26 at 2 o'clock. This is not a competitive show, but will give you an opportunity to see the type calves on feed now, and compare the

feeding results next March at our spring show.

**35 YEARS AGO--OCT. 26, 1945**  
Mayor Glenn Reeve announced Tuesday that the City Commissioners have appointed Freese and Nichols, engineers, to do the preliminary figuring on the prospective sewer system for Friona. Further announcements in regard to this project will be made as soon as possible.

Lion W.L. Edelman of Friona has been made Zone Chairman of the Lions Clubs at Friona, Hereford and Dimmitt. His appointment was made by Deputy District Governor Lon Edwards of Amarillo, and concurred in by District Governor Charles H. Dean of Plainview.

**30 YEARS AGO--OCT. 19, 1950**  
Burglars again struck Friona last Thursday night, taking property from the Friona Lumber Company and the Friona Consumers Cooperative. The same night, tools were taken from the A.L. Black farm southeast of Friona. The lumber company safe was carried from the yard, later being found near the highway west of town, minus a small amount of cash, but still containing the books of the firm.

**25 YEARS AGO--OCT. 21, 1955**  
Playing "caveman" proved fatal to

a 6 year old child Thursday afternoon and placed another in the local hospital severely cut and bruised about the head. David Casares, son of an itinerant Mexican family, lost his life when playing with a number of other children in a pit at the Mills & Fleming Gin south of Friona.

**20 YEARS AGO--OCT. 20, 1960**  
A three-firm shopping center has its grand opening in Friona Saturday. White's Supermarket, LuNora's Ladies and Children's Ready To Wear and E-Z Coin Operated Laundry will all have special prizes and prices to mark the occasion. All three firms are located in the new Schueler Building. E.S. White is operator of the supermarket. His son, Edward, operates the laundry and is also employed at the supermarket. LuNora's is owned by Mrs. Nora Welch.

**15 YEARS AGO--OCT. 21, 1965**  
Ross Ayers last week received notice of his advancement in rank from Brigadier-General with the National Guard, and received new orders placing him in command of SFR Brigade of the 36th Division, headquartered in San Antonio.

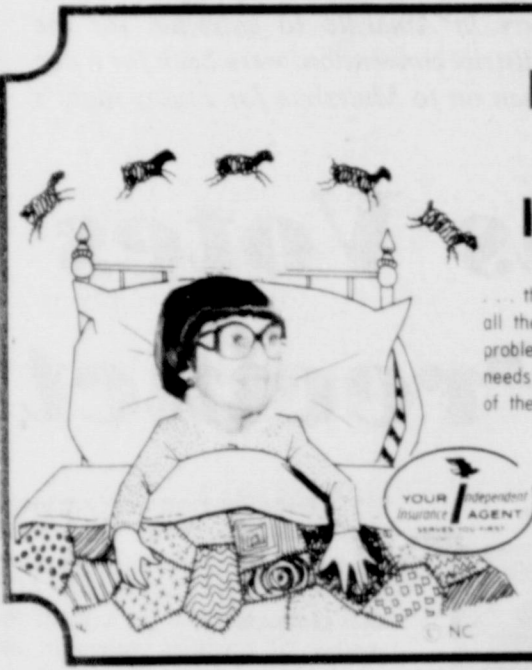
**10 YEARS AGO--OCT. 22, 1970**

**5 YEARS AGO--OCT. 19, 1975**

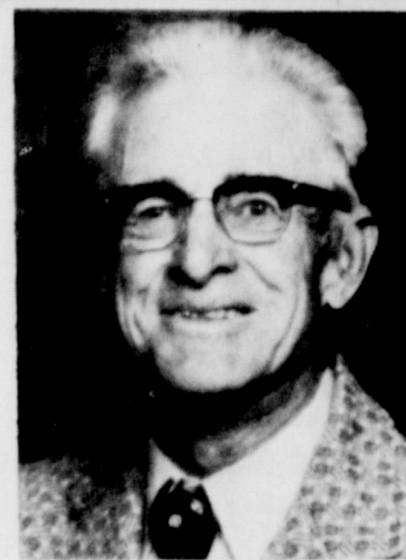

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# 'Cats Roar To 47-0 Victory

The Littlefield Wildcats, held at bay for most of the first half by the winless but stubborn Friona Chieftains, broke loose for 33 second half points, and roared to a 47-0 win in a game at Chieftain Field last Friday.

The Wildcats have their sights on the district title, and have been playing like they intend to win it this time around. They lost the title last year after a close defeat at Muleshoe.

The underdog Chieftains carried the fight to the Wildcats in the first half, stopping numerous drives with hard-hitting tackles which resulted in four lost fumbles by the Wildcats. The half also featured a pair of great defensive plays by Nelson Jackson and Mike Neill which prevented touchdowns by the potent visitors.

The 'Cats fumbled on their first possession, but got the ball back and proceeded to drive 37 yards for their first score. This came with 8:20 left in the opening quarter, and gave Littlefield a 7-0 lead.

Quarterback Nelson Jackson gave the home fans something to cheer about when he raced 36 yards on what started out to be a passing play. This put Friona into Wildcat territory. Three plays later, Jackson raced nine yards to the Littlefield 33. However, a bad snap on third down hurt the Chiefs, and they were forced to punt.

Late in the quarter, Littlefield threatened to score when speedy Michael Williams went around end and up the west sidelines. He appeared headed for a touchdown, but Nelson Jackson caught up with him from behind and forced him out of bounds at the Friona two.

Three plays later, the play became even more important, as his brother, Tony Jackson hit Williams, caused a fumble, and then recovered the ball for Friona.

The "Jackson Brothers" act continued as Nelson passed 20 yards to Tony to get Friona out of the shadow of their own goal posts, and a little later Mark Montoya boomed a punt which got the Wildcats back across midfield. Nelson was shaken up on the play and he sat out most of the remainder of the game, a big blow to the team's chances.

They stormed back upfield, and had the ball at Friona's 16, when another crushing tackle jarred the ball loose and Friona recovered their third fumble.

The only problem was that the Chiefs couldn't move the ball, either. Martin Mercado, hobbled with an ankle injury, had to replace Jackson, slowing down the offensive attack. Friona only managed three first downs during the first half and just 66 net yards.

Coach Jerry Blakely must have read the team "the riot act" at halftime, because they came out and corrected most of their mistakes, and taking advantage of a couple of Friona turnovers, scored 20 points in the third quarter, to up their lead to 34-0.

Friona, meanwhile, managed only one first down in the quarter, on a pass from Mercado to Tony Jackson.

The Wildcats decided they wanted blood. (The team had smashed Dimmitt the week before, 62-10, so

they evidently don't believe in the good neighbor policy.)

The 'Cats drove 45 yards through the air for one touchdown, and the same distance on the ground for another, to advance to their lead to 47-0.

The Chieftains didn't quit trying. Mercado passed to Tony Lafuente on a 30-yard gainer, the longest Friona gain of the night, and then hit Tony Jackson on a 16-yard strike, as the team moved the ball to the Littlefield 17-yard line.

But the Wildcats stiffened, and forced a fumble a few plays later, which they recovered at their 18 yard line and prevented a Friona score.

County Deputy here, outpolled Nick Hand in the Friona precinct, 816 votes to 497. Morgan received 62.1 per cent of the votes here.

Commissioner Ernest Anthony was re-elected. He outpolled challenger Raymond Euler, 914-370 in Friona, and 1069-434 in complete Precinct 1 totals.

Friona voters were mainly opposed to the proposed amendments, giving only three of the nine a majority. The local voters favored number 6 (governor's power to remove appointed officers), 662-511; number 7 (counties to do work on private roads), 760-430, and 9 (allowing spouses to have separate property), 666-513.

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

# The Happy Homemaker

On Montana's 100th birthday, the state's first lady, Mrs. Tim Babcock, compiled and edited a "first Ladies' Cookbook.... The Montana Territorial Centennial Edition. This was in 1964. The revised edition, from which the following recipes were copied, was printed in 1973.

Mrs. Babcock was the state's first lady from 1962 to 1969 and the first section of the book was devoted to her favorite recipes.

The following recipes were from that section:

### Chinese Veal

1 cup celery--cut fine  
1 cup onions--cut fine  
1 cup uncooked rice (brown or white)  
1 pound veal cut in small cubes  
1 pound pork loins cut in small cubes salt and pepper

Brown celery and onions in butter. Cook veal and pork in butter until brown. Salt and pepper and add to celery, onions and rice. Place in large casserole and add:

1 can cream of mushroom sauce  
1 can cream of chicken soup  
1 package frozen peas, cooked  
3 tablespoons soy sauce  
1 small can mushrooms  
Sprinkle top with toasted almonds. Bake 1 hour at 350 degrees.

### Avocado Ring Mold

Dissolve 1 package lemon gelatin (Jello) in 1 cup boiling water. Chill till partially set, then beat with a spoon. Stir in:  
1 cup mayonnaise  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 cup sieved avocado  
1 cup cream whipped  
Chill till set; serve on endive with lemon wedges.

### Queen Elizabeth's Cake

Pour 1 cup boiling water over 1 teaspoon baking soda and 1 cup chopped dates. Let stand while mixing 1 cup sugar, 1 beaten egg, ¼ cup shortening or butter and 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Mix 1½ cups sifted flour; ½ cup chopped nuts; 1 teaspoon baking powder and ¼ teaspoon salt.

Added creamed mixture to flour mixture and then add to date mixture. Bake in an 8x10 inch pan for 1 hour or until done at 350 degrees.

Icing: 5 tablespoons brown sugar; 5 tablespoons cream and 2 tablespoons butter. Mix and boil 3 minutes. Add chopped nuts or coconut. Spread over cake.

### Thirst Quencher

1 cup orange juice  
1 cup unsweetened pineapple juice  
¼ cup lemon juice  
¼ cup maraschino cherry juice  
1 cup dry ginger ale  
2 tablespoons honey  
1 pine vanilla ice cream  
2 tablespoons sliced maraschino cherries

Mix fruit juices and ginger ale; add honey; mix well. Chill thoroughly. Add ice cream; stir until blended. Serve in glasses and top with cherry slices.

### Orange Angel Delight

Dissolve 1 package of orange Jello in 1 cup of boiling water. Add 1 cup of orange juice with pulp, the juice of ½ lemon and ¼ cup of sugar. Cool until it starts to thicken. Add 1 cup of cream whipped and stir well.

Break angel food cake into small pieces covering the bottom of a large cake pan. Over this cut up 15 to 18 marshmallows and sprinkle ¼ cup chopped nuts.

Pour Jello mixture over all and let stand in refrigerator until firm.

### Percolator Cocoa

Mix:  
½ cup Pream  
3 tablespoons cocoa  
3 tablespoons sugar  
Dash of salt  
½ teaspoon vanilla  
Mix with just enough water to make a thick paste and place in basket of percolator. Pour three cups water in percolator; then put basket in percolator on mild setting. The cocoa becomes foamy. Makes 4 cups.

Brookfield is a registered and licensed architect, having received his degree from Texas Tech University in 1971. He is also a graduate of Friona High School.

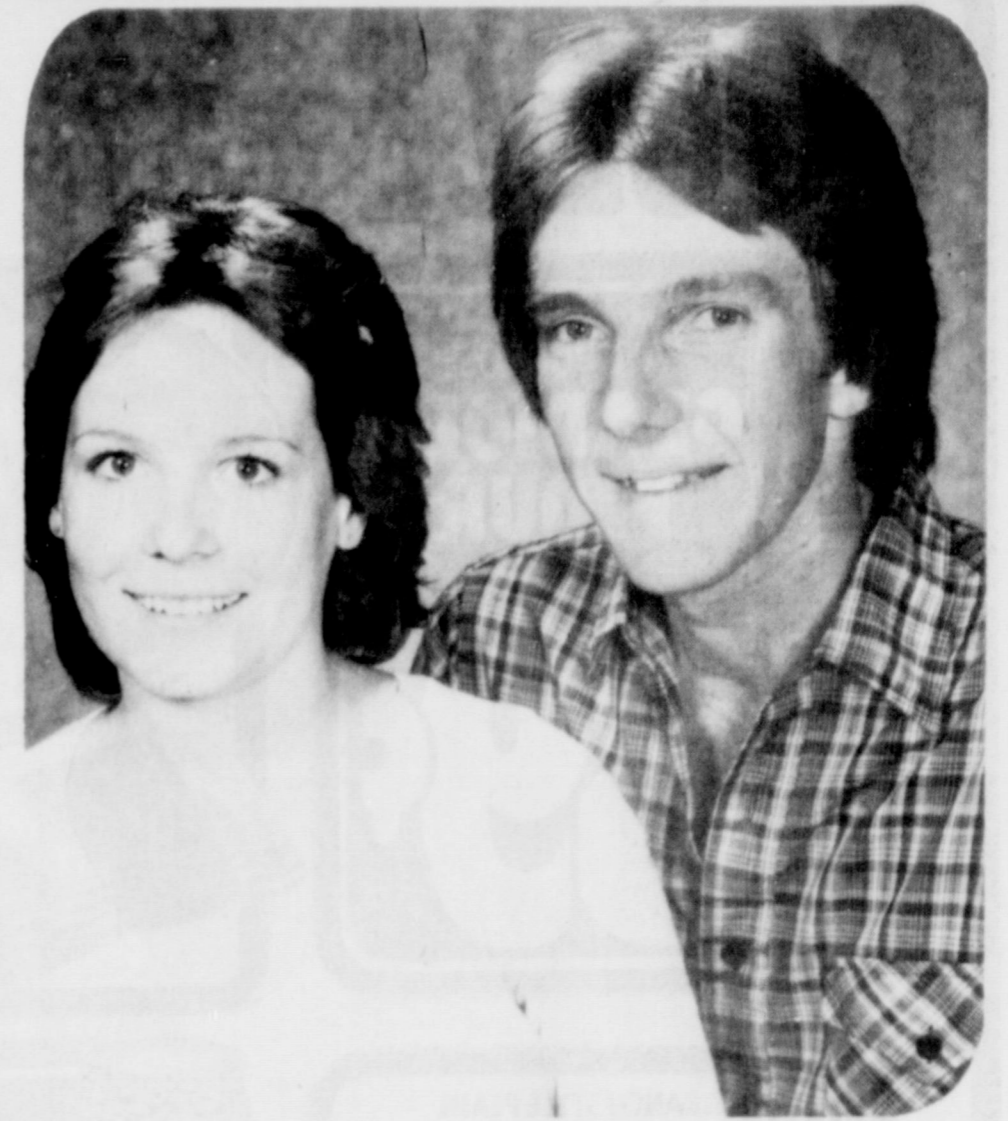
