Scores Nosedive In Grid Event

MERCIFULLY, TIME is running out on the 1980 presidential campaign.

It has been a long, drawn out campaign, and an unusual one which has seen both the president and challenger Ronald Reagan having their "highs and lows."

At one time, just after the conventions, polls showed Reagan with a big lead, with Carter fading. Now, as the election approaches, Carter is making gains in the polls, and the race looks as though it will have a close finish.

One observer said this week "If the race were a football game, I'd say it's in the last two minutes, and Carter has the ball."

The president very definitely has the ball. As the incumbent, a variety of issues over which he at least has some control, will have an effect on the race.

One of the issues, which has been at least in the background throughout the campaign, is the hostage situation. The administration appeared to be making a push during the past week to effect a release of the hostages, and enhance Carter's reelection chances.

Although many voters say they would be appalled, if Carter, having had the hostage issue up in the air for virtually a year, pulled enough strings to get them released on election eve. This would approach sacrilege, in many people's opinion.

Yet, the polls demonstrate that if, somehow or other, a release of the hostages from Iran could be accomplished prior to the election, it would be a boost to the president's reelection campaign, political overtones notwithstanding.

Events of the past week would indicate that Iran is sticking by their guns on the hostage situation, and it looks from this vantage point as though chances for a release prior to November 4 are slim.

That brings us to the next "big issue," which is sure to have an effect on the election.

This is the Carter-Reagan debate, which almost never came about, but was resurrected at the last minute by Carter forces, who saw it as a necessity in gaining lost ground of recent months.

The presidential debate has become almost a tradition in our country, and we feel as though it would have been a shame to have denied the voters this opportunity of seeing and hearing the top candidates appear in a one-on-one situation.

Most voters remember the Nixon-Kennedy debates of 1960, and what an influence they had on the election. Probably no single event ever had such a lasting impression on voters as did those debates.

The Carter-Ford debate of 1976 also was a high point of the election, and was good exposure for Carter, the challenger.

We feel that the debates are necessary, although traditionally the incumbents feel that they have more to lose than to gain through such an event. Even though this might be true, we feel that they owe it to the American people to appear in such a forum, and "face off" on the issues, and then let the chips fall where they may.

Voters apparently were needing some sort of impetus, to help them with their final decision in this important election.

Hopefully the debate has provided that motivation.

Yearbooks Go On Sale

The 1981 Friona High School Chieftain Yearbooks will go on sale this next week, November 3-6, at the various school buildings.

The cost of the yearbook will be \$10.50 each. A \$7.50 deposit may be paid, to hold the book. There will be no extra copies ordered, according to a spokesman for the yearbook staff.

It would have been a good week for a contestant to gain some ground in the standings, in the Friona Star's football contest last week.

But unfortunately for the leaders, most of them pretty well stayed about the same place, in regard to the other contestants.

With more than the usual number of upsets dotting the contest lineup, the average score for the week was 12.5 right, 9.5 wrong.

Ron Harkey took a two-point lead in the standings after posting a score of 12 for the week. Harkey leads the pack with a score of 126.

Steve Clark, who had been tied with Harkey, managed just ten correct last weekend, and fell into a three-way tie for third with R.L. Blakely and Steve Williams, whose score of 13 gained him some ground for the week. The three contestants have scores of 124.

Jerry Hinkle, who had a score of 11, and Donita Martin, 10, are now tied for third place with scores of 123.

In the weekly prize division, only four contestants picked as many as 15 games correctly, and three of them divided up the weekly cash prizes.

John Seright of Lubbock was the weekly winner, taking the \$10.00 first prize. Seright was 18 points away from the Dallas-San Diego score, picking San Diego to win, 28-27.

Jack Clark took second place and \$6.00, by virtue of being 28 points away from the Dallas-San Diego score, picking the Chargers, 24-21.

Marie Fleming of Dimmitt was third, missing the tie-breaker by 35 points. She picked the Cowboys, 21-17.

Reagan Wins School Vote

According to the students at Friona High School, Ronald Reagan will be the next president of the United States.

At least, the students favored Reagan in a special "straw vote" held this past week.

Principal Hal Ratcliff said the results were as follows, with 301 students voting:

Ronald Reagan, 177 votes; Jimmy Carter, 99 votes; John Anderson, 20 votes; Barry Commoner, four votes; and Ed Clark, one vote.

Ray Strickland was the fourth contestant to correctly pick 15 games, but missed out on one of the cash prizes by four points on the score, which he predicted would be 20-14 in favor of the Cowboys.

Virtually everyone missed the Texas-SMU game, the "sleeper of the week," but plenty of other games also were missed. To top it off, one game, Oklahoma State-Kansas, ended in a tie, giving all contestants an automatic miss.

Seright's misses were Bovina-Vega; the tie; Texas-SMU; New England-Buffalo; Los Angeles-Atlanta; Baltimore-St. Louis and San Francisco-Tampa Bay.

Ten contestants correctly picked 14 contest games, not usually worthy of special mention, but this week several entrants would have been glad to have that score. They included:

Contestants are reminded that even after this weekend's contest, there are still four weeks remaining in the race for grand prize, so it's too early to be counted out, besides, they can still make an effort for one of the weekly prizes.

This week's tie game also brings a reminder that the Star will pay a bonus of \$5.00 to any contestant correctly picking a tie, but limits the number of games to two per week which may be chosen, for this special contest.

Details Told For Voting

The voting in Friona will take place at the Community Center. Voters have been asked to enter at the east door and exit through the south entrance.

Voters are also asked to bring their voter registration certificates if possible, as this will speed up their voting. Those with certificates will be in one line at the polling place, and those without will be asked to be in another, as the voter lists will have to be consulted for those without certificates.

Those who have voted in any election held in the past three years are automatically registered to vote.

Voters Go To Polls Tuesday, Nov. 4th

Voters in the Friona area will join those across the nation in going to the polls during the general election, scheduled next Tuesday, November 4.

Highlighting the ballot will be the presidential election, featuring incumbent Jimmy Carter-Walter Mondale against the Ronald Reagan-George Bush ticket.

Also on the Texas ballot in the presidential race will be John Anderson-Milton Eisenhower and Ed Clark-David Koch.

On the local level, Parmer County voters will elect a sheriff for the first time in 32 years, but the race for county sheriff has been very low key.

Candidates for the position are M.C. (Bill) Morgan, the present chief deputy, in the Democratic column, and Nick R. Hand, a city patrolman at Friona, in the Republican column.

The Morgan-Hand race is the only contested countywide race on the ballot.

Friona area voters will be electing a commissioner, and have a contest, with incumbent Ernest Anthony challenged by Raymond Euler.

Perhaps the race which will draw the most attention on local ballots is that for State Senator for this district, in which Bob Price, the incumbent, is challenged by Bill Sarpalus.

Price was elected in a special election in 1977, to replace Max

Sherman after Sherman resigned to accept the position as president of West Texas State University.

Although it is a case of a political novice versus a veteran, the race has attracted considerable interest, and Price is expected to perhaps be pressed more in his bid for re-election than he was during the special race.

The only state races on the ballot involves seats on the railroad commission and the Texas Supreme Court.

United Way Campaign Aids Cerebral Palsy

(Editor's note: Following is the third in a series of articles dealing with Friona's United Way drive, which kicks off locally on November 10).

Cerebral Palsy is our nation's leading child crippler. Approximately 40,000 individuals in Texas alone are affected by Cerebral Palsy, almost one-half of which are children.

One out of every 200 babies born in the USA are born with brain damage that predisposes the newborn to Cerebral Palsy. At our present birth rate it is estimated that 15,000 babies are born with this condition every year. There are approximately four cerebral palsied individuals per 1,000 population, so 12 to 16 of these victims may live in Friona.

Cerebral Palsy is not a single disorder, but a group of ailments having quite a variety of symptoms and all are brain-centered and all affect muscular control. "Cerebral" means brain centered and "Palsy" describes lack of muscle control.

A popular mis-belief is that cerebral palsy is a disease, but it is not. Brain damage usually occurs during birth and people live with it all of their lives. Cerebral Palsy cannot be cured but often it can be managed so that people affected with C.P. can function productively and enjoy life.

Local donations made to cerebral palsy through the United Fund drive are retained in Friona and its immediate area for the needs of those qualifying for aid.

The funds are used for the needs of the cerebral palsied individual and

include medical diagnosis; evaluation and treatment; vocational training; social and recreational programs; parent counseling; special and therapeutic equipment and other needs.

This equipment ranges in cost from \$75 for corrective shoes (which must be replaced twice yearly) to \$700 and \$800 wheelchairs or \$1100 leg braces and other prescribed equipment.

"Area cerebral palsied youngsters are the people you help when you give to the cerebral palsy fund through your donations to the Friona United Way," said a spokesman for CP and the United Way drive.

Absentee Vote Sets New Record

A total of 230 people had voted absentee in Parmer County as of Friday morning, according to County Clerk Bonnie Warren. Deadline for voting absentee was 5 p.m. Friday.

This was apparently a new record for absentee votes, as there had been 165 absentee votes cast in 1976.

This may indicate a good turnout of voters on election day November 4. Parmer County residents cast 3500 ballots in 1976. There are approximately 4500 eligible voters this year.

50 YEARS AGO--OCT. 17, 1930

A deal was consummated the past week and contract signed whereby E.V. Rushing becomes owner and proprietor of the Wentworth variety store in this city. Mr. and Mrs. A.N. Wentworth established this store about two years ago and have owned and managed it since. The new owner will take charge Monday of next week. It is understood that he purchased the complete property, including lot, building and stock.

40 YEARS AGO--OCT. 18, 1940

On Tuesday, representatives of pump building concerns for irrigation wells were here in the interest of installing irrigation wells in this locality, and it seems to be an assured fact that a number of irrigation wells will be sunk here within the next few months.

30 YEARS AGO--OCT. 12, 1950

Structural steel is being lifted this week as work on the auditorium-gymnasium at the Friona Schools progresses on schedule. Most materials are now on the ground, including face brick, and completion is expected in the spring. Contract was let last June for 320 days completion. The new bleachers at the football field are now complete with exception of painting.

20 YEARS AGO--OCT. 13, 1960

Frionans went fleeing about 4:40 p.m. Tuesday with the tornado siren screaming in their ears as a twister bore down on the community. The crazily twisting clouds were first spotted southeast of Friona by Ben Moorman and Ralph Shirley, who warned the city hall by radio of the impending tornado. Floyd Dameron, about 45, who farms near Friona, was the only person reported injured during the twister. Dameron was driving his truck on Highway 60 when he spotted the twister. His truck was caught just south of the Frio Draw bridge near Friona and was sent spinning into J.T. Gee's grain field and came to rest about 45 feet from the highway. The cloud touched down at the Elk Drive In and this was

deemed a complete loss following the storm. Across the highway at the old Chief Drive In the screen is gone and Tuesday night seven trailer houses lay stacked upon one another. About one mile west of town at the Leo

McLellan residence the house suffered damage to the northwest corner where the twisting winds pulled the frame loose from the roof spilling the furnishings onto the ground.

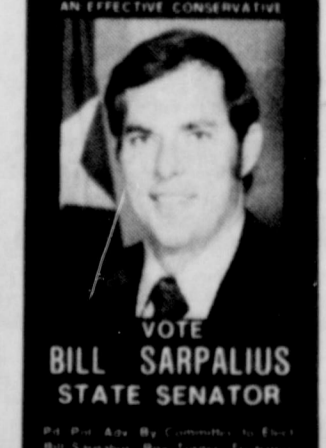

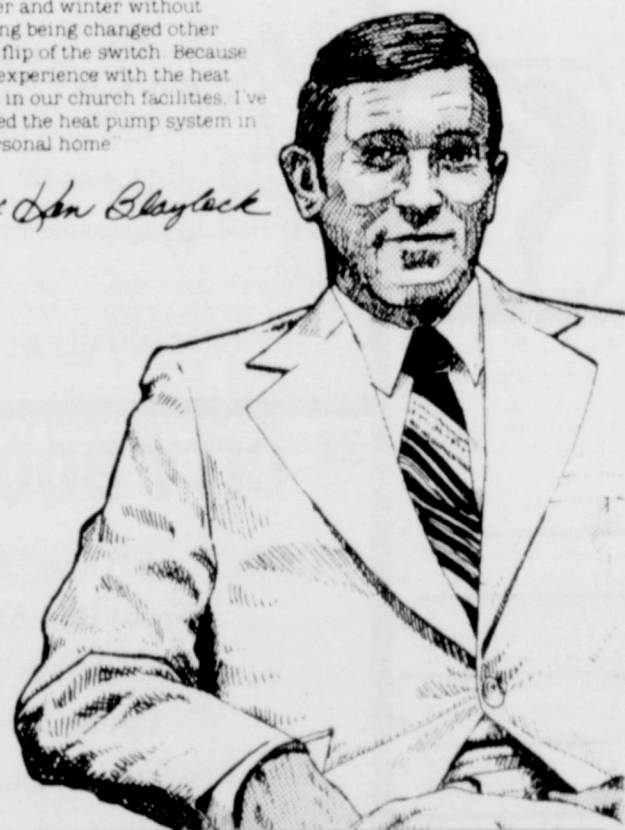
Survivors include two sons, Tom B. Jarboe of Friona and Melvin Jarboe of Floydada; three grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

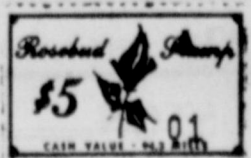



Here are pros and cons of proposed amendments

Texas voters will be called upon Tuesday to accept or reject nine proposed amendments to the state constitution.

To cast a more knowledgeable vote on each amendment, one must look beyond the wording to the "cause and effect" factors. There are valid arguments for and against each proposed amendment.

The most concise and objective analysis of the proposed amendments that the Star has seen is this one by State Representative Bill Clayton. As Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, he can be considered an authority on the most important merits and drawbacks of each of the proposed amendments.

Here is Speaker Clayton's report on the proposed constitutional amendments:

1 UNMANNED BANK TELLER MACHINES

The amendment would permit the legislature to authorize banks to use unmanned teller machines within the county or city in which they are located on a shared basis to serve public convenience.

FOR:

1. Unmanned teller machines allow customers to transact business at convenient locations and at any time.
2. Because each bank has the right to share in the use of the machines, a bank will be able to serve a larger area than it currently serves. Competition among banks will increase.
3. The use of unmanned teller machines allows banks to better compete with savings & loan associations, which currently may have more than one business location while banks are restricted to a single location.

AGAINST:

1. The cost of installing a network of unmanned teller machines would be passed on to the consumer.
2. The amendment circumvents the long standing prohibition on branch banking in Texas.
3. The use of unmanned teller machines will let large banks serve the entire community and force smaller banks out of operation.

2 STATE'S RIGHT OF APPEAL

A constitutional amendment to grant the state the right of appeal in criminal cases from certain rulings of the trial court.

FOR:

1. Granting the state this limited right of appeal provides the only effective way of testing the constitutionality of certain statutes and the legality of certain pretrial practices.
2. The amendment will provide a criminal defendant with a method of ending criminal action at an early stage if the appeal is worthy.
3. Granting the state a right of appeal will eliminate to some extent the tendency of some judges, when in doubt, to rule in favor of the defense to avoid appellate review of their rulings.

AGAINST:

1. The duration of a criminal trial will be substantially lengthened when the state takes an appeal.
2. The caseload for the court of criminal appeals will be significantly increased.

3 EQUALIZATION BOARD FOR AD VALOREM TAX

Proposing a constitutional amendment to require a single appraisal and a single board of equalization within each county for ad valorem tax purposes.

FOR:

1. Single appraisal districts and boards of equalization are needed to fulfill legislative intent in the passage of the Property Tax Code.
2. The creation of single appraisal districts eliminates duplication of property tax administration.
3. Such districts would prevent conflicts in appraisals, thus promoting uniformity and equality.

AGAINST:

1. Preventing county commissioners from direct involvement in property tax administration will vest too much tax authority within one non-elected board.
2. Property taxes will probably increase at the county level.

4 LOCAL CHARITABLE BINGO GAMES

Proposing a constitutional amendment to authorize bingo games for charitable purposes on a local option election basis.

FOR:

1. The charitable purposes for which churches, synagogues, religious societies, and many other organizations engage in bingo are of great benefit to society.
2. The proposed amendment would allow each community to decide whether to permit bingo games.
3. Bingo games provide an opportunity for entertainment, social gatherings and relaxation.

AGAINST:

1. Fraud in bingo games would not be easy to prevent by local law enforcement.
2. Organized crime could become involved in bingo games since profit margins would be as great as in criminal activities.

5 BUDGET EXECUTION

A constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to grant budget execution powers to the governor, subject to approval by a budget execution committee.

FOR:

1. Since the Legislature meets every two years in regular session, there is a need for more budget execution authority vested in an elective office.

2. With the approval of a budget execution committee, the chief executive could closely monitor agency expenditures and insure accountability of tax dollars.

AGAINST:

1. Additional controls on spending are not needed in Texas as the citizens' tax burden is among the lowest in the country.

2. Such authority would allow a free-spending governor the ability to increase expenditures, just as a frugal one could decrease them.

3. Agencies are managed by appointed or elected boards that are accountable to the people now; there is no need to change a system that is considered one of the best in the country.

6 REMOVAL OF CERTAIN APPOINTED OFFICIALS

Proposing a constitutional amendment to authorize the governor to remove appointed officials with the advice and consent of the senate; and allowing the governor to call a special session of the senate for this.

FOR:

1. Allowing the governor to remove appointed officers of the State gives the governor the ability to insure the promotion of his/her policies.

2. This ability would make board members and other appointees more accountable to the needs of an elected official.

AGAINST:

1. Appointees should have the ability to make independent judgments concerning the operations of their agencies, boards, and offices.

2. Such an added governing power would be a move away from control by the Legislature, which represents citizens at a district level.

3. The governor has no need for day-to-day control over appointed officers of the State.

7 COUNTY ROAD WORK ON PRIVATE ROADS

Proposing a constitutional amendment relating to the authority of a county to perform private road work.

FOR:

1. It is unfeasible to hire a private firm to perform private road work in many remote areas of Texas when the county can do the same at a reasonable charge.

2. Small counties must maintain expensive road construction and maintenance equipment even though not required on a full-time basis. Part of their investment could be regained with the revenue received from private road work.

AGAINST:

1. Provisions of the Texas Constitution prohibits the use of public funds for private purposes and public funds could be squandered by this amendment.

2. Counties would be in direct competition with private construction.

8 JURISDICTION AND AUTHORITY OF THE COURT OF CIVIL APPEALS

A constitutional amendment to change the names of the courts of civil appeals and the names and qualifications of the justices of the supreme court and to prescribe the jurisdiction and authority of the appellate court.

FOR:

1. It is unrealistic to expect only one criminal appellate court in Texas to administer criminal justice that is needed speedily and is a deterrent to crime.

2. The heavy workload of appeals in criminal cases that is presently handled by one court of criminal appeals would be shared by the 14 regional courts of appeal.

3. Appellate courts with jurisdiction in civil and criminal matters may attract and develop better judges that have benefitted from experience with a variety of legal problems.

4. This amendment would clarify such question as qualifications of a justice of the supreme court.

AGAINST:

1. Our present system is the most efficient system to achieve criminal justice.

2. The addition of a large number of criminal cases to the civil caseload of the civil appeals courts will create another caseload problem.

9 CONVERSION OF MARITAL COMMUNITY PROPERTY INTO SEPARATE PROPERTY

Proposing a constitutional amendment relating to the conversion of marital community property into separate property.

FOR:

1. A system for marital property should provide general rules for determining rights and allow for persons to make alternative property arrangements in their best interest.

2. Benefits derived from property should be owned by the spouse who owns the property.

3. The amendment would reduce the complexity of the process of converting community property to separate property.

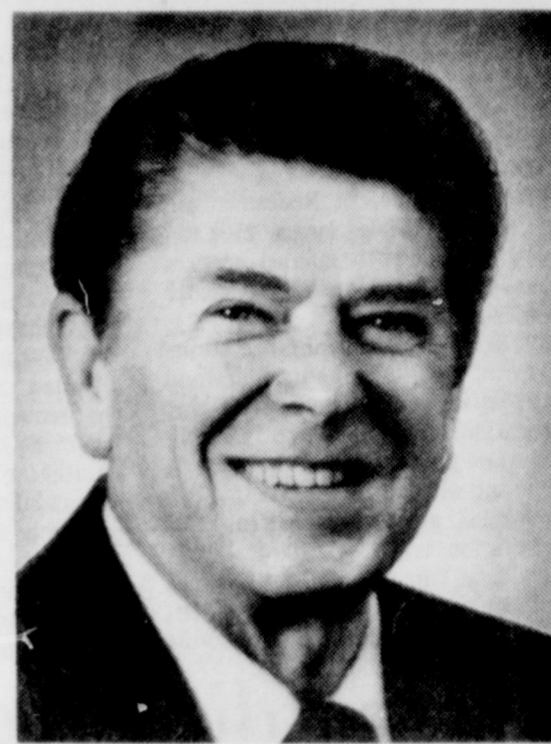
AGAINST:

1. The present community property system has served the best interest of the citizens of Texas.

2. The community property system, as permitted by the amendment, could foster the creation of an entirely different way of settling property matters.

Highway 60 Wreck Leaves Two Injured

Officers said Mrs. Terry reportedly had received a shot in a doctor's office shortly before the accident which may have impaired her ability to drive.

The accident was the second serious wreck on this particular stretch of highway in recent weeks.

The Happy Homemaker

By June Floyd

If you're looking for something different in the way of sandwich makings, you might like to try one of the following recipes. They were contributed to Montana's First Ladies Cookbook by Mrs. Elsie Jones, a culinary artist.

She was never the wife of a president or governor, but was the First Lady of the kitchen in the Governor's Mansion during the terms of six governors.

TUNA SPREAD

1 can tuna fish
1/3 cup mayonnaise
1/3 cup salad dressing
1/2 cup chopped celery
Juice from 1/2 lemon
Mix together well and spread on white or brown bread.

LEFT OVER ROAST

2 cups ground beef
1/3 cup chopped onion
1 cup salad dressing
1/2 cup ground sweet pickles
2 hard cooked eggs, if you wish
1/2 teaspoon salt
Mix together.

CUCUMBER SPREAD

1 six ounce package Philadelphia Cream Cheese
1 small cucumber, chopped real fine
Mix together and spread on bread.

CHICKEN SPREAD

Cut one three or four pound hen in pieces. Place in sauce pan with 1 onion and 2 carrots. Cover with water, add 2 tablespoons salt and cook very slow.

When done, let the chicken cool. Take off the bones and grind. Add about 1/2 cup mayonnaise, 1/2 cup salad dressing, 1 cup chopped celery (very fine) and a little onion juice.

Celery may be omitted if desired or a hard boiled egg may be added if you wish.

SPAM SPREAD

1 cup canned Spam (ground)

1/2 cup salad dressing
2 hard-boiled eggs, chopped very fine
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/3 cup chopped sweet pickle
Mix together.

SHRIMP SPREAD

1 large package Philadelphia Cream Cheese
1 can shrimp
2 tablespoons chili sauce
1 teaspoon Worcestershire Sauce
1/2 teaspoon onion juice
Mix all together with a beater and spread on bread.

Mrs. Jones added this note. "These spreads may be used for open faced sandwiches, trimmed with tinted cream cheese, ribbon sandwiches made with 3 different spreads, rolled sandwiches made with various spreads then last the lunch sandwich for home or school."

Other recipes which Mrs. Jones contributed to the book include Rice Potatoes, Barbecue Chicken, Cherry Chews and Party Punch.

RICE POTATOES

6 large potatoes
1 pint whipping cream
1/2 cup milk
Salt and pepper

Put potatoes through food chopper and then wash all the starch off the potatoes until the water is clean. Drain and add the cream, milk, salt and pepper. Bake for 2 hours in a 275-300 degree oven.

BARBECUE CHICKEN

1 chicken
1 cup chopped celery
2 onions
1/2 cup green pepper
2 tablespoons brown sugar
1 can stewed tomatoes (large can)
2 tablespoons vinegar
1/2 teaspoon prepared mustard
1 1/2 tablespoons Worcestershire Sauce
1 cup tomato sauce

1 cup mushrooms
1 teaspoon salt
Salt chicken. Roll in flour and brown.

Fry the onions, mushrooms, green pepper and celery until the onions are golden brown in 1/2 cup butter. Add sugar, salt, tomatoes, vinegar, mustard, Worcestershire Sauce, tomato sauce and cook five minutes. Then pour over chicken and bake for 30 minutes in a 375 degree oven.

CHERRY CHEWS

1 1/2 cups brown sugar
3 egg yolks, beaten
2 teaspoons vanilla
1 cup chopped nuts
1 cup maraschino cherries
3/4 cup coconut
3 egg whites, beaten stiff
Beat the egg yolks until a lemon color and then add the sugar. Beat until stiff. Add nuts, cherries and coconut. Set aside while making rich pastry.

Pastry

1 cup butter
1/2 cups flour
4 tablespoons sugar
Mix together and spread in a square pan. Bake in a 375 degree oven for 15 minutes.

After this has baked 15 minutes, add the first mixture over the pastry mixture and bake an additional hour in a 275 degree oven.

PARTY PUNCH

Boil one quart water and 4 cups sugar for five minutes.

Cool and add:

2 quarts grape juice
1 large can pineapple juice
2 large cans frozen lemon juice
2 large cans frozen orange juice
1 quart strong tea
1 quart apple juice

Mix together and at the last minute add 3 quarts ginger ale. Serves 70.
