TRUE TO FORM, the Iranians played the hostage situation to the hilt, and "milked" the situation for all the political slants that they

possibly could.

The extra delay which was placed upon the hostage release on Monday could only have been political in nature.

Whether the Iranians decided to hold the hostages an extra day to deprive Jimmy Carter of going to greet the group in person as his final act as president, or whether they did it, as some have theorized, to bind President Ronald Reagan to the hostage release terms, is hard to say.

But to think that the extra delay was caused just because arrangements had not been made with the Bank of England, to establish the escrow account, is a little bit hard to evallow.

Some thought that an "appendix" to the banking agreement, which Iran termed "fine print," according to one commentator, might have been the cause for the stall. Others said that the Iranians were balking, haggling over the amount of interest which would be involved in the escrow account, once the money was deposited to their account.

Whatever the reason or reasons for the delay, it has been a harrowing experience and time for the families of the hostages, who have been stretched literally to the breaking point by the events of recent days.

It has been bad enough for the average American, who has been following the progress of the situation, and hoping for an early release, to see the various delays; so you can imagine what a personal disappointment the delays caused the members of the families of the hostages.

Then, just before noon (CST) on Tuesday, church bells began to ring across the country, and the entire nation breathed a collective sigh of relief. The hostages were free of their 14½ month captivity.

HOPEFULLY, THE NEW administration headed by Ronald Reagan will present a new 'tough' front to the nations abroad, making our image overseas different to what it has been.

The new president inherits perhaps more problems than any other president, due to such things as the economy, the energy problem, foreign affairs, etc., etc.

It behooves all Americans to dig in and do all they can to support the Administration, and hopefully pull the country back to a position of strength, both fiscally and physically.

Cotton Crop Is Second Largest

Parmer County's 1980 cotton crop will be the second-largest crop ever produced here, in terms of bales, according to the final survey of the ginning season conducted this week by the Friona Star.

With virtually every gin either through ginning or in the finishing stages, the bale count stood at 62,862 bales, which will be second only to the record crop of 1962, when a total of 80,292 bales were ginned in the county.

"That figure will probably be pretty close to the actual number of bales ginned by county growers. We will not have the actual total until sometime in April," said Prentice Mills, office manager of the Parmer County ASCS.

The main difference between the figures for the current crop and that of 1962 is the yield per acre. The 1962 crop was ginned from just 49,000 acres of cotton, or about 1.64 bales

In 1980, Mills said that a total of 67,776 acres were planted to begin with, but only about 58,000 were harvested. The rest were lost to either hail or drought. This still gave a yield of over a bale per acre, not bad considering the less than ideal weather for the year.

The current cotton production thus is the best in the county in 18 years. Cotton acreage has been on the rise in recent years, due primarily to the relaxing of quotas, and also to the decline in the amount of irrigation water available. Mills said he expected to see the acreage continue to increase.

Other top cotton years in Parmet County have been 1956, which produced a record at that time of 58,825 bales; 1958, with 60,579 bales; and 1961, with 60,029 bales.

The 1980 crop marked only the fifth time in the agricultural history of the county, for as many as 55,000 bales of cotton to be produced.

Parmer County's cotton

production for the past decade is as follows (the low figures for 1975-76 were due to devastating hailstorms): 1971: 22,741 bales; 1972: 34,371 bales; 1973: 25,404 bales; 1974: 24.676 bales; 1975: 6,380 bales; 1976: 10,850 bales; 1977: 42,179 bales; 1978: 39,880 bales; 1979: 40,418 bales; and 1980: 62,862 bales.

Vote Starts For Water

Absentee voting for the \$1 million water bond issue which has been called by the City of Friona, began this week at City Hall, and will continue through Friday, February 6.

The issue has been called to provide bonds for the purchase of a 670-acre tract of land $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles northeast of the city, to be used as well sites by the city to cure its depleting water problems.

Wheat Assn. Sets Meeting

The Texas Wheat Growers Association will hold a meeting in Friona on Tuesday, January 27, it was announced this week by M.C. Osborn, who is a director for the association.

The meeting will be held at the Friona State Bank's Community Room, beginning at 2 p.m.

"All wheat growers or other interested persons are invited to attend the meeting," Osborn says.

Jim Allison, assistant to Bill Nelson, executive director of the Texas Wheat Growers Assn., will present an update on the outlook for the 1981 wheat crop and prices, and speculate on how farmers may expect to fare under the new administration.

Windbreak **Trees Are Available**

Order forms for windbreak trees from Colorado State Forest Service are available at the Soil Conservation Service Office in Friona.

Those persons interested may come by the office and place an order, or take an order form to be filled out.

A good selection of trees are available from the forest service, however, the demand for the trees becomes greater each year. To receive the desired trees, all orders should be in by February 27. The trees should arrive at the Soil Conservation Office in Friona, the latter part of March or the first of April. Persons ordering will be notified of the specific date of arrival at a later date.

The Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District sponsors this windbreak program. The program is to encourage planting of effective wind barriers to protect buildings, cropland, and for erosion control.

IRS Postpones New Ruling


Congressman Kent Hance (D-Tx.) announced that the Internal Revenue Service has postponed until May 31, 1981 implementation of a ruling that would have adversely affected banks, local governments, and municipal bond markets.

"If implemented, this IRS ruling would have been devastating,' Hance said.

Revenue Procedure 8055 stated that no bank would be allowed to deduct interest it pays on negotiated time deposit accounts of governmental units if the bank uses tax exempt issues as collateral to secure those deposits.

"The banks in Texas," Hance said, "have traditionally strongly supported the Texas municipal bond markets primarily because of the public fund pledging requirements and the high quality of Texas municipal bonds that have been established over the years.'

Hance said he expects both the IRS and the Ways and Means and Banking Committees of the House to hold hearings on this issue prior to the May 31 implementation deadline.

Changes Are Noted For S.S. Totals

The Social Security Administration today announced three program changes that became effective January 1:

*The maximum amount that beneficiaries may earn annually and still receive all of their benefits will increase from \$5,000 to \$5,500 for those aged 65-71 and from \$3,720 to \$4,080 for those under 65. Benefits are reduced \$1 for every \$2 of earnings exceeding these amounts. But, beneficiaries 72 and over may earn any amount without any reduction in their social security checks.

*The maximum amount of earnings subject to the social security tax will increase from \$25,900 to \$29,700. The change will give workers earning above \$25,900 greater protection because a larger amount of their earnings will be credited toward benefits than before. This will mean higher benefits for them and their families at retirement or in the event of disability or death.

*The amount of earnings required to earn a quarter of coverage will increase from \$290 to \$310. Four quarters of coverage will be credited for earnings of \$1,240, up from

These three changes, required by the 1977 amendments to the Social Security Act, will be published in the November 19 Federal Register.

increasing food shortages.

This is the height of folly from three standpoints: (1) It side-tracks our defense spending from building a credible defense during the next two crucial years. It is 1981 and 1982 that present the greatest threat of a Russian attack, both on the mid-East, and a pre-emptive strike on us. Placing the M-X on submarines, as has been suggested by knowledgeable people, is obviously the way to improve our defense, and in time. (2) It will help destroy our economy at a time we desperately need the balance of payments provided by agriculture, thus further weakening our defense posture and our productive capacity at the same time. (3) It is environmental rape at its worst.

What do the citizens of this area, Eastern New Mexico and West Texas intend to do about it? All of the community groups, and thousands of other citizens are going to fight it at every level of our court system and in every conceivable legal manner. So long as this is a free nation, and it is becoming quite apparent that we cannot take this for granted, we do not, under any circumstances, intend to allow the placement of this system in our area. Please convey this, loud and clear, to all those in authority. It will save one of the bloodiest domestic battles in the history of this nation, with the accompanying waste of time and energy on all sides.

Reagan stated in his campaign that he wanted to take government off the backs of the people. This farce, fraud and boondoggle is hardly in line with that promise.

We have the right, as American citizens, to require the Air Force to spend two years in hearings here, just as they did in Nevada and Utah, and the coalition of national wheat, corn and grain sorghum growers will be hiring the best attorneys we can find to see that they do. We are not to be taken lightly, or considered as of no importance so long as we have any rights as citizens of the United States. Frank Ford


