PRESIDENT REAGAN has just completed his first two months in office, and while you can't necessarily jump to conclusions about his possible success or failure at this early date, most people agree wholeheartedly with what he is trying to accomplish.

Virtually unanimous consent is heard across our land (at least this section of it) that our federal government has gone too far in its efforts to "be all things to all people."

Most sensible people have known for years that our nation has become far too liberal in the doling out of money, in the form of welfare, where the recipient was not truly deserving, food stamps, etc.

We have regulated our factories and companies virtually to the point of bankruptcy, and such agencies as OSHA have made it almost impossible for many companies to continue in business, to the point of eliminating scores of jobs under the guise of "protecting the worker."

School Gives Pact For Remodelling; Money Is 'Close'

The contract was awarded this week for the scheduled remodelling of Friona Elementary and Junior High Schools, a result of last year's \$1.4 million bond issue.

General contract was awarded to Wiley Hicks, Jr. of Amarillo. Hicks had the low bid of seven bidders, in the amount of \$1,088,233.

In addition, Plumbing Service Co. of Lubbock was awarded the bid of \$25,600 for steam heat renovation in the junior high building, and Western Building Specialties of Lubbock was successful bidder on the window renovation project, in the amount of \$88,866.

"We were pleased to receive the number of bids on the project that we did. We will be able to do basically everything we had hoped to do, within our bond issue dollar. By the time the architect's fee and consultant's fees are paid, we'll be very close to the \$1.4 million figure," stated Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe.

Hicks, the general contractor, called for 240 working days on the project, which calls for a new cafeteria, plus additional classrooms, from remodelling the old cafeteria.

Gale-Force Winds Cause Property Loss

The Friona area was still "picking up" late in the week from a severe wind and dust storm on Tuesday, March 17, which featured some of the strongest wind gusts in recent years.

The area's first "duster" of 1981 brought winds which were clocked at 85 and 90 miles per hour in the area. A spray company at Bovina reported wind gusts up to 85 miles per hour that day, and a Clovis, N.M. report

said they had seen 90 miles per hour on a wind gauge.

Rick Jennings of Benger Air Park said he had not monitored his gauges throughout the afternoon, but could verify winds of 65 and 70 miles per hour in Friona that day.

This would mean winds of the hurricane-force variety, at least in the areas where the strong gusts occurred.

The high wind kicked up some blowing dust, which hampered motorists, and was responsible for at least five traffic mishaps Tuesday afternoon west of Friona, according to Chief of Police Bill Denney.

At the height of the storm, the law officers closed down U.S. Highway 60 between Friona and Bovina, due to the accidents. It was the first time, at least in recent years, for the major highway to be closed due to blowing dust.

"It's a wonder we didn't have more wrecks. Several people thought they had close calls. One older couple, from Ohio, who made it through before we closed the road, pulled over and asked me 'What is this? Is it the end of the world, or what?'" Denney said.

A spokesman at Parmer County Community Hospital said that the hospital staff had examined "eight or ten" people Tuesday afternoon.

Of these, three were hospitalized, including D.E. (Buck) Bush, and a couple travelling through town, identified only as Mr. and Mrs. Fagan. Fortunately, none of the accident victims were seriously hurt.

Finally, farm equipment and men had to be summoned to an area near the MBPXL plant west of town, to disc a section of ground which was

responsible for one of the worst sandy spots.

After the ground had been plowed, the sand hazard diminished at this spot.

Among the storm losses, perhaps the greatest was at Clay's Corner, 18 miles south of Friona, where an 80-foot, 500,000 bushel elevator belonging to Farmers Cooperative Grain was collapsed by the strong wind.

In Friona, a carport at the Gladys Wilson home, 302 East Seventh, collapsed, trapping a pick-up truck which was parked underneath.

Home roofs, particularly shingles, were perhaps the hardest hit by the windstorm, with numerous reports of damage in this regard.

Extensive damage was reported to a large center pivot sprinkler system on the Doyce Barnett farm southeast of town.

Hance Sets Town Hall Meeting Sat.

U.S. Rep. Kent Hance has scheduled a public town hall meeting in Friona for 3 p.m. on Saturday, March 21, at the Friona Community Center.

The congressman will discuss many of the issues confronting Congress and the people before opening up the meeting for questions from the public.

"I have found that these town hall meetings are one of my best sources for finding out the feelings of the people of the 19th congressional district," said Hance. "Also, it has given the people the opportunity to relate their problems and concerns to someone who has access to the facilities to aid them."

"I also have discovered that some of the answers to legislative problems have come in some fashion or another, through the opinions and suggestions of people who attend these meetings."

This will mark the second consecutive session of Congress that Congressman Hance has scheduled town hall meetings across his West Texas District. During the last session of Congress, Hance held at least two open meetings in each of the 17 counties in his district in an attempt to stay in close contact with the grass roots of his constituency.

The public is invited and encouraged to attend and participate.

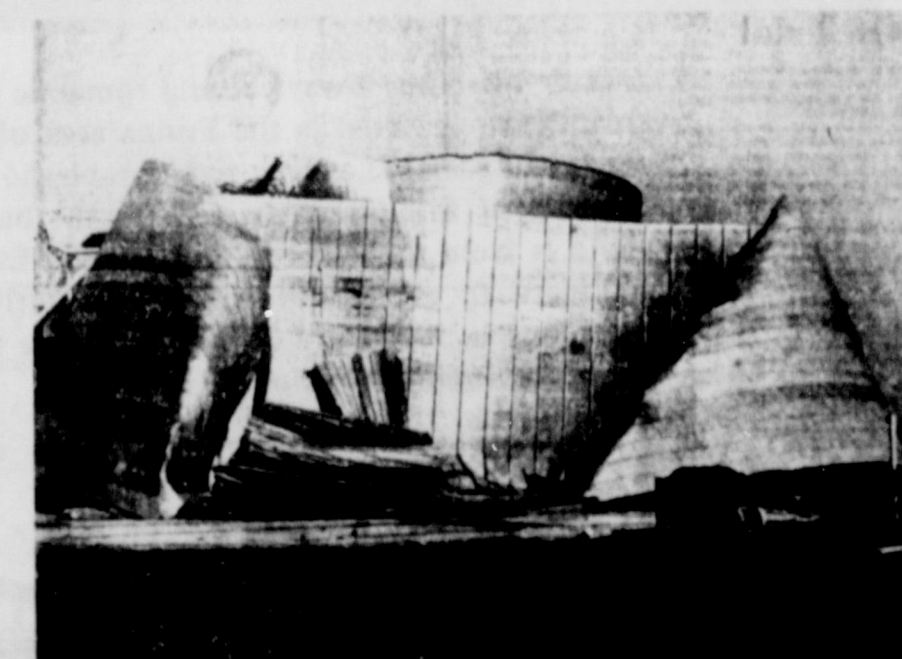
Lions Set Eye Promo

50 YEARS AGO--MARCH 20, 1931

Maurer's Ready-to-Wear is the only store of its kind in the Friona trade territory. This is a modern store, with fixtures and furnishings which are attractive to the eye of visitors. They carry a complete line of ladies' dresses, coats, hats, shoes, stockings, lingerie and accessories. They also have a men's department. In addition to the ready-to-wear, Mr. Maurer operates the Maurer Machinery Company, dealers in Rock Island and Minneapolis-Moline tractors and farm machinery.

45 YEARS AGO--MARCH 20, 1936

On Sunday night as F.A. Spring and Dan Ethridge were returning to Friona from Lubbock they were met in the neighborhood of the Jesko school by the severe dust storm which swept over this locality that night. The dense wall of dust came upon them so suddenly that before their car could be stopped it had taken to the barbit. Spring walked about a mile until he came to a farm house and secured aid in getting the car back on the road. The group in the car waited at the farm home until the worst of the dust storm had passed.

40 YEARS AGO--MARCH 21, 1941

Dr. R.J. McReynolds, who was

mentioned in these columns last week as the medical doctor who was located here permanently for the practice of medicine, arrived Monday afternoon with a portion of his office equipment, and he opened his office Tuesday morning for regular practice.

35 YEARS AGO--MARCH 15, 1946

Two Friona men were badly burned in separate fires during the past week. Wilmot (Red) Crow was burned at an explosion at the Friona Locket Plant, and Howard Ford of the O.F.&O. Supply Company was burned while doing some welding.

30 YEARS AGO--MARCH 22, 1951

Friona's crack farm skill demonstration team travelled over 700 miles carrying several pigs and a bale of hay to take first place in the Chapter Farmer division of the state leadership contests for the second straight year. Members of the team were Keith Brock, M.C. Osborn, J. Vonne Fulks, Ralph Reed and Jack Redfean.

25 YEARS AGO--MARCH 16, 1956

There will be 922 students enrolled in Friona Schools next year, according to the annual school census which was recently conducted.

Postal receipts, which are generally considered a pretty good indication of a town's prosperity, total \$3732 for the first two months of 1951, according to Postmaster Leo McLellan.

20 YEARS AGO--MARCH 16, 1961

Craig Coon of Friona FFA exhibited the grand champion steer at the Parmer County Jr. Livestock Show. Earl Smith, head coach of the Friona Chieftains for the past two seasons, resigned his post. Ben Moorman, who later was to return as police chief, resigned his position effective April 1.

A \$30,000 remodeling project has been announced by Glenn E. Reeve for Reeve Chevrolet Co., more than doubling the company's service department.

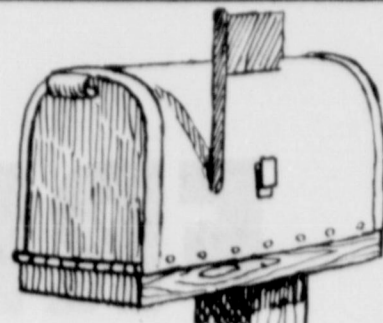
10 YEARS AGO--MARCH 18, 1971

In reply to your questions of the USPS, I would like to submit these facts.

1. My temporary assignment to the Canyon Post Office was a training process in a larger Post Office. The same was true for Mr. Oakley as he was being trained in Postmaster procedures. Assignments such as these are based on merit performance, and Mr. Oakley and myself are rated in the jobs we performed.

2. The training facility in Washington D.C., I really know nothing about. I presume the Postal Service has decided that it would be cheaper to buy than rent in the long run.

3. The new rate increases for second class mailings such as the Friona Star actually received a reduction in local zones. You are well aware that second class rates are cheaper than third class rates or "junk mail" as you called it. Come on Bill, admit you get a bargain in the cost of mailing and the service you have received for the Friona Star and the Bovina Blade.

4. The new 9 digit Zip is a voluntary program. A discount will be offered to the users.

5. Not all rural patrons receive mail in front of their house, but I know of none that has been refused delivery.

6. I appreciate the opportunity to answer your questions. The USPS has always strived for the best possible service at the lowest possible cost to our customers.

2. I'm searching for more definite figures on the USPS training facilities, both for you and my readers. We wonder, though, if it's cheaper on the nation's postal patrons for the USPS to buy a "Cadillac," rather than rent a "Ford or Chevrolet," which would have done the job.

3. I agree that my second class rate is a bargain--compared to today's first class, not to that of 1960. I have never complained on the local service, here or at Bovina. But you seem to object to the fact that I jumped on the U.S. Postal Service for its actions, proposals and rate hikes. You mean to tell me we should just sit idly by and let them cram whatever brainstorm they have down our throats, because it HAS to be good for us? If we ever lose our right to speak out for or against any proposal, then we've slipped into communism.

4. I'm glad to know the nine-digit Zip is voluntary. It will be interesting to see how many volunteers you get.

5. The individuals involved here would have to speak up. All I know is that some drive into Friona or Bovina where they have P.O. boxes.

6. I appreciate the communication. And, to answer several who asked me: yes, I continued to get my mail this week!

I noticed I'm not the only editor voicing similar opinions, and I must have had a hundred people say they agreed with mine, so apparently I'm not a minority of one. --B.E.

This is an open letter to all of you connected with the Friona Police Department to express my thanks for all you did to help me the day I broke down in your town. I made it back on Sunday to pick up my car and found it in the Reeve parking lot on the hook.

We found the gas line had a pin hole over the rear axle, and instead of leaking gas out, it sucked air in and stopped the flow. Mr. Reeve came by and let the car down for me, and he was generous enough to open up his parts department and sell me a length

of gas line hose and two clamps. After all this he only charged me \$12 for the tow bill and 78¢ for the parts! If I had been so unlucky back east, it would have cost me at least \$20 for the tow and at least \$3 for the parts.

Mr. Reeve, thank you for your friendliness and hospitality. And thank you for helping me on a Sunday. Again, back east, I would have been awful lucky to get anyone to open up to sell me a foot of hose.

Thank you to the ladies in the cafe who were so friendly and willing to receive a phone call for me.

Again, thank all of you at city hall for doing so much to make so pleasant 15 hours that could have been pure misery.

You all owed me nothing. You didn't know me--who or what I might be. You are super people, and I won't forget Friona, Texas.

I want you to know that a week and a half after I got here, I found a good job with McLane Western. I drive a van over a 775 mile route, 5 days a week.

Someday this year, I plan to come up to Friona to say hello and probably spend the night (Saturday and Sunday). Until then, best wishes to you all. Just wanted you to know I really appreciate everything you folks did for me. You really made an ignorant easterner feel at home.

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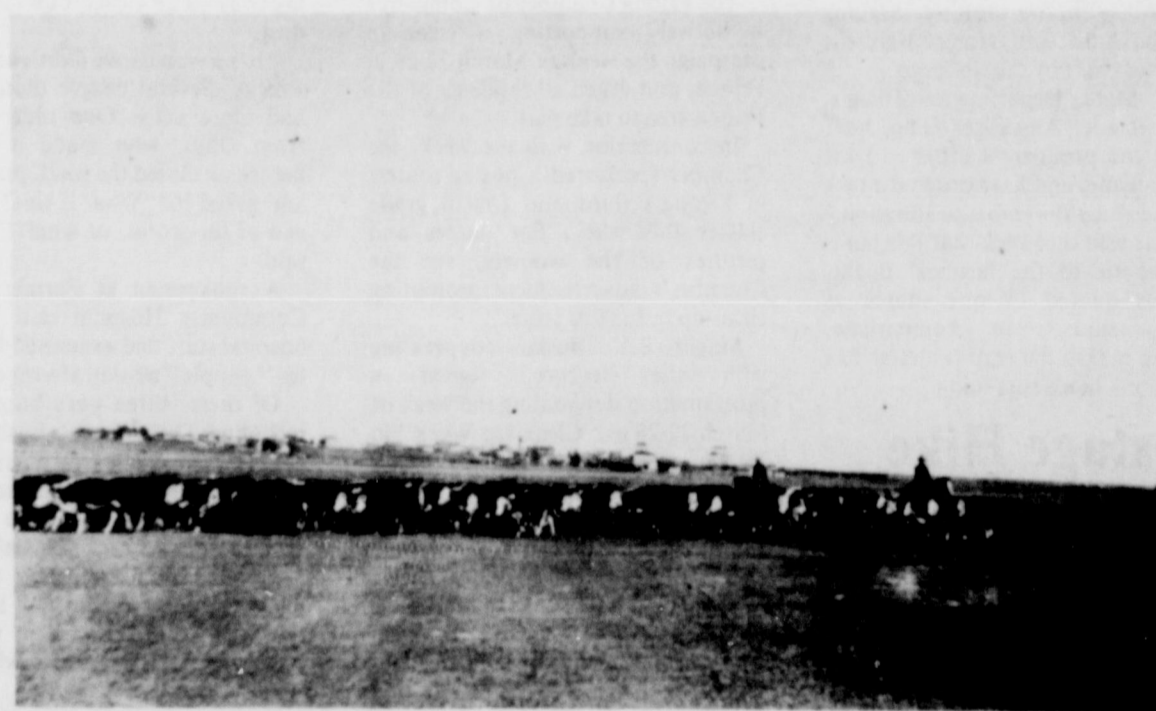

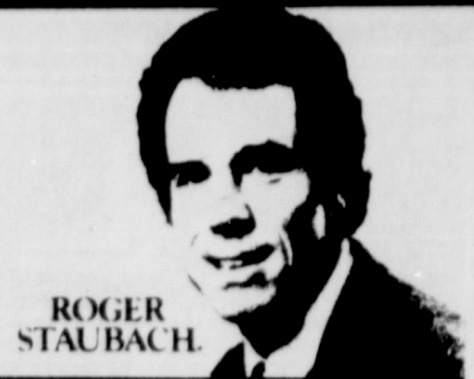

 The Texas Department of Public Safety knows countless lives are lost each year through reckless or careless driving. Frequently a passenger or two dies in a crash because the driver has deliberately violated common driving rules or traffic laws.
 One of the most common types of accidents occurring on Texas Highways is the one-car crash. Many times in such accidents, the driver is thrown from the vehicle and his own vehicle rolls over him.
 A large number of these deaths could be prevented if the occupants of one-car accidents remained inside the vehicle. The surest and best method of remaining inside an overturning car, is to buckle oneself in securely before starting out.
 The occupants of an automobile have a five to one chance of survival if they remain inside the vehicle during a violent crash. Impact is the killing factor. Two School Records Broken By Squaws

The Friona Squaws were well on their way to winning their first meet of the season at Farwell last Saturday, when the rains came and washed out the running event finals.

In the field events completed that morning, two members of the team set new school records. Meet officials went ahead and awarded ribbons for the running events where preliminaries were held. Based on these places plus the field events, the Squaws scored 86 points in the rain-shortened meet.

No team trophy was awarded, since none of the relay races, nor the 800-meter, 1600 and 3200 meter races were run.

Wennetter Jackson, freshman member of the team, smashed the school record with a discus toss of 102 feet, 2½ inches. The old mark, held by Sharon Smith Rector, had been 91 feet, 11½ inches, and was set in 1973.

Miss Jackson also won the shot put, giving the Squaws 20 points for her efforts.

Another double winner was Sherry O'Brian, who cleared the high jump bar at five feet, one inch, despite the cool weather, to win the event and

erase the school record set by Dian Day Anthony in 1972, at five feet, one-half inch.

Sherry took first in the 440-yard dash, based on time.

Diane Johnston placed second in the high jump, and teammate Norma Barlow placed third, giving the Squaws a sweep of that event. Miss Johnston also placed third in the 100-yard hurdles.

Rene Noland took third place in the long jump, third in the triple jump and fifth in the 440-yard dash.

Other good performances by team members included Kayle Britting, third in the 100-yard dash; Tammi Smith, fourth in the 220-yard dash; Shawn Osborn, sixth in the 440; and Joyce Melton, sixth in the 100-meter hurdles.

The Squaws are entered in the Bovina meet this weekend, and Coach Al Stinson is excited about the team's prospects.

"We have the makings of a good track and field team. We're a young team, but the kids have determination. If we could just get a break from the weather--we could use the workout time," Stinson said.

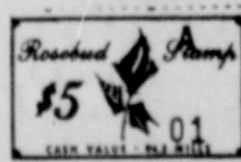

Reserve Deputy Setup Approved For County

Sheriff Bill Morgan met with the Parmer County Commissioners' Court and discussed the possibility of organizing a group of reserve deputies for the Sheriff's department.

After a discussion as to the costs involved, liabilities, etc., a motion was approved to authorize the sheriff to organize such a reserve group of 20 deputies for the county.

Sheriff Morgan also brought up the need of having an operating petty cash fund for the sheriff's department. A motion was approved that such a petty cash fund be established in the amount of \$500, mainly for travel and supply expenses. The money is to come out of the county clerk's office.

A discussion was held concerning the establishment of a deadline for spraying of 2,4-D and derivatives of 2,4-D in the county. After some discussion, a motion was passed setting April 15 as the deadline for using 2,4-D, and establishing the period from April 15 to October 31, 1981 as a closed time for such spraying.

It was noted that a public meeting has been scheduled for Tuesday, March 17, by the Parks and Wildlife Department. The need for publicizing this meeting was pointed out.

The court approved the purchase of a new typewriter for County Tax Assessor-Collector Hugh Moseley's office. An easement was granted for a resident of Precinct 4 to cross a county road with a water line.

County Agent Seth Ralston reported on the results of Parmer County 4-H Club members at the Houston Stock Show.

Ralston said that Parmer County was well represented at the show, and had 13 animals make the sale. His next job is to get more project animals for 4-H members.

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Three Local Students Are Members Of Music Group

To busy college students, a 24-hour day often falls short of time, but four West Texas State University students have found time among the hours of classes, study, social and extracurricular activities to record an album of original music.

"Essence" was formed more than a year ago by two WTSU seniors from Friona who had performed together in high school. Bryan Johnston, who will graduate from WTSU in May with a political science major, and Clint Mears, a senior business major, formed the musical ensemble.

Other students in the group who perform on the group's first album, which was recorded in August, are Rocky Gillmore, a junior accounting major from Borger, and Mike McFarland, a junior general studies major from Brownfield.

Johnston sings and co-writes the music for the group with Mears, who plays the piano. Gillmore sings and plays drums while McFarland

plays bass guitar.

Since the album was recorded last summer, Mears' sister, Sarah, a freshman at WTSU, has joined the group as a vocalist and plays synthesizer.

"Essence," which was shortened from "quintessence," a word Johnston liked in a WTSU vocabulary course, performs on weekends for churches, banquets and high school groups. Although gospel tunes form the main program of the group, Johnston said the members do add secular music for high school groups.

"It's more like contemporary Christian music than pure gospel," he explained. "It sounds like Top 40 with different words. We enjoy playing. It's a good ministry."

Audience demand for tapes or albums after performances prompted the group to investigate the possibility of recording an album. Family connections helped, also.

"Clint has an uncle who is a record producer in Nashville," said Johnston. "We sent a tape in last spring with five or six songs and they liked it."

Mears' uncle, Joe Bob Barnhill, who graduated from WTSU in 1961, set an August recording date for "Essence" at the Music Mill recording studio at Nashville.

Breaking into the music business was not as simple as it sounds. Group members had to provide more than \$5,000 for the week-long recording session.

"We did it in record time because we had a low budget and we had to get back to school," said Johnston.

A percussionist, who had recorded with the Allman Brothers Band, guitarists and several background vocalists joined the group for the session.

"It was all so unique because we got it with that type quality of people."

A thousand copies of the album, which features eight original songs composed during the past three or four years, were pressed. Royalties will come only if the album receives air time on radio stations and sells copies.

Group members are selling copies and the album also is available at the Agape Shop in Amarillo.

"Starting out is a little bit tough," said Johnston. "We're still writing and we hope to have to press more copies."

Johnston writes the lyrics while Mears, who has studied piano for years, pens the music.

"I'm still trying to write each day. I've always been interested in music. The hard part is trying to figure out new ways to say something that's already been said," Johnston remarked.

Between selling albums and performing on weekends, "Essence" is planning a summer tour. Mears and Johnston will graduate from WTSU in May and Johnston plans to enter law school.

"But I'm always open to change," he laughed.

Johnston is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Johnston of Friona. Sarah and Clint Mears are the children of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Mears, also of Friona. Gillmore's parents are the Rev. and Mrs. Jimmy D. Gillmore of Borger and McFarland is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Billings of Brownfield.

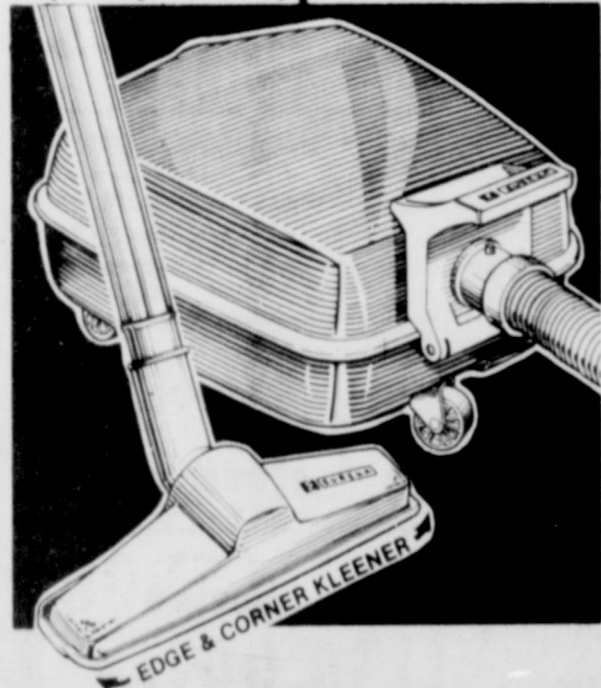
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50's Reunion Is Planned

A TIME TO LAUGH

Centuries before the time of Christ the author of the book of Ecclesiastes wrote, "...there is a time to weep, and a time to laugh." (Ecc. 3:4) I'm convinced that laughter is a gift from God.

A quotation from the American Medical Association tells us some very important facts: "Scientists have been studying the effect of laughter on human beings and have found, among other things, that laughter has a profound and instantaneous effect on virtually every important organ in the human body. Laughter reduces health-sapping tensions and relaxes the tissues as well as exercising the most vital organs. It is found that laughter, even when forced, results in a beneficial effect on us, both mentally and physically." Have you ever noticed how children seem to know that instinctively?

We all know that laughter, like all good things, can be misused. It can indicate sickness, as well as health. It can be used cruelly, as well as wholesomely. When a person laughs at the misfortune of others, when one laughs at someone because of that person's age, color, accent, dress, mistakes or for any other reason, then laughter is cruel, insensitive, arrogant and destructive.

The person who laughs all the time, who never senses the concerns of others or the seriousness of the problems of the day, may be insensitive to the feelings of others and denying the reality of the world in which he/she lives. This can be a

form of maladjustment not health, it can be an evasion of responsibility one would have to face if one faced the world realistically.

There are some who feel you can make a significant evaluation of a person's character and personality by studying the kinds of humor one enjoys, the things that make one laugh. Think about that for a minute. What do you laugh at most and what does that say about you as a person?

On the positive side though, laughter can be very wholesome and healthy. Humor can help us get rid of some of the irrelevancies of our life. Humor can throw an otherwise intolerable situation into a new and manageable perspective.

Jesus is known as a man of sorrows and acquainted with grief, but He also must have had a real sense of humor. Picture, if you can, the absurdity of a camel struggling through a needle's eye, or even more of a man straining at a gnat and swallowing a camel. If He didn't laugh when he used such illustrations (and others) he must have had a twinkle in his eye. And remember how Christ urged us to become like children. Well one of the most outstanding qualities of child-likeness is spontaneity in laughter. Could that, in part, be what Christ was suggesting?

Laughter is one of God's great gifts. It indicates that a person can express one's emotions. It means one is able to accept the pleasures of life, while one is fully aware of its seriousness. For a moment, at least,

one can lay aside life's seriousness and appreciate true pleasure.

Laughter is a universal language. It crosses all cultural barriers. It enables one to enjoy life and to help others enjoy it too, for laughter is contagious.

Healthy laughter means one is aware of the reality of the problems of the world and is sensitive to the feelings of others but one can also be aware of the pleasure and lighthearted aspects of life for these too are a part of reality--so one can enjoy its pleasure and accept its responsibility. We need to do both. This is both a sign of health and a source of strength.

Two Friona residents are spring graduates of the Amarillo College Division of Industrial Educational Programs.

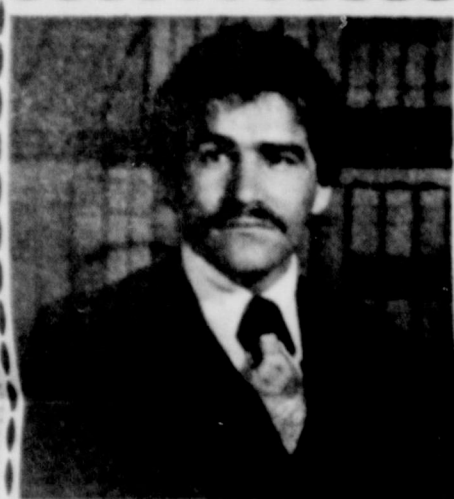
Marie L. McQueary graduated from the Vocational Nursing program and is qualified to take the State Board examinations scheduled for April 14.

Children Should Learn Safety

The Texas Department of Public Safety has learned that times are changing. No one will contest the fact that heavy traffic clogs streets and sometimes bloodies highways. Last year over 4,000 died on Texas highways.

There was a time when a boy could ride a bicycle backwards down the middle of almost any main street in Texas without worrying

about begin run over. Many people are alive today who did this or saw it in their childhood.

Today it's not safe for a youngster to ride frontwards down any of Texas suburban or rural streets. Due to the great increase in traffic, bicycles have almost become a hazard to themselves. The very qualities that make them ideal for short distance transportation, such as their lightness and maneuverability add to the hazard of riding bikes.

The rider is too vulnerable. A small pebble can throw a child off balance and into the path of an automobile. In the hands of a child who doesn't understand the danger of the situation tragedy could occur at any instant.

Children should be made aware that there are certain rules they must obey. A child should form behavior patterns while riding a bike that will be carried over to the time when he will graduate to a responsible motorist.

Today traffic laws apply to bicycles as well as cars and trucks. This is a fatal fact that is often forgotten by young cyclists. It may behoove parents to set safety standards in their own driving habits, because what adults do really makes a strong impression on a child.

The Texas Department of Public Safety urges both motorists and cyclists to begin this 1981 Spring by driving defensively. That is the only way we can live with the law.

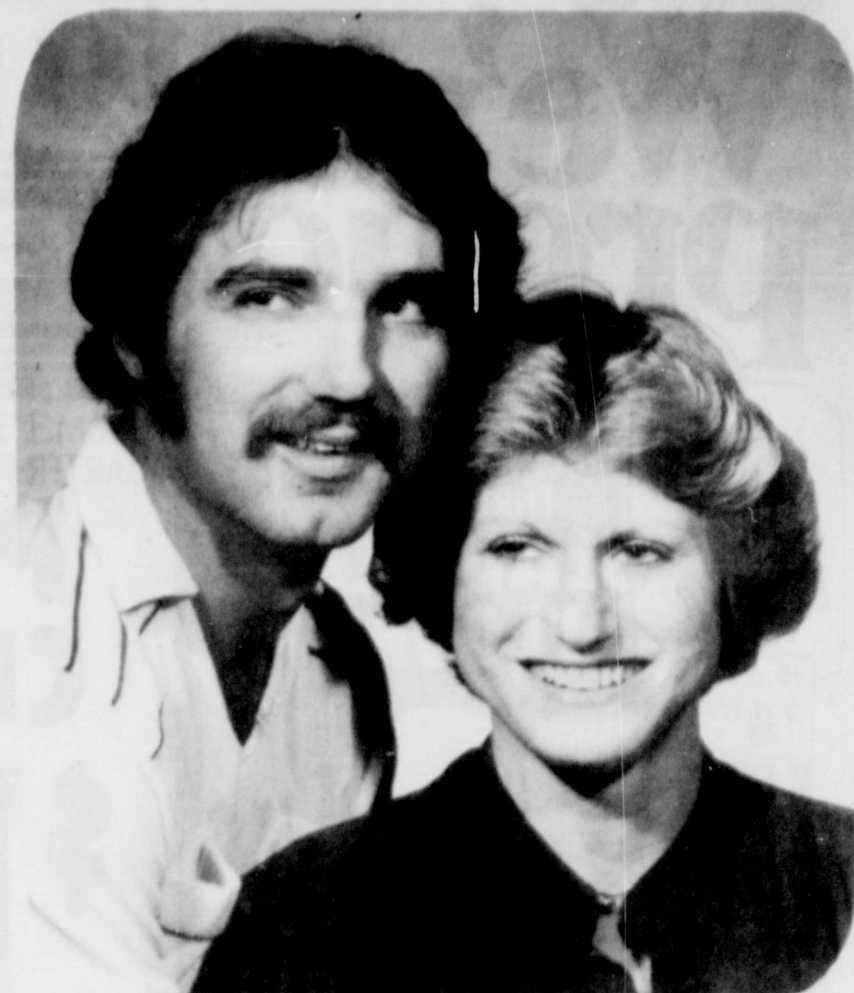

Other guests in the Welch home are Mr. and Mrs. Ray Bailey of Carlsbad, New Mexico. The Baileys are Terri's parents.

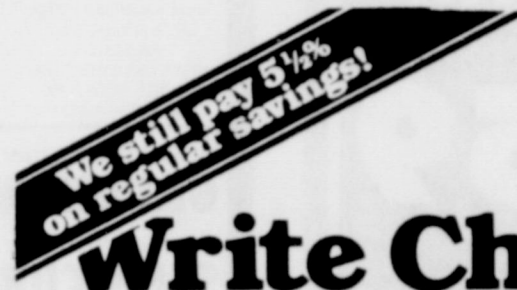
Bob and Terri are working on a renovation project of the old Ford Welch home northeast of town, which they have purchased, and will soon be moving to the country.

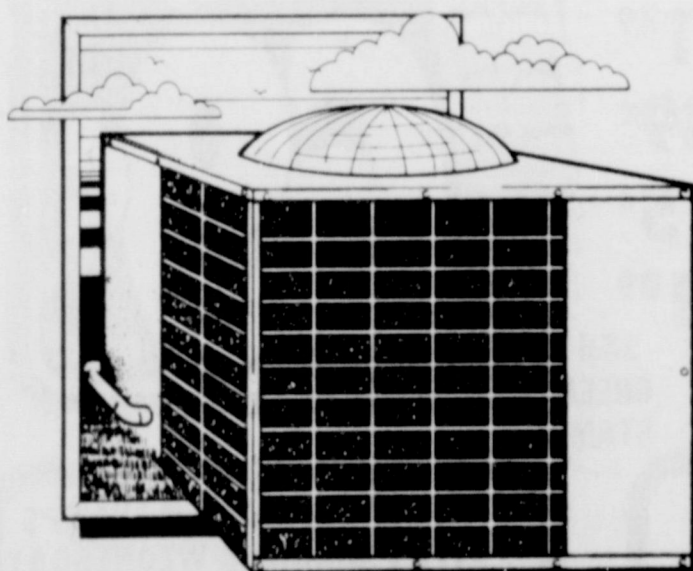
