50 YEARS AGO--MARCH 13, 1931

The throbbing, vital question in the minds of most of the people of Parmer County today is "Where should the county seat be?" Where do you think the county seat should be and why? The Friona Star is sponsoring a contest for the person writing the best letter on the subject. First prize is a \$10 gold piece. Second prize will be a \$5 gold piece, and to the next five letters will be awarded a year's subscription to the Friona Star.

45 YEARS AGO--MARCH 13, 1936

Parmer County's second annual Calf and Meat Show was held here on Saturday of last week, and was well attended by people from almost every part of the country. The calf division of the show was won by Boggess of Friona. Wines of Bovina was second, and Lilly of Bovina was third. Other entries were Julian, Lazbuddie; Welch, Friona; Harold Lillard, Friona; Franklin Lillard, Friona; Schlenker, Rhea; and Howard of Lazbuddie.

40 YEARS AGO--MARCH 14, 1941

Amassing a total of 1099 points in 34 games, the Friona Squaws earned the title of "point a minute" basketballers, having met all comers from Texline on the Oklahoma line of the north Panhandle, to Silsbee, deep in East Texas. The Squaws lost their

opening game of the state tournament, but came back for three wins to take the consolation title. The Squaws bowed to only three teams during the season.

35 YEARS AGO--MARCH 5, 1946

After battling their way to the finals of the Texas High School Girls Basketball championship tourney at Hillsboro Saturday night, the Friona girl capers lost to their old jinx and three-time winner, Aquilla High School of Hill County. Friona led at halftime, 14-11, but the final score was 29-26. M. Taylor, Cobb, Crow, Mingus, Horner and Robertson made up the starting lineup for Friona.

30 YEARS AGO--MARCH 15, 1951

A concert will be presented next Wednesday night by the Friona High School Girls Choir, under the direction of Glen H. Cunningham. The group is preparing to go on a 500-mile tour March 29-30-31. Included on their tour will be Crane-Odessa, Imperial and others.

25 YEARS AGO--MARCH 9, 1956

W.V. Null, representative for Cooley Construction Company, the contractors who will build Friona's new post office building, will arrive in town this week to begin construction of the building, according to work received by Postmaster Leo McLellan. Friona's present post

office has served the town since 1929. The building belongs to T.J. Crawford.

20 YEARS AGO--MARCH 9, 1961

An Amarillo man was arrested here Tuesday night at the rear of Gib's Cleaners after that building had been burglarized. The man was arrested by night patrolman Jack Fleming as he made his rounds. He is being questioned in regard to break-ins in Amarillo and other Panhandle towns recently.

15 YEARS AGO--MARCH 10, 1966

Monsanto Chemicals opened its new plant just east of the city limits, with Bill Wooley as manager. David Bailey has been hired by the Friona Farmers Co-op Gin as the company's new manager.

10 YEARS AGO--MARCH 11, 1971

The Friona Apartments, largest single housing project in the city's history, have been completed on the northeastern edge of Friona, and are now renting. The 60-unit project has been underway for more than a year, and began taking renters in mid-February.

5 YEARS AGO--MARCH 7, 1976

The Friona High School Stage Band under the direction of Charles Faulkner won the second place trophy in AA at the South Plains College Jazz Festival held Saturday, February 28, in Levelland.

Season scoring statistics showed that Friona Squaw forward Terri Patterson had one of the best individual scoring seasons in recent girls basketball history at Friona High School, during the season just passed. Miss Patterson scored 714 points in 29 games. Her per-game scoring average of 24.6 is the best average that could be found among available records for the past 20 seasons at FHS.

The Friona area, entertaining hopes for some much-needed moisture, instead was buffeted by gale-like winds on Thursday of this week. The southwest wind also kicked up sand which made outdoor activities unbearable, and added house-keeping chores for homes and offices.

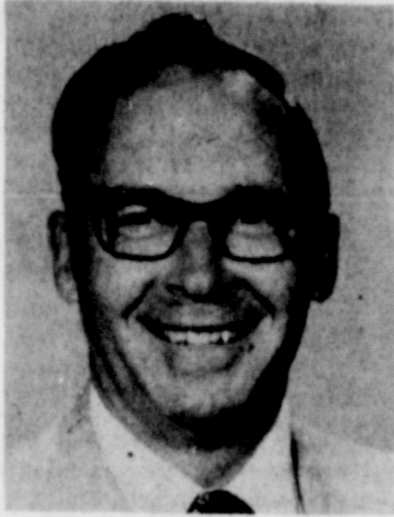

Extension Agent Seth Ralston pointed out to the court that time limits are to be set on spraying with 2,4-D, or its derivatives. This will be discussed at the court's meeting on March 9.

Ralston gave a report on the Parmer County Jr. Livestock Show in Friona. He reported that 78 4-H members were involved in the show, with a total of 182 barrows, 43 lambs and five steers, of which, 44 barrows, 16 lambs and three steers made the auction sale.

Ralston pointed out that county 4-H members have 14 barrows and four lambs entered in the Houston Livestock Show March 2-8.

Judge Roberts had been contacted by a woman at Friona asking the county to help pay a hospital bill for her daughter. After much discussion as to the size of the bill and the shape of the county's finances, the commissioners took no action on the request.

Texas A&M University, will be the instructor for the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Dr. Krehbiel has a strong background in animal production and genetics. He received a B.S. degree from Oklahoma State University in 1950, an M.S. degree from the University of Arkansas in 1959, and a Ph. D. degree from Virginia Polytechnic Institute in 1966. His graduate studies were based on selection for type and reproduction performance of cow herds.

Between periods of formal training, Dr. Krehbiel worked with the beef cattle industry as artificial insemination technician, beef cattle herdsman and ranch manager in Oklahoma. He also served as beef cattle research assistant in Arkansas, and animal geneticist for the USDA at Miles City, Montana. For two years prior to joining the Agricultural Education Specialist Program, he served as Area Livestock Extension Agent in Ohio.

The short course at Lazbuddie High School is scheduled to begin March 16 at 7 p.m. in the Vocational Agriculture Building. During the

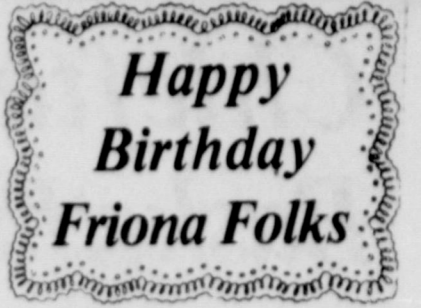
dates the short course is in progress, Dr. Krehbiel will be available to assist cattlemen with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Rick Copp. Cattlemen interested in attending

the short course should write or call Rick Copp at 965-2806 or 965-2156. An entry fee of \$5.00 will be charged. Beef Production Short Course certificates will be presented to each cattleman who attends all the training sessions.

Dr. Krehbiel states that the field of beef cattle production must take a close look at efficiency of production in the future. With land prices, feed, and taxes rising, the producer is meeting more and more competition for the consumer's dollar at the meat counter. From the economic view of the beef cattle business, there is every indication that in comparing the producer of yesteryear and the producer of tomorrow, beef must be produced more efficiently in order to be a profit-making business. Dr. Krehbiel indicated that the beef production short course will deal with methods of producing beef at a lower cost and the ways of producing the kind of beef that the homemaker wants to buy.

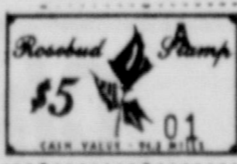

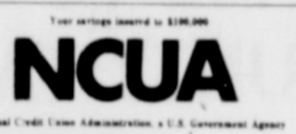

March Designated To Aid Mental Retarded

Persons with mental retardation are those who develop at a below average rate and experience unusual difficulty in learning, social adjustment and economic productivity. An estimated three percent of the population of the United States, or more than six million people, are believed to be mentally retarded. This population includes approximately 114 persons in Friona.

Mentally retarded persons are found among every race, religion and nationality; every educational, social and economic background. One out of every ten Americans has a direct involvement with the problem by virtue of having a mentally retarded person in his or her family.

Mental retardation should not be confused with mental illness or emotional disturbance, although a retarded person may, like anyone else, become emotionally disturbed. Mentally retarded people simply have a learning problem; they learn more slowly than others. Mental retardation can be caused by any condition that hinders or interferes with development before birth, during birth or during early childhood. Many causes have already been identified, although these account for only about a fourth of all identified cases of mental retardation.

Retarded persons often need a guiding hand in shopping, in cleaning house, in cooking, or in making wise choices, particularly in purchasing items. Parents of retarded children would appreciate having a person to call on to babysit if they need to shop or have an appointment or need some free time to themselves. The opportunity for service to mentally retarded persons and their families are endless if people will learn more about mental retardation and become sensitive to the presence of these people in their midst. Let them know you care.

Programs and services for mentally retarded citizens of the Texas Panhandle are available in the public schools and through various towns where satellite centers of the Amarillo State Center for Human Development are located. Day programs sponsored by the Amarillo State Center are located in Borger, Childress, Dumas, Hereford, Pampa, Perryton, Tulia and Wellington. Citizens in other towns can contact the Amarillo office for services.

Perhaps you bought the extras just because they looked good in the supermarket display.

Do your children find great delight in picking out all the sugar-coated cereals the store has to offer?

This may happen because those cereals are displayed at children's eye levels.

If so, you fell for marketing gimmicks.

Not so bad, since all that is fun occasionally--but not so good if you sacrifice family nutrition with frequent gimmick buying--impulse buying.

To avoid this, take time to plan purchases. Shop with a list so you aren't vulnerable to "point-of-purchase" influences at the supermarket.

Read labels and study food advertisements. Understand as much information as possible about nutrition and needed serving sizes.

Also learn about the "cost per serving" method of buying meats and produce. "Cost per serving" starts with "cost per pound" or "cost per ounce"--then you must figure how many servings that pound will make or how many ounces will make a serving.

In addition, seek information from your County Extension Office about food buying and nutrition. Many booklets and pamphlets are available to the public at no charge

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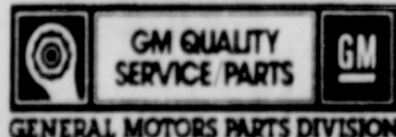

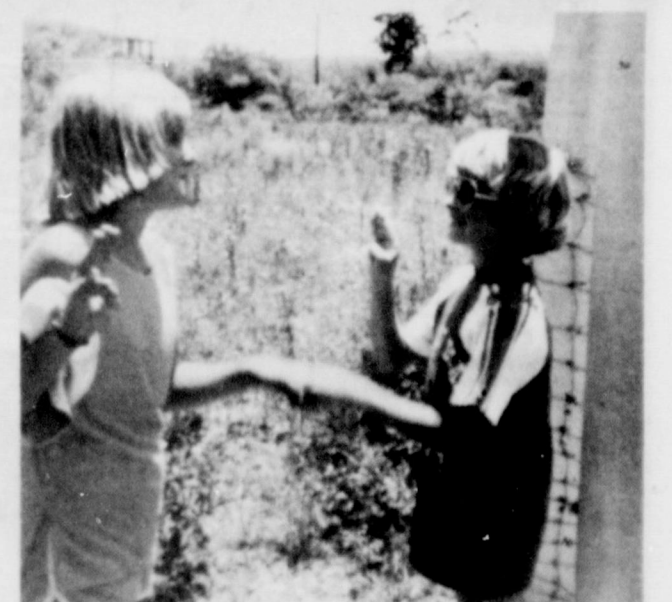

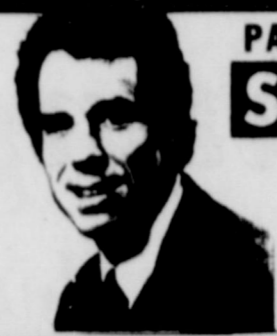
