THERE IS A NEW game on the market, along the lines of "Monopoly," or "Parchesi." This one is entitled "Public Assistance." The precepts of the game would be funny, if it were not so darned serious.

In this game, which like the others, uses dice and a couple of stacks of cards, there are two different courses which the players must travel. One is entitled "The working person's rut," and the other is "The able-bodied welfare recipient's promenade."

Some of the "chances" which the "working person" may land on include these: "Labor board reinstates the employee you fired: pay \$200;" and "Penalty for withholding taxes being late: pay \$100."

Also, "Secretary alleges sex discrimination: pay \$500." Or how about: "Customer rejects finished job: pay \$100." Then there is "Caught with improper racial balance in shop: pay \$500," and "Chief client goes bankrupt: pay \$1,000."

If those sound way out, how about: "Dip into retirement fund: collect \$2,000," or "Car payment due: pay dice times 10," or "Rent due: pay dice times 10." There are similar stops on the board for gas fill-up, grocery bill, property tax, and utility bills

Along the path of the playing board for the "able bodied welfare recipient" are such landing spots as "Emergency food stamps: collect \$100," and "Have illegitimate child," or "Rent TV and watch soap operas, pay \$50."

Other spots on their path include: "Act belligerent at job interview," "Play pin ball machines all day," and "Lie on application."

Other "stops" for the welfare recipient-player include such would-be things as shoplifting on the way to the welfare office; reading girlie magazines all day; stealing senior

citizen's social security check.

In Monopoly, you remember the stack of cards called "chance?" In the new game, they are labeled "burdens" and "benefits."

Among the burdens are: Jaycees recognize your dedicated service to the community. You are presented with "Citizen of the Year" award. Pay tuxedo rental, \$50," and "You and spouse are both working: pay \$100 for child care."

Others include: "Your son needs braces: \$800," and "Your sister is raped by a paroled rapist. Lose one turn," or "Your brother is killed by a rehabilitated murderer. Lose another turn."

How about: "Education means everything: pay son's college tuition," \$1,000," or "Ethnic solicitor slips on your sidewalk. Pay legal fees, \$500."

Among the "benefits" which might be picked up by the opposition are these: "Your number comes up on the daily lottery, collect \$500," and "Play \$50 of your welfare money on the daily lottery," and "Since your welfare money is not counted as income, receive \$500 tax rebate for being poor."

Also, "Advance to first of month. Collect all benefits," and "You are 35 miles from nearest welfare office. Collect \$50 in travel expenses," and "Illegitimate child has learning disability. Receive immediate \$200 benefit from Social Security."

Then there is "Your 15-year-old daughter is pregnant out of wedlock. Collect \$200 benefit," and "National Endowment for the Arts accepts your proposal for experimental filmmaking. Your theme: 'The limits of pornography.' Receive \$900 grant.'

Like we said, these glorified situations would be funny if it weren't for the fact that they probably could have been excerpted from official records.

BLACK STEPS DOWN

Changes Announced By Friona Industries

A.L. Black, chairman and one of the founders of Friona Industries in Friona, has contracted to buy the firm's steel fabrication and erection company in exchange for essentially all of his stock in the parent company.

Black will step down as chairman of Friona, but will remain on the board of directors. The deal calls for Black to pay 105,525 shares of stock for the subsidiary, Porch Bros.

Black's shares amounted to a little less than 5 per cent of the outstanding common stock. At the latest price of Friona Industries stock of \$6 a share, the deal would be valued at \$633,150.

The new chairman of Friona Industries is Ron Davenport, who adds that title to his position as president and chief executive officer.

Davenport said last week that Black was interested in Porch Bros., and "it was just something he wanted to do."

Porch Bros. accounted for less than 1 per cent of consolidated company revenue in 1981. It has built feed mills and other agriculturalrelated projects.

Black was one of the organizers in 1962 of Friona Feed Yards, which grew into Friona Industries.

Also resigning as an officer of Friona, but staying on the board of directors, was David J. Goddard, senior vice president. Goddard resigned to pursue personal business interests, the company said in a release.

Court Gives Okay To 'Crimestoppers'

The Parmer County Commissioners met in regular session on Monday, November 9, with all of the commissioners present. Judge Porter Roberts presided over the meeting.

Discussion on the article which appeared in the three county newspapers about the construction of a new county road was brought up. The commissioners had not okayed this road and were in question as to where the approval for such action came from.

The retirement system was reviewed by Bonnie Warren and several options on the choosing of a new plan, at no additional costs, were discussed by the members. It was decided to go with a plan which would be more helpful to those who are presently serving the county.

The commissioners accepted the results of the voting on the constitutional amendments for the county.

Two cases from the county social workers were discussed with the commissioners approving \$250 to supply a clothing need which one of the subjects had.

Sheriff Bill Morgan was on hand to bring up the possibility of creating a Crime Stoppers program in the county. This met with approval from the commissioners with Ernest Anthony being appointed to serve along with Morgan as the committee

to select which information was pertinent to the arrest and conviction of criminals.

The program would reward informants only for their information leading to the arrest and conviction of criminals.

It was decided that a \$1,000 fund would be set up for the fund, and that it would be necessary to solicit donations from businesses and private sources for the additional funding for the program.

The commissioners voted to cast 100 per cent of their support behind Lazbuddie ISD's choice for Parmer County Tax Appraisal District member, Alfred Hicks. This would give Lazbuddie enough votes to have a representative on the board.

The commissioners tabled any action to accept or reject an advertising committment with Pioneer Press of Friona, who had asked the commissioners to take out ads with them.

A letter from the Texas Department of Health was received by the commissioners concerning the dumpsite at Lazbuddie. This has been an on-going discussion between the county commissioners and the Health Department, which said the dumpsite was full and needs to have a cover of soil over it. Commissioners took no action on the matter, stating that it was not a county matter.



Basketball Season To Kick Off On Tuesday

Basketball gets underway with a bang at Friona High School during the next week, with games at Farwell for the varsity and junior varsity teams on Tuesday, and then the home openers against Springlake-Earth on Friday, November 20.

If fans notice a resemblance between the coach of this year's Squaws' team and the coach of the Chieftains, it's because he will be one and the same person-Coach Tom Johnson.

Due to the last-minute departure of former girls coach Al Stinson, Johnson agreed to take on the added assignment of coaching the girls this season, so he will be doing double duty for the 1981-82 season.

And, although coaching both varsity basketball teams may be something Johnson might not want to do for an entire career, he says he is looking forward to the season.

A big plus is the fact that the Squaws team Johnson has will be one with five lettermen back from a 14-10 season a year ago, which finished third in District 2-AAA. This year, the Squaws are picked to finish second to always-tough Dimmitt.

Returners include seniors Cari Hand, Lesa Bermea, Christie Wiseman, Teresa Loflin and Rene Noland. Miss Hand averaged 14 points per game last year as the team's second leading scorer, and Miss Hand added nine points per outing.

Other players expected to give yeoman service include juniors Sherry O'Brian and Sheri Dodson, who at 5-10 give the Squaws good height. Christie Wiseman is the team's tallest player at 5-11.

Also expected to help the team are juniors Judy McLellan, Cara Brockman, Pat Harris, Betty Harris, Revea Duffey and Kristi Britting. The team edged Hart, 27-26 in a scrimmage game here Tuesday.

Johnson's Chieftain team will have three starters and five other lettermen back from a team which finished 8-20 during a rebuilding year.

Starters back are 6-2 Mark Tucker, 5-9 Robert Caballero and 6-0 junior Mike Neill. Coach Johnson would have had a fourth starter back, except that Steve Taylor moved to Kansas

prior to the start of school. The other starter he must replace is all-district guard and floor general Tony Jackson.

Lettermen back in addition to the three starters are Nelson Jackson, Anthony Brady, Rocky Nichols, Mark Montoya and Richie Malouf. Since Malouf is 6-1, the team might have three starters 6-0 or over, something they haven't always had to offer.

Perennial favorite Dimmitt is the pick to win district. The Bobcats have three 6-4 players, and two others over six feet. Littlefield is picked second off their 21-6 record a year ago, and Friona is picked third.

But for now, it's non-district warmup games, and fans should come out and see what kind of teams Friona might have this winter.

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Friona Industries' Profits Are 'Normal' For First Quarter

Friona Industries, Inc. has reported net earnings of \$598,000, or 27 cents per share, on net sales of \$52.7 million for its first quarter ended September 30, 1981.

In the same quarter of the prior fiscal year the integrated agribusiness company had net earnings of \$1.3 million, or 60 cents per share, on net sales of \$50.1 million.

"All segments of our operations achieved satisfactory and what management considers normal operating profits in the first quarter of our current fiscal year," said Ron Davenport, president.

"The first quarter of fiscal 1981 generated unusual and higher than anticipated operating profirts, when compared with the same quarter of our current fiscal year," he explained.

"The weather played a big part in our operations both this year and last." said Davenport. "Last year's drought conditions made it necessary for livestock raisers to place their cattle in feed yards earlier than normal. This condition greatly increased occupancy during the first quarter of fiscal 1981 in the Company's three feed yards.

"Also, this same factor boosted occupancy in area feed yards which resulted in increased tonnages of however, an abundance of rain has kept pastures green and growing and farmers and ranchers have been more inclined to let their cattle graze.

"Cattle prices were about ten per cent lower on a quarter-to-quarter comparison, and our average feed yard occupancy declined 22 per cent.'

The Company's Meat Processing and Distribution operations showed a substantial gain over the prior year as sales increased 41 per cent to \$23.2 million and operating profits climbed 26 per cent to \$576,000.

This can be attributed to a larger average number of Wendy's Old Fashioned Hamburger Restaurants serviced with hamburger meat and a wider range of products, including dairy products and other refrigerated items. The Company processed 17 per cent more ground beef for an average of 629 stores, up from an average of 531 Wendy's during the same quarter of fiscal 1981.

"We now have the personnel, equipment and production capacity to expand distribution of these products to additional outlets," commented Davenport.

profits Operating Commercial Feeds, Animal Health Supplies, Custom Feeding and

Company-owned Cattle restrained by reduced numbers of cattle on feed in the Company's operating area and lower cattle prices.

The Commercial Feeds segment had operating profits of \$148,000 compared with \$367,000 in the first three months of fiscal 1981. Tonnage sold was down 29 per cent.

Animal Health Supplies operating profits of \$133,000 were 27 per cent behind the pace of the prior year's same quarter.

Custom Feeding accounted for \$662,000 in operating profits, about \$338,000 less than in the first quarter of last year.

The Company sold approximately 22,000 head of cattle for an operating profit of \$420,000, compared with 19,400 head and an operating profit of \$847,000 in the same period last

Grain operating profits were \$152,000 versus \$66,000 and the other category, which includes grain hauling and steel fabrication, reported \$283,000 in the first quarter versus \$336,000 in operating profits last year at this time.

"Actually, we are somewhat more optimistic about our potential financial performance during the remainder of the 1982 fiscal year than we were at this same time last year concerning the final three quarters of fiscal 1981," he added

FRIONA'S LUCK SOURS

Second Half Rally Wins For Mules

Someone once said they had rather be lucky than good, any day. That's not to say that the Muleshoe Mules were not a good team here last Friday--but the Mules definitely were not without their luck, either.

Muleshoe combined a hard-hitting rushing game with a little second half rabbit's foot, to score a 24-14 win in the important District 2-AAA contest. With the win, the Mules kept their district hopes alive, and snuffed out those of Friona.

The game was a good one from a spectator's standpoint. The lead changed hands four times, as the game was a see-saw affair until Muleshoe finally wrested control of the outcome late in the contest.

It was a game of big plays. Both teams had a number of outstanding plays on their behalf. But in the end, a couple of hard-luck plays on behalf of the Chieftains cost them the game, and allowed the Mules to take command.

The plays happened late in the third quarter, at a time when Muleshoe was clinging to a threepoint lead, and when up until that time it was first one, then the other team's turn to score.

Friona apparently had held the Mules near midfield on a third down and 20 situation, when a pass was thrown over the receiver's head. But Jeff Lundy, the Chieftain defender on the play, got his feet tangled up with the receiver's, and a pass interference call gave Muleshoe new life at the Friona 27.

Just four plays later, the Mules were facing fourth and nine on another pass play. Defender Mark Montoya had the best chance of catching the ball, but elected instead to bat the ball into the air.

This proved to be a mistake, as the ball was deflected right into the waiting arms of the Muleshoe receiver (Monty Hysinger) in the end zone for a touchdown. That gave the Mules a ten-point lead, and the Chiefs never could recover.

Muleshoe took the opening kickoff and drove from their own 34 to the Friona 17, where the drive stalled.

Hysinger kicked a 23-vard field goal, to give the visitors a 3-0 lead at the 6:41 mark of the opening period.

On Friona's third possession, the Chiefs finally clicked. Nelson Jackson gave the team a first down at the Muleshoe 35, and Mark Tucker hit Rocky Nichols on a pass play to the Mules' 19. Nichols made a circus catch to keep the drive going.

Two plays later, Tucker passed again to Nichols for the touchdown, and Montoya's kick gave Friona the lead at 7-3. There was 4:59 left in the first half, and it was far from being

Muleshoe drove 80 yards in nine plays to reclaim the lead. Hysinger broke on a 35-yard gain for the biggest chunk. He also got the final 15, and then tacked on the PAT for a 10-7 Mule lead with 1:14 left in the

If you thought the Chieftains can't move the ball in a hurry, you should have seen their offensive series following the kickoff. Mike Neill ran the kick back to the home 30, to get things started.

Robert Osborn ripped off a 12yard gain, Jackson ran for nine, and then added a 20-yarder on a pitchout around end, going out of bounds with 25 seconds left on the clock.

At this point, Anthony Brady ran a post pattern, and took a perfect pass right at the goal-line. Montoya's kick regained the lead for Friona at 14-10. The Chieftains had done a good imitation of the Dallas Cowboys-going 70 yards in only 38 seconds. There were still 19 seconds on the clock when they scored the TD.

And, would you believe--the Chiefs had one other chance to score before halftime. Friona hopped on a Mule fumble at the visitors' 21 with three seconds, and quickly called time out. Montoya teed up a field goal attempt, which would have been 38 yards. Montoya's kick was plenty long, but was barely wide to the left, and the half ended with Friona holding its 14-10 lead.

The half ended with the teams all knotted up in total vardage, at 178all, and Muleshoe ahead in first

The third quarter proved to be more than Friona could overcome.

Muleshoe started out by driving 65 yards in 12 plays to regain the lead, making the fourth time the lead had changed hands in the game.

Hysinger again provided the offensive spark. He was virtually unstoppable during the drive, posting gains of 11, 6, 13, 7, 3, and 9 yards. The TD and point kick at the 5:54 mark made the score Muleshoe 17, Friona 14.

The next series turned out to be the ill-fated drive where Friona should have held and been on the move themselves, except for the untimely flag, and later the deflected pass. In Hysinger's defense, he kept his eyes on the ball, when a lesser player might have let the pass fall incomplete after it was tipped.

So bleak was the third quarter for the Chieftains that they made only one first down, and that one came on a penalty against the Mules. The fourth quarter turned out to be a little better. Muleshoe scored a pair of quarterback "sacks," one against Tucker and one against Bruce Patterson, to stymie would-be threats.

The hard-hitting game took its toll on both teams. George Richardson was taken to the hospital for the Chieftains, with a whiplash. Muleshoe lost a starter with a compound fracture just a few minutes later. Two or three other players had to leave the game, including Friona's starting quarterback, Tucker. Before it was over, Nelson Jackson came up limping.

Both teams put out their best effort to claim the game in the win column, and as they were so evenly matched, it came down to the team getting the breaks being the winner.

Muleshoe's Hysinger, for his inspired play in the game, was named the class AAA player of the week runnerup by the Amarillo Daily News. He gained 163 yards rushing, caught a pass for 26 yards, scoring three TDs, and kicking the field goal.

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

Program Given By Farm Bureau

Anything will burn and nothing is fireproof. This fact was brought out by Joe Smetana, Safety Director for the Texas Farm Bureau, Waco, in a graphic animated fire prevention demonstration held November 10, at Friona High School

The three things needed to start a fire, air-fuel and heat, brightly illuminated as Smetana plugged in the parts of his fire triangle board, causing the flashing "F-I-R-E" sign. He defined fire control as he removed (one at a time), the three parts.

As part of a discussion on fire control and the classes of fire (A-B-C-D), Smetana demonstrated taking away air by smothering the flame of a candle; smothering the flame of a kitchen fire (pot of burning grease-Class B) and taking away the air or oxygen of another Class B fire--a burning gasoline rag.

The audience also witnessed the burning of steel (steel wool); the loud shotgun-like explosion of one drop of gasoline and they saw the wiring burn inside the wall and in the attic of

Smetana's model house-(Class C).

With each sequence of animated and actual fire hazard of the various classes both inside and outside the house and around the farm, Smetana gave applicable prevention and control suggestions. For fire control, Smetana pointed out that many fires in the home, vehicles, equipment and other buildings can be extinguished while in the incipient stage; provided you have a U/L approved extinguisher of the correct size and type. "Recharge each portable extinguisher after each use," he

This very educational fire program was brought to Friona High School under the sponsorship of the Parmer County Farm Bureau.

A West Texas State University touring production of "Fiddler on the Roof" will be presented at Friona on Sunday, November 15, featuring three Friona students.






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
