announcement by Superintendent Clarence Floyd County Rural will open Monday, September 1, according to OPA Rationing Executive Wm. G. Williams. The current sugar stamp, No. 36, will expire August 31. Continuing the ration rate of five pounds of sugar every four months, the new sugar stamp, No. 38, will be good through December. Sugar stamp No. 38 is being validated instead of No. 37 because so many home canners by mistake last year mailed sugar stamp No. 37 to their local War Price and Rationing Board to obtain special canning allowances, instead of spare stamp 37 requested by OPA.

Sugar Stamp No 38 Valid September First

With fourteen salesmen working, the 1946 wheat crop insurance sales program went into its final week. Such was the announcement from the AAA office this week. Wheat Crop Insurance policies are being offered on either 50 per cent or 75 per cent of the average yield of the farm, and covers all hazards. "Saturday noon, September 1, 1945, is the final date for writing this all-coverage insurance," said Ray S. McEntire, administrative officer of the AAA. "Each farmer in Floyd County should investigate the insurance program on his wheat crop and make a definite determination as to whether he wants the insurance. Too often it has been proven that when failures occur, farmers wish they had taken the policies," he continued. MOURNING DOVES

OPEN SEASON -- NORTH ZONE: Sept. 1 to Oct. 30, both days inclusive. Shooting hours, one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

SOUTH ZONE: Oct. 20 to Dec. 18, both days inclusive, except in Cameron, Hidalgo, Starr, Zapata, Webb, Maverick, Kinney, Dimmit, LaSalle, Jim Hogg, Brooks, Kenedy, and Willacy counties where mourning doves may be hunted only on Sept. 13, 16, 18, 20 and 23, from 12 o'clock noon to sunset, and from Oct. 20 to Dec. 18, from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

BAG LIMIT: Not more than 10 per day and not more than 10 in possession.

WHITE-WINGED DOVES

OPEN SEASON: Sept. 13, 16, 18, 20 and 23, inclusive.

SHOOTING HOURS: 12 noon to sunset.

BAG LIMIT: Not more than 10 per day and not more than 10 in possession.

Unlawful to take whitewings or Chachalaca South of U.S. Highway 83 in southern tip of Texas marked on the map as "GAME SANCTUARY."

No hunting permitted in game refuges and game preserves.

Shotguns must be permanently plugged to three shell capacity.

Shotguns may not be larger than 10 gauge.

Funeral services for B. H. Howard, 86, former Crosby county judge and the father of Ard and Grady Howard and Mrs. John H. Reagan of Floydada, who died at his home, 1414 Ave. M in Lubbock at 12:40 a. m. Tuesday, was held at the First Methodist church at 3 p. m. Wednesday.

MARRIED 64 YEARS

He and Mrs. Howard had been married 64 years. They were wed at Livingston, Tennessee, October 13, 1881. A Methodist and Royal Arch Mason, Judge Howard was formerly active in civic life. He was a member of the Board of Education in Crosbyton for several years.

Luther Lloyd Turner Electrician on USS Iowa

Aboard the USS Iowa off Honshu (Delayed)—Luther Lloyd Turner, 31, electrician's mate, second class, USNR, whose wife, Mrs. Nellie Marie Turner lives at 820 South Main Street, Floydada Texas, fought aboard this 45,000-ton battleship when she and other 3rd Fleet battleships, cruisers and destroyers staged a daring midnight bombardment of industrial targets on this main Japanese island, just 70 miles from Tokyo.

Standing only a few miles offshore, the IOAA hurled more than 200 tons of flaming projectiles at war factories. A few days before this crowning achievement in her wartime career, the IOWA's big guns had wrecked the port and industrial city of Muroran on Hokkaido, northernmost of Japan's large islands.

Since she was launched nine months after Pearl Harbor, the big battleship has taken part in virtually all Naval action in the island-to-island conquest of Jap-held Pacific territory. She was in on initial strikes at the Marshalls, air strikes at Truk, the Carolines, Marianas, Formosa, New Guinea, actions in the Philippines and at Okinawa.

ELECTRICO-OPS EXPAND

Three rural electric cooperatives recently have been awarded REA allocations for expanding electric services. These are located in Clay, McCulloch, and Wood counties. In addition, Lynn County cooperative has awarded contracts for construction of 125 miles of line to serve 260 members.

Red ration stamps L1 through Q1 for meats, fats, and oils will become usable on September 1. Q2 through U2 cannot be used after August 31.

Passenger Car Tires Continue to be Rationed

New passenger car tires will continue to be rationed largely on the basis of occupational driving needs, although rationing of all farm-implement and industrial type tires ended August 20, the District Office of Price Administration has announced.

"The critical tire shortage has only been emphasized by the cancellation of gasoline rationing—applications for tires have increased 20 percent in many counties," according to Rationing Executive Wm. G. Williams.

Predictions of an early end of tire rationing have made many applicants feel that local Boards were discriminating against them if their application was turned down. Local Boards must hold tire certificate issuance within their quotas and the end of the war brought on increase in quotas, Williams said. "If you need any proof of the scarcity of passenger tires, just try to find one of the popular sized ones," he pointed out.

Under the new eligibility system, certificates for new tires may be issued for use on the following:

1. Passenger cars used for occupational purposes. Board quotas will continue to be distributed in accordance with importance of the uses of the passenger cars.
2. Passenger cars used for non-occupational purposes provided that the local board decides that denial of the application would cause undue hardship and that the issuance in this category does not exceed 5 per cent of the board's total quota.

Rationing Calendar For September 1 to October 1

Sugar: Stamp No. 36 expires August 31. Stamp No. 38 becomes valid September 1 and will be good through December 31.

Meats and Fats: Book IV, stamps V2 through K1 are good for 10 points each. L1, M1, N1, Q1 become valid September 1. Through Z2 expire August 31.

Shoes: Book III, stamps O2, three and four with airplane pictures, each good for one pair shoes indefinitely.

Tire Inspection: T book holds every six months or every 5,000 miles, whichever comes first. Application for passenger car tire placement must show condition of all tires in use.

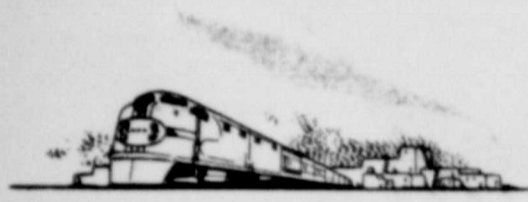

scholarship to the United States Public Health Service and attended a course at Vanderbilt University, Nashville, Tenn. Upon completing it, Dr. Grist was employed as food and drug inspector for the State Health Department at Austin, but in 1941 he returned to private practice at New Braunfels with the added responsibility of assistant state veterinarian. In 1943, however, he was appointed state veterinarian with headquarters at Fort Worth.

Currently, Dr. Grise is corresponding secretary of the Texas Veterinary Medical Association and editor of the Texas Veterinary Bulletin. He also is serving as chairman of the Procurement and Assignment Service, War Manpower Commission, charged with the allocation and re-location of veterinarians throughout Texas. In that capacity he has worked upon the basis of the needs of communities for veterinary services, especially the requirements of livestock owners. He has served on committees both for the National Veterinary Medical Association and the Association of the United States Livestock Sanitary Officials. "Since his work with the Texas Extension Service will be educational in the field of animal disease prevention," Director Trotter said, "his services not only will be helpful to farmers and practicing veterinarians in conducting a successful disease control program, but perhaps will create opportunities for veterinarians in parts of the state where they are not now located."

Campaign Against Tuberculosis in Livestock

College Station, August 30.—In three livestock market centers of the East, which 20 years ago received large numbers of cattle seriously affected with tuberculosis, cases of this disease are now rare. Of 430,230 cattle slaughtered in those centers during the year ending June 30, 1945 only 59 head—or about 1 in 7,300—were con-

demned for food because of tuberculosis by inspectors of the Federal meat inspection service.

In 1945 at the same market centers and under the same inspection, condemnations ran into the thousands and the proportion was about 1 in every 80 animals slaughtered. The cities are Boston, Mass, Buffalo, N. Y., and New York City.

Officials of the Bureau of Animal Industry, United States Department of Agriculture, attribute most of this saving in cattle and beef to the systematic campaign against bovine tuberculosis.

For livestock owners, city residents, and others who cooperated, the campaign of eradication is "paying off" in greater conservation of beef as well as in an increase in milk production per cow and in greater wholesomeness of products from healthy animals.

Had the proportion of tuberculous cattle at the three markets been as great last year as 20 years ago, there would have been a loss, to the food supply, of more than 5,000 animals representing about 2,000,000 pounds of carcass beef.

Similar savings, in varying degrees, are known to have occurred and are still in progress at the many other livestock markets of the country.

Statehood Centennial Edition of the Texas Almanac Now Ready

The new Texas Almanac is off the press, the 1945-46 edition being commemorative of the Centennial of Texas Statehood. Although print paper is still alarmingly scarce, the fact that the new book contains 608 pages—the largest in history—is considered adequate proof of its value to the public. In harmony with its dedication, a considerable portion of the book is devoted to historical matter. There is a revised history of Texas, from Cabeza de Vaca to Coke R. Stevenson, and there are additional chapters on events and places of historic interest, including an extensive current account of Texas' participation in World War II. As usual, data and statistics on rainfall, crops, mineral deposits, farm demonstration, railroad mileage, rosters of state and county officials, Mayors and City Managers, sources of state revenue during

the last fiscal year and articles on Texas counties, with individual maps, are included in the current issue, together with revisions in up-to-date form, covering rail, highway, air and shipping commerce; banking and insurance; Texas athletic events, parks and tourist attractions, schools, libraries, health and hospitals.

In view of the postwar program of economic development, especial attention is given to Texas manufacturing industries between 1940 and 1944, when pay rolls and volume of production more than trebled. There is full treatment also of Texas minerals, of which more than sixty kinds were produced last year, for a total value of more than a billion dollars—the greatest value of mineral production of any single state in the history of the nation. Included also, are late developments in soil and water conservation, telling of the construction of such new projects as Lake Texoma, near Denison, one of the largest reservoirs in America.

Approximately 85 per cent of the current edition of the Almanac had been sold before the first vol-

ume came from the press a few days ago.

MANY MEN WILL BE ENTITLED TO OLD-AGE BENEFITS

Many men who were near 65 years of age or who passed that age when they entered employment since war was declared, will be entitled to monthly old-age and survivors insurance benefits when

they retire. The amount of monthly payments will be based on the wages and the length of time the individual has worked covered employment, according to Sam Leifeste, manager of the Social Security Board office. When the wife of such individual reaches 65, she too will be entitled to monthly benefits, based on her husband's earnings record. Her monthly benefit will eq-
