## FARMLAND HELPED

## Friona Area Gets Good General Rain

The Friona area received the best rain in eight months late Wednesday and early Thursday, when over an inch of moisture was logged in the immediate area.
In Friona, the official measurement was 1.05 inch. Weather recorder Jake Outland said this was the most rain measured at one time since September 14, 1980
The rain fell as the result of a slow-moving line of thunderstorms which crossed the area late in the evening. Rainfall began at about 10:45 p.m. Wednesday, and continued past midnight
The latest measurement followed another good rain which had fallen Friday and Saturday, May 30-31. A total of .83 inch was measured on those two dates, bringing the total for the week to 1.88 inches.
The rain of this past week was apparently more general in nature than the area had received for quite some time. Virtually everyone right around Friona reported at least an inch of moisture
The area around the Black community reportedly received 1.5 inches, as did the Oklahoma Lane area, and the rainfall apparently was even heavier in Bovina
The Pleasant Hill area, on the state line north of Farwell, was said to have received two inches of rain.
In the Rhea community, Hoyt Smith received three-quarters of an inch of rain. North of Friona, Leroy Berend reported 1.2 inches
To the southeast, the measurement was somewhat lighter, as Floyd Reeve reported 75 inch, and Charles Myers .60 inch
The Lazbuddie area was reported to have received around a half-inch of moisture during the latest round of showers.
All of the rainfall of this week was beneficial in nature, falling slow for the most part. Luckily, the immediate area has escaped the bad hail which has hit some sections. The

Lubbock area has been pounded with hail twice in recent weeks.
On Thursday, May 28, a hailstorm damaged crops in an area around Tam-Anne. But for the most part, crops in the area are off to a good start, and the rainfall of the past week should be a big boost, according to farm observers.
In fact, the rain should even help the irrigated wheat, one spokesman said. The wheat, which has been ripening in recent weeks and nearing harvest time, should benefit from this late moisture, which should help it hold its weight, and not shrivel while awaiting harvest.
