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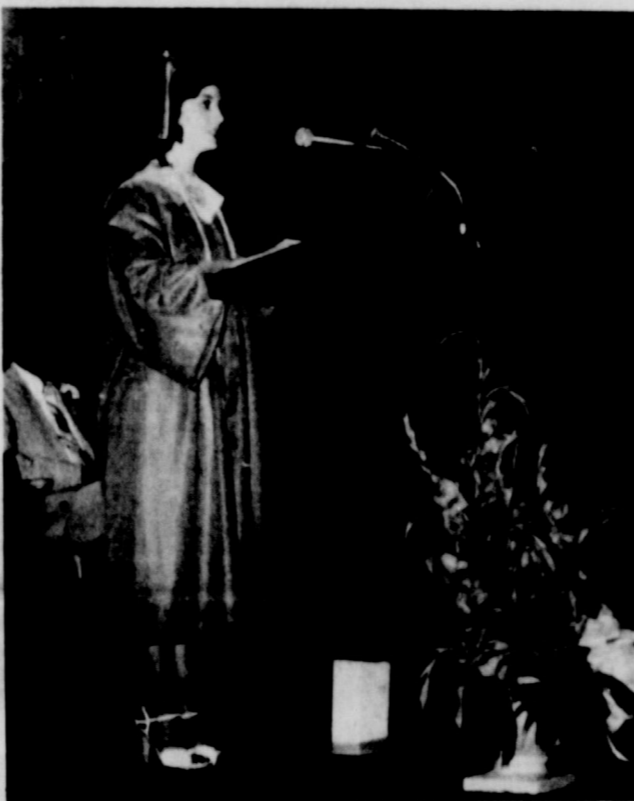
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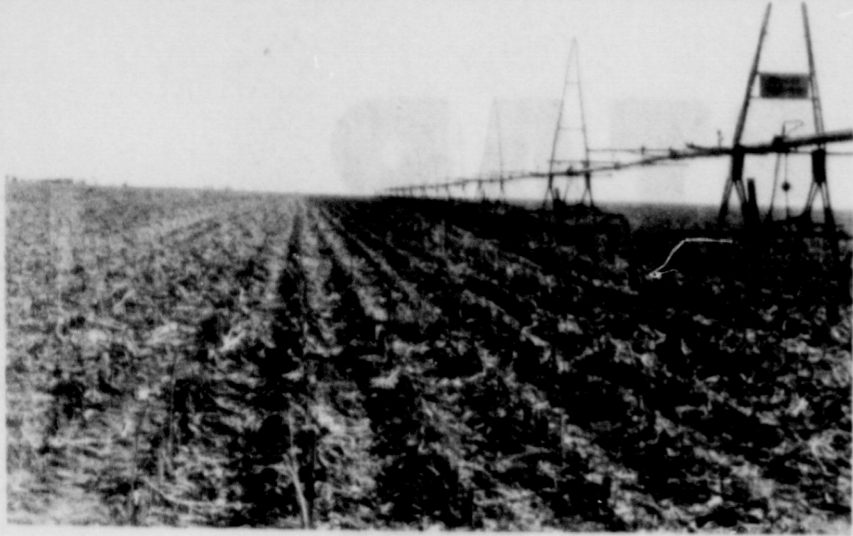
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SAVE THAT WATER....Minimum tillage, along with no-till farming is being practiced by farmers of Parmer County with sprinkler systems in order to conserve fuel and water.

Farmers Urged To Use Minimum Tillage

"Minimum Tillage is becoming the way of farming," explains Duval Burton, Soil Conservationist with the Parmer County Soil Conservation Service.

Minimum tillage is a system of farming in which cultural operations are limited to only those essential to crop production. Burton says, "By practicing this kind of farming, the farmer can eliminate from three to ten tractor trips per crop." With the high fuel costs this adds up to savings.

The moisture conserved by leaving the crop residues on the soil surface is very beneficial to this area, with

average rainfall being only 17 inches per year. "Leaving crop residues on the soil surface can prevent wind and water erosion from occurring," Burton added.

Many different equipment companies are designing equipment especially for minimum tillage. Many farmers are adapting their equipment on hand to fit their individual needs.

According to Burton, "Minimum tillage for each individual farmer requires careful planning."

50 YEARS AGO--JUNE 12, 1931

Once again the Magnolia Petroleum Company has changed agents here. Some time ago, M. Lacy purchased the interests of J.C. Wilkinson, and now Mr. Lacy turns the agency over to Homer T. Walker, who will take charge of the property immediately.

45 YEARS AGO--JUNE 12, 1936

F.S. Truitt, proprietor of the Truitt Lumber Company, departed last week for Dallas, where he is spending this week attending the Texas Centennial.

Dust or sand storms appear to be diminishing in both volume and frequency as the acreage of plowed land increases throughout the territory.

40 YEARS AGO--JUNE 13, 1941

The members of the Friona Lions Club, assisted by a group of the Muleshoe Club, duly installed the officers of the new club last week. Officers are W.L. Edelson, president; E.M. Rushing, secretary; C.E. McLean, Tail-twister; Frank Spring, first vice-president; Sloan Osborn, second vice-president; Tiny Magness, Lion Tamer; Ray Landrum, Dr. R.J. McReynolds, W.E. Boedecker and Roy Clements, directors.

35 YEARS AGO--JUNE 7, 1946

Spencer Hough brought in the first load of 1946 wheat last Saturday. The wheat was sold to the Santa Fe Grain Company, and tested 59 in weight, 14.6 in moisture. The yield is between 11 and 12 bushels per acre.

30 YEARS AGO--JUNE 7, 1951

In a special meeting Wednesday afternoon, the Friona School Board outlined plans to present to the voters of the district a rebuilding program involving the best facilities possible in an enlarged high school plant, calling for a bond issue of some \$150,000. Insurance companies last week agreed to pay the full \$80,000 insurance carried on the old building, destroyed by fire on May 16.

25 YEARS AGO--JUNE 7, 1956

Coming as regular as an afternoon dust storm in March, showers have visited the Friona area almost nightly for the past week, bringing the rainfall total to over four inches since the "wet spell" began three weeks ago.

Velma Vada Sessums, 47, died at the Parmer County Community Hospital at 6:30 Tuesday morning following a car wreck Saturday evening at the intersection of Farm Road 1731 and Highway 60.

20 YEARS AGO--JUNE 8, 1961

More than 200 persons have signed up for summer swimming lessons, which got underway Monday at Friona's new indoor swimming pool. A swimming exhibition will be held Saturday at the pool's grand opening.

15 YEARS AGO--JUNE 9, 1966

"On the Air" flashed at Friona's new radio station, KNNN, for the first time this week, as the new daylight hours station officially went on the air.

Travis Clements, Friona's Chief of Police since last September, was relieved of his duties, and patrolman Kenneth McDermott was named his successor during the regular meeting of the Friona City Council Monday.

10 YEARS AGO--JUNE 10, 1971

Mr. and Mrs. A.W. Anthony of Friona were among 100 persons from across the country honored with invitations to Washington from President Nixon for national observances of Salute to Agriculture Day, May 7. Anthony is president of the GSPA. The couple was treated to a full day of activities in Washington as the guests of Mr. and Mrs. Nixon, the USDA and other federal officials.

5 YEARS AGO--JUNE 6, 1976

The Friona area has been hit by extremely high winds on two or three occasions during the past couple of weeks. The worst was Sunday, May 30, when gusts destroyed an old airplane hangar at Bengier Air Park, and toppled utility poles east of the city. Farm crops also were ruined or

adversely affected across a wide area.

Iola Nelson, longtime employee of Friona State Bank, will be honored by the bank with a reception on the occasion of her retirement Thursday, June 10. Mrs. Nelson will retire officially from her position as assistant vice president on June 9. She first went to work at the bank on January 4, 1959. She has been concentrating on Certificates of Deposit and retirement funds in recent years, and was the first secretary the bank ever had.

Approximately four years ago, Dr. and Mrs. Gary Albertson made a short-term mission tour to Kenya, East Africa, where Dr. Albertson was associated with the Tenwek Hospital. Many people of this area will recall the visits made by the Albertsons to various civic organizations and churches and the support given in prayers and contributions to this World Gospel Missions outreach. Thirty hospital beds, in addition to money for a whirlpool and X-ray room for the hospital were sent from this area.

Dr. and Mrs. Ernest Steury, chief-of-staff at the hospital compound, will be in this area June 6-11 and will be speaking and showing films at the First Assembly of God Church in Muleshoe, Monday, June 8 at 8 p.m. Dr. Steury's main purpose in coming to this area is to share with the people the outcome of their support. He will give up-to-date information on missions in Africa and will be sharing personal testimonies concerning the work there.

An average of 3,000 people receive spiritual help through the cooperative efforts of missionary and national staff. Two full-time chaplains, graduates of Kenya Highlands Bible College, are regular staff members at the hospital. The hospital plays a vital role in building the church.

Mrs. Steury (Sue), a native of North Carolina, attended Pilgrim Bible School, Kernersville, North Carolina, is a graduate of Asbury College, and has done graduate work at Butler University. In Kenya she served in various capacities—secretary of the station, women's work, director of Sunday schools and VBS's, hospital treasurer, and station hostess. The Steurys have four children, one of whom is married.

During the camp, an oral interpretation section and a public speaking section will be taught.

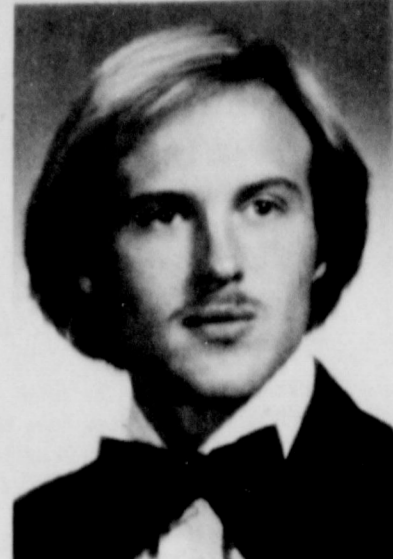
Three plays will be produced as part of the theatre activities. Joy Morton, speech and drama instructor at Friona High School, will direct "The Madwoman of Chaillot."

Student Seminar Set July 10-28 At WTSU

Gifted and talented grade school students from throughout the Texas Panhandle will spend part of their summer at West Texas State University sharing and enriching learning experiences in a variety of areas.

WTSU Department of Curriculum and Instruction in the College of Education will host the first Gifted and Talented Seminar July 10-28. Claud "R" Zevely, associate professor of education, will direct the seminar and Donnie Ickles, a consultant with the Region XVI Education Service Center in Amarillo who coordinates a gifted and talented program in the district, will serve as assistant director.

For two weeks, about 100 students in fourth, fifth and sixth grades of Panhandle grade schools, about 50 teachers of gifted and talented students, and parents with college degrees will meet on the WTSU campus.

From 9:10 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. each day, seminar participants will become involved in discussing and participating in the major subject areas of the arts, sciences and humanities.

Areas to be presented include biofeedback, archeology, anthropology, performing arts, visual arts, parenting, language, philosophy, banking and political science.

Zevely said a civil engineer, a political figure, architect and an international banker, among other professionals and consultants, will conduct the learning experiences. Seminar participants will become involved in discussing future housing, Greek and Hebrew languages, the languages of an artist, music and a dancer and will take field trips to archeological digs, museums and the Don Harrington Discovery Center in Amarillo.

"We feel we've done so little for these students," explained Zevely. "They're the last slaves of civilization. We have used them and misused them."

Cost of the seminar is \$25 per student and parents and teachers will

pay tuition costs for a summer session at WTSU. Three semester hours of graduate credit may be earned through participation in the seminar.

Zevely said the seminar is part of a three-year program designed to develop methods of training teachers to provide instruction for under-achieving gifted and talented students in area public schools.

He said this year's seminar is a "discovery year." Plans for next year's seminar include involving the participants in various careers and fields.

"During our third year, we hope to have 300 children on campus in a camp situation," he said.
