Aycock Named County Attorney

Appointment of Charles Aycock, Farwell attorney, as County Attorney, highlighted the regular session of the Parmer County Commissioners meeting Monday, April 27, in Farwell.

A letter of resignation was accepted by the court from former County Attorney Johnny Atkinson, due to his appointment as the new District Attorney for the new civil district for Parmer and Bailey counties.

After considerable discussion with the appointee, the court voted unanimously for Aycock to fill the vacancy.

Upon suggestion by County Treasurer Benna Felts, a motion was passed to invest \$100,000 in Farm to Market road funds in a certificate of deposit to mature July 31, 1981.

The court voted to pay the expenses of County Judge Porter Roberts to an education session for non-lawyer judges in Austin May 4-5-6.

A motion was also passed to advertise for the purchase of a shredder for a Case 910 tractor for Precinct 1, with bids to be opened on May 22, at 11 a.m.

Friona Industries Sets Oil Lease Program

Friona Industries, Inc. announced today that it intends to invest approximately \$2,000,000 over the next 12 months in a program to acquire oil and gas leases and topleases in the Williston Basin of North Dakota.

The purchase of oil and gas leases and topleases will be made by a limited partnership consisting of Friona and another party, as limited partners, and Berco Resources as general partner. Berco Resources, which has offices in Buffalo, Wyoming and Denver, Colorado, will be responsible for all lease acquisitions. Berco, along with its principals, has been engaged in the acquisition of leases and topleases in the Rocky Mountain Region of the United States for the past 20 years.

The limited partners will contribute to the partnership approximately \$2,500,000 or 75 percent, of the total capital and the general partner will contribute approximately \$833,000, or 25 percent, of the total capital.

The Limited Partnership Agreement provides that all cash distributions will be made 75 percent

to the limited partners and 25 percent to the general partner until the partners have received an amount equal to their capital contributions; thereafter, cash distributions will be divided 50 percent to the limited partners and 50 percent to the general partner. During the life of the partnership, profits will be divided 50 percent to the limited partners and 50 percent to the general partner.

"We are constantly evaluating diversification and investment opportunities, and management believes that this limited partnership venture into the energy industry offers good potential for return on capital and future growth possibilities for Friona," said Ron Davenport, president.

Star Lites

BILL SOUTHARD, our newspaperman-friend at the Clovis News-Journal, is currently experiencing a rare thrill for a writer.

As you may have read, Southard has a book in print. Not only that, but the Clovis editor's Western novel won a \$25,000 prize in a contest sponsored by Bantam Books and 20th Century Fox.

"Season of Vengeance" is probably one of the most carefully-written western novels to hit the market in years.

Southard told this writer that he wrote the book a third time before submitting it to the Bantam contest. Maybe that's why it's such a good book.

The Clovis editor said that he had written the manuscript, and had it finished when he heard about the national contest. He decided then to re-write the novel and enter it in the competition. He did, but still not satisfied, he re-wrote his work another time before sending it off.

"When I re-wrote the book, I would pause, asking myself 'Is that the word I want to use?' I labored to get just exactly the right word I wanted for each instance," Southard says.

Southard's effort won him the prize, from approximately 1,000 manuscripts entered in the contest. Included in his prize money is a check from 20th Century Fox for movie rights in the event the book should be made into a movie.

Although this writer has been a longtime Western movie fan, we must confess that it had been years since we had read a Western novel.

The book was extremely enjoyable, and now, like Bantam Books, we are anxiously waiting for Southard's sequel.

You read the book with the knowledge that not only is Southard an extremely good writer, but he knows what he is writing about.

"Season of Vengeance" is set in the mountains of New Mexico. Southard has been a New Mexico resident all of his life. As a youth he enjoyed horseback riding, hunting and fishing.

After high school, he spent four years in the Navy, at the time of the Korean conflict. He then returned home, and earned a degree in journalism at Eastern New Mexico University.

Southard has been in newspaper work ever since. He has served as managing editor of the Clovis News-Journal for the past ten years.

As a youngster, Southard became a fan of Western novels, by the old masters, Zane Grey, Max Brand, Luke Short, etc., and later on, Louis L'Amour. Today, if you go into a store which sells Bantam Books, you'll see Southard's paperback right there with those of his idols.

"It's quite a thrill, I can tell you, to go into a bookstore and see your book on their racks. It's what you always dream of," says the writer whose first ambition was to grow up to be a cowboy.

His hero in "Season of Vengeance" is Jessie Ramming, who is thrust into a quest to find the murderer of his wife, seemingly without help from the law.

Ramming's efforts, against the elements, and naturally, against the "bad guys" makes for an exciting story. So well does Southard build the book's climax that we found ourselves speeding ahead, to see how Ramming would "come out."

As one reviewer points out, Southard's book is accomplished without the profanity and four-letter words that some writers feel they must use to get attention.

It's a good book, and we think our readers would enjoy it. It's not often you get a chance to read a book authored by a good neighbor.

Parmer County Hospital has also been filled to capacity almost all week.

25 YEARS AGO--APRIL 13, 1956

One of the larger real estate transactions recorded within the Friona city limits was completed this week with the sale of all undeveloped property within the Lakeside Addition to Carl G. McCaslin of Hereford. The Lakeside and Staley additions were each commenced last year at a time of acute housing shortage in Friona. Building in both locations has proceeded at a rapid pace, probably as fast as local building labor could proceed.

20 YEARS AGO--APRIL 13, 1961

Kenneth Miller, 28-year-old head coach at Groom High School, was selected from 15 applications Monday night to become Friona High School's head football coach. 10 YEARS AGO--APRIL 15, 1971

Parmer County Commissioners voted Monday to join the cities of Friona and Bovina in paying a monthly subsidy to Claborn Ambulance Service, thus assuring that Parmer County would continue to have a qualified ambulance service. Commissioners, after an hour of heated debate, passed a motion by a 3-1 vote to make a monthly payment of \$420 to defray losses Claborn said he was incurring. The city of Friona had earlier agreed to pay \$200 monthly, and Bovina had indicated it would pay \$100.

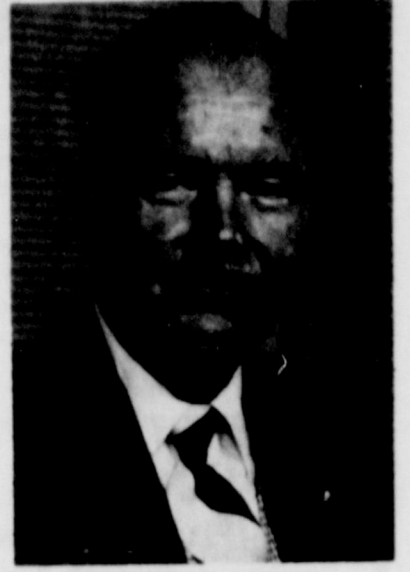
Since settling in Amarillo, Hoffman has performed numerous times as soloist with the Amarillo, Lubbock and Houston Symphonies.
