Community Choir, Band Set

SEVERAL PEOPLE with whom we have talked have expressed their objection to the prospects we mentioned last week, of having Parmer County aligned with those counties down the western boundary of the state in a new state representative's district.

This proposed alignment places Parmer County at the northernmost point of the district, which would stretch to Andrews and Gaines counties to the south.

If you are opposed to this proposal, it would be well for you to write or contact Representative Bill Clayton, asking him to make an effort to get Parmer County in a more contiguous district.

Most of the other former counties in the 74th District have been placed at this point in Pete Laney's district. Parmer County definitely has more in common with Lamb, Bailey and Hale counties than it ever will have with Gaines and Andrews.

We realize that re-districting is a job that cannot please every voter and every county. This is one reason the matter had to be carried over to a special session of the Texas legislature.

But by the same token, given more time the legislature can, if it will, consider as many of these regional problems as possible, and correct as many as they can.

For one thing, the travel which would be necessary for the proposed 81st District would be prohibitive, during a campaign, or while making routine contact in the district. Would you run for state representative if you knew you would have to make campaign trips to Seminole and Andrews? This proposed alignment would make Morton or Plains the "center" of the district, a most unusual "hub" for a district in this region.

Let your voice be heard in this matter, before it is too late. Whatever the legislature approves during the special session will be the boundaries we'll have to live with for the next ten years.

We have objected in the past to far-flung district alignments for UIL purposes; but this matter is far more serious to all concerned.

DON'T LOOK NOW, but one of our Texas teams in the major leagues is in first place in its division.

The first two months of the baseball season has produced a number of surprises. The Houston Astros, winners of the National League's western division last year, are in third place, seven games behind the Los Angeles Dodgers. This may be too much ground for the light-hitting Astros to make up, even though the season still has four months to go.

But, lo and behold, the Texas Rangers have been playing excellent baseball in the early season, and as of Monday night, moved into first place in their division.

And the Rangers, up to this point, have gotten both good pitching and hitting, something they have had trouble getting to "jive" in recent years, and at the present time they are playing the best baseball of any team in their division.

We hesitate to jump on the Rangers' band wagon too quickly, because historically they have been better "starters" than they are "finishers."

Don Edwin Lewis, or Del Lewis, has been once again chosen as director of the workshops this summer. Del is a graduate of Friona High School and attended Midwestern University in Wichita Falls where he received a bachelor's degree.

He served in the U.S. Army for two years and then went to New York to work with the U.S.O. While in New York, Del attended Columbia University and took acting classes. He also appeared in a few Broadway musicals.

The Friona native then went to the University of Wisconsin, where he took his master of fine arts. He was associated with East North Carolina University and was with the university's drama department there. Later he was guest director of a play there.

Weather Heats Up; More Rain Received

Residents of the Friona area got a taste of summer during the past week, with the mercury climbing to 100 degrees or better on three days.

But, a late thunderstorm on Thursday dropped a nice shower on the area, cooling things down a bit, and bringing much-needed moisture.

Monday's high temperature in Friona was 103 degrees, and Tuesday's high reached 105. After a brief respite on Wednesday, when a weak weather "trough" cooled things off considerably (the high reached 90 degrees), the mercury again climbed to 100 degrees Thursday afternoon.

The thunderstorm Thursday night came from an unusual direction, if you get rain--the north and northwest. The rain started at about 10:30 p.m., and was accompanied by an impressive electrical storm and booming thunder.

The official measurement in Friona from the thundershower was .73 inch of moisture, but farmers in the outlying area reported from an inch up to 1.5 inch of rain.

West of town, Ted White and Ralph Shelton reported an inch of rain. Northwest toward the Bootleg area, Hoyt Smith said he received 1.5 inches--the second good rain in eight days for the dryland area.

Other reports heard early Friday included an inch for W.M. Massie, just north of town, and

1.3 inches for Floyd Reeve, southeast of Friona. E.G. Phipps said he received over an inch. Jackie Stowers reported an inch of rain.

Tommy Edwards, who lives northwest of town (two miles west of Adobe Corner), reported two inches of rain, with some light hail, and Don Fortenberry was said to have received 2.4 inches of moisture in the Rhea Community, so apparently the rain was considerably heavier to the north and west of Friona.

Wheat farmers were on the verge of cutting their wheat, with a few loads (mostly dryland) having been harvested earlier in the week. The rain will delay this somewhat, but as the crop already was dry enough to cut, the delay probably won't be long.

The 100-degree weather earlier in the week had pretty well prepared the wheat for harvest in most instances.

The area's corn and other row crops welcomed the latest rain. The recent hot days had caused the young corn to curl somewhat, and the inch of rain should give it a boost.

And, coming as it did just eight days after the good rain of the previous week, city residents welcomed the moisture for their lawns and gardens--and city officials breathed a sigh of relief to have this help for the city's water supply.

New Gift Store Opens Monday

Mrs. James (Sue) Procter has been named manager of the new Western Gift Store in Friona.

Hours of the new store are 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Friday, and 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. Saturdays.

D.L.'s Venture Foods is now giving the new stamps (effective Monday, June 15). Other local merchants are expected to announce their participation in the stamp program in the near future.

"There is a certain advantage in being able to redeem your stamps locally, especially in the convenience factor," states D.L. Harguess, owner of D.L.'s Venture Foods. "Also, the

new gift store will be an addition to Friona's downtown shopping area, and will add to the local economy," Harguess said.

In addition, Harguess said that since the stamp company is owned by stockholders in Affiliated Foods, any profits made by the stamps will be pumped back into the grocery chain, and would be reflected by lower grocery prices.

As a promotion for the new stamps, D.L.'s will be giving double stamps all during this coming week.

"We will also continue to have Gunn Brothers stamps for awhile, to allow shoppers to finish filling the books on which they are working," Harguess said.

SPSC Offers Shares Of Common Stock

Southwestern Public Service Company announced that it is offering 2,919,036 shares of common stock for subscription by stockholders at the subscription price of \$10.95 per share, on the basis of one share for each 10 shares held on the record date on June 4, 1981.

The offering, which will expire at 5 p.m., Dallas local time, on Wednesday, June 24, 1981, carries the privilege to subscribe, to the extent available for additional shares. One right is being issued with respect to each share of common stock outstanding on the record date, and 10 rights are required to subscribe for one share of additional common stock.

The offering is being underwritten

by a group managed by Dillon, Read & Co. Inc. which will purchase any unsubscribed portion and reoffer those shares to the public.

Net proceeds from the sale of the common stock will be used by the Company to pay outstanding short-term debts incurred primarily in connection with its construction program.

Southwestern Public Service Company, headquartered in Amarillo, Texas, supplies electricity in portions of Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Kansas. Over 99 per cent of its operating revenues were derived from electric service during the 12 months ended April 30, 1981. Its electric properties comprise an interconnected system.

FCIC Seeks Comment On Barley Crop Rules

The Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC) of the Department of Agriculture is seeking public comment on a proposed amendment to regulations for insuring barley in Parmer County, effective with the 1982 crop year.

The current regulations include cancellation and termination dates for spring-seeded barley only. This amendment would benefit barley growers by changing these dates to permit the insuring of fall-seeded barley also.

10 YEARS AGO--JUNE 17, 1971

Missouri Beef Packers was probably the hardest-hit single concern in last Friday's "big blow," which caused damage locally that will probably top \$500,000. The packing plant, three miles southwest of town, sustained heavy damage to the roof of its building, which in turn caused water leakage and a loss of insulation, making it hard to maintain the temperature constant in the new fabricating portion of the plant. Damage will top \$50,000 at MBP, according to manager Dave LaFleur. Other businesses sustaining heavy losses included Friona Wheat Growers, which had a grain dryer completely destroyed. Friona Motors had extensive damage to its roof, and some new cars were affected. Rockwell Brothers Lumber Company lost 72 feet of roofing on one of its warehouse buildings. The municipal swimming pool had its roof partially

torn off, and some damage to the building structure. Six trailer homes were damaged, one of which was picked up and tossed about 20 feet, landing on its top and being crushed.

5 YEARS AGO--JUNE 13, 1976

Work has begun this week on the cemetery road which is in the process of being paved.

The Friona City Council held their regular meeting June 7, at the City Hall. Among the many items under discussion was a name for the new Friona Nursing Home. Percy Parsons and the Board of Directors submitted the name "Prairie Acres." The Council accepted the name after some discussion.

Survivors include two sons, Haywood of Friona and Odell of Waxahachie; one daughter, Mrs. Dorothy Rolen of Stratford; two sisters, Mrs. Opal DeHart of Athens, Texas and Mrs. Cora May Hutson of Dallas; and one brother, Theo.

ASCS Tells Deadline For Reports

The Parmer County ASCS offices announce that if your crop gets hailed out, or is low in production and you are interested in a low yield payment, you will need to observe the following guidelines in order to file.

First of all, if you have a wheat crop, but it does not make 60 per cent of the expected production, you may file a low yield application within 15 days of harvest, however, this must be before the crop residue is destroyed.

Also, if you have planted cotton, and are hailed out, certify your planted acreage and file a low yield application before making other use of the land and wait for an appeal.

Corn and grain sorghum procedures should be followed the same as the procedures for application for cotton, except the replacement date is June 20.

It was announced by Prentice Mills, County Executive Director, that applications may be made anytime now, if summer crops are to be measured. Applications will be taken through July 15, 1981.

Also, applications for cotton prevented planting will be accepted from June 1 through June 15. Applications for grain sorghum prevented planting will be accepted from June 20 through July 6, 1981.

Eligibility for participation in all programs administered by the ASCS is established under the law without regard for race, religion, sex, national origin or handicap.

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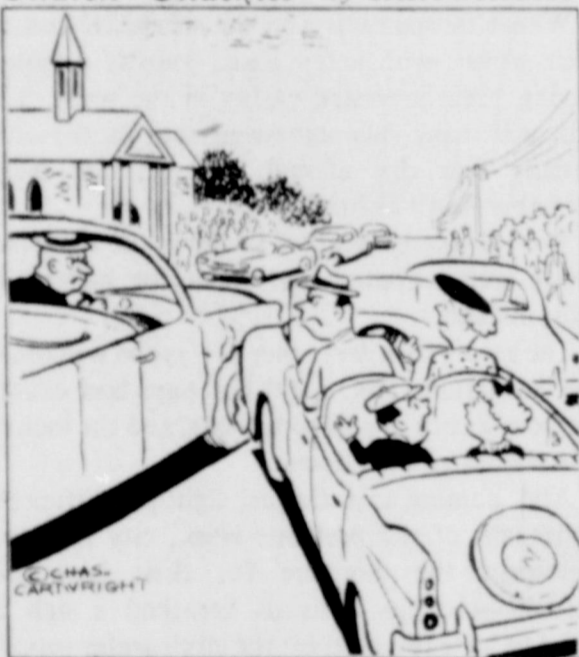

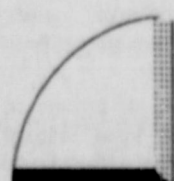

Library Association Asks Public Support

Why should Texans be starving their public libraries?

This question is being asked by Books for Texans, an organization formed by Texas Library Association, Friends of Texas Libraries, Texans for Libraries, and the Trustees Roundtable of the Texas Library Association.

Leaders in Books for Texans are convinced that Texans will do something about the starvation diet for their libraries when they know the facts and reflect on just how important libraries are to citizens of Texas.

Texas now ranks 39th in the U.S. in state library support with 16¢ per

capita. Largest per capita state aid is paid by West Virginia at \$3.61, followed by Georgia at \$2.47. Even states poorer than Texas pay significantly more in aid to their libraries. Alabama's state aid is 42¢ per capita; Arkansas 63¢ and Mississippi 53¢.

As long ago as 1978, the Texas Conference of Libraries and Information convened in Austin to study library problems, recommended state support of \$1.00 per capita and urged the Texas Library and Archives Commission and the Texas Library Association to go to work to seek \$1.00 per capita funding "at the earliest possible date."

Wendell Mayes, Jr., Austin, and Wayne C. Sellers, Palestine, chairman and secretary of Books for Texans, have noted that an appropriation of \$1.00 per capita which can do so much for libraries is minuscule when compared to the total state budget.

"We can think of no appropriation which can do so much for so little," they said, pointing out that in 1979 Texas public libraries circulated 43 million items to the public, answered 7½ million reference questions, hosted 3 million persons at library programs and showed films to 5 million persons.

"In many communities, public libraries are the only adult education facilities. Information ranging from performance of the stock market to how to unstop a sink or fix a lawnmower is available for grownups. One library has made it possible for 300 adults to obtain G.E.D. certificates. Others have conducted classes for adults wanting to learn to read and write. Books are provided for nursing homes by public libraries. These are but a few of the services rendered," the Books for Texans officials added.

Texas Daily Newspaper Association and the Texas Press Association, representing virtually all of the newspapers in Texas, have passed resolutions favoring the \$1.00 per capita support. Texas League of Municipalities has also endorsed the request.

Prospects are bright for reaching the goal set by the Austin conference back in 1978, Books for Texans officials added.

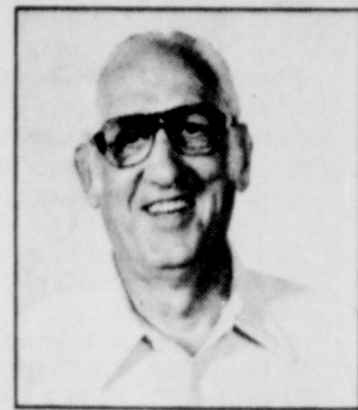

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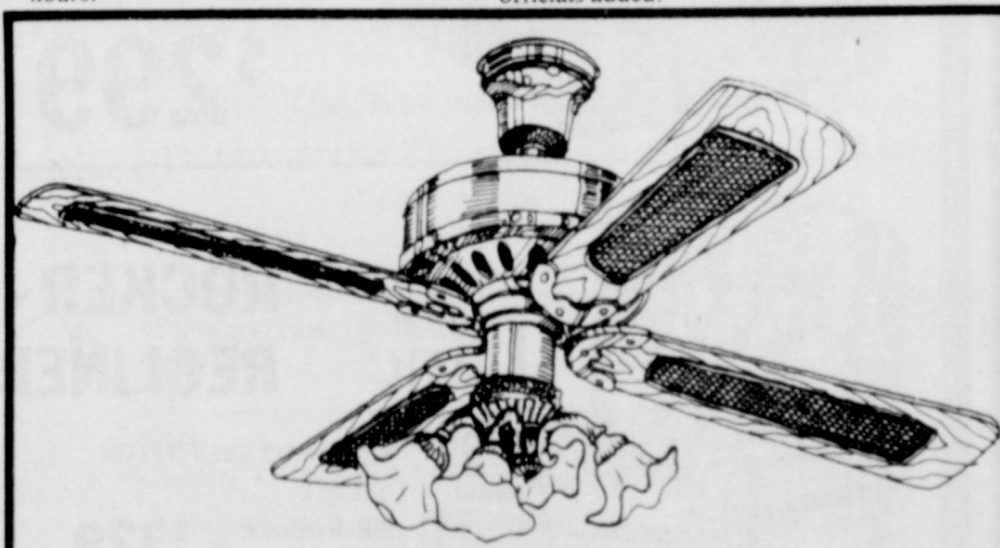

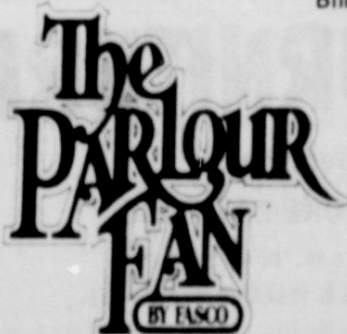

Parmer County Has Clear Health Record

Parmer County is one of 41 counties in West Texas with a unique record: it has no herd under quarantine for brucellosis, records from the Texas Animal Health Commission reveal.

Brucellosis is a highly contagious disease of livestock. It centers in the reproductive organs and causes abortions, weakened calves, sterility, and partial loss of milk production. A cooperative federal-state program is in effect to control and eventually eradicate this disease.

"Producers in this county are to be commended for their efforts in controlling brucellosis. We are making progress throughout the state in our program, but cowmen in this

county have already achieved the goal of no herds under brucellosis quarantine.

"We would encourage producers to redouble their dedication so that this county can continue with no herds under quarantine," Dr. John Holcombe, executive director, TAHC, Austin, said.

Other features of the Texas plan for brucellosis control include increased surveillance, improved laboratory system, certified free herd, and producer participation.

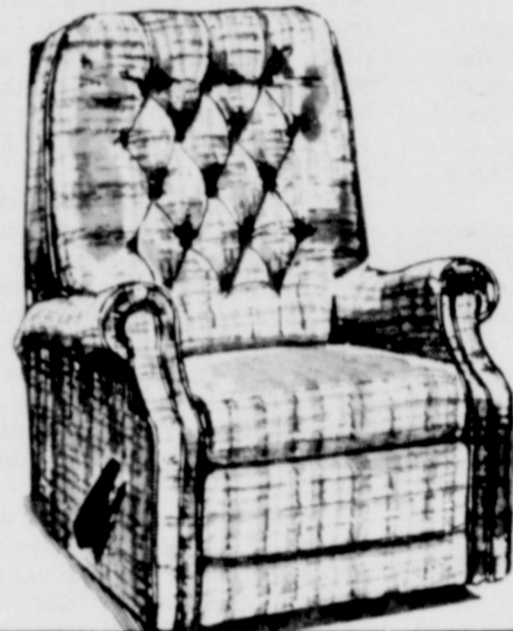

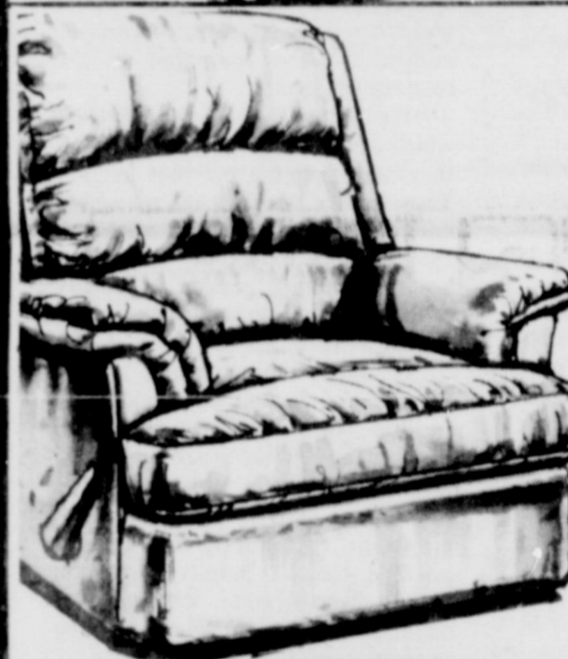

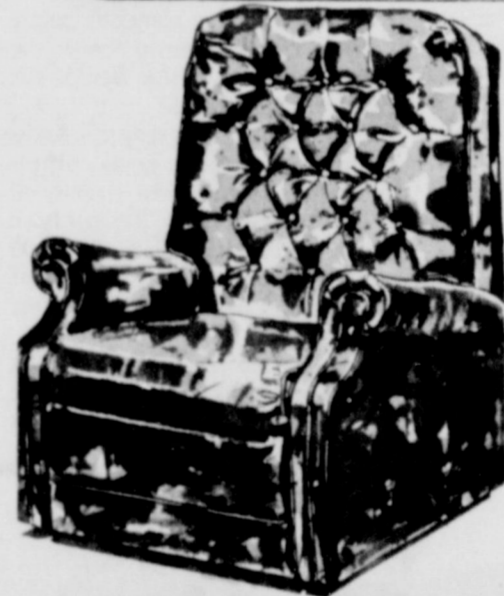

"The biggest drawback to getting old is being unable to accomplish the things you'd like to do," observed Jim Shaffer as he and his wife of more than 61 years were being interviewed Tuesday afternoon.

For this energetic farmer and livestock grower having to adjust to a different lifestyle has been very difficult.

He went on to say, "For many many years I got up early, fed the hogs, cattle and horses and did other routine chores before beginning my field work and thought I had to be in the field by the time any of my neighbors were."

Jim, one of a family of nine, was born in Butler County, Kansas. His father filed on land in Beaver County, Oklahoma, and the family moved down there when Jim was very young.

Corinne Simmons was born at Lockhart, Texas. She also moved to Beaver County, Oklahoma, with her parents when she was very young. She had one sister and four brothers.

Jim and Corinne grew up in the same community and were married January 20, 1918.

For the next eleven years they farmed near their families. During this time three daughters were born to them.

Their first baby died a few days after her birth.

In 1928 Jim had started using a tractor to farm with instead of horses and mules and began looking around for a place to move where he could have more land to farm.

That year he and Corinne and their two small daughters, Valoris and Ouida, moved from Beaver County

to the farm on which Missouri Beef Packers is now located.

"I brought one team of horses with me to Texas," Jim remembered. He added, "I just used them mostly for feeding cattle, but did some other odd jobs around the place with them."

Nine years later the Shaffers bought a farm about three miles southeast of Friona, which they still own. In 1958 they went into semi-retirement, built a new home and moved to 1301 Pierce.

After the couple moved to Friona, another daughter, Ruby, was born to them. Valoris, Ouida and Ruby are all graduates of Friona High School. They also have four grandchildren, Karen and Joel Osborn and Jim Bob and Joe Bill Jones, who are Friona High School graduates.

Jim was interested in the betterment of the schools in the communities in which he lived and served on the board of directors of Friona Independent School District several years.

He also served as the Precinct 4 representative on the Parmer County School board for thirty-one years. During this time many of the smaller schools in the county were consolidated with other schools.

He said, "The board has been abolished now, but for a number of years members of it burned a lot of midnight oil taking care of the problems of consolidation."

Corinne said, "There was a time when I was busy from morning until night with taking care of the children, chickens, milk, butter and eggs and a garden. I also sewed for me and the girls and made many things for our home."

"But," she added, "all that has changed and now I don't spend much time cooking or keeping house, so I have a lot of time for crocheting and making quilts."

She has made quilts for each of her daughters and each of her grandchildren. Recently she started on a project of crocheting an afghan for each of them.

At the present time the Shaffers have only one daughter and son-in-law living here. Valoris and Ernest Osborn have lived here many years. She teaches homemaking in Friona

High School and he farms.

Ouida Jones recently moved to Lubbock, where she is employed by Southwestern Public Service Company.

Her sons, Jim Bob and his wife, Kathy; and Joe Bill and his wife, the former Holly Welch of Friona, and their daughter, Blaire, also live in Lubbock.

They also have just one granddaughter, Karen Osborn Renner, living here. She and her husband, Gary, and their children, Jana, Krista, Amy and Casey, live on a farm southeast of town.

The Osborn's son, Joel, who is a medical doctor, and his wife, the former Carlene Greeson, and their children are in the process of moving

from Jackson, Mississippi to Amarillo at the present time.

Ruby Shaffer Bainum and her son, Mike, live in San Antonio. Her two daughters, Lori and Lisa, are college students. Lori is in Virginia and Lisa is in Lubbock.

Jim and Corinne are long time members of Friona United Methodist Church and support it and its activities.

Neither of them have very good health, so are unable to do many of the things they enjoyed doing for many years.

Jim concluded the interview by saying, "I still do some yard work, but surely do miss being able to make things in my shop and do the things I would like to have done."

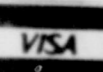

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GSPA Needs Farmer List

Mabry Foreman, president of the National Grain Sorghum Producers Association (GSPA) has announced an intensive farmer-to-farmer effort to reach and enlist every sorghum farmer in the nation.

Foreman, an Oklahoma farmer and rancher, said it is essential that sorghum growers be represented in Washington, D.C. as feed grains provisions of the 1981 Farm Bill are written. "Never before, has it been so important for farmers to speak up," Foreman said. "Never before, has it been so necessary for them to combine their voices in unity to reach their common goals. The economic and political mood of the nation demands it."

"GSPA has operated for more than 25 years on a very small budget," Foreman continued, "but it has been acclaimed as one of the most successful and effective farm organizations. In 25 years, the organization has added BILLIONS of dollars to sorghum farmers' incomes—\$250 million, in last year alone. Every sorghum farmer in the nation has shared in these benefits, and the time has come that we must have their support to continue to work."

Foreman said every member of Grain Sorghum Producers Association will be asked to contact other sorghum farmers in his community, tell them about GSPA's work and ask them to help him keep it going. The success of GSPA's work is directly related to the participation of farmers. "We expect this to be a landmark year in farm legislation, especially for feed grains. Export market development may be even more important," Foreman said. "We simply must not let sorghum farmers be ignored because they were not represented."

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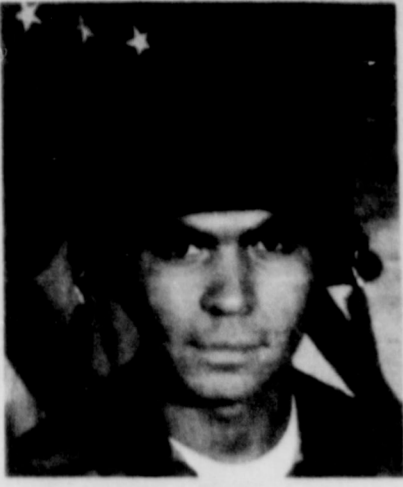

Around The House

The garden is planted and if hail, drought, and insects don't ruin it, you'll be putting the fruits and vegetables of your labor up for the winter. Since the dawn of history, homemakers have searched for ways to preserve the families food supply to eat at a later date when the elements made food scarce. Today's homemaker needs to simply follow the directions to be assured high quality home preserved food. Novice or pro, we have help for you at the Extension office. Call (481-3619) or come by--I'd be glad to help you!

Proper equipment for home canning is an absolute necessity. One of the major reasons for spoilage of home-canned foods is faulty or improper equipment. Check your equipment now, so when the time comes for using it, you'll be ready. Thrifty homemakers sometimes use mayonnaise, peanut butter or other commercial jars in an effort to save money. NEVER do this! These jars are not tempered to withstand the heat treatment and may not seal properly in home canning. Check standard canning jars for cracks, chips and dents. Discard those with defects that would prevent an airtight seal. A two-piece, self-seal lid is used for home canning. It has a metal disc and a metal ring and is self-sealing as the jar cools after processing. The disc can only be used once, but the ring may be used again if it is not rusted or dented. Next week, I'll discuss the water-bath canner and the pressure canner.

Sales for the first month period totaled \$2,735 for three per cent of the 1981 goal of \$85,000.

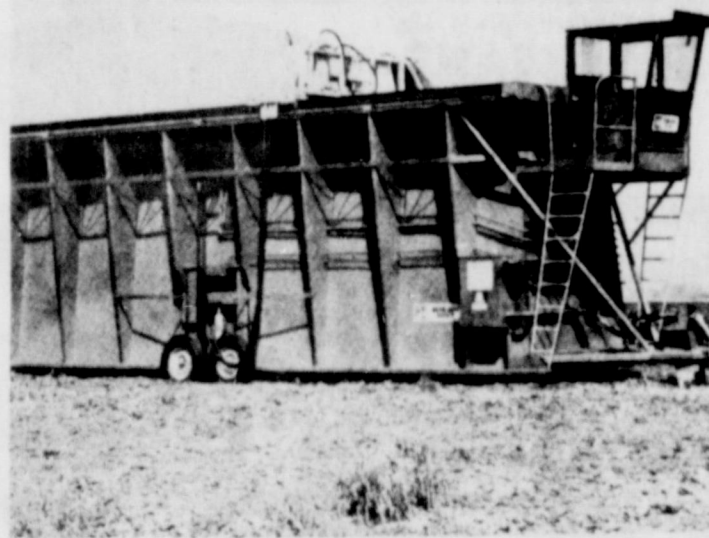

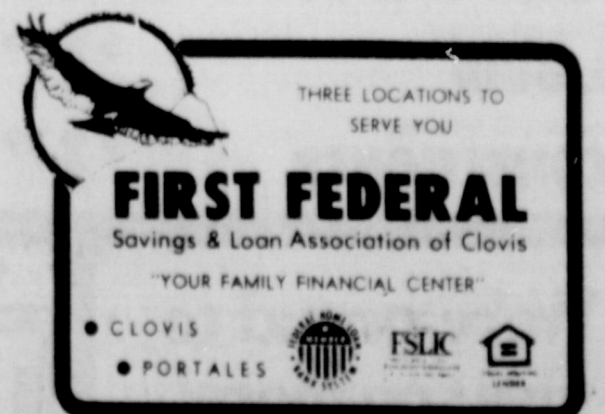
