We were glad to see the president respond to the strike by starting the procedure to fire the strikers. As federal employees, they had signed an oath not to strike. The government also has hit the union, Patco, with tremendous fines since the strike started. There should be some way to pay these fines to the airlines which are affected.

The thing we're afraid of, and are praying will not happen, would be a major accident, which might be caused by the people who are being pressed into service by the strike. The controllers are not only messing up the country; they are gambling with thousands of lives as well.

It's about time that the residents of our nation realize that strikes never really solve anything.

A good case in point is the strike this summer by the major league baseball players. Spokesmen for both sides in the strike admit that neither side won-not the players, and certainly not the owners.

And the bad thing is that the public, the baseball fans, were deprived of their sport for the summer, and most of them are saying that when play resumes, that they (the fans) will be the ones on strike.

So, it appears that professional baseball, which was fighting pro football for the attention of fans spending their bucks entertainment, may have shoved itself backwards and have a long, uphill fight on its hands.

## Group To **Tennessee** Via Cycle

"We're planning to do something a little different from the ordinary," admitted Leland Gustin of Friona

Gustin and his wife Geneva, along with Roy and Paula O'Brian, left Friona early Friday morning for a trip to Nashville, Tennessee, and back.

The thing that makes their trip different from other folks is that they are going by motorcycle--complete with camping gear.

"We're going to start out by camping out, at least. A Holiday Inn may start to look pretty good before we're through," Gustin laughs.

The Friona area foursome planned to make it as far as Oklahoma City to spend their first night. At Eureka Springs, Arkansas, they plan to stay with former Friona residents Charles and Pat Bass, and to attend the Passion Play.

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This proposed improvement will consist of the construction of two additional lanes to form a four-lane divided facility with the exception of those sections through the towns of Bovina and Friona which have recently been reconstructed.

Maps and other drawings showing the proposed location and geometric design will be displayed at the public meeting and together with environmental studies and any other available information about the proposed project are on file and available for inspection and copying at the Resident Engineer's Office in Littlefield, Texas.

Personnel from the State Department of Highway and Public Transportation will be in attendance at this meeting to answer questions and give information concerning the design, the State's Relocation Assistance Program and right of way acquisition.

All interested citizens are invited to attend this public meeting.

Rhea Bradley of the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation, points out that a consulting engineer for the department will present three basic proposals at the meeting: (1) do

nothing; (2) improve the existing highway and (3) construct a new fourlane divided highway.

Bradley has said that he believes this section of Highway 60 carries the heaviest concentration of truck traffic in the entire state, due to the concentration of feed yards and packing plants in the area.

Since the need for a four-lane facility on Highway 60 has long been underscored by local residents, it behooves all elected local and civic officials, as well as the general public, to attend this meeting, to voice their interest in the project.

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Deadline for signing up for the tournament will be August 20, according to Chris Fontanilla, Friona Country Club pro.

## LONGTIME COUNTY SHERIFF

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Funeral services for longtime Parmer County Sheriff Charles B. Lovelace, 71, were conducted Friday, August 7 in Farwell.

Lovelace died at 10:55 a.m. Wednesday at Parmer County Community Hospital following a short illness.

Services were conducted at the Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church in Farwell, with Rev. W.T. Perry of Crane and Rev. J.L. Bass of Bovina officiating. Burial was in Sunset Terrace

Memorial Cemetery in Farwell, under the direction of Parsons-Ellis Funeral Home. Lovelace was born October 25,

1909 in Vernon. His parents moved to this area, settling in Bailey County in 1920. He was reared on a farm four miles south of Muleshoe. On May 27, 1939, Lovelace

married Alice Margaret Guyer. She preceded him in death in April 1975. He married Frances Treider in Lazbuddie March 5, 1977.

In 1948, Lovelace was elected to the position of county sheriff and tax assessor-collector, and held that position for a number of terms, until the sheriff's and tax position were split, in 1958.

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In an interview at the time he retired, Lovelace pointed out that when he first was elected as sheriff, he had only one deputy, at Friona, and no radios. When he retired, he had deputies at Friona, Bovina and Farwell, five dispatchers who worked around the clock, and several radios.

Lovelace was a member of the Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church. He was a 32nd degree Mason, and also was a member of the Scottish Rite.

Lovelace also was a member of the Sheriffs Association of Texas, the National Sheriff's Association and the United Peace Officers Assn.

The Parmer County jail, under Sheriff Lovelace's supervision, was one of the first in the Panhandle to earn state certification. He was named "Man of the Year" for 1980 by the Farwell Chamber of Commerce.

# Law Enforcement, **Emergency Reports**

We realize that statistics are boring and most of the time they are not too interesting or informative. But, we hope that each of you takes the time to look over these statistics, because otherwise, you might become a

No one can make you a better driver other than you.

As grim as they are, Department of Public Safety statistics show that seven per cent more Texas residents died in traffic accidents for this period of time than they did last year.

Through June 1981, 1,718 traffic fatalities were reported. Last year at the same time there were 1,605 deaths attributed to traffic mishaps.

This year, to date, there have been 80,126 injuries reported in traffic accidents in the State, and last year at the same time there were 73,202 injuries reported, which is an increase this year of nine per cent.

Over 27,000 accidents involving motor vehicles in traffic were reported, and 142 of these were fatal. Over 7,400 persons were injured in those accidents and 19,603 escaped

On U.S. and State Highways, there were 10,987 accidents reported with

# Library Award Is Presented

The Texas State Library and the Texas Library Association have received a John Cotton Dana Library Public Relations Award for their 1980 campaign to encourage Texans to use their libraries.

"A lot of things to a lot of people. Check us Out" was the message of television spots, radio scripts, newspaper ads and artwork for bookmarks, bumper stickers, lapel buttons and bus cards. The campaign was a joint project of the Texas State Library and the Texas Library Association's Ad Hoc Committee on Public Relations and the Public Relations Advisory Council.

The Texas project was one of four year-long projects from throughout the United States in the top category. An additional 21 libraries were also recognized for projects completed during 1980. The contest is sponsored by the Public Relations Section of the American Library Association's Administration and Management Association and the H.W. Wilson Company, a publisher of materials for libraries. The award is named in honor of John Cotton Dana, the long-time librarian at Newark, New Jersey, who did much to stimulate the use of library

144 of these severe enough to cause death and there were 3533 injuries

associated with those wrecks. On farm-to-market roads in the State, there were 2854 accidents reported with 52 of these fatal accidents and injuries which amounted to a total of 980.

On County Roads, so far this year, 18 persons have died and 572 were injured. There were 1,615 accidents reported occuring on these roads.

In cities under 2,500, 7,028 accidents occured with 184 of them fatal and 2,502 persons receiving injuries.

The largest number of accidents occured between the hours of 4 and 5 p.m. and on Friday.

More persons between the ages of 25-34 died as a result of accidents in this state and this more than doubled the number of teenaged drivers who were killed in accidents this year to

Nearly 10,000 persons who were involved in motor vehicle accidents were involved in accidents in which the automobile was entering at an

Of these types of accidents, 35 persons were killed and 2500 were injured.

The second highest occurence of accidents involved rear-ending, which accounted for about 1973, and the third highest incidences of accidents occured when one car was leaving the driveway and was hit by another car.

In 1981, more males died and were injured in traffic accidents than females. Some 40,000 men were involved in accidents where there were 19,000 females involved.

Most often, accidents occured on normal road conditions with no defects reported wrong with the vehicle and they happened most often on clear days on dry surfaces.

Most of the accidents involved a car and the second most accidents involved trucks with motorcycles coming in as third in this category.



Families of yesteryear can teach today's families how to cope--successfully--with today's economy.

Their "lessons" focus on cooperation, positive attitude and a bright look to the future.

History tells us that when

the economic conditions of a given population begin to deteriorate, family behavior changes to meet economic Many families return to

"extended system" because it becomes more difficult for individual family members to maintain separate households. This means other family

members come to live with 'Mom and Dad and the kids. Aunt Suzy may come to

share housekeeping and child-care responsibilities in return for lodging, or Cousin Bill may join the family while he attends the local university, or a grandparent may come to stay during the winter months to avoid the high cost of heating a separate dwelling.

Not only do family members tend to "pull together" during times of economic hardship, so, too, do friends and communities. In fact, it's not unusual for

non-family members to become part of one's family. During the "depression

era" single individuals would "hire on" to a family. They would help with the field work, gardening and other household tasks in return for room and board and

sometimes a nominal wage. Because these individuals lived with the family, they often became unofficial "adopted" family members.

In addition to the creation of "extended families," hard times often create "extended communities."

scarce, it becomes more difficult individuals who can provide services needed by the community. So community members form their own committees, task forces and work teams to do the work-road repairs, traffic control for special events, roadside mowing, maintenance of community buildings and local child care, for example.

Examples given today's families by yesteryear families who managed well in times of economic decline should give us faith and confidence in ourselves and our families.

The heritage of our earlier families has already proven that a poor economy need not be our downfall.

A positive attitude and a bright look to the future--the coping tools of yesteryear families--are still the most valid tools for coping with hard times today.

## Friona School **Nurse Completes Training Course**

Tommie R. Mercer, a school nurse from Friona, has completed a summer training course at Baylor College of Medicine on assessing health care needs of migrant children.

Children from migrant farm worker families often have multiple medical problems complicated by poverty and poor health habits, said Dr. Robert Roush, director of Baylor's Center for Allied Health Professions.

Because the school nurse may be the only health professional these children routinely see, it's vital for the nurse to be well-schooled in recognizing physical and mental abnormalities, Roush said. Other important aspects of the nurse's job are making necessary referrals to physicians or agencies, and following up on each child's progress.

Classes covering topics such as dental problems, bone and muscle cardiovascular abnormalities, child abuse and chest, lung and skin diseases, were taught by Baylor faculty from the Department of Community Medicine.

The project was funded through the Texas Education Agency, which contracted with Pan American University in Edinburg, to enhance the delivery of health care to migrant students. Pan American subsequently contract with Baylor College of Medicine to conduct and evaluate the program.
