LONGTIME RESIDENTS cannot recall a time when the weather was more agreeable for this time of the year.

By this time a year ago, the area had experienced a couple of good-sized snowfalls, accompanied by cold spells, which caused you to have to bundle up when you went outside, and fairly curtailed outside activity for a time.

The cotton farmers are glad that the weather this time around is unseasonably warm, because they needed the late-season break in order to get their cotton harvested.

Maturing of the cotton crop was delayed earlier in the fall by rains which caused prolonged growth. This caused the harvest of the cotton crop to be later than usual.

Having "Indian Summer" run into December is nice for shoppers, who are well into the Christmas shopping procedure. But for some of us, who are prone to put off Christmas shopping anyway, the summerlike weather just makes it worse. It's hard to think of jingle bells when the temperature outside is 75 degrees.

We may have to pay for this warm weather later when winter arrives, but for the present, we will just enjoy it as long as we can.

THE USE OF MODULE builders during the cotton harvest has made for quite a change in the harvest of this crop. It is quite a sight to drive around the countryside and see the cotton modules in the field. They look like "cotton boxcars," all parked neatly in rows.

The modules have a number of advantages, foremost of which is allowing the farmer to get his cotton harvested and out of the field. At one time, the farmer was at the mercy of the gins, and had to wait on trailers during their busy season.

Especially this year, with the late crop, it would be a maddening situation to be waiting for trailers, with all of the sunny weather, with the realization that the pretty weather can't go on forever, and our first big snow cannot be too far away.

Other advantages of building the cotton modules include the fact that the cotton is tightly packed, and is not as susceptible to rain or snow as, for example, a harvested trailer load of cotton.

Ginning the modules cuts down on work at the gin, since each module contains eight to ten bales of cotton. This also reduces trips to and from the gin.

One ginner told us the other day that with all of the advancements being made, he would not be surprised if someday there might be a machine which would go into the cotton fields, strip and gin the cotton, and kick out the completed bales, much like bales of hay are produced today.

This type of machinery is not a threat to cotton gins within the next generation or so, and considering what such a machine would cost, may not ever come about.

But it's an intriguing idea.

New Laws Underscored As Season Kicks Off

The pheasant season begins Saturday morning, December 12, 30 minutes before sunrise.

Around 10,000 hunters are expected in Parmer, Deaf Smith and Castro counties, which are among the most popular spots for hunters on the first weekend of the season.

Reason for this popularity is that the prospect for success in the "Magic Triangle" is usually good, and this year should be no different.

Several reports have indicated that there are just as many, if not more, pheasants in the local area this year than in any recent year.

Hunters this year are warned about new, tougher laws in regard to pheasant hunting, and put on notice that the laws will be enforced.

Chuck Cosper, Texas Parks & Wildlife Game Warden from Hereford, says "We will have ten or twelve extra game wardens here from the Amarillo District, checking for violators."

Cosper said that last weekend, when the pheasant season opened in New Mexico, the TPWD had six men and an airplane near the state line, looking for violators, and they caught 66 hunters across the state line.

An Amarillo hunter was fined \$500 after he was caught near Hereford

last Sunday with a couple of pheasants in his possession. The hunter was also trespassing on private property.

Those hunting on land which is posted, and have on their person a deadly weapon may be guilty of a Class A misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of up to \$2,000 and a year in jail.

Cosper says that violations have not been heavy in the past, and that only a few flagrant violations are noted each year. "Usually we find hunters who have fully dressed out a bird, not leaving the head and feet intact," the warden said.

Other violations include not hunting with a valid license, having more birds in possession than the legal limit, possession of a hen, and hunting from a county road or using illegal devices.

"We take nearly 100 per cent of our cases to the justice of the peace," Cosper said. "The fine for these violations can be up to \$200 each, and each bird is considered a separate offense."

Cosper pointed out that hunting from a vehicle is permitted as long as it is done on private property, and no device aimed at flushing the birds

from hiding by dragging it behind the vehicle is used.

"It is illegal at all times to hunt from a county road," he added. "And, the legal description of a road is fifty feet either side of the center."

While violators on roads are watched for Cosper says that he "usually won't bother someone who is alongside a bar ditch as long as it is on the side toward a field."

The legal limit for pheasant hunters is two cocks per day, with a limit of four in possession following the first day of the season. Shooting hours remain from 30 minutes before sunrise to 30 minutes after sunset each day of the 16-day season which ends Sunday, December 27.

He sent a warning to out-of-state hunters, too. "It is very important for hunters to leave the head and feet intact on the birds so a warden can tell the sex of the bird," Cosper said. "It would be a shame for them to pay for a license, get caught on a violation and fined, and then have the birds confiscated as well."

The out-of-state license for hunting is \$37.75, and it is valid until next August 31. Texas hunters must have a resident hunting license (which costs \$5.25) except for those who are hunting in the county of their residence, where no license is needed.

Friona Flashbacks

50 YEARS AGO--DEC. 11, 1931

Friona has been in need of refuge for the unwary violator of the public peace, and owing to the fact that the city treasury has been depleted to the extent that no funds were available for the purpose, enough funds have been donated by various citizens to purchase the cage. This cage has been delivered, but no building is available in which to house it.

45 YEARS AGO--DEC. 11, 1936

A very disastrous occurrence took place on the farm of I.W. Barnhouse about 16 miles southeast of Friona on Thanksgiving Day, November 26, wherein Mr. Barnhouse's entire feed crop was destroyed by fire. The crew had just finished threshing the crop from about 200 acres of sudan and the straw was piled in one immense stack, when it was noticed that the top of the stack was on fire. By the time the thresher could be moved, the entire stack was ablaze, and was completely destroyed.

40 YEARS AGO--DEC. 12, 1941

Their many friends in Friona have learned with regret the planned move of Rev. and Mrs. C. Carl Dollar to Lannett, Alabama, where he will be pastor of the Congregational-Christian Church. The Dollars have been most active both in church and civic work in Friona.

Little excitement greeted the declaration of war on Thursday against Germany and Italy, certainly not the stunned silence of Monday when the United States answered the Japanese challenge. The country is settling into a grim determination to back up what the president terms the greatest challenge ever made to life, liberty and civilization.

35 YEARS AGO--DEC. 6, 1946

The modern age of aerial warfare is playing havoc with the ancient art of hunting. Local Nimrods, scouring the Plains lakes for duck and geese, have been loud in their complaints since the opening of the season that a few airborne sportsmen are not only violating the game laws but spoiling the sport for other hunters. Reports say that light planes are being used not only to scout the lakes for duck and geese, but in some cases in an effort to herd the flocks to certain spots.

30 YEARS AGO--DEC. 6, 1951

G.B. (Pete) Buske still is confined to the Parmer County Community Hospital, suffering from severe lacerations and broken bones in all fingers of his right hand as incurred in a roping accident last Saturday. It is not known yet if Buske will lose some of the fingers.

25 YEARS AGO--DEC. 6, 1956

History turned a page last weekend, when the City of Friona occupied its new quarters in the just-completed city hall adjoining the fire station on Main Street. The shift from the Legion Hall, which has been the city's home for years, was accomplished without fanfare.

Also moving last week was the Ethridge-Spring Agency, which moved one door south to the former post office location which has been remodeled for them. Johnny Nazworth of Friona Shoe Shop moved into Ethridge's former location.

20 YEARS AGO--DEC. 7, 1961

Friona's farm skill demonstration teams brought home first place banners from the state competition in Huntsville Saturday. Both the junior and senior teams were judged best of the ten teams competing in each division. Members of the senior team were Charles Bass, Ranza Boggess, Earl Crow and Max Reeve. The junior team was composed of Don Collier, Jimmy Snead, Milton Hargus and Dennis Howell. J.C. Lane and David McVey are instructors.

10 YEARS AGO--DEC. 9, 1971

Tony Perea, former super-star for the Friona Chieftains, has had another banner year for the University of Texas at El Paso Miners. Tony made first team all conference for the Miners as a middle linebacker, and also was chosen honorable mention on the Associated Press' All-American team announced recently.

5 YEARS AGO--DEC. 12, 1976

Friona High School's Farm Radio team won the district and area leadership contests, and then placed second in the state finals. Members of the team are Jody Lewellen, Tom Schilling, Danny Hand and Mike Hill.

Five members have been selected to the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture's board of directors. Elected to serve two-year terms on the local board were Gayle Warren, Tom Jarboe, John R. Cook, Ronald Smiley and JeDon Gallman.

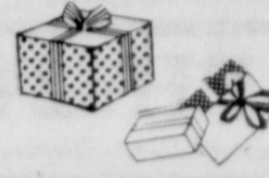

Literature of Christmas Enhances Enjoyment of the Holiday Season

Just as music and decorations add to the merriment of the holiday season, so the literature of Christmas enriches its meaning for all of us.

Fortunately for readers, Christmas has inspired many a wonderful poem or story.

Perhaps the most famous story of all is *A Christmas Carol* written by England's Charles Dickens in 1843. Is there anyone among us who has not been fascinated by Old Scrooge and his miserly ways . . . or been touched by the pathetic figure of Tiny Tim? This beloved tale has inspired plays, musicals and motion pictures, not to mention generations of readers!

English poets, too, have been inspired by the nativity or its celebration. Tennyson, Elizabeth Barrett Browning, and John Milton are among those whose poetry sings of the season.

Here in America, the most famous Christmas poem of all was written for the entertainment of some youngsters, the children of Dr. Clement Clarke Moore, a professor of divinity.

In this poem, entitled *The Visit of St. Nicholas*, Dr. Moore described the activities of Santa Claus on Christmas Eve and old Santa himself. Today, our

conception of Santa is derived to a great extent from his description: "His eyes, how they twinkled! his dimples, how merry! . . . He had a broad face and a little round belly, that shook when he laughed, like a bowl full of jelly." With such a delightful portrait, no wonder youngsters and adults alike took Dr. Moore's poem to heart.

Marmee's Girls

In her popular novel, *Little Women*, Louisa May Alcott gave us a charming glimpse of Christmas among impoverished but genteel society. The March girls—Jo, Amy, Beth and Meg—have pitiful funds, yet they conspire to shower their beloved "Marmee" with thoughtful little gifts: slippers, a hankie, cologne and gloves. She in turn, is only able to give each of her girls a small book. Yet, the reader basks in the warmth that these beloved characters evoke.

Denmark's Hans Christian Andersen has written several tales with Christmas themes and they are justifiably cherished in world literature. Who can forget the story of *The Little Match Girl* . . . or *The Little Fir Tree*? Each story has that ability to touch our heartstrings, no matter how often read.

In more modern times, another American, William Sidney Porter, was to pen a classic story that has come to epitomize the spirit of Christmas itself: *The Gift of the Magi*. Writing under the name of O. Henry, Porter told the bitter-sweet tale of a young couple, Della and Jim. Although lacking in material goods, they have an abundance of that most precious gift of all, the gift of love.

Famed Editorial

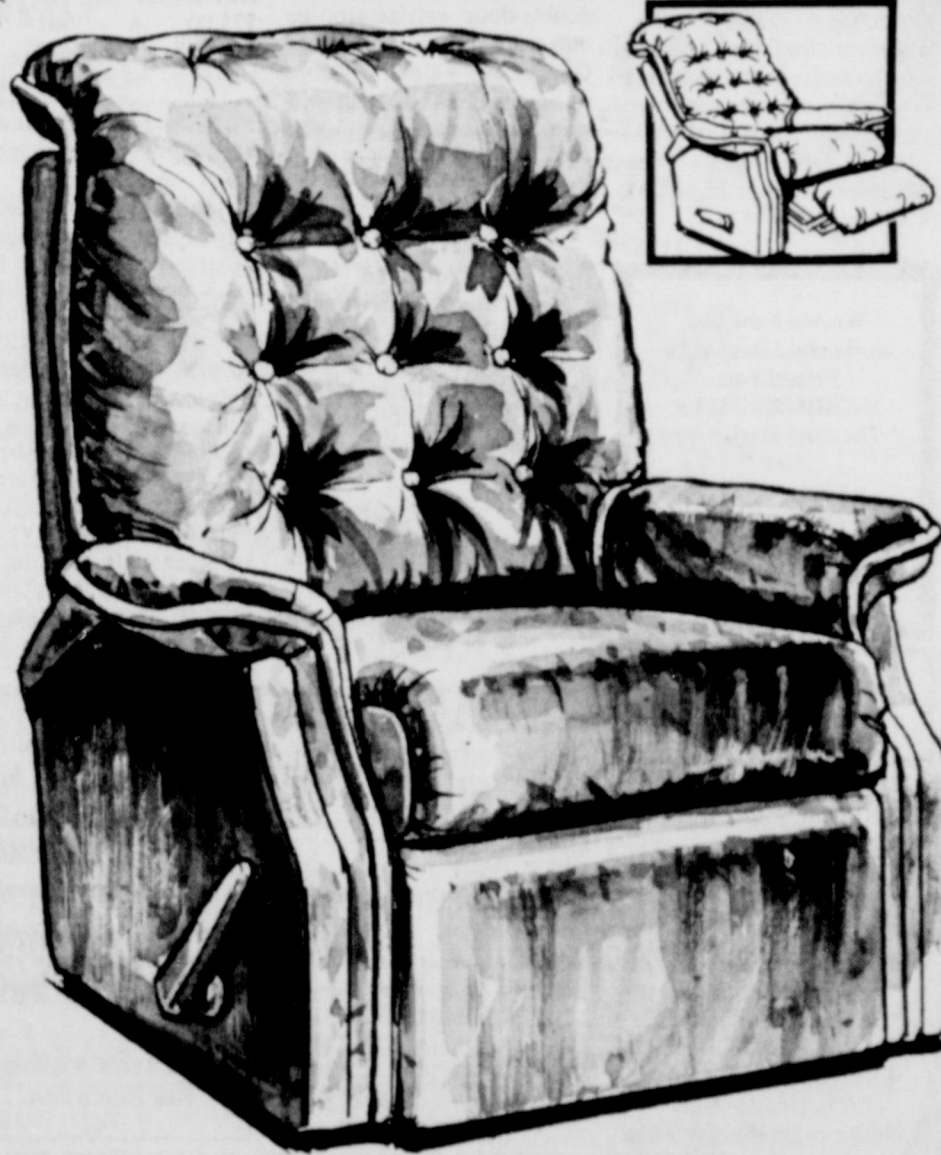
Not all the literature of Christmas is to be found in stories or poems. An editorial, written to a young inquirer is probably one of the best-known "works" that is quoted each holiday season. When an editor of the *New York Sun* published his answer to Virginia O'Hanlon on September 21, 1897, he laid to rest once and for all the question, "Is there a Santa Claus?" That editorial has been reprinted countless times since then, and it never fails to inspire.

St. Matthew wrote the first account of the Wise Men bringing their gifts to the Infant; St. Luke first described the astonished shepherds in the field near Bethlehem. Of all those who have written about Christmas, these two authors must surely be the most widely read of all!

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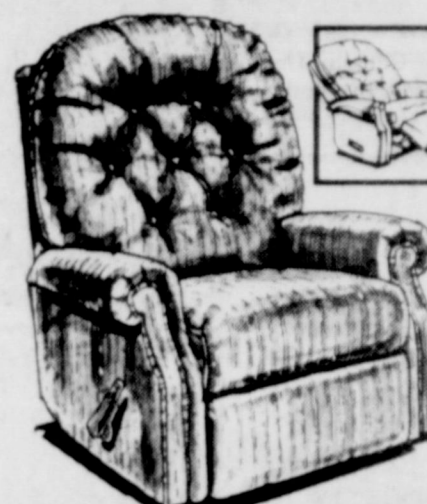

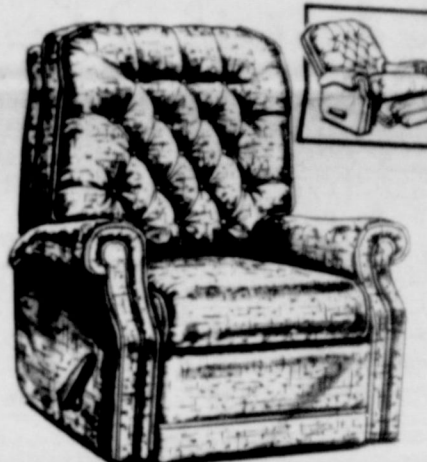

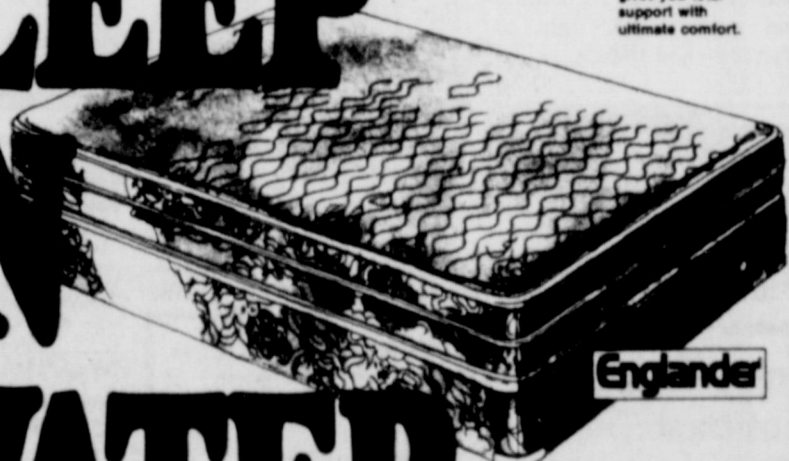
Skirted traditional recliner with T-cushion. Reg. \$399⁹⁵ \$319

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
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Conservation Program Out For Public Review

The Secretary of Agriculture has invited the public to comment on the U.S. Department of Agriculture's proposed soil and water conservation program. The Secretary's preferred program features expanded roles for local and state governments and the targeting of USDA dollars and personnel to conserving critical resource problem areas.

People who are interested in the program, or potentially affected by it, are urged to comment. Responses will be accepted through January 15, 1982, and can be mailed to State Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service (SCS), P.O. Box 648, Temple, Texas 76503.

Duval Burton, acting district conservationist for SCS at Friona said the Secretary's proposed program would concentrate more USDA assistance in areas where soil erosion and other problems threaten

to reduce agricultural productive capacity and to increase agriculture production costs. Basic USDA technical and financial assistance would continue in all areas.

The program would use local and state conservation coordinating boards to identify critical problem areas, set priorities, and develop program for local and state action to solve the problems. These boards would be based on existing organizations—conservation district boards, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) committees, extension advisory boards and other groups.

Based on the recommendation from these local and state boards and national priorities, more USDA assistance would be aimed at reducing the most serious soil erosion and related problems.

Burton said the program is the Secretary's proposed response to the Soil and Water Resources Conservation Act of 1977 (RCA). It is contained in an RCA Program report and a summary leaflet with response form that can be reviewed at the local SCS or Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office.

The basis for the program is an appraisal of the condition, trends and natural resource problems of the nation. Published in two reports, the appraisal is also available for public reference in the two USDA offices.

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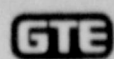

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
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Chiefs, Squaws Topple Farwell

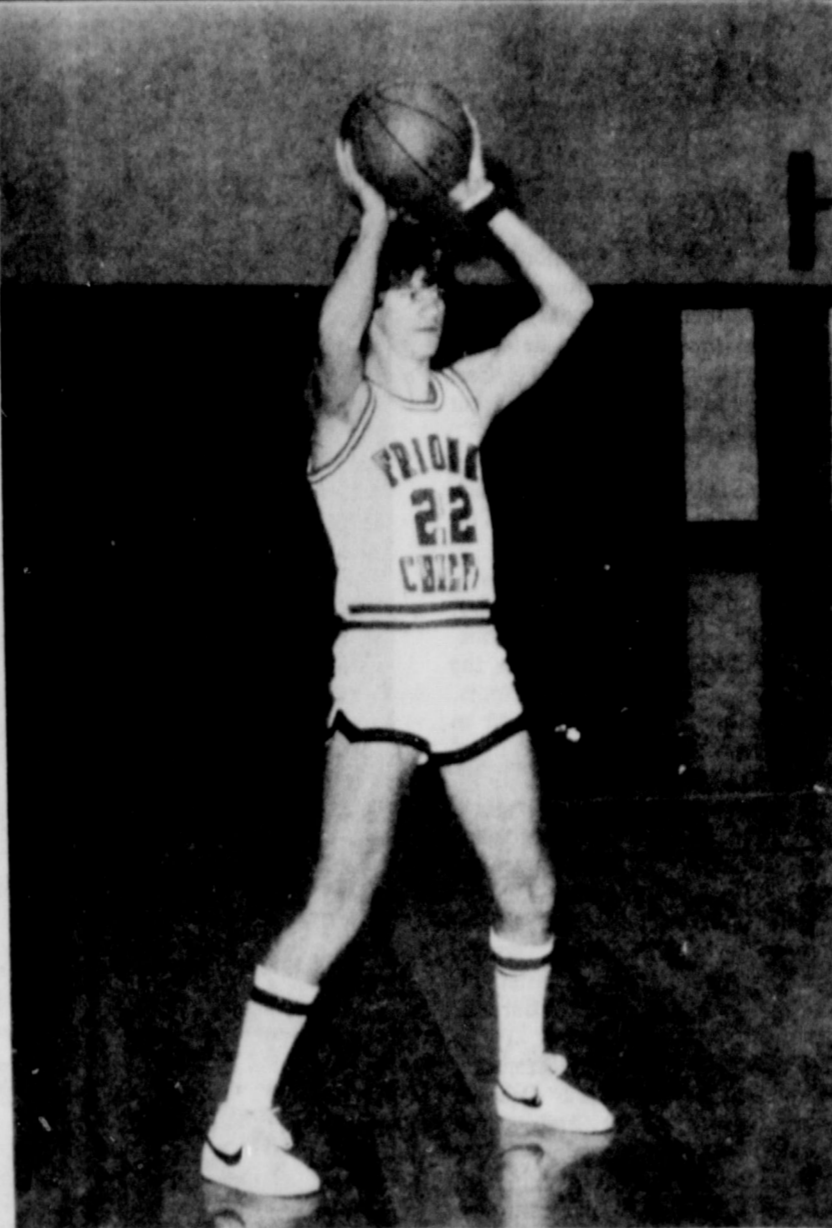
Neill's 19 points and Caballero's 16 paced the Chieftains, who extended their record to 7-1 for the year.

District champion Littlefield, who made it to the state quarter-finals, dominated the all-district selections. The Wildcats had 13 spots on the super team. Muleshoe had four spots, Dimmitt three, and Olton failed to have a player selected.

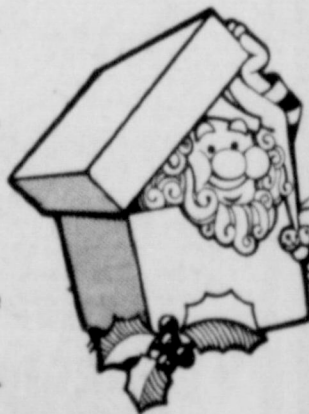

General Telephone Has Center For Questions

When it comes to paying bills with their hard-earned money, customers want their billing questions answered accurately--and fast.

General Telephone has a center that not only answers questions and adjusts phone bills for residential customers, but also serves as a collection office for both residential and business customers who don't pay their bills.

Each month more than 24,400 calls are made to the firm's BVT Center in San Angelo, Texas. The BVT Center--which stands for "Billing, Voucher and Treatment" serves about 218,000 General Telephone customers in West Texas and New Mexico.

"We answer all types of residential billing questions, but the kind that our customers ask most often regard long-distance charges and whether we have received their payments," David Perez, the center's manager, said.

A lot of times, customers honestly don't remember placing long-distance calls, he said. In many cases the center can provide the names of the parties they called to refresh their memory.

"We know no one likes to wait, so 97 per cent of the calls made to our center are answered within 20 seconds or less," Perez said. "If customers experience any delay it will normally be on Mondays when the volume of calls is the heaviest at the center."

When residential customers think they have been charged for long-distance calls they did not place, they should call the center for a billing adjustment. If calling is not convenient, the charge and the appropriate tax can be deducted from the billing statement, which then should be mailed with the payment.

If customers don't pay their monthly phone bills on time, the

center begins collection procedures--which may lead to the temporary denial of telephone service.

"The only reason telephone service is temporarily denied to a customer is to protect company revenues," Perez emphasized. "We must protect those revenues because ultimately any dollars not collected are paid through higher rates by all other customers. And that is who we are really protecting--our other customers who pay their bills."

Perez pointed out that the center's collection section handles both residential and business accounts, while the center's billing section serves residential customers only.

The center is open from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. Its phone number can be found at the top of each Gen Tel residential phone bill.

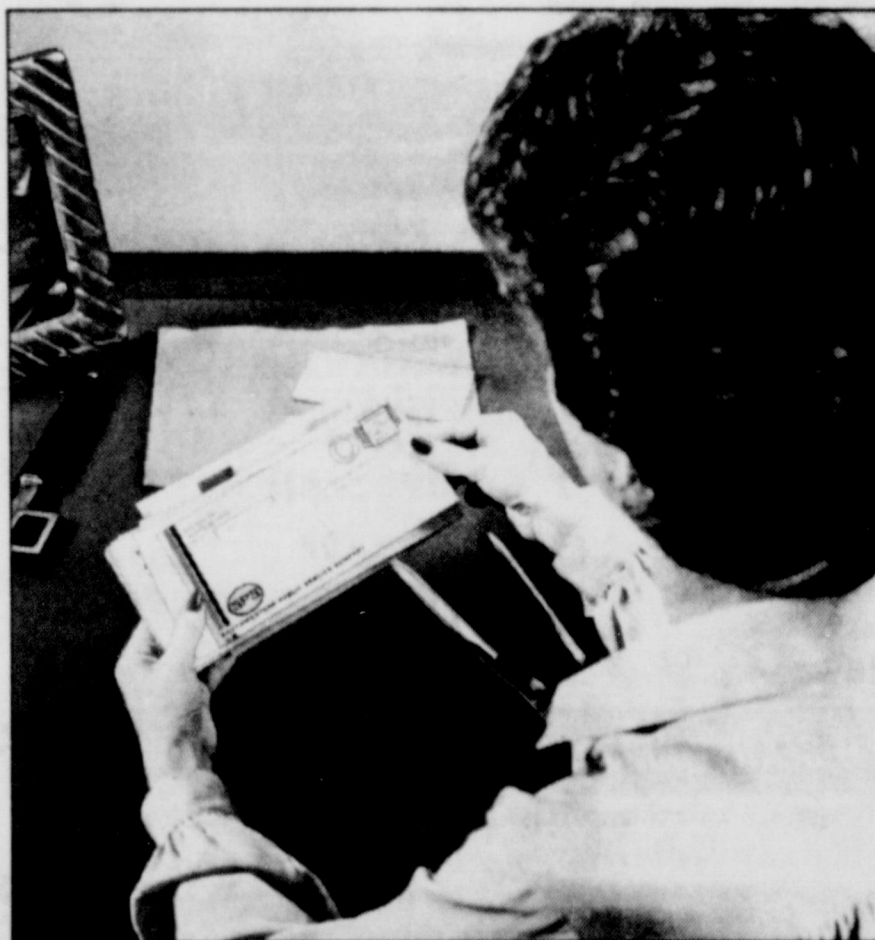
