CHALK UP ANOTHER achievement for Yankee ingenuity. The nation's space program scored another victory this week with the Saturn fly-by, featuring Voyager II.

Space nuts, science fiction buffs, and even the general public were treated to some rare treats in the way of pictures of the ringed planet, beamed back to earth over almost a billion miles.

It is mind-boggling to imagine that a space ship can even make it as far as Saturn, let alone send back the type of pictures that the craft and its equipment did this week.

Scientists will learn more about this neighbor planet after studying the photos and data which has been sent back by the space probe. And ultimately, we'll all benefit by the technology which goes into a program of this type.

The Voyager ship is programmed to continue its journey through space, toward the planets Uranus and Jupiter, reaching these far-away sister planets in 1986 and 1989, if all goes well. (You can see why these are unmanned flights -- a human pilot would have had to miss too much football, and hence no volunteer).

If memory serves us correctly, the year 1986 is also the year that the most famous comet, Halley's Comet, is due to return to the earth's vicinity, after an absence of 75 years. Perhaps your parents or grandparents told you about seeing the comet during its last visit, in 1910-11.

A lot of superstition surrounds the great Halley's Comet. One expert has theorized that it may have been the Star of Bethlehem, which led the Wise Men to the Christ child.

It bids to be quite a sight to behold, and we have been anxious to be a witness to this space visitor, ever since first learning about the comet as a junior high school student. Be sure and mark your calendars, and don't get too far away from mother earth in 1986. You don't want to miss this one.

## Enrollment Is Given

Enrollment on the first day of school on Thursday, August 27 totaled 1276, according to Superintendent Tom Jarboe.

This total was down by 22 students, or 1.69 per cent, from the comparable date of August 28, 1980, when the total enrollment was 1298. It was, however, ahead of the 1979 figure.

"We expect the total to continue to climb. The enrollment always continues to grow until after Labor Day," Jarboe said.

The enrollment totals include 538 students in grades kindergarten through fourth grade; 413 in fifth through eighth, and 325 in high school.

The totals for each grade were as follows, with the totals for 1980 in parenthesis: early childhood special education 4 (5); kindergarten 93 (96); first grade 112 (119); second grade 111 (115); third grade 106 (102); fourth grade 102 (104); special education, combination unit 10 (9). Elementary totals: 538 (550).

Fifth grade 99 (107); sixth grade 100 (108); seventh grade 107 (103); eighth grade 107 (101). Junior high totals: 413 (419).

Ninth grade 93 (94); tenth grade 83 (83); eleventh grade 75 (79); twelfth grade 75 (73). High school totals: 325 (329). Grand totals: 1276 (1298).

#### Registration **Begins For Cattle Brands**

On August 30, 1971 a law was passed by the Texas legislature stating that all marks and brands registered after that date must be re-registered at subsequent ten-year intervals by the brand owner with the county clerk's office.

All markers and brands are to be recorded with the county clerk, the law states, regardless of when they were originally recorded, within six months of August 30, 1981, August 30, 1991, and August 30, 2001, etc.

Parmer County Clerk Bonnie Warren states that her office will begin the registration and reregistration of brands and marks on September 1, and she stresses the fact that brand owners may retain their brand and mark for six months before it expires. "We cannot register it to anyone else during that six month period," she said.

Mrs. Warren said there is a \$5 fee for registering or re-registering and to do so, the brand owner must come into her office located in the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell. She said they will accept brand registering by mail, and those registering in this manner should enclose the \$5 fee.

According to Texas Attorney General Mark White, if everyone follows the registration schedule set out by the law, county clerks will have a correct, revised set of records every ten years, and there should be no dispute about the correct ownership of livestock.



# Scrimmage Termed Success

The Friona Chieftains were playing their second scrimmage game Friday evening, against Wellington, and Coach Tommy Moss said he was well pleased with the team's performance in their Bovina scrimmage.

"We accomplished what we wanted to accomplish. We ran 45 plays and gained 247 yards. That is 5.7 yards per play, and that wouldn't be bad in an actual game," Moss said.

In the scoring department, Bovina scored twice and held the Chieftains scoreless, although Friona had the ball on the Mustang seven yard line on their second series with a good chance to score. However, a fumble occurred at this point.

"We had called a sweep, and our blockers had driven Bovina 'way off the line, so we felt we would've scored otherwise," Moss commented.

The new Friona coach pointed out that runningback Nelson Jackson carried the ball 12 times for 96 yards in the scrimmage (eight yards per carry).

"Each of our three quarterback candidates (Mike Neill, Bruce Patterson and Mark Tucker) got to run the team for 15 plays each, and we got a good look at them," Moss said.

The Chieftain coach indicated that the team had only one injury, and this didn't come in the scrimmage. Joe Kyle Reeve bruised his tailbone in practice this week, and will miss the Wellington scrimmage. "We hope to have him back in time for our season opener," Moss said.


Moss said he was especially pleased with the play of those players who had re-joined the team after missing last year. "Really, all 28 players did

## SWCD Sets Field Day

The Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District will host an Irrigation Energy Field Day on September 3 from 10 a.m. to 12 noon. Activities will be held 1/4 mile west of Hub on Highway 86 on the Phil Johnson farm.

The Parmer County S.W.C.D. and the Soil Conservation Service will demonstrate how to test efficiency of an electric irrigation pumping plant. The procedure for testing a natural



gas well will also be explained. The purpose of the meeting is to familiarize local farmers of the procedures involved in testing wells and the benefits to be gained. By making a modest investment in equipment, farmers can run efficiency tests on their own wells.

In addition to figuring efficiency, the cost per hour and cost per acre inch of water, the potential annual electric cost reduction from repairs will be figured.







# Rhonda Parsons, James Murphree Wed In Double Ring Ceremony


Rhonda Lynn Parsons of Dimmitt and James Ross Murphree of Friona exchanged double ring wedding vows August 22 at 7 p.m.

The couple will make their home on Route 2, Friona.


