OUR FRIEND DON CUMPTON has his Hereford Whitefaces all charged up and headed down the playoff road in football. Hereford waxed previously unbeaten El Paso Bel Air, 22-0 last Friday night in El Paso.

As of this writing, the Whitefaces have a 12-0 season record, the best in the history of the school, and will face Eastern Hills of Fort Worth in the state quarter-finals this Saturday in Texas Stadium, home of the Dallas Cowboys.

Putt Powell says "Wonder if the Harris Rating System has noticed the Hereford Whitefaces yet. Harris, which rates high school teams, never had Hereford rated higher than 32nd in class AAAAA during the season."

Cumpton is a native of Bovina, graduating with the class of 1963. While in high school, he played quarterback. He was on the team which won the district title for the Mustangs in 1961, losing out to Groom in bi-district.

After college (at West Texas State), Cumpton served as assistant coach for several years at Hereford. He was head coach at Sanford-Fritch two years, winning district in 1975. He then went to Muleshoe, where he turned the football program around, posting a 9-1 season record which included a tie for the district title in 1977.

This is his fourth year at Hereford, and the program has been coming up gradually. In 1980, the Whitefaces had an 8-2 season record and finished second in district. This year the team put it all together. A tough 9-7 win over Plainview at Plainview was the team's springboard to the district title.

The 'Faces beat Palo Duro in their bi-district game at Buffalo Bowl, and then beat the El Paso area champs, Bel Air, in the Sun Bowl. Last Friday's game drew almost 20,000 fans, including a number from the Hereford area.

Included in that number was Don's mother, Bobbie, of Bovina. Bobbie and her late husband Allen have always been Don's top fans. We used to visit with Allen every week, and he would have a progress report to give us on Don's team.

This year, we've had some help, as the media in the area has gotten behind the Hereford effort. Here's hoping that the team goes all the way.

SPEAKING OF FOOTBALL, we had the opportunity to see our favorite team, the Dallas Cowboys, play Washington at Texas Stadium on November 22.

Although we seldom ever miss a Cowboy game on TV, this was our first chance to see the team play in person, and we thoroughly enjoyed the experience. Although the old adage that "you can see the game better on TV" has some credence, there is a lot to be said for "being there."

Son Stanley and I shared the experience. We got to see some good running by Tony Dorsett, good passing by Danny White, good catching by Butch Johnson and Drew Pearson (who also had a great reverse run), and some good moves by the Cowboy Cheerleaders.

Mark Neill Wins Football Contest

It took a top score by Mark Neill during the final week of the contest to nail down the grand prize in the Friona Star's annual football contest.

Neill scored an 18, which was the high score for the final week, to edge out his two closest competitors by two points. He was awarded the contest's grand prize of \$100 cash.

Going into the final week of the contest, Neill had been tied with Kenneth McLellan, who scored a "16" in the thirteenth week of the contest. The two contestants only had two games picked differently on their final contest entry, and fortunately for Neill, he correctly picked the two "toss up" contests, which were Penn State-Pittsburgh and St. Louis-New England.

Johnny Curtis of Farwell correctly picked 17 games during the last weekend, to finish in a tie for second with McLellan.

Neill's leading score was 205 for the season. McLellan and Curtis tallied 203. The winning score was four higher than the winning score for Ron Harkey in 1980. The top score yet posted in the event was a 209 by Jerry Hinkle, the winner of the contest in 1979.

Finishing third in the contest was Jim Pope, who had a score of 202, and Hinkle, always a consistent entrant, tallied an even 200 for the season for fourth place. Tying for fifth were Ron Cain, Marie Fleming and Tom Johnson at 199.

Neill took over the lead in the contest in the ninth week, and held on. He shared the lead twice, including going into the final week.

Winner of the final week's contest was Martha Clements, one of the four contestants posting a score of 18.

(Note: Three college games, which were re-scheduled for television purposes, were given to all entrants last week. These were the Pittsburgh-Notre Dame, Army-Navy and Georgia-Georgia Tech games. Just for the record, the top three contestants in the race for grand prize had picked these games the same.)

Mrs. Clements won the weekly prize on the basis of her tie-breaker score on the Philadelphia-Miami game. She picked the score at Philadelphia 24, Miami 13, missing the actual score by 14 points.

Second place went to Jimmy Walker, on a tie-breaker guess of Philadelphia 21, Miami 17, missing by 15 points. Mark Neill took third place, with a score guess of Philadelphia 20, Miami 21, missing by 18 points.

The fourth contestant to correctly pick 18 games was Mal Manchee of Hereford, who will kick himself when he learns that he forgot to write in his tie-breaker guess.

Pheasant Season Set December 12-27

The 1981 Pheasant season will kick off next Saturday morning, December 12.

Once again, the season will be two weeks in duration, spanning three weekends. Final day of the season will be Sunday, December 27.

The bag limit will remain the same as in years past: two cocks per day and four in possession. Only the cock pheasants are legal game.

A good hunting season is anticipated. Jack Patterson, spokesman for the pheasant season, said that although he had not seen quite as many pheasants in his home area of the Rhea Community, that he had heard other county residents say that they had seen at least as many as usual for this time of the year.

A large influx of hunters is expected for the opening weekend of the season next weekend.

A contest for the hunter turning in the longest tailfeather will be held, sponsored by the Parmer County Game Management Association. Details on where to turn in the feather entries will be announced next week.

Texas followed the lead of its neighboring state, New Mexico, with the passage of House Bill 1421, which authorized the formation of Operation Game Thief. Concerned citizens may call a 24-hour toll-free number, 1-800-792-GAME, to report flagrant violations of Texas' wildlife and fish laws.

Since implementing its game thief program in 1976, New Mexico has collected over \$79,000 in fines and paid almost \$40,000 in rewards.

Trespassing laws have been stiffened with HB 717 upping criminal trespassing from a Class C to a Class B misdemeanor. In addition, if the offender carries a deadly weapon, he can be charged with a Class A misdemeanor.

Notice has to be present before a person can commit criminal trespassing. Notice is given in three ways: (1) oral or written communication by owner of property; (2) presence of fencing to exclude intruders or contain livestock, or (3) sign posted on property indicating entry is forbidden.

City Hit By Crime Spree

The Friona Police Department was investigating four theft reports in Friona, all of which occurred sometime Wednesday night.

E.G. Phipps had his 1980 Chevrolet pick-up stolen. The vehicle was recovered the next day in Portales, N.M.

Edward White reported that around \$50.00 in change was taken from White's Super Market as a door was broken into.

Thieves took \$3.00 or less in change from the Sonic Drive-In, after breaking in the back door.

"In both cases, the damage to the doors was much greater than the money taken," said a spokesman for the police department.

Also the same night, four tires and rims were taken from a pickup sitting in the driveway between the Leland Hutson residence and White's Auto Store.

The crimes are under investigation. Police say they have some leads, but no arrests as yet.

Deadline Slated For Card Event

Contributions are currently being accepted for Project Christmas Card, under the sponsorship of Modern Study Club and The Friona Star.

Deadline for contributing to the fund is Tuesday, December 15.

Contributions may be made at Friona State Bank or at several local businesses.

Under the Texas penal code, a Class C misdemeanor carries a maximum \$200 fine. However, trespassers convicted under the new law, under a Class B misdemeanor, will face a possible \$1,000 fine and/or 180 days in jail.

If the offender carries a deadly weapon, and most hunters do, the Class A misdemeanor can cost up to

\$2,000 in fines and up to a year in jail.

No public funds will be used in the Operation Game Thief program. More than \$20,000 in donations from individuals and organizations have been received to get the program started, according to Harry Tension of Fort Worth, the operation's first chairman.

Local 4-H'ers Are Recognized

Forty-four outstanding members of 4-H Clubs in the South Plains were honored here Monday night, November 23.

In addition to receiving the Gold Star Award, highest honor presented at the county level, the youths were challenged by a top administrator of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service to strive for a good finish as a climax to their outstanding start in life.

Joining the youths at the awards banquet in the cafeteria of Coronado High School were parents, government officials, Extension leaders, fellow 4-H'ers, educators and other community leaders.

Honored from Parmer County were Devera Rhodes, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Rhodes of Friona and Charles Johnson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Billy Johnson of Bovina.

The belief that we need to get off to a fast start is deeply ingrained in American custom, Dr. Uel Stockard of College Station, state leader for the county programs with the Extension Service, told the audience. But he stressed that the long run of life requires more than a good start.

A good start is important, whether it's eating a good breakfast to provide a nutritious start for the day or

getting a good education to prepare for life, he said.

He told how Curtis Bickey of Bryan, now a professional football player with the Baltimore Colts, became a world class track star by practicing his start for sprinting events. "He spent hours upon hours practicing getting out of the blocks," Stockard said, because he knew that fast start gave him an advantage over runners as fast as he was, but who were slower starting.

"But getting off to a fast start is more important in the short run than it is in the long run," Stockard cautioned.

He told of another youth who got off to a fast start as a West Texas farm boy who grew up in 4-H. This boy went into agri-business and literally walked with Presidents," Stockard said. But he was convicted of fraud and now is a convicted felon unable to take part in much of the life of his community, Stockard noted.

"You 4-H'ers have gotten off to a fast start," Stockard said, "You've been involved in projects that have taught you leadership and followship." And he said the ability to follow good leadership is just as important as being a leader.

He suggested five things they

should do to assure a good finish for their fine start in life. He urged them to develop a set of beliefs; develop goals for their career, their family life and their community life; chart a course of action to achieve these goals; be patient in working toward their goals, and take advantage of the many opportunities they receive.

Master of ceremonies for the banquet was Dr. Sam Curl, dean of agricultural sciences at Texas Tech University. Guests were welcomed by Jim Roberts, general manager of South Plains Electric Cooperative, one of the 12 electric cooperatives which annually sponsor the banquet. The others are Bailey County, Cap Rock, Deaf Smith, Dickens, Lamb, Lea County, Lighthouse, Lone Wolf, Lyntegar, Midwest and Swisher electric cooperatives.

The awards presentation was narrated by 4-H'ers Tanya Tyrer of Hale County and Katie Montandon of Swisher County. The awards were presented by Dr. Catherine Crawford and Billy C. Gunter, district Extension directors.

Dinner music was by 4-H'ers Justin Sharp of Swisher County and Mandy Igo of Hale County. Cleet Griffin, Dawson County 4-H'er presented a patriotic closing ceremony. Also on the program were 4-H'ers Ralph Scheele of Floyd County, Linda Smith and Lonnie Howard, both of Hale County.

50 YEARS AGO--DEC. 4, 1931

The fire committee appointed by the Chamber of Commerce met in the office of the water superintendent Wednesday morning. Howard G. Morris was chosen fire chief, and left him the duty of selecting a company of 16 men and determining the amount of extra equipment necessary to make its work effective.

45 YEARS AGO--DEC. 4, 1936

Lewis Barnett, who plays the cornet in the WT Buffalo Band, will leave with that organization Wednesday as it plays its way to the Texas Centennial during the Thanksgiving holidays.

40 YEARS AGO--DEC. 5, 1941

Friona's newest industry, the Malone Creamery and Produce Station, began operation last Friday with plans made for the installing of all equipment this week. Roy Vaughn, a former resident, is manager of the creamery, and will be in charge of purchases of eggs, cream, poultry and all kinds of produce.

35 YEARS AGO--NOV. 29, 1946

One of the biggest cattle feeding operations in this area is being carried out in Parmer County, by Triplett and Pringle, cattle feeders and buyers of Bovina. At the present time the firm has 7,000 head of cattle grazing on wheat fields in Parmer and Curry Counties.

30 YEARS AGO--NOV. 29, 1951

County commissioners stalled for the third time in recognizing the right of Precinct 1 to form its own independent road district, at its regular meeting Monday in Farwell. The commission indicated its desire to go before the state highway commission in Austin before making its final decision.

25 YEARS AGO--NOV. 29, 1956

A head-on collision at the outskirts of Friona claimed two lives and badly injured another man last Wednesday night. Killed instantly was Clarence Franklin Davis, 55, Hereford, and Otis Deming, 21, of Clovis. Davis was driving a pickup, and Deming was a passenger in a 1956 Ford car.

20 YEARS AGO--NOV. 30, 1961

Jack Patterson, Rhea farmer, this week announced his candidacy for county commissioner of Precinct 2. His candidacy is subject to the action of the Democratic primary next May.

15 YEARS AGO--DEC. 1, 1966

Two Friona students at Wayland Baptist College, who live "just down the hall" from each other have claimed the first and second grand prizes in the 1966 Friona Star football contest. Danny Murphree kept his two-point margin to win over another Wayland sophomore, Dennis Howell.

10 YEARS AGO--DEC. 2, 1971

Direct Distance Dialing (DDD) will go into effect in Friona at 6 a.m. Saturday, December 4, it has been announced by General Telephone Company of the Southwest. Friona telephone patrons will thus join those in the large metropolitan centers in being able to dial their own long distance telephone calls, without having to consult the operator.

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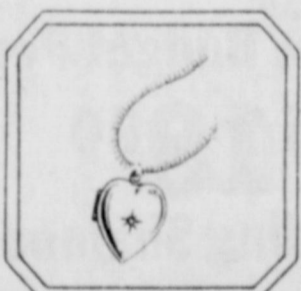
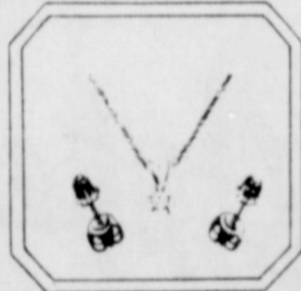

Six Weeks Are Required To Receive SS Number

Those who intend to work for the first time in the near future should be advised to apply right away for a social security number, as it usually takes about six weeks to get your social security card after your application and necessary documents are received.

The social security law requires that you furnish evidence of age, identity, and U.S. citizenship or lawful admission status when you apply for a social security number. If you are 18 or older, you must apply in person. Documents are subject to verification with the agency that issued them. Please do not submit uncertified photocopies of your documents. We must see either the original documents or a copy certified by the agency which issued it. We will return any documents you send in.

A variety of documents can be submitted as evidence of your age,

identity, and citizenship. Examples are: Public or hospital record of birth or religious record of birth or baptism established before age five. If these records cannot be obtained one or more of the following will establish date of birth, or age and your place of birth: drivers license, voter's registration, school record, marriage record, divorce decree, draft card or military ID, U.S. passport, baby's hospital wrist band, newspaper birth announcement, church membership or confirmation record, clinic, doctor or hospital record, insurance policy or other document providing identifying data such as a physical description, photograph or signature.

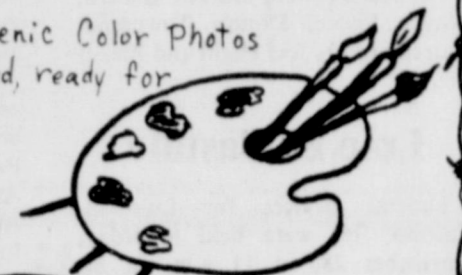

The fourth quarter was another

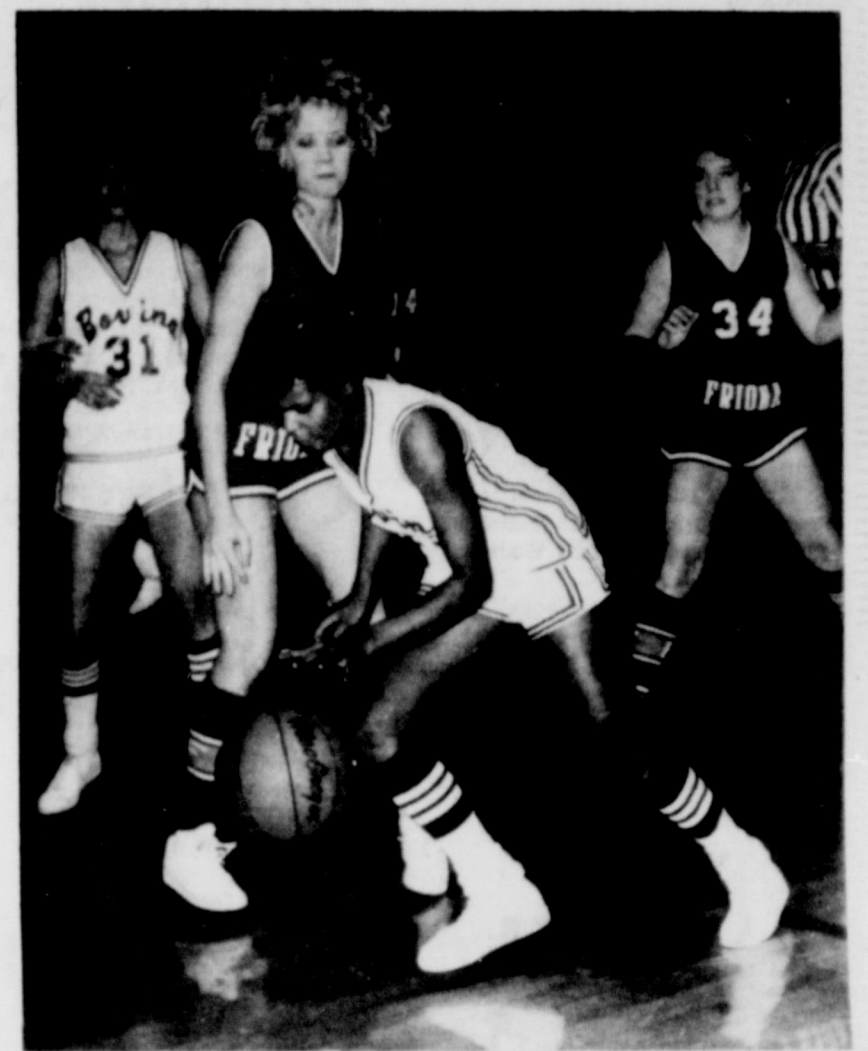
low-scoring period, and although Adrian held the advantage, 10-7, Friona's lead was too much to overcome.

Consumers should not eat chicken broth from 13 1/2 oz. cans produced by Sweet Sue Kitchens, Inc., Athens, Ala., with the production code 1B084 and the plant code P-732 on the label, a U.S. Department of Agriculture official said recently.

Laboratory tests indicate that some product might contain C. botulinum Type A, which produces a deadly toxin, said Donald L. Houston,

administrator of USDA's Food Safety and Inspection Service.

Consumers should destroy the cans or return them to the store where they bought them, Houston said.

"Sweet Sue Kitchens has directed its distributors to locate and return all product with code 1B084 to the plant," Houston said. "There have been no illnesses reported as a result of people eating the product."

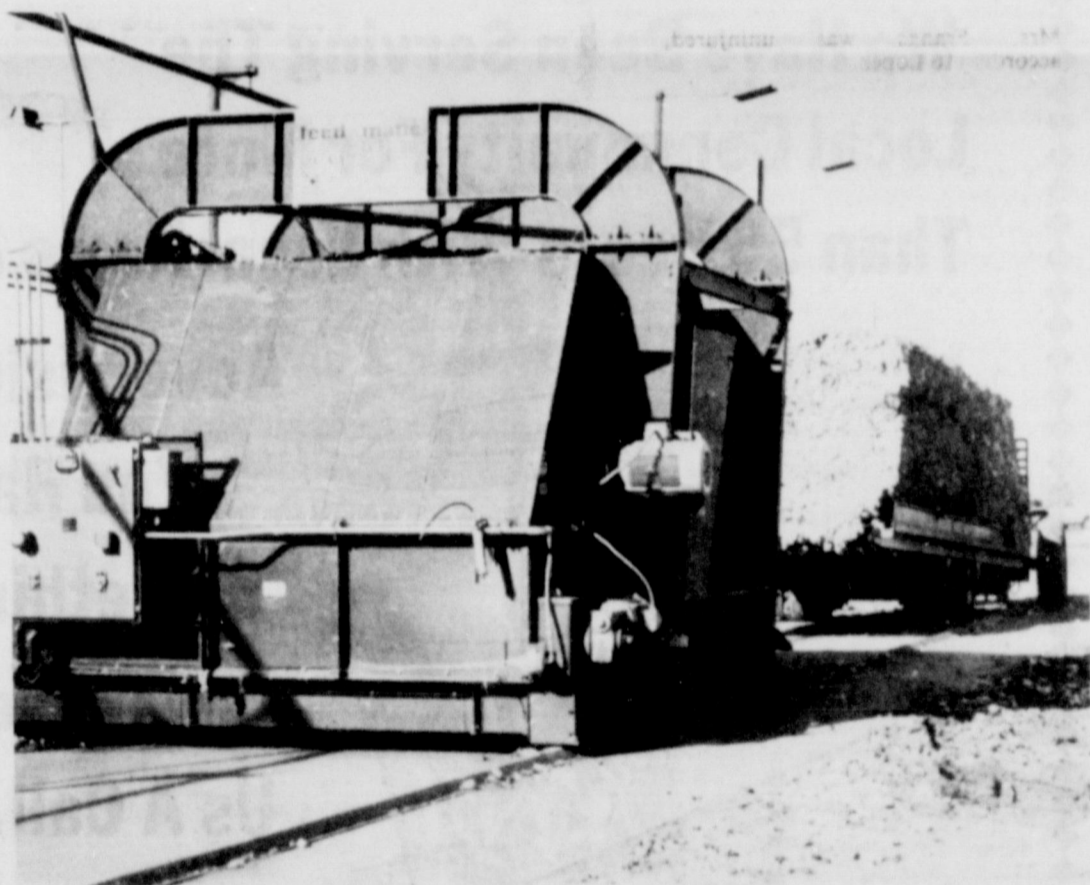

Teams Vie For Trophy

Both the Chieftains and Squaws were to play for third place in the Kress tournament on Saturday, after suffering close losses in tournament

play Friday. The Squaws dropped a 37-29 decision to Hale Center Friday morning, and the Chiefs dropped

their first game of the season to strong Valley, 64-55.

Both teams lost the game at the free throw line, as the Squaws hit only seven of 20, and the Chiefs made just 11 of 23 attempts.

"I thought both teams played well. The boys played super to hold Valley to 64 points. They are 8-0 for the season and are averaging 80 points a game," said Coach Tom Johnson regarding the games.

The Chieftains and Squaws each won their opening round games at the Kress Tournament on Thursday.

The Squaws scored a 33-31 win over Hart to advance to the second round. The Chieftains rolled to an easy 56-36 win over the Hart boys.

Of the two games, the girls' contest was much more interesting. Coach Tom Johnson said that there never was more than four points difference in the score during the entire game.

Hart held quarter leads of 11-10 and 16-15, before the Squaws tied things up at 23-all and then pulled out the win.

Cari Hand scored 16 points and Sherry O'Brian 10 to pace the team in scoring. Friona made only one free throw (of six attempts), and Hart made seven of 20. The Squaws did not shoot well, making just 16 of 54 field goal attempts, 29.6 per cent.

The win advanced the team's season record to 3-2.

The Chieftains broke out to a 27-17 lead in their game, and were never in serious trouble. Mike Neill canned 20 points to take game scoring honors. Robert Caballero scored ten points.

Friona made 45 per cent of its field goal efforts, 26 of 56, and made four of seven from the line.

"We had the most turnovers we've had this year, but Hart didn't capitalize. We're not putting up enough shots. We should be scoring in the 60s and 70s, but we're just not taking the shots," Coach Johnson said.

On the other hand, the team is playing good defense. They had been allowing opponents an average of just 39 points per game, and Thursday was no exception, in fact, Hart's 36 points were less than this average.

In second round action, the Squaws were to meet Hale Center on Friday, with the Chieftains meeting Valley. Coach Johnson said it appeared that both teams would be playing potentially their toughest opponents of the season.

Should either or both teams win, they will play for the tournament title on Saturday night at 7 or 8:30 p.m. Should they lose, they would play for third place on Saturday afternoon.
