Friona Flashbacks from the files of The Friona Star

55 YEARS AGO--DEC. 25, 1926

The front page of the Star carried Friona school system during the preceding five years, from a threeyear to a four-year high school; from five teachers to eleven; from three equipment available. buses to eight; from 98 students to 300; and from ten grades to eleven.

Census Info Available In New Publication

If you want to know the 1980 census counts of Houston or Loving County or any other incorporated city, county or metropolitan area, you can find it in the 1982-1983 edition of the Texas Almanac, which is just off the press.

The new edition, published by The Dallas Morning News, features the 1980 Census along with an analysis of Texas' population shifts written by R.L. Skrabanek, professor of sociology and demographer at Texas A&M University. The book also contains tables of 130 years of population growth of Texas cities and counties.


The Almanac also features a special article on East Texas, written by Bob Bowman, author of several books on the region. Titled "East Texas: A Changing Region," Bowman's article says that at first it seems the sleepiest of lands--talltimbered, a gently rolling piece of Texas pushed into its eastern corner, almost more southern than Texan. "But when you look beyond the verdant forests and saddle-sloped hills, you begin to sense a livelier land--a region being reshaped by industrialization, tourism and an influx of Sunbelt newcomers lured here by a moderate climate, scenic beauty and outdoors ethic..."

West Texas is also featured in a comprehensive article on McDonald Observatory, located in the Davis Mountains. Its author, Mike Kingston, Dallas Morning News editorial page writer, notes that the unpolluted view of the stars available from the observatory makes it one of the top astronomical sites in the world.

Persons who want to know more about Texas are provided a reading guide in a special article, "44 Books About Texas," written by Lee Milazzo, director of University Archives at Southern Methodist University and a book critic of The Dallas Morning News.

Even though a large glittering tree filled with many ornaments, which are of special significance to Florian and Lorraine Jarecki, greets all who enter the Jarecki home at 809 Woodland, the focal point of interest to all nine of their grandchildren is elsewhere.

A small white tree in the west end of the Jarecki's combination bedsitting room attracts the attention of other visitors, as well as the grandchildren. The only decorations on this tree are red apple shaped lettered "John," ornaments "Jennifer," "Marsha," "Tom," "Brooke," "Heidi," "Joshua," "Jeff" and "M'Kell," and recent pictures of each child.

The traditional Christmas activities begin in the Jarecki home with church services at the nearest Lutheran Church on Christmas Eve. All the family attends these services and Santa stops at their home before they return.

On Christmas Day the family has a traditional early American turkey and dressing dinner with a large assortment of vegetables, salads and desserts. To this they add Polish sausage. Florian's mother was a native of Poland.

Lorraine Reiken and Florian Jarecki grew up in nearby Nebraska towns. She was born in Platte Center and he was born in Columbus. They attended high school in Platte Center and were married there.

"Moving to Parmer County was Florian's idea and came to me as a complete surprise," Lorraine remembers.

"He had never been to Texas," she went on, "but one of his friends had

met Gilbert Schueler while the two were in service during World War II and wanted to come down to see him. The man was employed and had only a weekend to drive down here and back, so he asked Florian to come along.'

He must have liked what he saw. While he was here he made arrangements to go to work on the farm for Raymond Schueler. When he arrived back home, he announced, "We're moving to Texas."

The oldest Jarecki child, Tom, was a first grade student and Debbie, the second, was in kindergarten. They remained in Platte Center with their maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Oliver Reiken, who moved to Friona a few years later.

When Florian and Lorraine and the three younger children, Leslie, Pam and Susie, who was only four weeks old, moved to the Rhea Community, they took two days to make the trip and had seven flats on the way.

They spent their first night with Raymond and Lorna Schueler and their three older children, Shirley, Dale and Kathy. The Schueler children had chicken pox at the time and soon all three of the little Jareckis also had chicken pox.

After two or three years Florian rented land and farmed for himself several years. At the present time he is employed by Friona Industries.

Leslie and John are the only ones of the children who live here. Others who plan to spend the Christmas holidays here are Debbie and her husband, Larry Johnson, and their sons, Joshua and Jeff, and Tom and his wife, Penny, and daughter, Brooke, who live in Amarillo.

Also Pam and Mike Steward and daughter, Heidi, of Lamesa, and Susie Peters of Lubbock. Grandmother Reiken will be there too, of course.

During the holiday season Lorraine always has an assortment of Kolaches, a German delicacy, home made candy and other goodies sitting

around just waiting for someone to eat them.

A favorite candy recipe goes like this: 2 pounds sweet chocolate melted and cooled thoroughly. Mix in 1/2 pint whipped cream. Mix together and let stand one or two hours.

Then form in balls and roll in ground nut meats.

Any time the family is together, Lorraine knows Frozen Mint Salad will be welcomed. Her recipe reads thusly: Dissolve one small package lime Jello in 13 oz. crushed pineapple. Chill until mixture is syrupy. Whip 1 pint of cream or two packages of Dream Whip. Add one miniature small package marshmallows and add to above ingredients. Special Magician Program Teaches Bible To Children

What do magic, puppets and a clown have to do with Biblical gospel? For L.C. and Sandra Roots, everything. They have an act which combines the talent of magician L.C. Roots and the puppeteering and clowning of Sandra to present the message of Jesus Christ to children.

L.C. Roots has been involved in the ministry for years and is currently the pastor of the Baptist Church in Greenland, Arkansas. He and Sandra have been married 23 years and have four children, two grown daughters and two younger sons. Mrs. Roots is the former Sandra Brock and is the daughter of Mrs. Laverna Parr of Friona, and a 1956 graduate of Friona High School.

The couple take their acts to revivals, children's crusades, Vacation Bible Schools, camps and occasional birthday parties. Sandra's puppets and clown build up to L.C.'s magic act and the real message of the presentation. They also use visual arts such as slide stories and flannel graphs to present the story of Jesus Christ.

Giggles, the clown, is the newest addition to the ministry. Sandra dons her flaming red wig, two and one-half inch red eyelashes and clown suit, arms herself with her can of spring snakes and ketchup bottle full of red yarn ketchup, gathers up her sidekick, Chuckles, and takes on a new personality. The transformation takes about an hour.

Clowning is not so simple as putting on make-up, however. Clowns must always be in character while they are in clown face, Sandra said.

They answer only to their clown name, even to their own children, and out of clown face will not admit to her audience that she was Giggles, the clown.

During one performance, Mrs. Roots said she wore a pair of her street shoes with the clown costume. The next time she appeared, out of make-up, one very observant child spotted the shoes and announced that she was the clown. Since that time, she said, she has been careful to change shoes after performing. She has also ordered a special pair of clown shoes to complete the costume. Giggles is an August clown. Her

face is not entirely covered with white greasepaint. Only five per cent of all clowns are August clowns and five per cent are hoboes. The remaining 90 per cent are whiteface clowns. Mrs. Roots believes that the August clown face works best with children because some facial skin shows. Children are more frightened by the stark white face. Giggles is a speaking clown as

opposed to the totally silent mime clowns. Mime clowns tend to have more trouble with harassment, Sandra explained, and must always have someone with them. Children are often frustrated by the silence and will try to make the clown speak by hitting or kicking them. Mrs. Roots said that she has never had any trouble with the kids in her audience.

Although there is a lot of fun involved in what they do, and although the children are delighted with their act, L.C. and Sandra emphasize that the important thing is the message. "I use my magic to present my message," he said. Their goal is to provide professional quality entertainment with a Christian impact.



Add marshmallows, dates and nuts. Pour in whipping cream and work all ingredients together.


Shape in long roll and roll in dry cracker crumbs. Wrap in waxed paper then in damp cloth. Refrigerate.





Keep Eye Safety In Mind

When shopping for children's holiday gifts, beware of those that pose threats to eyes, cautions the Texas Society to Prevent Blindness.

More than 5,000 eye injuries were linked to toys last year, and nearly two-thirds of these accidents were suffered by children under the age of fifteen. BB guns, darts and bows and arrows--"toy weapons"--were responsible for hundreds more injuries.

"Ninety per cent of all eye injuries

are preventable," notes Elvin Schofield. President of the Texas Society. "Safety-conscious adults can protect children from eye damage--or even the loss of an eye--by picking toys and games carefully and by teaching youngsters how to respect toy hazards and their own safety.

"Holiday gifts hopefully will bring children many hours of enjoyment without jeopardizing their well-Mr. Schofield added. being," Playthings with projectiles have been



proven dangerous to eyes and should be avoided. A U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission survey of hospital emergency rooms indicates that children under 15 were the victims of eye injuries predominantly from slingshots or sling-propelled toys, toy guns and other toy weapons with projectiles, and gas, air or spring-operated guns.

Eye damage also can result from toys and games with less apparent hazards. Building sets, skateboards and battery-operated toys were a few of those responsibile for eye injuries to children last year, primarily children under 15. In some cases, the child may be too young to handle a toy. Often, too, play gets rough, and youngsters accidentally hurt themselves or playmates.

Most of these eye injuries happen, reports the Society, when children are not supervised. It's very important that parents show their children how to use their gifts properly. Does the child understand how to use the toy? Does he or she take a "harmless" toy and make it dangerous, for example, by pulling rubber tips off darts? Do older children keep their more complicated toys out of reach of younger brothers and sisters? When dangers are explained, does the child acknowledge and avoid them?





Speed, Alcohol **Cause Accidents**

'Traditionally, excessive speed and alcohol are the leading violations that cause holiday traffic accidents," said Major C.W. Bell, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety, Region 5. Because of this, special emphasis will be placed on these violators during the holiday season and all DPS personnel will make a special effort to try and reduce this needless waste of lives.

Major Bell noted that Texas is running six per cent above last year in traffic fatalities, and a new record was set last year when 4,424 persons were killed. Last year in Texas he stated someone died in a traffic accident on an average of one each hour and 59 minutes, and someone waste of human lives and human suffering," he stated.





Renners Celebrate Sixtieth Christmas Together

By JUNE FLOYD

When Christmas Day 1981 rolls around, it will be the sixtieth one Rudolph Renner Sr. and Clara Baker Renner have observed together since their marriage in Arnett, Oklahoma, October 24, 1921. Since Christmas 1922, they've had from one to more than three dozen children, in-laws, grandchildren with their spouses and great-grandchildren around to help them celebrate.

Christmas Eve at the Renner home has been an established custom for as many years as they have had children and grandchildren, which is 59.

"This time," says Granny Renner, "we're looking forward to having all of them even though they're pretty well scattered right now."

The first few years the couple was married they lived near Shattuck, Oklahoma, where they rented land to farm. Earlier Rudolph had been to the South Plains of Texas and been very favorably impressed with the ample supply of water for domestic use and the flatness of the land.

Clara remembers that on the seventh day of June in 1922--just as their first wheat crop was ready to be harvested--a severe hail storm completely wiped it out and dashed all their hopes for purchasing land in the immediate future.

However, Rudolph was able to getjobs helping neighbors who had not lost their wheat in order to get money to support his family and put in another crop.

Of course, as was the custom in those days, Rudolph and Clara kept milk cows and laying hens. In addition to supplying milk, cream, butter and eggs for the family, the cows and hens produced some surplus, which was sold so the young couple could buy flour, coffee, sugar and other needed staples.

Their first son, Johnny William, was born in the fall of 1922. Two years later, their second son, Lee, was born.

After three fair crops in succession, Rudolph decided it was time to become a land owner, so he made a trip to Parmer County, where he purchased a farm southeast of Friona, which he still owns.

Early in February of 1926 the Renners had a farm sale and sold the cattle, horses, farm implments and other things--many of which Rudolph had traded for--they thought they could get along without and began making preparations to move to Texas.

Most of their possessions were loaded into an immigrant car and freighted to Friona. H.H. Weis and his wife, Rebecca, and their two sons, Leslie and Johnny Lee, who were living at Darrouzett, Texas, moved to Friona at the same time the Renners did. Weis rode the train with the immigrant car.

Rebecca, who is Clara's sister, and the two boys made the trip with Rudolph and Clara and their two boys in a 1923 Model T touring car. It took them 14-15 hours to drive from Higgins to Friona.

Clara recalls, "We had to keep the car top down to keep from using too much gas and it rained on us all day. Rebecca and I kept both hands busy all day trying to keep those four little boys covered up to keep them dry."

Their first stop was at the Syndicate Hotel southeast of town. After learning there were no vacancies, the group drove across the prairie to Friona and spent the night in the Friona Hotel.

There was no pump on the well, out on the farm, the train was late getting here, there was no fuel for the cookstove and it seemed that nothing turned out right for the newcomers.

Mrs. Renner says, "We can all laugh about it now, but at the time there was nothing funny about it."

Rudolph Jr., the third son, was born in 1927 and their first daughter, Lillie Mae, was born three years later. By that time the Renners had built a new larger house than their original Parmer County home, which was 12'x24'.

Their second daughter, Mary Joyce, was born in 1934; and their third son, Delmer Earl, who is better known as "Cotton" was born in

1938.

They continued to live on the same farm until 1955, when they built their present home at 200 East Eighth, leased their farm out and moved to town.

Since that time, both of them have kept busy most of the time. Rudolph re-finished trunks, does a lot of woodwork, builds windmills and metal barns and restores Model T Fords. Clara pieces quilts, crochets and does other hand work.

When their family gets together Christmas Eve, residents of Texas, Louisiana, Arizona, New Mexico and Colorado will be signing the guest register.

Children and spouses planning to be present are John and Lavon Renner; Junior and Betty Renner; Lillie Mae and Billy Dean Baxter and Mary Joyce and Doyce Barnett, all of Friona.







Chris, Kyle, Kim, Ricky and David Barnett, children of Wesley and Doris McFarland Barnett share a unique heritage in that all eight of their greatgrandparents, their grandparents and parents have all lived here and have been a part of the history of Parmer County for more than one half a century.

Mr. and Mrs. R.E. Barnett, Mr. and Mrs. F.E. McMurry, Mr. and Mrs. J.B. McFarland and Mr. and Mrs. W.W. Campbell were pioneers in this area. They're the Barnett children's great-grandparents.

Their paternal grandparents, Fern and Mildred McMurry Barnett, live in the Black Community, Granville and Irene Campbell McFarland, the maternal grandparents, live in Friona. The Wesley Barnett home is about half way between Friona and Black.





1931 Year Is Recalled Through Newspaper File

By JUNE FLOYD

A feature story on page one of the Friona Star dated January 2, 1931 was the success of a Santa Claus party, which was sponsored by The -Friona Star and local merchants.

People began to gather about six o'clock and Santa arrived about 7:30. The crowd was estimated to be about 2000, the weather was ideal and in addition to distributing 250 pounds of candy, Santa, who wore a suit of red trimmed in white fur stood in the doorway of the Star office and gave 500 toys to children who passed by.

Another front page story reported that Johnny Lee, six year old son of Mr. and Mrs. H.H. Weis had had an appendectomy in the Hereford hospital. The local physican, Dr. R.R. Wills, performed the surgery. The patient was expected to recover.

At this time the publisher was Nunn-Warren Publishing Company, the editor was L.E. Bauerfeind, and the reporter was Mrs. Nat Jones. Incidentally, Mrs. Jones was the mother of Neva Raybon, who has lived here many years.

The installation of a new job press was front page news in the January 9 issue. It was a 12x18 Chandler and Price equipped with a Miller automatic feeder capable of turning out 3000 or more impressions an hour of the very finest kinds of job work.

The January 16 issue urged everyone in Parmer County-especially farm families to subscribe to the Star. In lieu of the \$1.50 cash for a one year subscription, the following offer was made:

"If you don't have the cash, bring in six dozen eggs and we will take them instead of money.'

This offer was limited to Parmer County farm families only.

The following story appeared in the February 6 edition: "Friona people are quite wrought up this month over the size of the gas bills received on the first. It seems that in spite of the warm and moderate weather that has prevailed, the gas bills are as large or larger than usual and citizens are talking about taking this matter up with the city council and demanding an investigation."

A price war was big news in the February 13 edition. There were three shops in town at that time. The following paragraph, "Friona barber shops have started a price war and have reduced the price of haircuts to 40 cents and shaves to 20 cents," was followed by this prediction. "If the boys keep on reducing prices perhaps we will be back to the old 25 cent haircut and 15 cent shave soon."

editions and the results were reported in the March 6 issue. Rhode Island Reds, White and Buff Orphingtons. White and Brown Leghorns, Black Minorcas; Blue Andilusions and White Wyandottes were some of the breeds mentioned in the results of the show

There were also classes for ducks, turkeys, geese, guineas and bantams. More than 300 birds were exhibited.

The headline on the March 20 edition read, "Parmer County Listed For Federal Drought Relief Aid." The late M.A. Crum and Floyd Reeve had been designated to receive applications for loans made the local people.

"Frank Spring, son of F.L. Spring, local merchant, is now employed as bookkeeper at the Friona State Bank. Everyone wishes Frank well in his new position," (A page one story in the April 10 issue).

It is interesting to note that at this time there was a report from several rural communities in Parmer County in each edition. Some of the communities were Homeland, Eleven Mile and Black. There was also a regular report from the Flagg Community in South Central Castro County.

In the April 24 issue Friona residents were urged to take advantage of a rare opportunity billed as "The chance of your lifetime to see this magnificient natural cavern for so little money."

The Friona Star was sponsoring the trip in cooperation with the Santa Fe Railway. The train was scheduled to leave Friona at 12:30 a.m. Sunday and to return at 4 a.m. Monday. Cost of the excursion was \$9 per person.

The following week a notice appeared advising readers that the special train, which was scheduled to run to Carlsbad, was cancelled due to lack of interest.

Graduating seniors listed in the commencement story on May 8 Mildred included McMurry Barnett, Minnie Reed Knight, Glenn Reeve and Frank Truitt.

A feature picture on the front page of the May 22 issue showed the Empire State Building in New York City alongside a drawing of the Eifel Tower, which up until that time had been the world's tallest building. The Empire State Building's height was reported to be 1248 feet. Rushings 5° to \$1 Store and City Drug Store advertised the following school supplies in the September 4 edition: Binder with Index 25'; 10 cent tablet 5°; Gluey Paste 8¢; 10 dandy crayons 5°; 25 cent water colors 15° and Carter's Ink 8°.

Friona High School football team were reported in the September 11 issue.

The headline read, "27 Huskies out for high school football squad." Some of the names listed were Clifford Crow-158; Red McFarland-137; Paul Spring-156; Gilbert Boatman-125; and Raymond Euler-127

Our town had water problems fifty years ago. Page one of the October 2 edition announced that a new well was having its first problems. The conclusion of the story read, "The officials are doing everything in their power to hurry up the work of reconditioning the city well so that it can be again put on the job with a bountiful supply of water."







Nichols' Basement Decorations Highlight Holidays

The basement is large, has utility room furnishings, a clothes line, two couches, a piano, several chairs, one bed, a pool table and an assortment of odds and ends of furniture in it. It also has gray concrete walls. The west end of it also serves as a storehouse for L.D.'s auto parts and related items.

Their first step was to hang red material from the clothes line to the floor. The space above the clothes line needed something to cover it up, so they decided to use Christmas wrapping paper for that purpose. Later they hit upon the idea of covering all the walls with brightly colored paper.

There's a fireplace, equipped with a red light which twinkles to give the impression of burning coals; snowmen, a nativity scene, a Rudolph the Red Nosed Reindeer display, and numerous other decorations. Most of them are in red, white and green.

Lights have been strategically placed to give an elegant look to different scenes they have created. The pool table is covered with a Christmas table cloth, where supper is served each Christmas Eve evening.

When the basement door is opened, a visitor is greeted by a life size Santa and Christmas music can be heard from several directions. The basement steps are colorfully decorated on each end and as a person starts down, he's in for an indescribable treat.

An arrangement featuring crystal tear drops and bells decorates the top of the piano. Eva Marie and Eleanor did leave the keyboard un-decorated, so their mother, an accomplished pianist, who is now 89 years old and a victim of arthritis, can play for the group when they assemble.

When asked, "What do you plan for next year?" Eleanor replied, "Doing this has been so much fun that we're already thinking about that."

The family Christmas dinner will be served at Eva Marie's Restaurant, which will be closed to the public, and will feature the following menu: turkey with cornbread dressing, giblet gravy, baked ham, candied yams, shrimp salad, cranberry sauce, potato salad, fruit salad, and pea salad.

Eva Marie was gracious enough to share some of her recipes with us. She said, "Even though I grew up in Iowa, I'm a southerner when it comes to making dressing. I like cornbread dressing and I'd never heard of it until I moved to Texas."

She went on to say, "I have adapted my dressing procedure to include a suggestion by my father, the late Walter Smith. He suggested that I use raw eggs as part of the liquid rather than boiled eggs, and I do like that better."

Even though this long time Friona resident has been cooking two meals a day for a large number of people almost daily since late January of 1967, she still calls herself "a family cook."

Her favorite candied yam recipe goes like this: Cook your own fresh yams, which have been cut in large chunks, or use two cans of commercially canned yams.

Combine 2 cups brown sugar; ¹/₂ cup oleo; 1 cup dark Karo; and 1 teaspoon cinnamon in heavy sauce pan. Boil until the syrup spins a thread.

Pour over yams, which have been placed in a casserole dish. Pour syrup over yams and cover with marshmallows. Bake until syrup forms candy around the yams.

Another of her specialities which she always prepares for family dinners is Shrimp Salad. Combine 1 can shrimp, one small bunch green onions, 3 tablespoons salad oil, 1 tablespoon prepared mustard and juice of one lemon. Toss, chill and serve.





Six Flags Train Engineer **Retires At The Age Of 94** working on trains in 1907, shoveling

Three short whistle blasts turned heads as an antique steam locomotive slowly pulled into the depot at Six Flags Over Texas. A cheer went up from the 100 or more friends and relatives gathered to take part in Charlie Patton's retirement party.

The crowd's enthusiasm was directed at the newly painted engine, whose name had been permanently changed from the "Mirabeau B. Lamar" to the "Charles Jefferson Patton" to honor the retiring railroad man.

At the age of 94, Patton was leaving railroading after 74 years at the throttle, the last 21 of which were spent at the Arlington theme park.

"That's really something," said Patton, staring through round, wirerimmed glasses at his name on the new sign. "That's really something."

The railroad veteran then stepped up into the train's engine compartment, settled himself before the maze of levers and dials, adjusted his glasses and cap, and turned to get an OK from the conductor.

"All aboard," shouted the conductor. And a minute later Patton had maneuvered "his" train out of the station, and around the bend for a last 11/2 mile run around the park.

Patton had been a railroad engineer at the theme park since its opening in 1961, but his railroading experience goes back to the turn of the century.

The railroad veteran started



coal for the Texas & Pacific Railroad on the 250-mile run between Fort Worth and Texarkana.

"The T&P was one of the best railroads in the country," he recalled. "I used to make the Fort Worth-Texarkana run a dozen times a month in all kinds of weather.

"On one run, just outside Terrell, we were rounding a bend in the track after a heavy rain. Runoff water from the rain had washed out the dirt from under the tracks just ahead. We steamed right into the washout, and the locomotive, a few cars and several yards of track all dropped into a big hole in the ground. It took a huge derrick to pull us out."

Patton operated "every fast train the T&P had." He was the engineer

During those years it conveyed holiday greetings from Ed and Bessie Boggess to anyone who happened to drive by. Geneiva had the greetings painted for her parents. Then, this year she recycled the greeting and now is it covered with poinsettias and is playing a new role in a new place.

Geneiva moved to Parmer County from Mutual, Oklahoma, with her. parents, the late Ed and Bessie Boggess, as a very small girl. She has two older sisters, Irene Sherley, who lives in Arkansas, and Juanita Reed, who lives here. Her brother, Eugene Boggess, also lives here. A younger sister, Thelma Mae Johnson, is deceased.

Following her graduation from Friona High School, Geneiva attended a business college in Lubbock, where she met Bob, who had grown up in Dawson County.

Their first home was in Lubbock. Later they lived in Spokane, Washington and Oklahoma City. Bob served in World War II and when he went overseas, Geneiva came back to Friona.

When Bob was discharged, the couple moved to a farm at Spartanberg, which is near Lamesa. Their three children, Mike, Kay and Jill, were all born before they moved to Friona in December of 1956.

The children are all graduates of Friona High School. Mike farms. His wife, the former Becky Elliott, teaches in the local school system. Their two sons, Brent and Corbin are both in school here.

Kay and her husband, Larry Rogers, and their two children, Jennifer, two, and Jeffery, four months, live in Lubbock, where he is employed by Bell Telephone Company.

Jill lives in Abilene and teaches in Abilene Christian School.

All of them plan to be home for Christmas. The family traditionally sings Christmas carols as gifts are being opened. Geneiva says, "The two things we

Santa Letters Boggess sage dressing and Grandma Riethmayer pecan pie."

When asked about recipes for these two dishes, she replied, "Well, for Grandma Boggess sage dressing you just combine cornbread, dried bread, turkey broth, lots of sage and a few other ingredients and hope it turns out 'just like Grandma Boggess used to make'."

For Grandma Riethmayer pecan pie: Combine 5 eggs; 1 cup sugar; 1 tablespoon butter; 1½ cups white Karo and two teaspoons vanilla in a mixing bowl. Mix three minutes and pour over pecan halves, which have been spread in two unbaked pie shells.

A frozen fruit salad recipe Geneiva uses at Christmas time or for any other large gathering is Frozen Fruit Salad.

Drain 4 large cans crushed pineapple, 2 large cans sliced peaches, 2 small jars maraschino cherries and 2 cans green grapes. Reserve 1½ cups pineapple juice. Add one ten ounce package miniature marshmallows. Soften 1 envelope plain gelatin in ½cup cold water. Heat pineapple juice to boiling. Add gelatin, which has been dissolved and chill until mixture begins to set.


Mix fruit with 2 cups pecans, 2¹/₂ cups sugar, 1 cup orange juice and ¹/₄ cup lemon juice. Whip ten packages Dream Whip as directed on package. Add three cups mayonnaise. Combine with partially set gelatin mixture and mix well.

Pour in cartons and freeze. Serves 30 persons.

He and his parents, David and Merylene Massie Towle, live in Richmond, Virginia. This is Aaron's first Christmas and his Friona relatives are anxiously awaiting his first visit to Texas.

Other members of the Massie family who plan to be present are Marca Lynn, Glen, Richie, Kristi, Jamie and Jill Herring and Jayn, C.B., Jodi and Lance Looper, who live here.

In addition to Olive's and Meryle's three daughters, Marca Lynn, Merylene and Jayn, they have two other young women who have lived in their home and made a place for themselves in the family.

Friona's first exchange student, Anni Jensen came in the fall of 1961 and lived with the Massies until the following June. She is a native of Denmark. She's married to Eric Jensen, also of Denmark, but not a relative. This couple came to the United States and visited in the Massie home on their wedding trip in 1972. Then, in 1979 they returned and brought Anni's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Gunnar Jensen with them.

Nergis Yazgan, another exchange student, made her home with the Massies during the 1963-64 school year. She is a native of Turkey.

Olive and Meryle both enjoy travelling very much and in 1975 they visited Anni and Nergis in their homes. Other foreign countries this couple has visited include Mexico, Canada, Panama, Paraguay, Uraguay, Belize, Casmul, San Bliss, San Augustine, Italy, England, Austria, Switzerland, Germany, Norway and Sweden.

They have also toured every state in the union, including Alaska and Hawaii, except Vermont and Wisconsin.

Olive, the oldest of six children born to pioneer Dickens County residents, Mr. and Mrs. D.P. Smiley, was born near Roaring Springs, Texas, where her mother still lives.

Following her graduation from Patton Springs High School, she attended Texas Tech University, Lubbock, two years. One summer while she was working at Jenkins Jewelry in Lubbock, she met a young service man from Claude, Texas, who was stationed at Reece Air Force Base. His name was Meryle Massie.

These two were married December 27, 1942 and made their home in Lubbock while Meryle was transferred elsewhere. Before he was discharged in November 1945, they lived in Syracuse, New York; Louisville, Kentucky; and Columbus, Georgia.

New Year's Day 1946 marked the beginning of Olive's and Meryle's Parmer County residency. They moved into a small house on the farm of two of Meryle's uncles, the late Bill and Ed Massie.

At the time, the house had no modern conveniences and Olive remembers what a difference cooking on her first butane range made in her housekeeping duties. Prior to that time she had cooked on a wood stove. They still live on the same farm. In 1960 they built their present home.

The family members traditionally get together on Christmas Eve for a gift exchange and evening of fun and games. Baking traditions include Fresh Coconut Cake and Black Walnut Cake. Black walnuts grow in the yard, so they're fresh, too.

In addition to being a farmer and livestock man, Meryle enjoys hunting and annually supplies pheasant for the freezer.

One of the family's favorite pheasant dishes is:

Pheasant and Rice

One 3 pound pheasant 2 stalks celery, cut in two inch pieces 2 tablespoons butter

l teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon pepper 11/2 cups cooked wild rice 1 can chicken soup 1/4 cup milk


Saute celery in butter. Combine salt, pepper, rice, soup and milk. Place celery in bottom of crock pot. Place pheasant on celery breast down. Pour rice mixture over pheasant. Cook until meat is tender. One of Olive's favorite cookie recipes is:

Icebox Cookies 3/4 cup butter 1/4 cup Crisco 1 cup brown sugar 1 cup granulated sugar 3 eggs


l teaspoon vanilla 1 teaspoon cinnamon 1/2 teaspoon salt 41/2 cups flour l teaspoon soda 1 cup chopped nuts Cut Crisco and butter into dry

ingredients until mealy. Beat in eggs, vanilla and nuts. Pack stiff dough on waxed paper and roll. Leave in refrigerator overnight. Slice with sharp knife and bake on oiled cookie sheet.

The Massies attend Friona United Methodist Church. Olive served as a Girl Scout leader for many years. In her spare time she crochets and does other hand work including making quilts for her grandchildren.
