IF YOU LISTENED to President Reagan's State of the Union speech last Tuesday evening, there is a good chance you saw the political advertisement which followed, advertised as "The Democratic Response."

If you are a Reagan fan, or just unbiased but willing to give anyone in office for just a year his fair chance, there is a good chance that you found the Democratic film, which was produced well in advance, very

Some Reagan critics like to say "Well, you know he's just an exactor," implying that you can't believe what an actor says or does. So, what did the Democrats do? Why, they went to Hollywood and had their "response" produced right in one of Reagan's old studios.

One commentator pointed out that on the Democratic cinema, a senator indicated Reagan because there were more bankruptcies in 1981 than in any year since 1933. The reverse of that coin is the fact that 1933 was the first year of another president's term: Franklin D. Roosevelt. If the Demos are to lay all the faults of Reagan's first year at Reagan's feet, then they also must be prepared to say that the difficulties during FDR's first year were his fault, and not Herbert Hoover's

The public should be aware that the economic mess in which the country finds itself did not happen overnight, nor did it happen just in the last year. Things did not just suddenly go sour when Reagan replaced Carter (by the way, good ole Jimmy's name was not even mentioned in the Democratic 'movie' last Tuesday.)

One would think the Democratic response would have dealt on a more logical plane, such as how the states are going to take over such programs as food stamps and other welfare programs, which the president says he will shift from Washington to the

Although most state governments have been opposed to the shifting of such programs into their jurisdiction, there is something good to be said for this: usually, welfare, or any other program, is more adequately administered on the local level than through Washington.

If the tax money which supported these programs were to be returned to the states, we have every confidence that Texas could handle its welfare far better than it has been handled from the banks of the Potomac.

SUPERINTENDENT TOM JAR-BOE told us this week that the construction program in the schools was virtually complete, and that as soon as the weather warms up, plans are being made to have an open house, so the general public can see what has been done.

From what we have seen, the additions and alterations are very nice, and something that will really benefit the school.

A HEARTY WELCOME to new City Manager Jerry Lewis. We understand that he arrived in Friona at the height of this week's snow and freezing conditions, and had a few problems in getting into his new home, but finally made it.

We tried to assure him that the weather of this week was not the "norm," but Lewis would rather have skipped it entirely. It had waited this long to snow, anyway....

Filing Is Underway

Filing began this week for three spots on the Friona Independent School District's board of trustees. Deadline for filing is March 3. Applications for a place on the ballot may be picked up in Superintendent

Tom Jarboe's office. The spots held by Teddy Fangman, Floyd Reeve and George Frye are expiring. All three incumbents have indicated that they will seek new three-year terms.

Winter Storm Holds Area In Icy Grip

The worst storm of the winter--in fact in three or four winters--has held the Friona area in an icy grip for much of the past week.

The area received around four inches of snow late Monday and early Tuesday. The snow was accompanied by high winds, which caused considerable drifting, and also caused mammoth problems for the travelling public.

Friday morning's low temperature of -1 degrees was the lowest temperature of the season, and lowest since February 11, 1981, when the mercury also fell to minus one. The lowest temperature in 1980 was a ten degree (above) reading, but on January 2, 1979, the temperature fell to ten below.

The biggest adventure started in the local area at about 10:15 p.m. Monday night, when patrol units from Friona and Bovina were combing U.S. Highway 60 between the two cities looking for a reported one-vehicle roll-over.

While looking for the reported accident, DPS trooper Steve Talkington, Friona Patrolman Lindel Davis, and Deputy Jerry Atchley of Bovina discovered a school bus from Vega stranded in the middle of the roadway eight miles southwest of Friona on Highway 60, with 48 junior high school students and two coaches. The bus was returning from games at Farwell.

The coaches told the officers that they had been stranded for about 30 minutes before the officers arrived.

Upon locating the bus, officers closed Highway 60 between Friona and Bovina, until the bus was safely moved off the roadway and until the Vega students and coaches were transported into Friona.

Friona Patrolman Randi Burkhart and Deputy Bob Davis held up traffic in Friona, while Bovina Reserve Officer Robert Olvera stopped the traffic in that city.

In order to transport the Vega students and coaches from their stranded bus into Friona, Fire Chief Ralph Shirley and volunteer fireman John Blackwell took a Friona Fire Department van to the location, while volunteer fireman Glenn Reeve. Jr. and Friona schools superintendent Tom Jarboe took a four-wheel drive vehicle to the location.

The students and coaches were taken to Friona High School, where Tom Jarboe took charge and distributed them to residents in the city, where they would have a place to sleep and get warm. The bus was pulled off the roadway and left until the morning hours.

Also helping in the rescue operations were Bovina City Marshall John Detten and Bovina Reserve Officer Charlotte Detten, who were between the convoy and Friona, advising of hazards and controlling traffic from MBPXL.

According to Patrolman Davis, it took the rescuers exactly two hours and 33 minutes to bring the students and coaches from the bus into Friona. During the time they were being brought into town, those who took part in the operation were faced with zero visibility, 40 mph winds, blowing snow, zero temperatures and much below zero chill factor.

Two People Killed On Highway 60

Two New Mexico residents were killed Saturday, January 30 when the pickup truck they were in collided with a tractor-trailer rig on U.S. 60 near Friona.

Killed were Vonnie Jasper, 55, and Virginia K. Heine, 50, both of Roswell, N.M., said a Texas Department of Public Safety officer.

The accident occurred two miles southwest of Friona, the officer said. The tractor-trailer rig, operated by

Robert Dwayne Holt, 38, Springdale, Arkansas, was traveling northeast at the time of the accident when it hit an icy spot in the road and slid sideways, the officer said.

The pickup truck hit the rig broadside and both victims were pronounced dead at the scene, by Justice of the Peace Frances Euler.

Holt is charged with criminally negligent homicide, said DPS Sgt. Billy Don Scott of Hereford. The violation is a Class A misdemeanor and carries a penalty of one year in jail or a \$2,000 fine or both, he said.





Music Dept. Offers Scholarships


About \$20,000 in scholarships will be awarded by the West Texas State University Department of Music through auditions beginning on Saturday, February 6.
