PRESIDENT REAGAN announced early in his administration that he would like to abolish the Department of Education. You will recall that this federal agency had its beginning as a part of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW), which proved to be one of the most wasteful and money-grabbing agencies in the federal bureaucracy.

The president had a lot of support in the beginning, for the abolishment of the Department of Education, but in recent weeks and months, opposition has developed, mainly from the powerful National Education Agency and its various state branches.

To most people, abolishment of the Department of Education would be a sensible move—a start in the right direction. There are numerous federal agencies, conceived for what originally was the well being of the public, which today have strayed far from their original intentions, and are merely a dead expense to the American taxpayer.

These types of agencies need to be abolished, and the money saved could go a long way toward the president's program to balance the budget.

If you favor such moves as President Reagan's proposal to eliminate the Department of Education, you need to write to Congressman Kent Hance and tell him of your support for the president's intentions.

President Reagan still has to overcome liberal members of Congress in his efforts to cut out the "fat" in government. Naturally, the entrenched bureaucrats are going to protest, when their gravy trains are untracked.

Supporters of President Reagan had to wait a long and agonizing time to see their man inaugurated, and then had a close call with his assassination attempt only months into his term.

If you are a Reagan supporter, you would do well to let your support of his programs be known, both to your elected representatives, and also to the president himself. The sooner some of these conservative measures can be passed, the better.

Summerfield Wreck Kills Driver, 38

A major accident involving two semi-truck trailer rigs occurred at about 4:30 a.m. Saturday morning, at Summerfield.

Injured in the accident was Richard Allen White of Friona who was operating a feed truck, which was loaded at the time of the accident.

The other driver was Douglas W. Bryan, 37, of Hereford, who was operating a cattle truck, which was also loaded.

Bryan was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace J.P. Marshall, of Castro County.

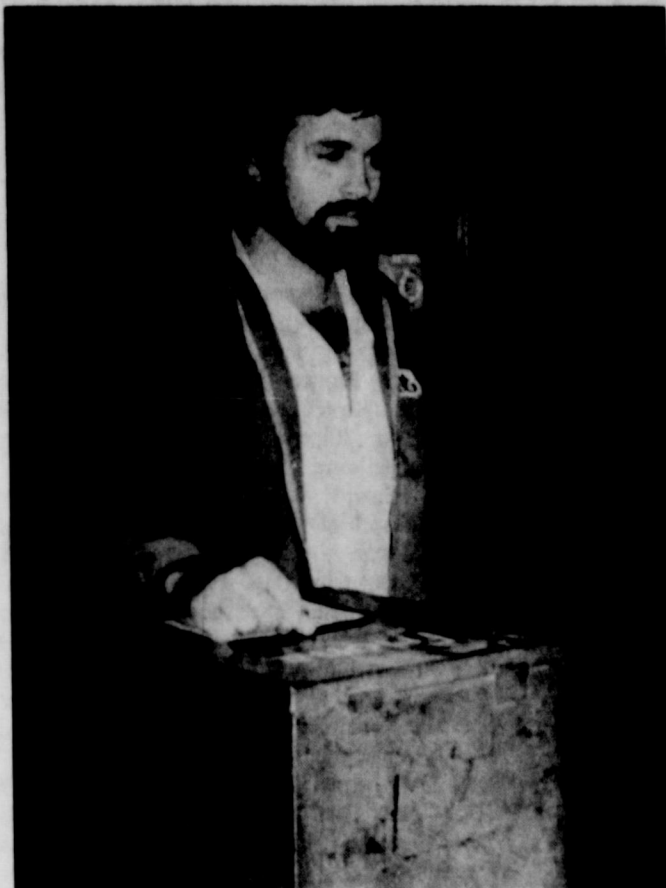
The accident occurred about six miles west of Hereford on US 60, police officials at the scene said it took rescue and police officials about four hours to rid the scene of debris, cattle, and wreckage.

Hereford Fire Department volunteers responded to the call as the truck which Bryan was driving exploded into flames at the accident scene.

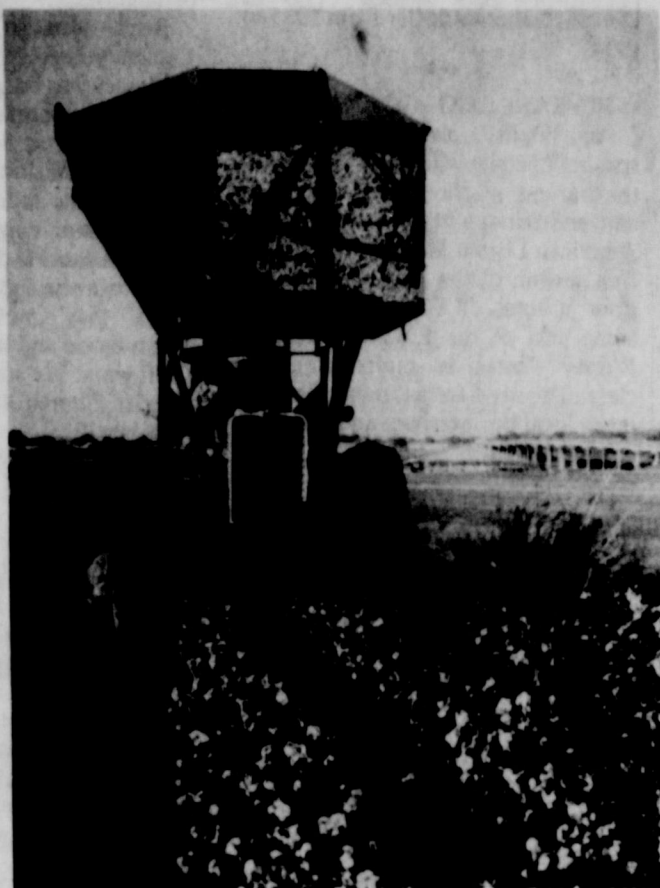
Friona Ambulance Service workers transported White to Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona, but was later released.

Services for Bryan were held at 2 p.m. Monday in the Avenue Baptist Church of Hereford with arrangements by Gilliland-Watson Funeral Home.

His death was the fourth fatality in Parmer County in the past three months.

Youth Nabbed After High-Speed Chase

A 16-year-old Bovina youth is being held in detention for ten days in the county jail in Farwell, following robberies at Allsup's stores in Friona and Bovina, and a high-speed chase from Friona to Amarillo.

A 14-year-old girl, who accompanied the youth accused in the robberies, was released to her parents by Judge Porter Roberts.

Sheriff Bill Morgan said that at approximately 2 a.m. last Saturday, October 31, the Allsup's store in Bovina was robbed of the cash in its cash register "by a young male whom the clerk on duty knew personally."

The youth apparently made no effort to disguise himself.

Authorities theorized that the youth went from the Bovina store to a girl's home in Bovina, picked her up and then left in the girl's father's pickup. They drove to Texico, where they reportedly filled up with gas at the Target station.

Then, the pair drove to Friona, where the 16-year-old is alleged to have robbed the Allsup's store. During the robberies, the youth held his hand inside his jacket pocket, telling the clerks he had a gun. It was later discovered that the "weapon" was merely a plastic soft drink bottle.

Also at Friona, two customers of the store were robbed, one inside the store and another outside. The one inside the store was Eune Martin, who surrendered \$7 cash to the young bandit. (The robberies of the two stores and two customers netted only \$160, according to authorities.)

As the couple headed east, Parmer County authorities radioed a description of the pickup to Deaf Smith County officers. Shortly thereafter, the Hereford officers were in pursuit of the vehicle, which was said to have been "headed east at speeds in excess of 100 miles per hour."

A roadblock was set up in Canyon, but the pair got around it. Another

roadblock, at the Canyon Expressway and Western Street, was set up. The youths rammed an Amarillo city police car from the rear, knocking the car across the median and into the southbound lanes of the E-way.

This crash ended the chase, at approximately 4:45 a.m. The pickup was a total loss, as was the police car.

The chase reached speeds of 100 miles per hour, officers said. The suspect's front tire was shot out by officers at Canyon, but he continued to drive the pickup to Amarillo at high speed, on three tires and a rim.

The two were taken into custody by Randall County Sheriff's officers, appearing before a juvenile judge. They were then released to Parmer County officials.

They appeared before County Judge Roberts on Monday, with their parents.

The 16-year-old youth is to appear at another hearing at the end of the ten-day period. A motion has been filed to try the accused as an adult. Officers said he was known in Bovina for his frequent offenses, and likes to flaunt his status as a minor to law officers.

UW Kickoff Is Slated Monday

Friona's United Way Campaign for 1981 will kick off with the annual breakfast at the Girl Scout House, 704 Ashland, Monday, October 9, beginning at 7:30 a.m.

Speaker for the kickoff breakfast will be Jim Bullard, administrator of the Deaf Smith General Hospital in Hereford. Bullard is president of the Deaf Smith United Way chapter.

The goal for the 1981 United Way campaign in Friona is \$12,150, an increase of six per cent from the 1980 drive.

Voters OK Six Items

Voters in Friona and Parmer County gave their overwhelming approval to the water development amendment (number four on the ballot), although the proposed addition to the state constitution failed statewide.

In Friona, where 419 voters marked their ballots, the vote was 389 for, 29 against, 93.1 favoring. Countywide, the total was 955 for, 88 against, 91.6 in favor.

Almost as good a margin was given to proposition number 2, which allowed for correction of a land title oversight for a Texas family. Friona voters approved, 341-64 (84.2 per cent), and the county totals were 775 for, 221 against (77.8 per cent favorable).

While only 21 per cent of the local voters turned out, this was better than the state prediction of ten per cent.

Trio Tie For Lead

The battle for the lead in the Friona Star's football contest continues to be heated. After the ninth week of the event, three contestants are tied for the lead with scores of 140.

A total of 53 contestants have scores of 125 or better, in the race for grand prize, and another 47 contestants are grouped between 100 and 125. Counting the current weekend, there are four weeks left in the contest, and a potential of 88 points to be earned.

In the weekly contest, two of the contestants, Wiseman and Jimmy Bell of Hereford, somehow waded through the maize of upsets, to post scores of 20, equalling the high score for the season in the contest.

Bell claimed first place, on the basis of his tie-breaker score. He picked the Denver-Minnesota score at 17-14 favoring the Broncos, missing the actual score (19-17) by just five points.

Two Bovina juveniles were arrested in those incidences which took lawmen in a chase from Bovina to Amarillo before the spree culminated in Amarillo with the escape vehicle crashing into an Amarillo Police car, totaling both vehicles, and sending the police officer and the juvenile girl to hospitals for treatment of minor injuries.

The pair ran a roadblock in Canyon and one later in Amarillo as they sped away from one law officer and then another. Officers reportedly shot out three of the pickup's tires, and it continued from Canyon to Amarillo on one tire and three rims, at approximately 100 m.p.h.

The total amount of money taken in the hold-up was about \$160 according to Sheriff Bill Morgan.

Both juveniles were brought back to Parmer County by Morgan, where the girl was released back into the custody of her parents, while the young man is still being held in Parmer County jail at the present time.

The escape vehicle was a Dodge pickup, which belonged to the girl's father.

TEXAS DPS REPORT

The Troopers of the Department of Public Safety reported one accident on US 84 outside of Lariat.

Jerry Foskey, 38, of Muleshoe was heading eastbound on US 84 at an excessive amount of speed, when he apparently lost control of the pickup which he was driving and overturned the vehicle two and one-half times, throwing Foskey from the vehicle more than 50 feet.

According to DPS Trooper Craig Hunt there were skid marks at the scene in excess of 700 feet.

Foskey was taken to Clovis High Plains Hospital, where he was hospitalized with massive head injuries. He was later transported to a Lubbock hospital.

City's Sales Tax Check Makes Gain

State Comptroller Bob Bullock's office Thursday issued checks totaling \$37.9 million to Texas cities as their share of the one per cent city sales tax for October.

This month's payment is about \$9 million more than the cities received during a comparable period in 1980.

Friona's payment for the current period amounted to \$4,815.89, which was up from their check for \$3,616.81 for the same period a year ago. The city's 1981 sales tax payments to date

amount to \$72,374.76, a 14.4 per cent increase from the 1980 totals of \$63,246.07 at the same time.

The October payments push the 1981 yearly total of city sales tax payments to \$518.3 million, up 16 per cent over the same 10-month period in 1980.

Houston's check this month will be for \$7.7 million, bringing the city's 1981 payments to date to \$107.7 million.

Dallas will receive a check for \$4 million this month. Dallas has received \$57.9 million this year, an increase of 11.1 per cent over 1980 payments.

San Antonio's 1981 payments to date reached \$27.8 million with the payment of a \$1.9 million October rebate. The city's 1981 payments are up about 11 per cent over 1980.

Fort Worth's check this month totals \$1.3 million, bringing that city's yearly payments to date to \$19.1 million, a 9.2 per cent increase over 1980.

The one per cent optional city sales tax is collected by merchants and businesses in the cities where it is levied and rebated on a monthly basis by the Comptroller's office.

Potent Wildcats Play 'Trick' On Friona

Up until last Friday night, most Friona football fans considered the Littlefield Wildcats a "good," undefeated class AAA football team.

But after seeing them in action against the Chieftains, Friona backers decided they had underrated the Wildcats. Littlefield is a GREAT class AAA team, and could go a long way in the playoffs.

The Wildcats downed the Chieftains, 35-0 in a district game last Friday at Littlefield. The hosts played a near-flawless game in racing to their ninth win of the season against no losses.

After an open date this weekend, Littlefield will play Muleshoe in the last regular season game of 1981.

Friona fans had an inkling that they and their favorite team might be in for a long evening, on the game's first play from scrimmage. Mark Montoya had sent the opening kickoff out of the end zone, and Littlefield put the ball in play at their 20.

Bobby Price took the ball, skirted tight end, and sped up the sidelines 80 yards for an apparent touchdown, virtually untouched. However, a clipping penalty at the Friona 40 called the touchdown back.

But the flag merely served to delay

the inevitable. Littlefield put the ball in play at their own 45, and then drove 55 yards in 11 plays for the score. A big play in the drive was a 19-yard pass to big end Clark Pylant on a third down and 12 situation from the 32.

Scott Blakely got the touchdown, giving Littlefield a 7-0 lead after the PAT kick.

The next time Littlefield got the ball, they promptly drove 55 yards in only five plays. Two pass plays, for 25 and 24 yards, both to Pylant, were the big gainers. Pylant was a long, lanky end (number 10) with glue-fingers. His catch of the drive brought the TD, and a 14-0 score after the successful kick.

Friona simply could not crack the Wildcat line, losing five yards in three attempts, and punted the ball back to Littlefield.

This time, Littlefield drove 46 yards in eight plays. Blakely went in from a yard out, and the kick made the score 21-0.

The defense finally dug in and held the Wildcats on their next two possessions. A 38-yard field goal attempt by the 'Cats almost worked, hitting the crossbar and bouncing back. On their fifth possession, a fourth down pass from the Friona 38 fell incomplete.

Friona finally was able to crank up its offense during the third quarter. They outgained the potent Wildcats, 50 yards to only eight during the quarter. But ironically, Littlefield scored the only TD of the period.

The touchdown came after the Wildcats intercepted a Mark Tucker pass at the Friona 30 and returned it to the Friona one. Blakely made the needed yard on the first try, and Littlefield's lead became 28-0 on Jim Burks' fourth successful kick.

However, during the quarter, Nelson Jackson ripped off gains of ten, nine and eight yards to give Friona first downs in each case, and Richard Malouf raced 25 yards on a double reverse.

Malouf's run was the offensive highlight of the game for the Chieftains. Friona had the ball at midfield, when Richie took the extra handoff. He was soon at top speed, in the Wildcat secondary. Only a sure tackle by the Littlefield safety prevented a Friona touchdown, as Malouf was stopped at the Wildcat 25.

After the nice run by Malouf,

reserve quarterback Bruce Patterson was sacked for his own 45, and Friona missed its best chance to score.

Early in the final quarter, Littlefield took the ball at their own 20 following a Friona punt. They set sail on their last scoring drive.

The speedy Price, who had been denied a touchdown on the game's first play, got behind Nelson Jackson on a pass pattern, and made the catch on a 50-yard gain. Three plays later, Blakely got the points, and the hosts held a 35-0 lead.

Friona was driving again with the ball when the game ended. Jackson gave the team a first down with a vital two-yard burst on fourth down, but the game ended with Friona having the ball at about midfield.

The entire second half was played without benefit of the clock, which went out of commission late in the first half, so it was impossible, at least for the fans, to gauge time.

In Friona's defense, the Chieftains never gave up, and were still hitting when the game was over.

Also in Friona's favor was the fact that despite the hard-hitting vicious tackling by Littlefield, the Chieftains never lost a fumble; although a hard lick by Friona on punt-returner Jim Burks caused a Wildcat turnover in the fourth period.

Quarterback Mark Tucker was shaken up by a hard tackle early in the third quarter, and reserve Bruce Patterson finished up. Patterson also took some licks, but always managed to get up.

District Adds Tulia, Abernathy For 1982

Friona's District 2-AAA will be somewhat changed for the next two years, after the semi-annual realignment process completed this week by the University Interscholastic League (UIL).

Olton, which has been a member of Friona's district for the past 12 years, is dropping back to class AA due to decreased enrollment.

Joining the district will be Tulia and Abernathy, both of whom competed in District 3-AAA the past two years.

Both of the new teams have formerly been aligned in Friona's district in the past. Abernathy was last a district opponent during the 1975-76 school year. Tulia, which has been played in recent years as a non-district foe, last was a member of Friona's district in 1961.

"I am real happy with the new district lineup. We're getting two real competitive teams. It should be a much tougher district. Our program is right on course, and we should be on a par with these schools by next year," said Chieftain coach Tommy Moss.

Friona will now be one of the smallest schools in its district, thanks to a revamping of enrollment

extremes for the various classifications.

Class AAA now starts at 270 students and goes through 644—quite a range of enrollment. Friona's average daily attendance last year was around 320. Littlefield, which had been on the top fringe of the old enrollment limit with about 550 ADA, was thus retained in conference AAA.

"We could have done a lot worse," Moss said in regard to the proximity of the schools in the new district.

The realignment also causes a shuffling of the non-district schedule. Three of the teams currently on Friona's schedule—Boys Ranch, River Road and Farwell—will be back on the slate for the next two years.

However, new teams added were Shallowater, for a September 17 game here, and Dalhart, for a September 24 engagement, in Dalhart. Vega, one of the teams on Friona's non-district schedule the last few years, dropped a notch back to conference A.

"We tried to fill the schedule with good games against teams our size. Although Dalhart causes a longer trip than we would like, they will give us a good, hard game, and at least it's

better than Seagraves. Although Shallowater is still in class AA, they are growing, and are expecting to be moved up to class AAA, perhaps in two years. They are attempting to upgrade their program," said Moss in regard to the two new faces of Friona's grid schedule.

Starting with the 1982 schedule, the top two teams in each district qualify for the playoffs, which will give more teams an opportunity for post-season play. The schedule thus is arranged in ten consecutive weeks with no open date, to allow for the extra playoff game. Most coaches are excited about this new rule change. The Chieftains for 1981, for example, would still be in the thick of the playoff picture if the rule were in effect this year.

The football schedule, as arranged for 1982, is as follows:

September 3: River Road, there; September 10, Boys Ranch, here; September 17, Shallowater, here; September 28: Dalhart, there; October 1: Farwell, here; October 8: *Tulia, here; October 15: *Abernathy, there; October 22: *Dimmitt, here; October 29: *Muleshoe, there; *November 5: Littlefield, there. *District game.

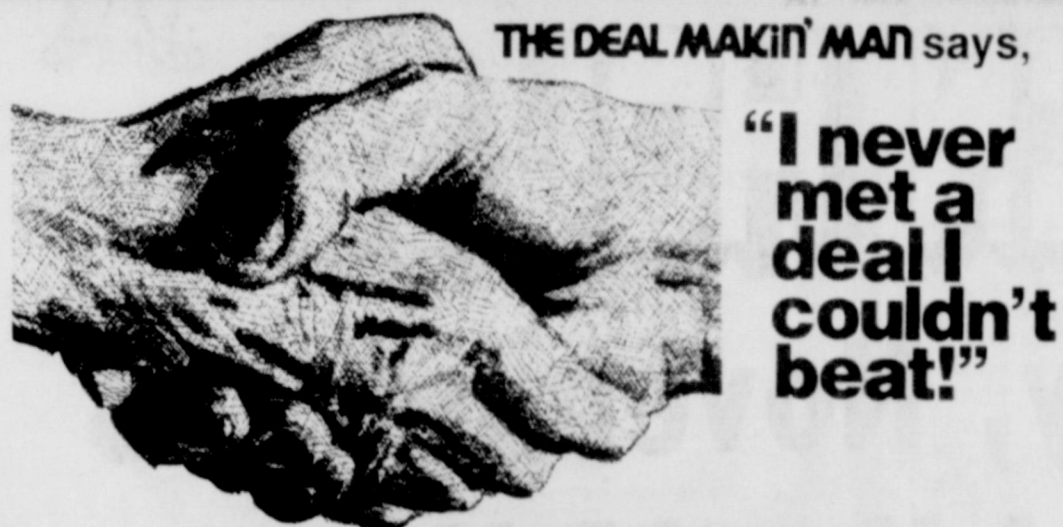

# Veterans Day 1981 Holds On To 11-11-11

Veterans Day 1981 marks the fourth anniversary of the return of the observance to November 11 and the tradition of honoring the unknown soldier at Arlington on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month.

From 1971 to 1975, Veterans Day was observed on the fourth Monday in October in compliance with a 1968 law that changed most national holidays to Mondays.

In 1975, Congress responded to public feeling that the November 11 date was too significant to abandon. Effective 1978, and on the sixtieth anniversary of the World War I armistice, a law was passed returning the holiday to November 11.

With the return of the observance to the armistice date of that "war to end all wars," this year's observance is an occasion to pay tribute to the 1,081,000 Americans who have died in the defense of their country in all American wars since 1776 and to more than 30 million former servicemen who served during both war and peace.

More than half of the men and women who have worn their country's uniform in wartime are still alive. Of a total of 38,924,000 war participants—going back to the earliest days of the nation—25,789,000 war veterans are still living.

Another 4.2 million living veterans saw only peacetime service.

By far the most costly of America's wars was its Civil War. That conflict saw 364,000 deaths in the Union Army and an estimated 133,821 Confederate deaths. (Authoritative statistics are not available for the Southern casualties.)

In contrast, 290,000 Americans fought in the Revolution, and 4,000 died in service. Out of 287,000 American participants in the War of 1812, 2,000 lost their lives in service.

During the Mexican War only 79,000 Americans were in uniform, yet 13,000 died in service.

In the Spanish-American War, 11,000 of the 392,000 U.S. participants died in service.

A total of 4,744,000 answered the country's call to arms in World War I, and 116,000 died.

World War II saw the greatest number of Americans ever in uniform—16,535,000 men and women. There were 406,000 deaths in service during that conflict.

During the Korean fighting, 6,807,000 saw service, and when it was over in 1955, 55,000 had died.

A total of 9,834,000 Americans were in service during Vietnam Era fighting. Of that number 47,000 deaths were due to action of hostile forces.

### New material may replace asphalt

COLLEGE STATION — A transportation researcher says within 10 years an experimental highway material using sulfur may begin to replace asphalt in many of the nation's roads.

The new mix, a plasticized sulfur called sulphlex, could be particularly superior to current asphalt binders in the massive interstate highway system which is now 25 years old and is beginning to show signs of major disrepair, said Dr. Dallas Little, a civil engineer and researcher for the Texas Transportation Institute.

Little said in smaller roads where the layers of highway material were both thinner and fewer in number, traditional asphalt might prove superior.
