Almost a year ago John Lennon was gunned down by a demented youth who claimed that John Lennon was his idol. A strange sort of Hero-worship, wouldn't you say?

Contest Tied As Last Week Here

Contestants have labored through twelve weeks in the Friona Star's football contest, and still nothing is settled. In fact, the contest may well go down to the final game on the final day before the champion is determined in the contest.

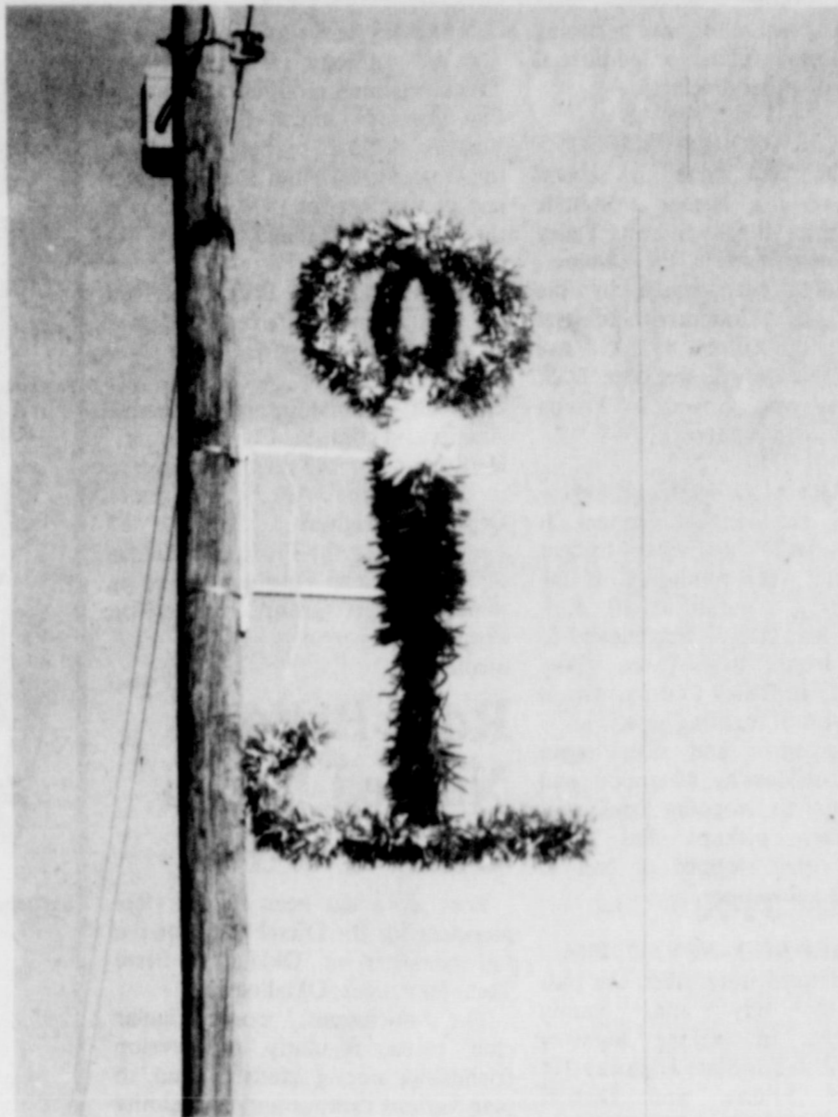
The reason for the above statement is the fact that two contestants, Mark Neill and Kenneth McLellan, are deadlocked for the lead in the contest with scores of 187 going into the final weekend of the event.

And those two contestants don't have a lead-pipe cinch of deciding the outcome between them. Just a point behind in second place is Johnny Curtis of Farwell with a score of 186.

Next, in third place, are Ron Cain and Jim Pope, tied with scores of 185. Jerry Hinkle has fourth place all to himself with 184 points, just three points off the pace, and Marie Fleming is next at 183.

If that isn't enough challengers, Tom Johnson and Wright Williams are five points back, but would have to rely on a bunch of upsets to come out on top.

McLellan tied up the lead by correctly picking 19 games in last weekend's contest, one more than Neill, the leader for the past four weeks. Curtis also scored a 19, to keep pace. Cain and Pope, in third place, each had scores of 17. Hinkle tried to make up some ground, but some of his "long shots" did not

City's Sales Tax Check Shows Gain

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday sent checks totaling \$96.4 million to 948 Texas cities as their share of the one per cent city sales tax for November.

The payment this month is \$16.3 million more than Texas cities received during a comparable period in 1980.

The payments push totals for Texas cities through November of this year to \$614.7 million—a 16.6 per cent increase over payments for the same 11-month period in 1980.

In area cities several noticed a change in their amounts from last period.

Hereford's payment this period resulted in \$68,852.18 as compared to \$79,066.93 at the same time last year.

Friona received a payment of \$12,013.41 which compared to last year's figure of \$12,701.36, but had paid in \$84,388.17 as compared to \$75,947.43 at the same time last year, which was an increase of 11.11 per cent.

By contrast, Farwell received a net payment of \$461.83, which was a 31.26 per cent decrease in payment from the amount paid last year at this time which amounted to \$3,568.96. In 1981, Farwell had paid \$16,272.76 compared to \$23,671.84 at the same time last year.

Bovina received a net payment of \$4,152.73, which was an 11.31 per cent increase over the amount of \$3,506.36, which was the payments comparable from last year and has paid in \$23,297.41 to date, as opposed to \$20,931.10 at the same time last year.

Commissioners Talk Road Project

The Parmer County Commissioners met in session to discuss their agenda Monday, November 23, 1981, with thirteen visitors present.

All of the commissioners were present as was Judge Porter Roberts. Also present at the meeting were representatives of the Texas

Department of Highways and Public Transportation, and ten County residents. All were there to discuss the proposed highway project concerning FM Highway 3333's connection to US 60 from the west.

The court voted to accept the minute order, with commissioner McGehee abstaining.

A bill was approved for payment from the Commissioners which was from Seth Ralston for 4-H club supplies.

Also approved for payment was a bill from a Plainview doctor on a Parmer County patient who was admitted into the MH/MR center in Plainview. The bill was for a chest X-ray.

A bill was received by the Commissioners from Bickerstaff, Heath, and Smiley, attorneys at law, for legal services concerning the re-districting proposals within the county.

A Resolution was received from Swisher County concerning the nuclear test hole project currently being discussed in their county. The opponents to this project were wanting the Parmer County Commissioners to go in with them on the resolution, stating they were against making the tests. The Parmer County Commissioners decided to table the matter at the present time.

A letter was received by the Commissioners from the County Tax Appraisal Board, stating that they were wanting to extend a contract to start at an earlier time than the previous contract. This was accepted.

Sheriff Bill Morgan reported to the Commissioners that worms had gotten into a storage room in the courthouse and infested some items stored in the room. The Commissioners voted to have the infested areas of the courthouse sprayed.

Card Project In 26th Year Here

Modern Study Club will sponsor "Project Christmas Card in Friona for the 26th consecutive year, it was announced this week.

The project benefits Parmer County Community Hospital during the Christmas season each year, and in the course of its history has raised over \$48,000 to purchase equipment for the local hospital.

Equipment which cost over \$33,500 has been provided in the past ten years by gifts to the project. Last year the project raised \$4,100 which provided a large cardiac care unit for the hospital, including an additional heart monitor and an additional cardiac care room.

"This additional cardiac unit has really been used. I don't know how we had gotten along without it. Now, if we have more than one heart patient at a time, we don't have to be in a position of making a choice as to which one to put on the heart monitor," said a spokesman for the hospital.

Residents of the area are requested by the club each year to donate to the fund rather than mailing Christmas cards to local friends. Names of those contributing are published on a full page in the Christmas edition of the Friona Star, as a community-wide greeting to everyone in the Friona

area. The Star donates the full page to the project each year.

Donations may be left at Friona State Bank. Club members also will place containers at a number of local businesses, where residents may leave their donations.

Deadline for donating to the fund and being a part of this year's project will be Tuesday, December 15.

There is no set amount for the donations, but each person or family is requested to donate at least the amount of money they would normally spend on Christmas cards and postage, mailing to local friends.

Iona Cook is chairman for Project Christmas Card for the second straight year. Assisting as members of the committee are Estelle Caffey, Carmaleet Truitt, Vera Beil and Ilene Osborn.

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FRIONA FLASHBACKS

...from the files of The Friona Star

50 YEARS AGO--NOV. 29, 1931

O.F. Lange, manager of Rockwell Bros. & Company lumber dealers at this place, received a telegram Tuesday morning informing him of the peaceful passing away of Mr. J.M. Rockwell at an early hour that morning at his home in Houston. Rockwell was president of Rockwell Bros. & Co., which has had business interests in Friona almost from the time of the founding of the town.

45 YEARS AGO--NOV. 20, 1936

About 16 Friona people took advantage of the Santa Fe Railroad's extremely low round trip rates from the various points in Parmer County to the Centennial grounds at Dallas last week. Two whole days were allowed for visiting the centennial, and the roundtrip fare from Friona was \$4.75.

A few coops of turkeys have arrived on the Friona market within the past ten days.

40 YEARS AGO--NOV. 21, 1941

The collapse of a large water supply tank at the Blackwell Hardware and Furniture Store Tuesday night caused severe damage to a transformer bank on the lines of the Texas-New Mexico Utilities Co. and shattered some boards on the rear wall of the Rockwell Bros. Lumber shed. The tank and tower, one of the landmarks of Friona, was constructed by Logan Sympon and Fred White some time in the early twenties.

35 YEARS AGO--NOV. 15, 1946

E.L. Price, one of Friona's pioneer barbers, who, some time ago sold his shop here to Ralph Taylor, and has recently been working in a shop at Hereford, has purchased a shop at McLean and has taken charge of it.

Mr. and Mrs. Carl C. Maurer, who flew to Colorado City, Colorado about two weeks ago, to visit their daughters who are attending college there, became snowbound and were forced to remain several days, returned home the latter part of last week.

30 YEARS AGO--NOV. 15, 1951

A large group of citizens of Precinct 1 met with the County Commissioners Court today for the

second time this week, asking audience to hear the plea for an independent road district to follow the boundaries of the precinct. The proposed district would in no way be detrimental to the county road program, rather enabling state approved construction and releasing the local road funds for additional roadwork in other precincts.

25 YEARS AGO--NOV. 15, 1956

For the first time in several months, Friona has a telephone service man. Since Everett Talley moved away early in the summer, efforts have been made by the Chamber of Commerce to get someone to replace him. Many Friona residents will welcome D.G. McClellan, who moved to Friona from Littlefield last week.

20 YEARS AGO--NOV. 16, 1961

Funeral services for Samuel J. Green, 34, junior high school teacher and coach, were conducted at the First Baptist Church at 10 a.m. Tuesday. Mr. Green, who moved to Friona from the Three Way community in Bailey County, was in his sixth year of teaching here.

Blowing snow and sleet began falling late Monday afternoon and in addition to stopping combines, motor cars, pickups and other vehicles, either stopped or had to proceed at a slow pace.

15 YEARS AGO--NOV. 17, 1966

Official steps were taken the past week, by city and county governments in seeking highway improvements for State Highway 214 south of Friona, and District Highway Engineer, O.L. Crain, indicates that the road will be considered in next year's program for the district. Both bodies submitted resolutions; the city asked that an overpass be constructed across the railroad linking the highway into Grand Avenue.

10 YEARS AGO--NOV. 18, 1971

The Hub Exchange (265) of the West Texas Rural Telephone Exchange was converted to Direct Distance Dialing (DDD) on Monday morning of this week, making both the Hub and Parmer exchanges available for "One Plus" dialing.

The completion of the Hub system sets the stage for the conversion in Friona, which is scheduled for Saturday, December 4, making all the immediate Friona area on the DDD system.

5 YEARS AGO--NOV. 21, 1976

A.W. Anthony, Jr., of Friona, Texas was honored Thursday at the first Annual Golden Spread Agri-Business Seminar by being named as the Outstanding High Plains Farmer and/or Rancher for 1976. Anthony is the first High Plains resident to receive the award.

Garvin Thorn of Friona received the American Farmer Degree November 11, at special ceremonies held during the 49th National Convention of the Future Farmers of America in Kansas City, Missouri. He was one of 748 members selected to receive the American Farmer Degree, highest degree of membership in the FFA. As a holder of the American Farmer Degree, he joins a select group representing about one per cent of all FFA members.

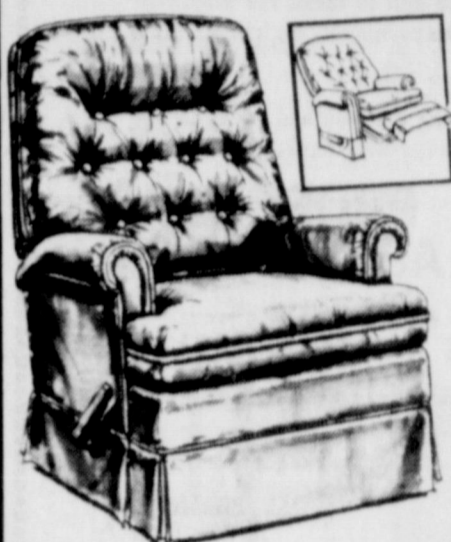

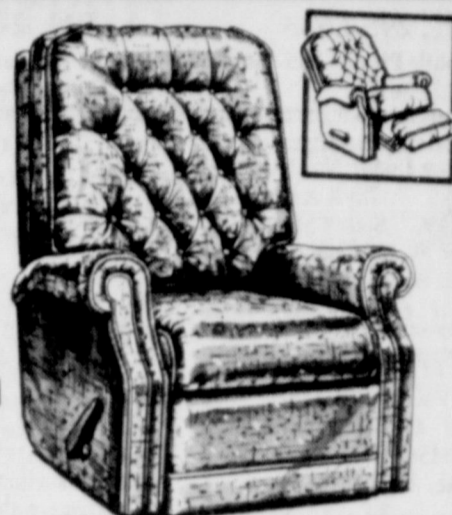

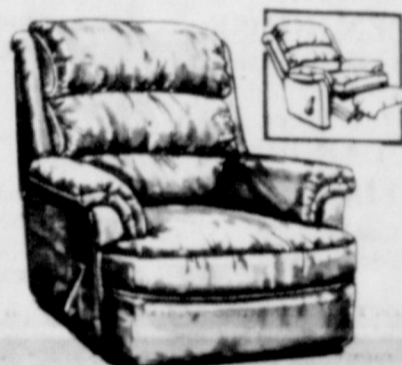

Posters promoting the project will be placed in downtown businesses about December 1, Mrs. Cook said.

Money raised from the 1981 project will go toward the purchase of a new "call" system for nurses on duty. The system will be used to tell nurses where to go whenever emergencies occur.

"We are in dire need of updating our present system" said a hospital spokesman. The new system is expected to cost between \$4,000 and \$6,000.

In recent years, the project fund has purchased a heart monitoring unit, automatic beds for the new hospital wing, heating and air conditioning for the emergency and surgery rooms, fire alarm system for the building and an anesthetic machine.

Also, a Coulter counter, a monitor for the surgery room, a spirometer (a device to measure pulmonary functions for lung patients), I.V. drip counters, a table and carts for the operating room and a new light for the emergency room.

Beginning in 1970, the project has selected a particular object or need for its funds, and in that time has purchased equipment costing roughly \$35,600.

Project Christmas Card has become a fine way for residents of the area, and even former residents, to say "Merry Christmas" to their friends, and at the same time assist Parmer County Community Hospital.

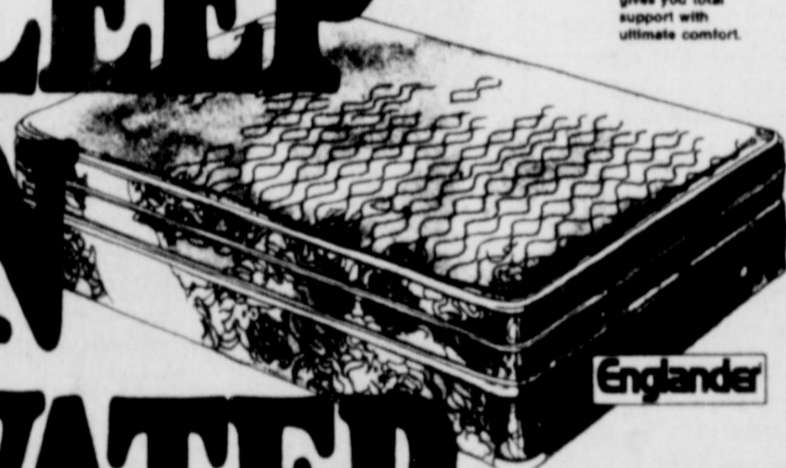

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Chieftain Basketballers Win Over Bovina, S-E

The Friona Chieftains scored an overtime win over Bovina's Mustangs in a game at Bovina Tuesday night, 49-46.

Friona trailed for much of the game before rallying to tie the game and send it into overtime where the Chieftains used free throws for the victory.

Bovina held a 16-13 lead at the end of the first quarter, and owned a one-point lead at halftime, 24-23.

Friona never had the lead in the third quarter. Bovina held four-point leads at 29-25, 31-27 and 33-29. Mike Neill came back with field goals after each of the final two Bovina scores, to cut the margin back to two points each time at 31-29 and 33-31.

However, Bovina scored three points in the last minute of the quarter, to take a five-point margin at 36-31.

Bovina's lead became a six-point

margin early in the final quarter at 38-32, and again at 40-34 when Richard Shepherd hit a basket with 6:14 showing on the clock.

However, Friona scored the next eight points, to come from behind and take the lead.

Joey Howard hit a basket with 5:21 left in the quarter to cut the margin to 40-36; Mark Tucker scored for a 40-38 deficit at the 4:07 mark, and Howard connected again with 3:04 on the clock as Friona tied the game at 40-all.

Richie Malouf then scored a basket with 2:18 left to play for Friona's first lead of the half, 42-40, as Bovina couldn't get the lid off their basket.

With 12 seconds left in regulation time, Mark Tucker missed a chance to win the game when he stepped to the line with a 1-1 free throw opportunity. However, Tucker missed his first shot, but Friona

rebounded.

In the commotion, Mike Neill was fouled, and he stepped back to the line with nine seconds showing, with another chance to put the game away. Lo and behold, Neill missed his shot as well.

This time Bovina grabbed the rebound, whipped it downcourt and scored with five seconds remaining, to tie the game at 42-all and send it into overtime.

Bovina scored the first basket in overtime for a 44-42 lead, but Friona began to click.

Tucker canned a pair of free throws with 1:56 left in the overtime period to tie the score at 44-all. Then Neill hit one out of two foul shots for a 45-44 lead with 1:48 left.

Bovina scored to take a 46-45 lead with 56 seconds left, but Neill's free shot tied the score and Robert Caballero matched that with a basket with 29 seconds remaining for a 48-46 Friona lead.

Neill made the second of his pair of shots with a second left, for the final margin of 49-46.

On Friday, November 20, the Chiefs scored their second win of the season, 47-27 over Springlake-Earth. Mike Neill scored 14 points to pace the Chieftain scoring.

"We were well pleased with our game at Bovina. They are an explosive team. We played super defense. In three games we have allowed only 110 points—and Bovina is capable of scoring a lot of points," said Coach Tom Johnson.

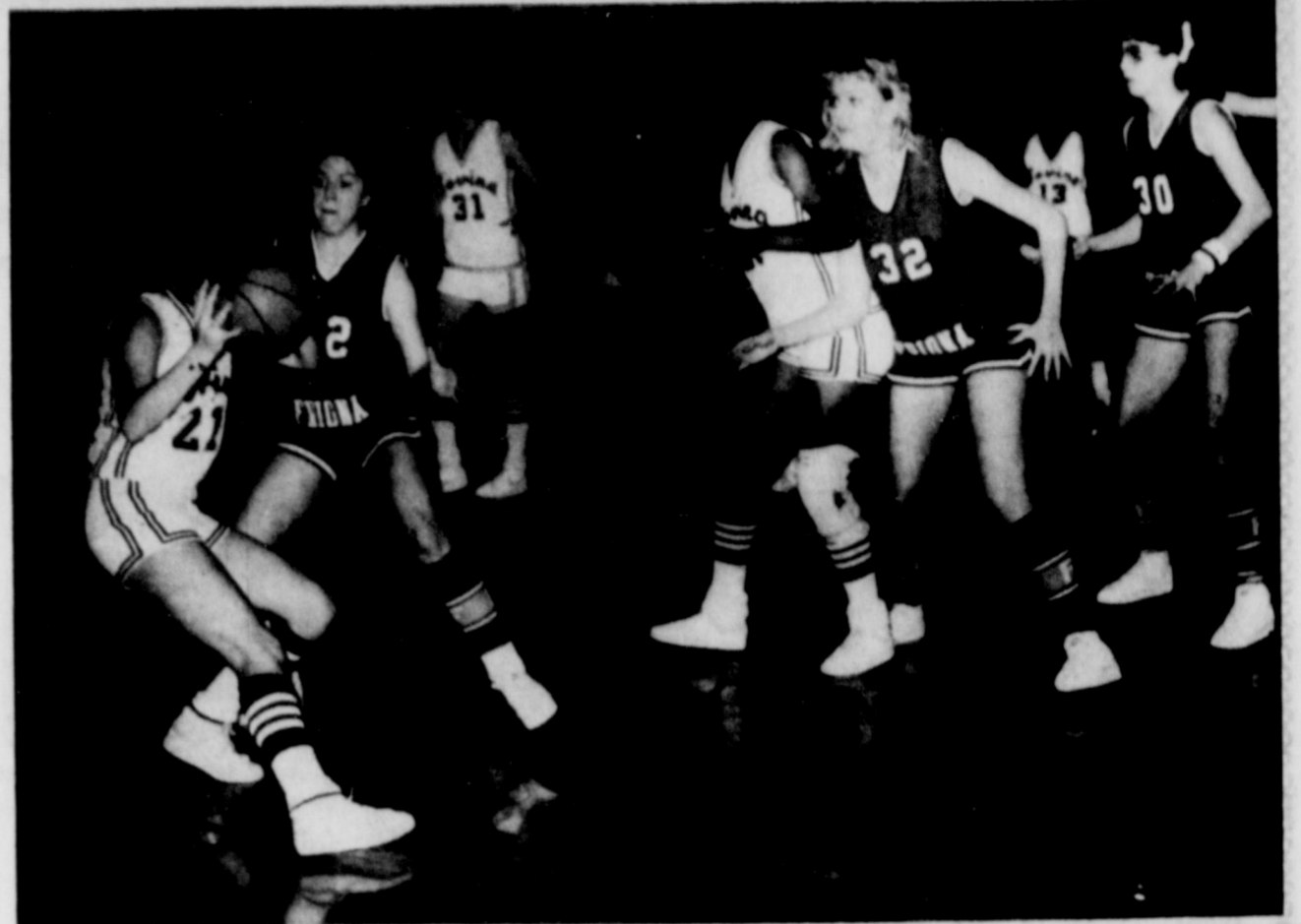

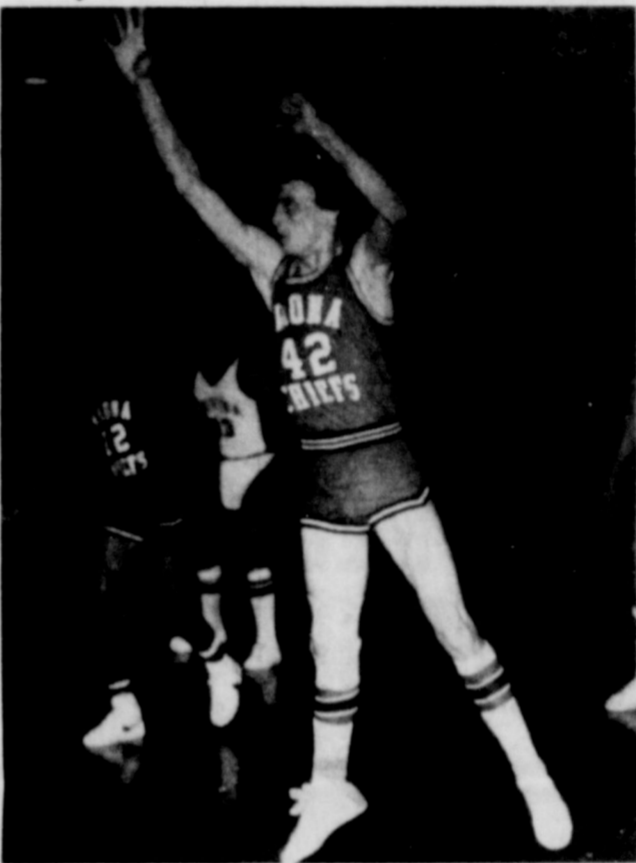

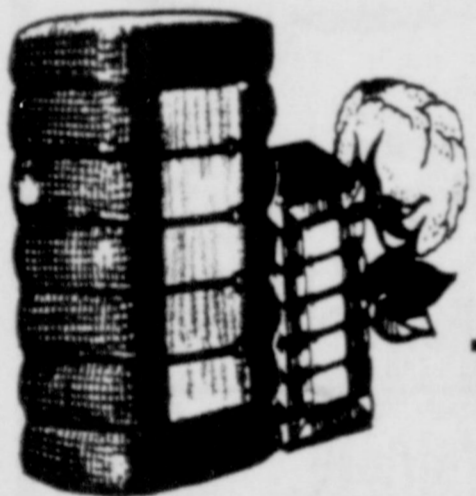

Although originally scheduled for the Municipal Auditorium, the commencement exercises have been moved to the coliseum because of the large response by graduating students.

Former Texas Governor Smith, a 1934 Texas Tech graduate and the school's first alumnus ever to be elected governor of Texas, was appointed chairman of the State Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, earlier this year by Governor Bill Clements. The Coordinating Board is an 18-member appointive body which oversees public higher education in Texas.

More than 700 students have indicated they will participate in the commencement program. Dr. Len Ainsworth, associate vice president for academic affairs, said more than 130 students who completed their degree requirements during the summer session and about 500 more who will finish their degree requirements this semester will participate. More than 100 graduate students also are expected to attend.

With commencement participants usually bringing several guests, the university's Convocations Committee switched the ceremonies from the auditorium to the coliseum to provide ample space for all. Ainsworth said a survey in one college indicated each graduate would bring six persons to the exercises.

The fall commencement was initiated this semester in response to requests of students, parents and alumni, as a way to better serve the growing number of graduates completing their degree requirements in August and December.

Commencement speaker Smith and his wife, Ima, have been designated distinguished alumni of Texas Tech.

Smith served six years as state representative, six years as state senator, six years as lieutenant governor and four years as governor. When he became governor in 1969 he was the first Texan since the Civil War to move directly from lieutenant governor to governor by election.

During his tenure as the state's highest elected officer, more new state universities and medical and dental training facilities were established than under any other governor.

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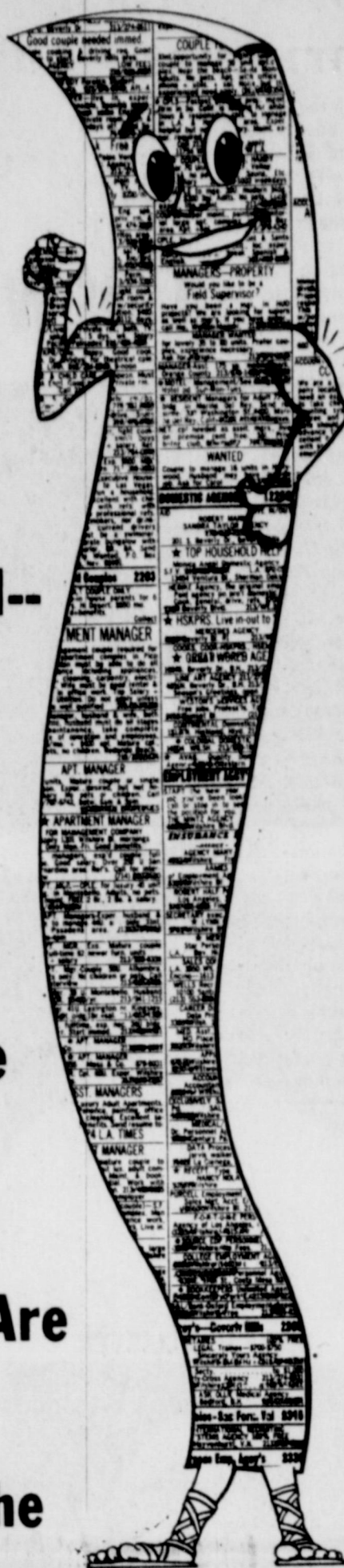
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Postal Officials Offer Christmas Mailing Tips

With the Christmas mailing season just ahead, Friona Postmaster Richard Wilson is offering tips for customers to assure that their cards and packages arrive on time and in good shape.

In addition to shopping and mailing early, customers are urged to properly address cards and packages with the name, street number and name (or post office box number), and the city, state and Zip Code reserved for the last line.

"It is also a good idea to put a slip of paper with the recipients name and address and your return address inside parcels, and be sure the addressing on the outside of the parcel includes your return address and Zip Code," Wilson says.

Customers are also reminded to check the size of their envelopes before mailing Christmas and other holiday cards. Letter size standards require that envelopes be at least 3 1/2 inches high and 5 inches long to be accepted for mailing.

The Postal Service is also asking customers to put an ounce of extra care into preparing parcel post and other packages for mailing. Parcels will arrive at their intended destination in good shape if mailers will follow a few simple suggestions:

Cushion: Make sure contents are well-cushioned and there is no empty space in the box. Use crumpled newspaper around the item—including all sides, top and bottom. Commercially available foam shells or air-pocket padding also make good cushioning materials.

Don't overwrap: Just use your carton. Brown paper and twine cord are not necessary. Paper can rip, and twine can become entangled with processing equipment.

Seal properly: Close your parcel with one of the three recommended types of tape, pressure sensitive, nylon-reinforced kraft paper, or glass-reinforced pressure sensitive.

Avoid smudges: Use smudge-proof ink for your addressing.

Locate addresses properly: Put the recipient's address in the lower right portion of the container. Put your return address in the upper left hand corner. Remove all other labels from the box.

Use Zip Codes: Be sure to include the ZIP Code in both the recipient's and your return address.

Time it right: Mail early in the month and early in the day. This will help you avoid the rush.

Use the right service: Irreplaceable items, cash and other valuables should be sent by registered mail.

If you run out of time: Priority mail affords First-Class handling for packages weighing over 12 ounces and up to 70 pounds. Priority mail can be sent from any post office, station or branch or through rural carriers to any address in the U.S. Priority mail can even be used for foreign mailings.

The service is available with insurance, return receipt, COD, certificates of mailing and special delivery. Customers interested in priority mail should contact the post office for details.

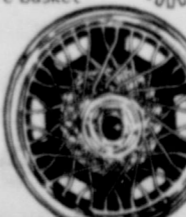

County Food Show Is Set December 5 At Lazbuddie

Each contestant will have to make up a menu for one day and each of the basic food groups will need to be represented in this menu.

A small percentage of the contestant's score will also be based on the way the food is displayed.

Laura Jacobs, County Extension Agent for Home Economics, said the main objective of this type of show is to teach youngsters about the essentials of food nutrition and also to give them poise and confidence by

having them tell someone else how to prepare their food dish.

There will be three categories for the contestants. The PeeWee group will include ages up to 9 and these children can go no farther than this contest.

In the junior division will be participants ages 9-14 and they can not go past the district contest.

Senior division includes ages 14-19 and these persons can go on to the State contest.

For those contestants who will advance past the county show, the district show will be held in Lubbock, on the campus of Texas Tech University December 12.

And, for those who advance past the district food show, the state food show will be held in College Station in June.

There is about 180 4-H'ers in Parmer County and the club is getting

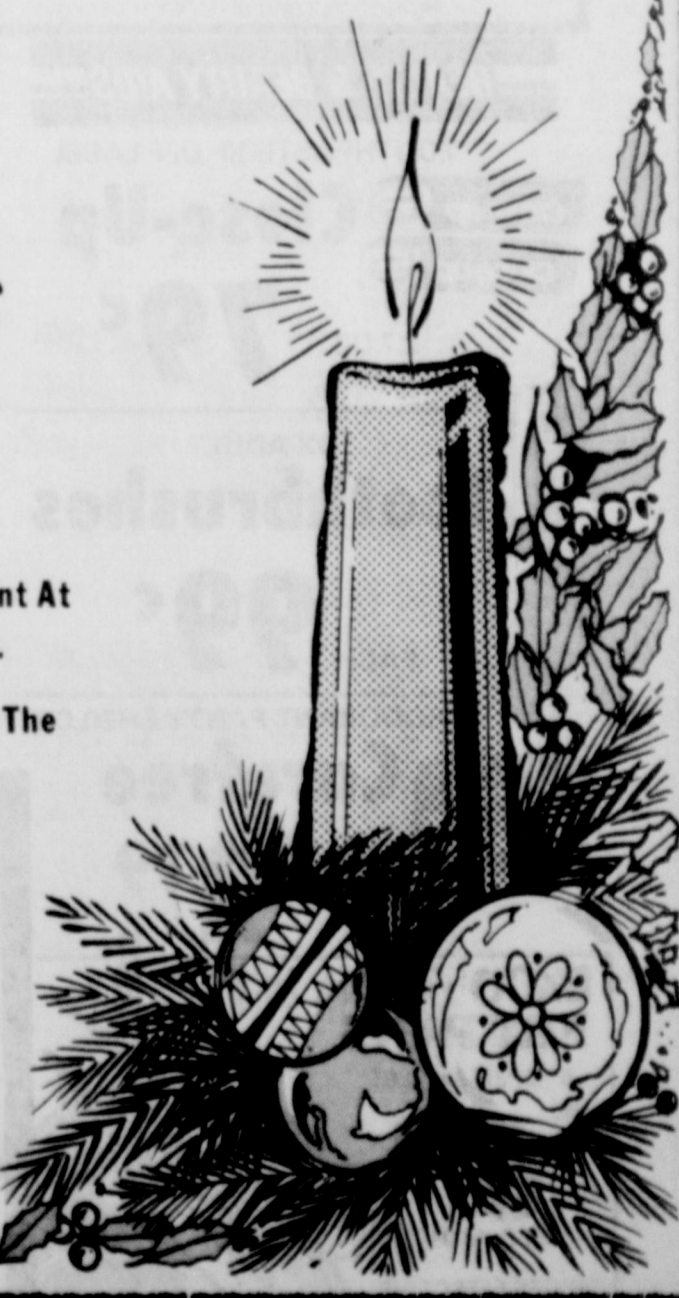
