City's 1981 Building Totals Impressive

CONGRATULATIONS TO THE Historical Parmer County Commission, which began just prior to Christmas the distribution of its new book, Prairie Progress, a history

of Parmer County. The new, 600-page volume is packed with history, and we guarantee you that you'd better have some extra time on your hands if you pick it up and start to leaf through the book and read it--because it's hard to put down.

The newest county history contains a written history on each community in the county--not just the incorporated cities, but others such as Black, Clay's Corner, Lakeview, Lariat, Lazbuddie, Oklahoma Lane and Rhea.

It also features historical sketches of all the schools in Parmer County, past and present. If you thought you knew all the old schools in the county, did you remember such institutions as Cracker Box, Big Square, Jesko, Old Dobie, Old Dipping Vat, O'Neal, Red Tower, Prytz, State Line and Buckeye?

There is also a section on churches in Parmer County, with 27 local congregations being featured in pictures and print. Also included are articles on cemeteries.

A good section is devoted to agriculture, featuring crops, cattle, the county livestock show, annual hunt and pheasant organizations.

Under the section "Community Health" are write-ups and pictures of Parmer County Community Hospital, the Bovina Medical Clinic, the Farwell Clinic and Prairie Acres nursing home.

Celebrations are highlighted also, with historical sketches on Maize Days, Bull Town Days, and Border Town Days. A section is devoted to pictures of notable homes in the county.

A number of old, priceless articles have been re-printed, and preserved for posterity. Among these are such items as "Diary of the 1936 Oklahoma Lane Senior Trip," kept by Harold Carpenter; Childhood Recollections of Friona" by Elwin Gishler; "Hog-Killing Time" by Mary Collier and one of the old "Light and Hitch" episodes by Laura V. Hamner, this one dealing on the early-day settlement of Friona.

There is even a section on the weather, showing how our county can feature all extremes. Sections include an article on the "Dust Bowl Days" and longtime weather prognosticator, J.W. "Indian" Crim.

Another section features organizations, such as the various senior citizens groups, Girl and Boy Scouts.

Some 70 pages of the book are devoted to memorial and tribute pages, to loved ones both living and deceased. Another 40 pages contain business histories, as the company write-ups were another way promoters of the book used to help finance the venture.

Of course, the main section of the book--over 300 pages and 869 individual stories, contain family histories of present-day county residents. Scanning the pages of this section enables you to learn a great deal about your friends and neighbors that you did not know previously.

Naturally, there are many families whose write-ups are not in the book. But after many months of pleas by the book committee, a project of this nature has to pick a termination

To our way of thinking, "Prairie Progress" is a great success. We commend Grace Whitefield and her hard-working committee on a job well done.

By the way: those needing to pick up their history books may do so on Wednesdays or Thursdays each week from 1:30-4:30 p.m. at the Congregational Church.

of \$296,000; six permits for new business buildings, valued at \$210,000, and 29 for additions or alterations, (including the school), valued at \$1,175,833.

The building totals were the most for the city since permits totalled \$1,780,475 in 1970 (which totals did not include a 60-unit apartment complex started that year), and were the thirdhighest in the city's history.

Thanks to the school's building program, local building was able to top the \$1 million mark for the eighth time in the past 18 years.

The school permit was issued in March, making that month the largest from a dollar standpoint; although the six permits issued in April were the most for a single month. Included in that month were the permits for the new facilities at Friona Ford Sales, and for Friona

By comparison, the permit totals for the 1980 calendar year stood at \$501,150.

Card Project Raises \$4,000

The system, which will be used to tell nurses where to go whenever emergencies occur, was expected to cost at least \$4,000.

Four Killed In Accidents

Three people were killed in a twocar smash-up at the Hub intersection on December 26, and a Bovina resident was killed in a car-truck accident near Parmerton Hill on December 29.

These fatal wrecks brought to a grim conclusion a year which saw ten people killed on county roads.

Area Gets Cold Snap; **Light Snow**


The coldest temperatures of the winter season were experienced by area residents this week, although the area missed what looked like an opportunity for a good snow.

Year's Rain **Most Here Since 1969**

Rainfall measured in Friona during 1981 was more than six inches above the average for the area, as tabulated for the past 20 years.

Figures compiled by Friona City Manager A.L. (Jake) Outland revealed that a total of 21.58 inches of rain was measured during the calendar year just past. It was the largest total since 1969, when almost exactly an inch more was registered locally: 22.59.

In the 20 years since Outland has been keeping the weather records, an average of 15.44 inches of rainfall has been received per year.

August of the past year proved to be the wettest month of the year, with 5.82 inches of the total coming that

Also arrested by Talkington on December 31 for the same charge was Oscar Stevenson, 19, of Clovis. He was fined \$100 plus court costs.

Joe Andrew Costello, 34, of Farwell, was arrested by Trooper Talkington January 1 for possession of marijuana, less than two ounces, and was fined \$100 plus court costs.

Todd Meeks, 18, of Farwell, was arrested by Trooper Steve Talkington for DWI on January 1, and was fined \$150 plus court costs.

In addition to the above guilty pleas, there were several other arrests made during the holidays, including the arrest of a juvenile, who is being held for Friona PD, and a public intoxication arrest, as well as a probation violator who is being held over for district court.

In recent district court action, Louis Spears of Friona, was convicted of burglary of a habitation with intent to commit assault, for which he was granted eight years probation.

DPS REPORT

Troopers of the Texas Department of Public Safety were kept busy over the holidays as there were four traffic fatalities reported from accidents in Parmer County alone.

The second vehicle was travelling southbound on Highway 214 and broadsided the Huffman car, when it failed to stop at the intersection.

The driver of the first vehicle, William Huffman, Arlene Stamper, and Dorothy Stamper died from the

The driver of the second car had only facial injuries.

In the second accident in the county, which occured December 29 at approximately 6:45 a.m. at Parmerton Hill, the driver of the first vehicle, Merle Ross McPherson of Bovina, was operating a two door Dodge car.

Driver of the second vehicle was Brent T. Beske of Albuquerque, N.M. He was driving a truck with two

Vehicle one was west bound on US 60 and vehicle two was eastbound on US 60 when vehicle two crossed the center stripe and collided head-on with vehicle one, killing the driver of the car at the scene. Neither of the vehicles was speeding at the time of the accident
