Lundys Sweep Steer, Heifer Show Honors

Friona's Jeff Lundy exhibited the Grand Champion steer, and his sister Corrie claimed the Grand Champion heifer trophy at the 35th annual Parmer County Jr. Livestock Show Friday.

Lundy's 1280-pound Angus-Chianina cross steer was tapped

for the top spot, and Charlie Trimble, Bovina FFA, took Reserve Champion with his 1335-pound Maine-Anjou entry.

Other class winners were Richard Malouf and Wendy Tatum, Friona, and Jeff Jesko, Lazbuddie.

Lundy's steer won the heavyweight

class, and Trimble's was the jumbo division winner.

A record 270 barrows were being judged Friday afternoon, as ideal weather blessed the annual show.

In Thursday judging, Bret Whitten

of Bovina exhibited the Grand Champion Lamb of the 1982 show. Whitten, a Bovina FFA student, exhibited the breed champion in the Suffolk division, and then won the top prize in the championship class.

The reserve champion lamb was exhibited by another Bovina entry, Jon Riddle, a fine wool entry.

Other breed champions were exhibited by: fine wool, Sean Mason, champ; Chad Rhodes, reserve; fine wool crosses: Jon Riddle, champ; Shain Rhodes, reserve; Hampshire: Tracy Moore, champ, Shane Mason, reserve.

Suffolks: Bret Whitten, champion; Sean Mason, reserve; Southdowns and crosses: Glenda Ellis, champ; Sheldon Mason, reserve; Other breeds and crosses: Chad Rhodes, champ; Monte Smith, reserve.

For the first time, a heifer class was judged on Friday morning.

Corrie Lundy of Friona exhibited the grand champion heifer, an Angus-Chianina, and Jeff Jesko of Lazbuddie had the reserve champ.

The show will wind up on Saturday, with the auction sale of all the top animals, beginning at 1 p.m.

All businessmen and others interested in supporting the showmen by purchasing an animal are urged to be present.

Immediately preceding the sale will be the presentation of the showmanship awards to top showmen in each division.

Complete results of the 1982 show will be printed in next week's edition of the Friona Star.

Young showmen from the Friona Independent School District exhibited some 172 animals at the third annual Friona Junior Livestock Show on Saturday, February 13 at the Community Center-Showbarn.

Daylen Gallman had the grand champion barrow of the show, beating out 82 other entries for the title. Gallman's animal, a heavyweight crossbreed, first had won honors in the crossbreed division.

Joe Kyle Reeve, who had the second place heavyweight crossbreed barrow, won the reserve champion honors in the show.

Jeff Lundy won the championship of the steer show with his heavyweight entry, an Angus, and Roddy Berend exhibited the reserve champion steer.

Cori Lundy exhibited the grand champion heifer from a light field of four entries, the first time for this division to be judged at the local show.

Shain Rhodes exhibited the grand champion lamb, a Hampshire entry. Kemal Tongate had the reserve champion, a Suffolk.

SPS Seeks Rate Hike

Southwestern Public Service Company announced it will request a 12.7 percent increase in the retail price of electricity in Texas, ranging from \$5 to \$10 per month for the typical residential customer.

The proposed increases include \$19.2 million in rates within Texas city jurisdictions and \$22.3 million in rural area rates which are set by the Texas Public Utility Commission outside city jurisdictions.

Bert Ballengee, the electric utility's president, said "the increase is imperative later this calendar year because of the need to change to coal as the fuel source in the Company's power plants, because of high money costs, and because of inflation."

Ballengee pointed out that "although inflation has totaled 23 percent since the last electricity rate adjustment two years ago, SPS is able to hold its request to half that amount as a rate increase."

A significant portion of the new revenue request will help pay for the first unit of the Company's second coal-fired power plant, Tolk Station, which is scheduled to go into service early this summer.

"We must change our system from gas to coal because coal will save our customers money," Ballengee said.

Ballengee said that "even with a rate increase, the typical Southwestern Public Service residential customer in Texas will spend about \$4 to \$5 per month less than he would have, if the Company had not made the decision to move to coal and away from natural gas as boiler fuel in new power plants. For all of the Company's customers, this amounts to a savings of about \$106 million a year when the new Tolk Station is fully operating."

No Action Added To Two Races

Filing activity remained slow this week in the city and school election, scheduled for April 3.

Three seats are expiring on the school board. Incumbents Floyd Reeve, Teddy Fangman and George Frye have filed their applications for re-election.

In the city election, terms of aldermen Mike Chaney and Clarence Monroe and Mayor B.K. Buske are expiring. As of Thursday, none of the incumbents had filed.

Deadline for filing in either of the races is March 3. Applications may be signed at either the Superintendent's office or at the City Hall.

Iota Chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma Society met Thursday, February 11 at 7 p.m. in the Friona High School Library.

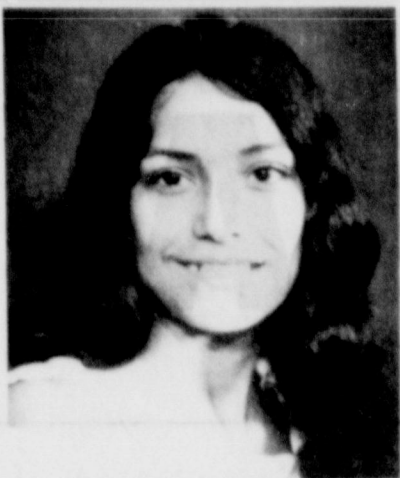
The moment of meditation was given by Patsy Gresham. The business session was conducted by Lynn Roberts, vice president of Iota Eta.

Gifted/Talented Program Offered

In only its second year, the Gifted/Talented program at Friona High School provides opportunities for a group of students to explore the possibilities of their individual potential and develop their special abilities beyond a point they might have formerly imagined.

Although popular belief holds that bright children make their own way, research has shown that a lack of challenge will likely cause these students to "turn-off" or misbehave. In 1978 the Texas legislature appropriated funds to be used for the education of gifted children.

It is estimated that about five per cent of the school-age population is in the "gifted" class. Funds are appropriated by this standard. Since the amount received by small school districts would be relatively small, the districts in the Panhandle area formed a co-op under the administration of the Region XVI Education Service Center in Amarillo to provide programs for their gifted students.

The schools participate in a Seminars Project during which six

times a school year the students meet together in a centralized location to attend programs of their choosing.

Topics have ranged from lasers to law. Presenters have included Dr. Alexander Ginzburg, Russian dissident, and scientists from Los Alamos, New Mexico's scientific laboratories. Other opportunities are available to the students through the program.

A summer institute is held on the campus of WTSU for a week of concentrated study in academic areas as well as study in general-interest areas.

Senior students have the opportunity to visit the laboratories at Los Alamos during a weekend in the spring. Symphony tickets and play tickets have also been made available for various performances in Canyon and Amarillo.

In addition to the region-wide opportunities the students are meeting on a regular basis in their home school to pursue different areas of study.

The students meet before or after school to do background research before attending regional seminars.

They also study areas which deal with giftedness and learning processes. They record thoughts daily in a journal.

At selected times during the year the students are released from regular classes for half a day for mini-courses conducted on the Friona High School campus. Topics covered thus far this year have dealt with consumer chemistry and were conducted by Richard Tullis, high school chemistry instructor.

In March and April mini-courses are planned in speed reading and advanced research techniques to be followed by a field trip to a university library. Area cultural opportunities are attended whenever possible.

Cheryl Weatherly is the faculty director of the Gifted/Talented program at Friona High School.

"The program can definitely be termed a success. Many of the students have experienced things which opened career possibilities for them. They have also become more aware of the contribution they can make to the society which has contributed to make their experiences possible," Mrs. Weatherly says.

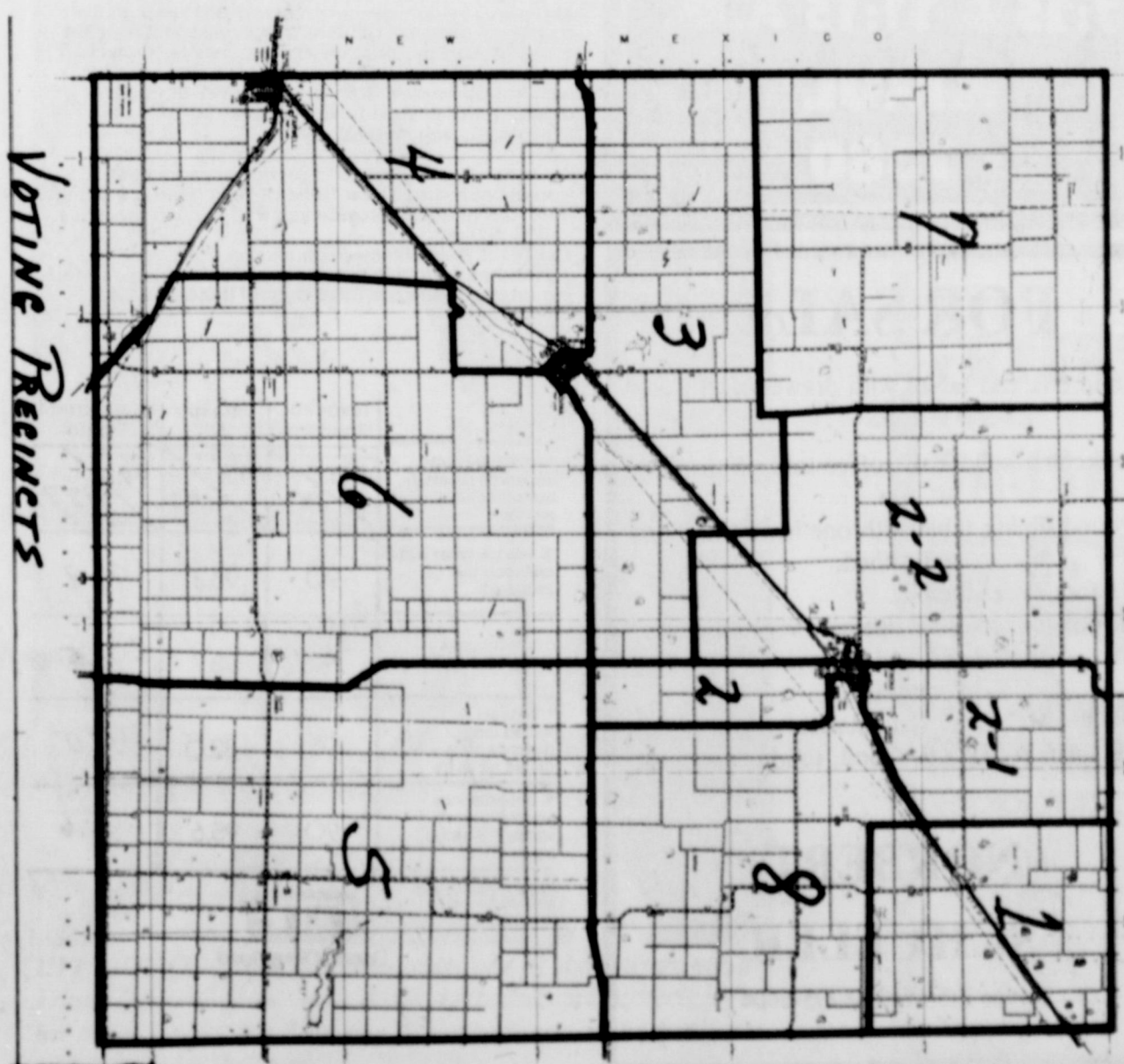

Friona High School basketballers topped teams from Muleshoe here Tuesday in a pair of district games. The Squaws downed the Mulettes, 34-26 and the Chieftains raced past the Mules, 54-41.

It was the last regular season game for the Squaws, who ended their season with a 14-10 record. The team finished the second half of district play with a fine 3-1 record good for second place.

But the Squaws were playing good defense. Miss O'Brian had an exceptional game on the boards, limiting Muleshoe to one shot in most cases. Muleshoe had a 15-10 halftime lead, thanks mainly to the outside shooting of Denise Wilson.

Friona began to get their shots to fall in the third quarter. Cara Brockman scored the first basket to trim Muleshoe's lead to 15-12, and when Miss O'Brian made a three-point play with 2:39 left in the quarter the Squaws had taken their first lead in the game, 18-17.

The lead rocked back and forth, as Christie Wiseman's jump shot with 39 seconds left in the quarter gave

Friona a 20-19 lead at the end of the third quarter.

But Joey Howard was the star of the first quarter. Muleshoe had the ball, trailing 14-7, and were playing for the last shot of the quarter. The

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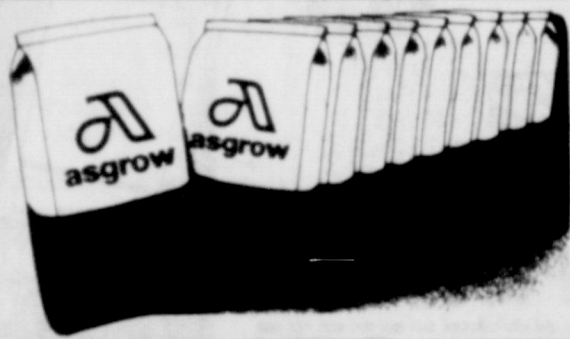

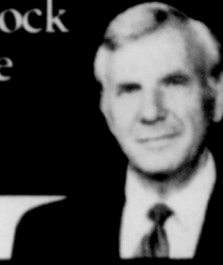

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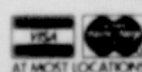
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Art Students Have Display In Amarillo

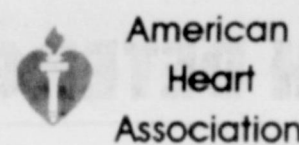

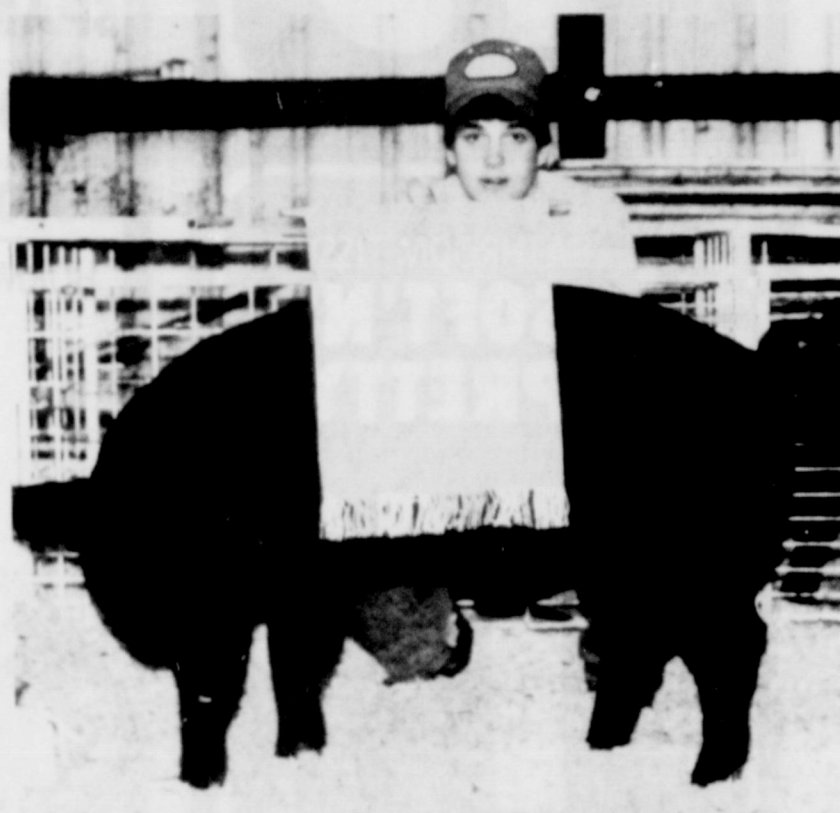

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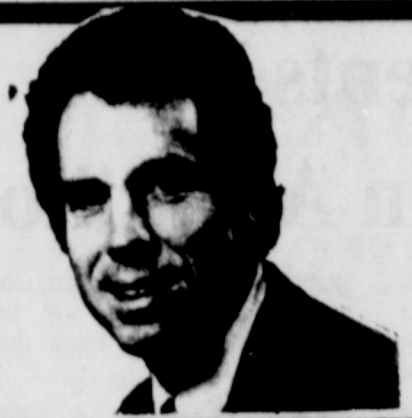
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
