## Star Lites

**HOW WELL DO YOU** know your state? Most folks who have lived in Texas for any length of time are pretty familiar with many of the basic facts, such as Texas being the second largest state, the bluebonnet is the state flower, etc.

Here's a quiz to see if you are a real true Texan with some obscure facts gleaned from the Texas Highways magazine.

How big is Texas?  
What is the state tree?  
Name the six flags which have flown over Texas.  
Where did Texas get its name?  
How many head of cattle are there in Texas?  
What percentage of Texas' 176 million acres is farm or ranch land?

If you've had trouble answering those, we'll give you a little help. Texas is 801 miles long and 773 miles wide with a total of 275,416 square miles.

The state tree is the pecan tree. The six flags of Texas were Spanish, French, Mexican, Republic of Texas, Confederate and U.S.

Texas evolved from the Indian word "tejas" for friendly. Guess that's why Texas is called the Friendship state.

There are over 15 million head of cattle in Texas, which is more cattle than there are people.

A survey in 1976 showed that an estimated 205,000 Texas farms and ranches covered about 141 million acres, some 80 per cent of the state's land area.

Texas boasts the nation's largest inland port at Laredo with dollar volume of imports and exports exceeding four billion dollars.

The state's two longest rivers are both state boundaries. The longest river is the Rio Grande which separates Texas from Mexico for 1,248 miles. The Red River on the Texas-Oklahoma border is the second longest with 640 miles through Texas and along the boundary.

When was the first cattle drive in Texas? Although the first cattle drives were not recorded, James T. White was known to have sent cattle from his Liberty Ranch in present Chambers County to New Orleans in the early 1830's before the Texas Revolution. His JTW brand is believed to have been first recorded about 1830 and it is likely that he established the Longhorn cattle industry in southeastern Texas when he brought a herd of Longhorns to Turtle Bayou in 1827.

The largest flathead catfish ever caught in Texas was landed at Lake McQueeney in 1956 and weighed 104 pounds. And that's no fish story!

The first Texas Navy was really nothing to brag about. The Texas Navy became a reality in January 1836 with the purchase of four schooners which had been authorized by the General Council on Nov. 25, 1835. However, the lifespan of the first Texas Navy was short: by mid-1837 all four vessels had been lost.

During the Civil War, Sophia Porter earned the title of "woman Paul Revere" when she forded the Red River to warn Col. James Bourland of the approach of federal forces. It is not recorded whether she shouted, "The bluecoats are coming."

Popular TV star Dan Blocker was probably about the biggest Texas fellow to ever make it B-I-G in TV-land. He was most famous for his role as "Hoss" Cartwright on the Bonanza show. He was born in DeKalb, Texas and weighed 14 pounds at birth. He was said to have been the largest baby ever born in Bowie County. When he was 12 years old he stood over six feet tall and weighed 200 pounds. As a football player at Sul Ross, he measured six feet, four inches and weighed more than 275 pounds. Blocker died in 1972 at the age of 43.

## Council Approves Patrolman Addition

Approval for the hiring of an additional patrolman for the City of Friona highlighted the regular monthly meeting of the Friona City Council Monday evening.

Chief of Police Bill Denney presented the request, and pointed out that by adding a patrolman to the force, the city could have an additional patrolman and patrol car on duty through the late hours, taking in the period when most trouble calls occur.

After much discussion of the matter, in relation to the city budget, the Chief of Police was authorized to employ an additional certified patrolman.

In other business, Mayor B.K. Buske pointed out that he and Robert Neelley, president of the Board of Governors of the Friona Community Center building had discussed adjustment in the costs of renting the facility, to assist in the utility costs and making needed repairs.

In this regard, the council passed a motion to increase the rental to \$50 for non-profit events and \$100 for ticket-selling events, with one-half of the rental being held as escrow. Half of the rental then would be returned if no damage to the building was noted upon inspection by the city.

Mayor Buske presented a petition from George Rushing, requesting annexation of five lots in Western Addition. Noting that extension of

water and sewer lines would be necessary, and that the water main would be dead-ended, a motion was passed that the request be approved, providing the developer underwrite costs for installation of utilities and engineering fees.

Clayton Yeager and John Kelley of the engineering firm, Parkhill, Smith & Cooper, Inc., conducted a public hearing on the city's proposed improvements to the city's wastewater facility.

The renovation of the facility includes enlargement of the lagoons and the addition of an aeration pond, and is due to requirements by the Environmental Protection Administration (EPA). After some discussion, the plan and contract was approved.

Outland reported that the Parmer County Tax Office was making a survey of cities and school districts, to determine how many will contract for the county office to become the collection agency for them, in addition to the assessment of properties as now required by the state. In that the local tax office is maintained in conjunction with the school district, and the school board is to also consider the proposal, no action was taken.

A deed was drawn up for the city to return Block 56, Old Town to its original owner, Leo Potishmann. The property was originally used for a sewer plant, and was deeded to the city for such use as long as needed, at the end of which time the property was to revert to Potishmann. It was

Post cards will advance in price from ten cents to 13 cents on March 22.

According to the notice, the meeting will be to discuss changes in the regulations covering fish, birds, fur-bearing animals for 1981-82.

A Bovina resident, Francisco Madrigal, 43, was killed in a car-pedestrian accident about 8 p.m. Thursday, inside the city limits of Bovina.

Madrigal was brought to Parmer County Community Hospital by Bovina Ambulance Service, but was pronounced dead at about 8:20 p.m. Cause of death was listed as massive head injuries.

Investigating officers in Bovina said that Madrigal was in the highway when he was hit. "We feel that the accident was completely unavoidable. The driver just did not see him in time, and did not even know he had struck anyone at first," said Bovina patrolman John Detton.

It was stated that Madrigal was pulling a toy wagon at the time of the accident.

Services were pending Friday for Madrigal at Parsons-Ellis Funeral Home.

## Area Gets Moisture

The Friona area has received some nice moisture during the past ten days.

Largest measurement was early on Saturday, March 7, when a total of .42 inch was recorded in Friona. Another .41 inch was received on Tuesday, March 10, with .21 inch measured as of 8 a.m. that day, and another .20 falling throughout the day.

The total for the week stood at .83 inch, and March's total is 1.04 inch of moisture, all of which has fallen as gentle showers, and has been a boon to farmland.

# Child Welfare Board Created For County

The County Commissioners and the County Judge, working with the Texas Department of Human Resources, created a five women, 2 men Parmer County Child Welfare Board in the fall of 1980. Now the term "welfare" is immediately a problem for some folk, but it need not be in this case. Let me explain what our Board is organized to do.

In every community and the cities in Parmer County are no exception, there are needs on the part of children that need to be met. One of the most challenging problems rests in the fact that there are children who need protection because they are victims of abuse or neglect.

The needs of children like those mentioned above are not the concern of one person or group of persons; rather, they are the concern of society. That means folks from national and state government all the way to folk on the regional and local levels. Our Child Welfare Board is a local expression of this concern by our society. We are interested people who, through mutual cooperation and use of available resources and talents, try to give the unwanted, unloved, abused and or neglected child a better chance to become a respected and contributing member of society.

For our local board that means our responsibility is a wide one. We are to help recruit adoptive and foster parents, to secure funds for clothing and medical expenses, for transportation and special needs the children may have.

One of the other major functions is publicity and public awareness. We want to let folk know that:

1. There are children in Parmer County who are abused and neglected.
2. That there is a financial need on the part of these children.
3. That there is a continued need for foster and adoptive parents.
4. That there is a Child Welfare Board in Parmer County which is trying to work with you to deal with the existing problems and needs.

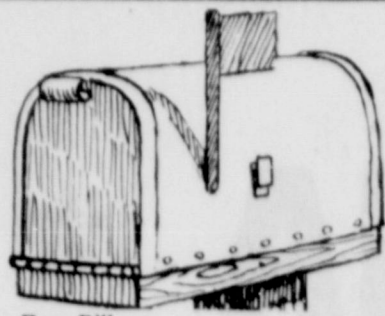
Aiming at the goal of publicity, awareness and then response on the part of you the public, I am writing this article—the first in a four part series.

# Letter To Editor

Dear Bill,

In your editorial of 2/22/81 you expressed concern over the proposed rate increase for the postal service. In hope of a better understanding of the postal service let me explain a few facts.

1. The USPS has 74,000 fewer employees than in 1970 handling an annual volume of 6.5 billion pieces of mail. This volume is up 20 billion pieces since 1970.

2. The 17 billion in sales of postage and other services in 1980 make the USPS larger than such companies as Shell, Chrysler and Dupont.

3. Only 4 per cent of its operating budget is supplied by federal subsidies. This is down from the 25 per cent subsidy in 1970. Other Government agencies could improve by using the USPS as a guide. If I as the postmaster, have a problem in my office, it is my job to solve this problem rather than wasting money and resources just delaying the problem.

4. The postal service is a victim of inflation as all the United States. Each time the price of gasoline increases 1%, it increases postal costs by 3.5 million dollars. The postal service has some 160,000 carrier routes from Alaska to Puerto Rico for letter delivery at 15¢ per ounce. How would you like to pay this gas bill?

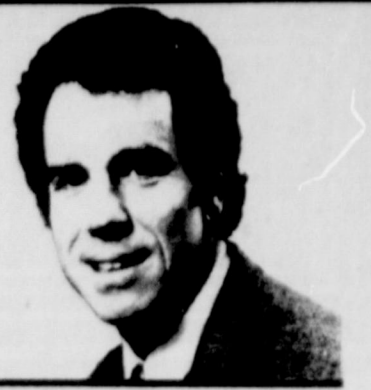

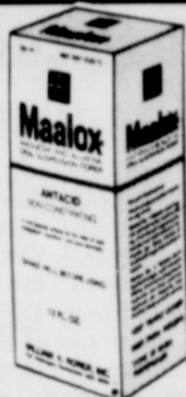

## Ministerially Speaking

"Help!" That's a word that most of us ought to use more often than we do. However, we are taught to be strong and brave and self-sufficient so we try to avoid it as much as possible. Our pride, or

embarrassment, won't let us use the word "Help" very much.

We ought to use it more with our children. When the lines of communication break down and all we are doing is ordering, perhaps we should try saying, "Help. Help me understand you," or "Help things to work out better around here." We should be careful that this is not just another order, but a genuine plea for mutual support.

"Help" is also a word young people might try on their parents. You might be surprised how understanding and supporting your parents would be if you shared some of the problems you have been keeping from them.

I have a personal wish that people would say "help" more to their pastor. We often want to keep up a good image in front of our pastor and therefore are reserved to share any weaknesses we have. Our pride keeps us from asking for help from the very person that is trained to help. We pastors may not be professional counselors, but many times just a listening ear and a prayer of concern can make a world of difference.

You might try saying "help" to your friends, also. Many people are willing to help in times of crisis, but simply don't know how. Tell them! Let people know how they can help and most will respond quietly and humbly.

Finally, we need to say "help" to God. There may be some of us who feel self-sufficient and in control of everything. However, I am persuaded that not one of us will make it through life without deep-down knowing that we need HIM. If not in life, at least in death we realize we are not the final "captain of our fate."

When I was a teen-ager I plowed for a farmer one full summer. The day I started to work, I was too embarrassed to admit I didn't know much about tractors. I told the farmer, "I can do it." And so I made the first round in the deep sand without using the brakes to turn. It was a mess. The farmer came back to the field and said, "Maybe I should help you for a while." How much simpler it would have been if I had said "Help" in the beginning.

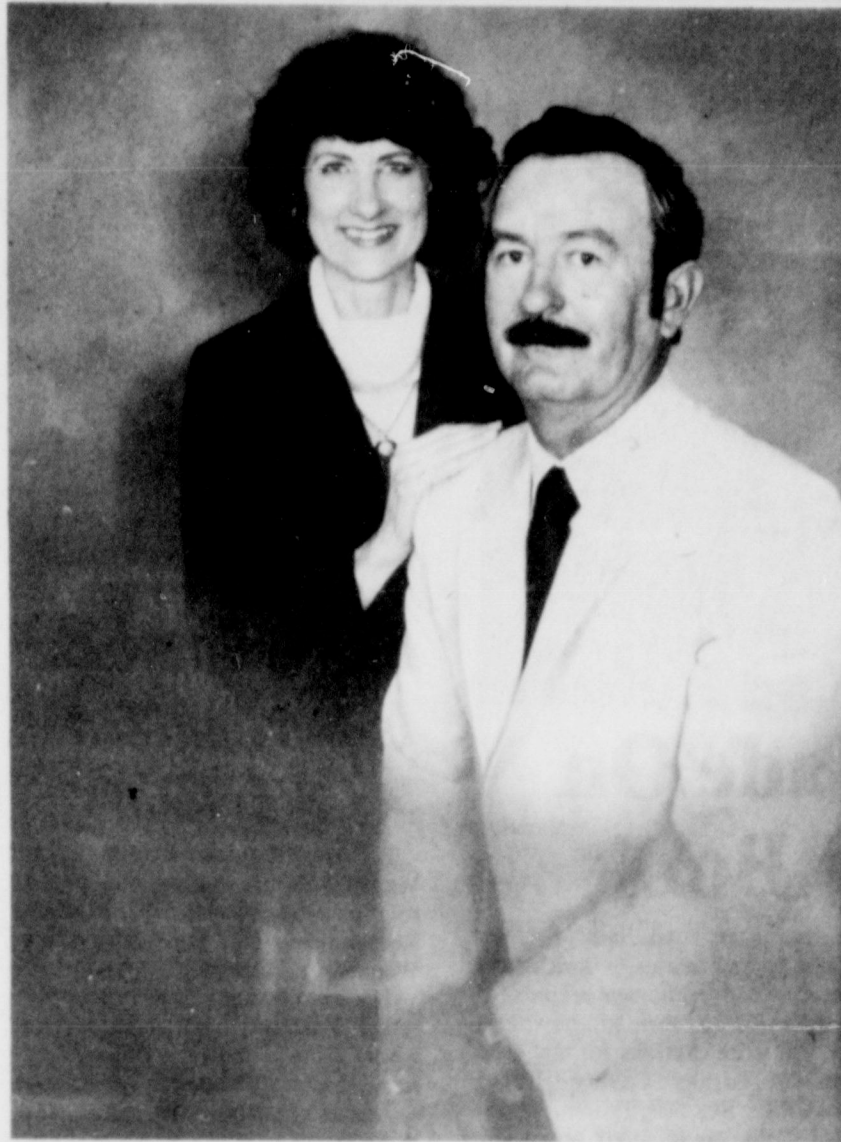

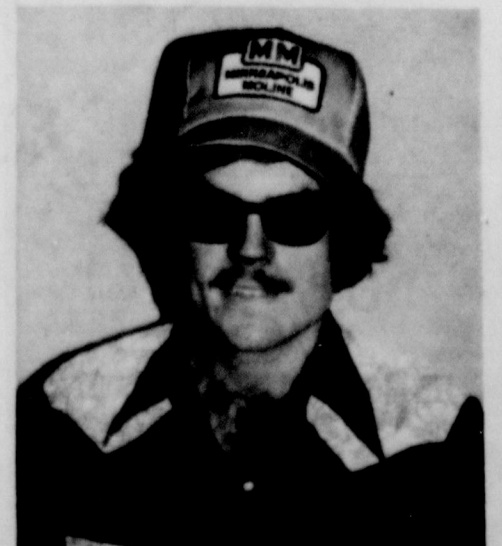
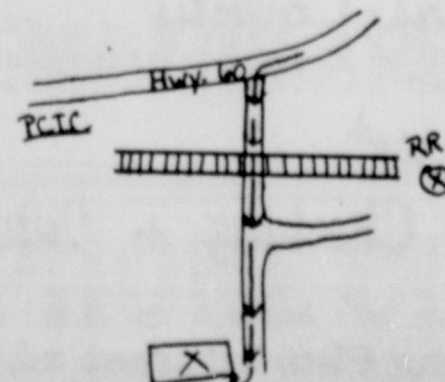

## Area Farmer On Program At Portales

A Friona area farmer, Charles Hough, will be featured on a program at Portales, N.M. next Wednesday, March 18, 1981.

The "Energy Workshop" is sponsored by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and Soil Conservation Service, and will be held at the Student Union Building, Eastern New Mexico University.

The workshop is a two-day affair, beginning on Tuesday, March 17.

Hough's topic will be "My Water Conservation Practices." He will be on the agenda from 11-11:30 a.m., M.S.T. (12-12:30, Texas time).

Others on the workshop program include Dr. Paul Unger, USDA, Great Plains Research Center, Bushland; Dr. Tom Kerby, Extension Weed Control specialist, New Mexico State University; Dr. George Morrin, Clovis Branch, NMSU; Dr. James Libbin, farm management specialist, NMSU; Troy Monroe, vice president, Production Credit Assn., Clovis; Chuck Caruso, SCS, state irrigation water management specialist; and Truman Woody, Clovis area farmer.

Other topics to be covered include minimum tillage; herbicides for minimum tillage operations; minimum tillage equipment, on-farm fuel alcohol production; potential yield, storage and equipment; low-pressure sprinkler irrigation systems; maximizing corn production under sprinkler irrigation.

The workshop is co-sponsored by the Lea, Central Curry and Roosevelt Soil and Water Conservation districts.

## Beef Course Set At Lazbuddie

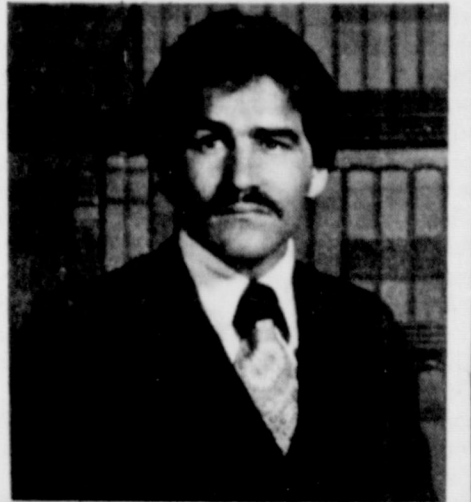

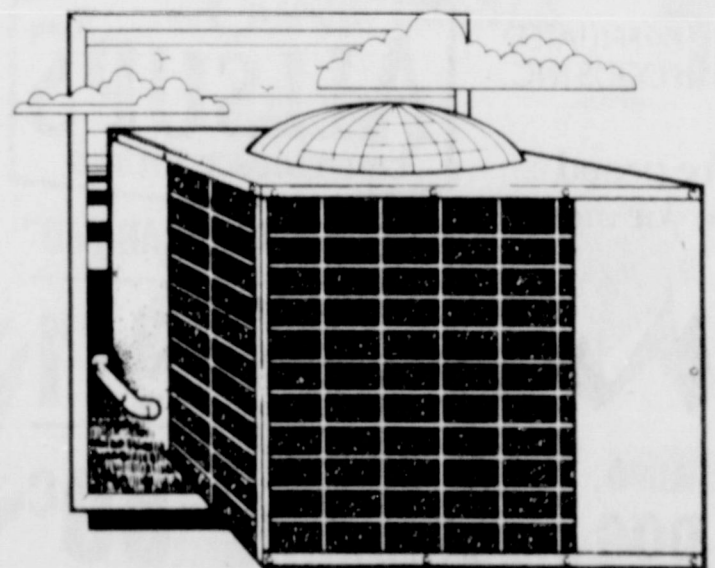
