The Unknown Soldier

TOTTE OF THE COVENOWIN SOLDIER IS

No one knows in what outfit he perved. It may have been the infantry. the cavalry or the artillery. Or he may have worn the silver wings of aviation. But the branch of the service doesn't matter. He was a soldiera fighting man.

No one knows where or how he died. It may have been in Belleau Wood or at St. Mihiel, or somewhere on the Somme that he "got his." A hand grenade may have dealt him his death wound during some trench raid or it may have been a burst of shrapnel. or a bayonet thrust when the fighting was hand-to-hand. But that doesn't matter, either. The thing that matters is that "he died fighting" and the flag for which he died was the Stars and Stripes.

No one knows his name. It may have been Smith, or O'Brien or Cohen or Schwartz or Smedjkl. Or it might have been Paul Two Lances-the name by which he was once known in the day school on some Indian reservation out West. But his name and the nationality of his parents are not things that matter. He now bears the proudest name that any man can

And it is here in Arlington, where the Unknown Soldler sleeps, that President Coolidge, the commander-in-chief of all merican soldiers and the first citisen of the land, will voice America's tribute to her soldier dead on Memorial day this year.

The first memorial to the unknown dead was erected in Arlington in 1866. It was the impressive monument of rough-hewn granite and polished marble (pictured above) which bears the following inscription, "Beneath this stone repose the bones of 2,111 unknown soldiers gathered after the war from the fields of Bull Run and the route to the Rappahannock. Their remains could not be identified but their names and deaths are recorded in the archives of their country; and its grateful citizens honor them as of their noble army of martyrs. May his grave. Considering the vast armies which the United States put into the field in the World war, there was a surprisingly small number of unknown Of approximately 40,000 Americans killed in that conflict only 4,-000 were listed as "unknown" at the time the body of one of them was selected for the nation's highest honors to be buried in Arlington as "The Unknown Soldier." Since that time persistent investigation has cut down the number until now the War de partment reports something over 1,-600 still listed as unidentified.

The reason for the smallness of the list of unknown dead in this war lies in the simple little afuminum identification tags which each man in the A. E. F. wore. Two of these tags, each about the size of a silver half dollar, were worn around the neck, one suspended from the other. On each of these was stamped, in the case of an officer, his name, rank and regiment, corps or department, and in the case of the enlisted man, his name and serial number. If the wearer was killed one tag was buried with him and the other was usually attached to the cross at the head of

cemetery was established near every battlefield and each grave was marked with a temporary headboard giving the name, rank and name of the organization of the man buried there. The company officer was made responsible for this and he was required to furnish the War department with a sketch map of the graves.

In contrast to the small number

of unknown dead in the World war, the record of the Civil war is appai ing. There are eighty-three national cemeteries in this country where are buried 393,714 Union soldiers. Of this number the graves of 153,414 are marked "Unknown!" These totals include those who died in hospitals where identities would have been eastly established. In the haste with which the country plunged into the Civil war no system for identification of the killed was adopted. After a battle searching parties gathered up the wounded and buried the dead in hastily dug pits. Since this work was usually done at night, these detachments overlooked many of the casualties. Then the army marched away leaving these bodies to keep their lonely "bivouse of the dead."

After the Civil war was over, the federal government undertook the task of making a systematic search for the Union dead on many of the Civil war battlefields. Hundreds of skeletons were found but there was no mark of identification. It was such "unknown dead" as these who sleep beneath the memorial in Arlington. And they are only a few of the unknown there. In 1872 the War department marked 18,000 graves in that cemetery with little marble headstones and of this number 4,000 bear the simple word "Unknown!"

The Civil war was not the only one which added to the long roll of missing men, soldiers who gave their lives for their country and of whom no trace now remains. Their last resting places, unmarked, are scattered far and wide over the United States in the West, where Indian bullet and lance took their toll, as well as on the battlefields of the South, Memorial Day is a day for honoring their memory, too, and the tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington, before which in spirit, at least, all Americans how their heads in reverence on Memorial Day is a monument to all American soldiers who fought for the preservation of this "government of the people, for the people and by the people," even though all visible traces the earth.'

Value of Proper Coil Connections

Knowledge of Lenz' Law Necessary to Understand Phase Selection.


For a proper understanding of the subject of coils and phase relations it is necessary to know something about Lenz' law.

Suppose that a sensitive current meter be connected in series with a coil of wire. If a bar magnet is suddenly inserted into this coil and brought to rest there will be a deflection of the current meter, showing that the act of introducing the bar magnet produces a current in the coil.

As soon as the magnet comes to rest the current stops. Now, if the magnet is suddenly withdrawn there will again be deflection of the meter, but this where the circuit contains more than time it is in the opposite direction from the first deflection.

The current set up in the coil exerts a back force on the bar magnet, that is, the induced current opposes the motion of the magnet. That is Lenz' law, or an application of it. Effect of Second Coll.

Now suppose that instead of a bar magnet we use a second coil which is carrying a steady current. There is a magnetic field about this coil just as there is about the magnet. In fact. the coil carrying the steady current is an electromagnet. When this is brought up suddenly to the coil which is connected across the current meter there will be a deflection of the meter. Again when the current-carrying coil is withdrawn from the other coil there will be a deflection in the meter, but in opposite direction. In this case also the current, induced in the coll and meter by the motion of the steady

Secondary's Retarding Effect.

The current in the secondary, prowided that this coil is closed, also will be alternating, but the current in the secondary will retard the current in the primary. The effect of the current in the secondary is always to oppose any variation in the current in the primary. This also comes under Lenz' law. Whatever may be the cause of the interaction, the current in the secondary will always be such as to keep the magnetic field unchanged.

If the magnetic field in the primary is increasing, the current in the sec ondary decreases so as to keep the total magnetic field the same. Likewise, when the magnetic field in the primary decreases, the current in the secondary increases so as to keep the total magnetic field constant. This applies to the case of the moving bar magnet as well as to the cases of alternating current in the primary and to a moving electromagnet.

As an illustration of this law consider Fig. 1. This may well represent any ordinary radio frequency transformer having two windings, L1 and of its defenders has "perished from L2. Fields Are 90 Degrees Apart. From this explanation it must not be taken that the two fields are 180 degrees apart in time. They are only 90 degrees aparts This means that when the intensity of the magnetic field or of the primary current it max imum that of the secondary is zero, not minimum. At the instant that the primary current is maximum there is no change in the magnetic field, and hence, no current is induced in the secondary at that instant. When the primary current is zero the magnetic field about it changes most rapidly and then the induced current in the secondary is maximum for that reason

When connecting a radiofrequency or any other transformer, the terminals should be connected as shown in Fig. 1. P should go to the plate of the first tube. B should go to the plate battery, F should go to minus C and G to the grid of the succeeding tube This gives the most stable connection one such transformer. There is also another advantage and that is that the capacity coupling between the primary and the secondary is the least. Not only is the capacity least but the current through this capacity is the least for a given capacity and frequency. The reason for this is that the two terminals which are at the greatest potential difference are farthest apart in space as well.

Fine Wire for Primary.

An important consideration in the design of radiofrequency coils is the size of wire in the primary winding. Many have thoughtlessly made this of heavy wire in order to reduce the resistance in the circuit. This coil may have a resistance of an ohm or two while it is connected in series with the plate resistance which may be from 5.000 to 50.000 ohms. Obviously nothing can be gained by reducing the resistance of the primary winding. Much, however, can be gained by making the primary of fine wire. The finer the wire is in this winding the less will be the eddy currents, which are induced in it by the current in the secondary. The fine wire in the primary will materially increase the selectivity of the secondary, or, in other words, reduce the resistance in the secondary. Still another advantage is gained by using fine wire, and that is the reduction of distributed capacity between the two windings. The finer the wire in the primary is the less will be the capacity between the windings. since capacity is largely a matter of dimensions. Reducing the capacity will increase the voltage that is induced in the secondary and hence will increase the sensitivity of the set. Still another advantage of fine wire is the space required. Ffity turns of No. 40 wire, say, can be placed on the coil without any appreciable increase in the dimensions, whereas the use of No. 20 wire would require increased space even if only a few turns were used in the primary winding. Even if the wire is as fine as No. 40 a good many turns could be put on the wind ing form before the added resistance could be appreciable in comparison with the plate circuit resistance of the

Likewise it is important to refrain from using a high voltage speaker on a set that cannot feed to it the power it requires.



Capital City Made to Order

Step Taken by Australian Government Parallels That of U. S.

Washington.-"By moving into a capital city made out of hand, where no town existed before, the Australian government has taken a step closely parallel to that taken by the United States in the summer of 1800, when the seat of government was moved from one of its greatest cities, Philadelphia, into a virtual wilderness," says a bulletin of the National Geographic society. "Canberra, the federal city, was formally dedicated by the duke of York on May 9, and the Australian parliament began deliberations in the new capital on the same

"A century and a quarter has seen a great advance in the art of capitalcity building," continues the bulletin; 'and although the residents of Canberra will find their capital, as early Washingtonians found theirs, a city made up in large part of 'magnificent distances,' at least they will have the organized comforts of modern community life such as the infant Wash-Ington could not know. One of the first things done at Canberra was to start work on a water supply system. The first unit of this has long been completed. Next, both sanitary and storm sewers were constructed; and only a little later a powerhouse was built, and a railway was extended to an existing line. There are some good streets in Canberra in place of the rude trails and muddy paths by which the American congressmen of 125 years ago found their way through thickets and across morasses between the capitol and the White House.

"The federal territory in which the new Australian capital is situated, was set apart for the purpose in December, 1909. It is near the southeastern corner of the continent close to its center of population. The territory contains 912 square miles and so is 13 times the size of the present District of Columbia

Plans Chosen by Contest.

"Australia's new capital is to be an fnland and upland city. It lies some 70 miles from the ocean, behind the dividing range of mountains that skirts the coast. It is nearly 200 miles southwest of Sydney and about 300 miles northeast of Melbourne. The site chosen for the city was formerly a sheep 'station' or ranch, an undulating upland plain with an altitude of about 1,800 feet. Chattanooga, Tenn., or Asheville, N. C. "A world-wide contest was launched by Australia in 1911 for the submission of plans for her made-to-order capital. The first prize was won by an American, the second by a Finn. and the third by a Frenchman. The plan which has been taking shape in the Australian hills in recent years follows the American design in general, but has been modified to include some of the good points of the other winning plans, as well as changes considered necessary by the commissioners and engineers who have been entrusted with the building of the city.

"A commanding eminence south of the river was chosen as the site for the permanent capital, and about this blocks are arranged in a great circle. Lesser circles of blocks impinge upon this Capitol circuit, or exist at a distance, connected by radial avenues. North of the river, on a similar hill, a university will be built.

"Australians have profited by the errors of other capital builders, and have provided against the Topsylike propensity of cities to 'just grow,' as did Washington during a certain era of its existence. No lots or areas in the district will be sold outright. Instead 99-year leases will be given, with reappraisal of values every 10 years. The leases will pay rent amounting to 5 per cent on the appraised values. By withholding leases in certain sections of the city and granting them in others, the commission of three men in charge of Canberra can control its growth. The commission also requires that no structure be erected until the plans for it have received official ap-


