THE INTERNATIONAL situation is fast becoming a mess, if you haven't already noticed.

One of the latest crisis is the situation in Poland, which has become a "police state," after the military was ordered to arrest members of the nation's union, Solidarity.

The situation in Poland is sticky, to say the least. The latest confrontation has been building up for the past several months, during which time the union has been battling the government.

In recent months, the festering problem has caused Poland to be short of food and many things necessary for daily living.

It is feared that Poland may become a battleground with Russia attempting to take over during the shaky national situation. The U.S. leaders would hate to see this happen, since Poland has managed to shake Russian dominance up until now.

At this point, the world is watching, and most Americans will be hoping that the problem can be resolved from within that country, without outside intervention.

THE MID-EAST continues to be a problem for national relations, especially with the situation in Libya, after the revelation by the Administration of the threatened assassination plot against our national leaders.

The president has ordered Americans out of Saudi Arabia, lest another situation such as we experienced in Vietnam be repeated.

Libya's strongman, Moammar Khadafy, has become the newest international "problem child." The U.S. had its first confrontation with Libya last year, when American jets, on a routine mission in the Mid-East, were fired on by Libyan planes, whereupon, the U.S. planes returned fire and downed their attackers.

Some observers feel that Khadafy's present tough-guy image is probably a result of this event, in which he lost face on the international scene.

This is another area where we would not see a shooting war develop—but we sure don't want a "hit team" shooting at our national leaders, either.

AS IF THE ABOVE two situations were not enough, the political turmoil continues to boil between Israel and Egypt, over disputed boundaries.

The recent death of Egyptian president, Anwar Sadat, has caused the situation between Egypt and Israel to change somewhat. Prime Minister Begin of Israel may be using this situation to further Israel's interests.

Begin also used the situation in Poland, which had attracted international attention, to push through the annexation of the disputed territory, which was contrary to the Camp David agreement between Israel and Egypt, and against what the U.S. government would have liked.

It's too bad we can't just shut ourselves off from the rest of the world at times, and let them worry about their own problems. But in most cases, the United States has vested interests, which must be considered.

Friona's United Way campaign had reached 96 per cent of its goal as of Friday morning, according to Hal Ratcliff, co-chairman of the drive.

The total amount deposited as of that date was \$11,603.61, said Ratcliff. "Anyone who has not had the opportunity to contribute is urged to do so, in order that we can meet our goal and pay each agency 100 per cent of their budget," he said.

Court Discusses New Items At Meeting

The Parmer County Commissioners met in their regular session on Monday, December 14, and discussed various items of business.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and Archie Tarter moved and Ernest Anthony seconded that these be approved by the commissioners. They were accepted as read.

Bills for the month were read and Raymond McGehee moved these be paid and it met with approval from Tarter and met with approval from the commissioners.

It was decided that the next meeting would be held December 23 and this would be set up to pay the county employees at that date.

A boarding bill for a county child was paid in the amount of \$270 and the county will be reimbursed for this amount.

A bulletin on revenue sharing was purchased for the county at the cost of \$38 per year. This move was made in the form of a motion by McGehee then seconded by Anthony and approved by the commissioners.

An invitation from Potter County

was received by the commissioners to attend their county auction, also stating that if Parmer County had any items for sale, they would put these in the auction. No action was taken on this matter.

A bill for a visiting judge was approved for payment, and a medical bill in the amount of \$341.91 for a boarded county child's medical and surgical expenses was approved for payment. A large portion on this bill was paid by Medicaid. Jack Patterson moved that the bill be paid and Anthony seconded the motion, with approval of the commissioners it passed.

A letter from the PRPC and Community Action were received offering to assist with the CETA program within the county. Parmer County had been using assistance from the Community Action Program, and the commissioners decided to continue in this area with the Community Action plan.

There was more discussion on the upcoming redistricting plan which will begin affecting the county residents as early as January 1982.

Schools Set Price Hike On Lunches

The Friona Independent School District has announced a price increase for school lunches beginning Monday, January 4, 1982.

As of that day, the prices for lunches will be: (kindergarten through fifth grades) 95 cents per meal, \$4.75 per week and \$19.00 per month; grades 6-8: \$1.00 per meal, \$5.00 per week and \$20.00 per month; grades 9-12: \$1.10 per meal, \$5.50 per week and \$22.00 per month.

"Inflation has been eating away at our food service for the past two years. With the cutbacks initiated recently in federal support of school lunch operations, the sting is even greater. After much discussion and deliberation, the board of trustees has determined that the only solution to the problem is to raise our prices as indicated," said Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe.

If students have pre-paid meals or tickets bought prior to January 4, these will be honored and students may use them without additional charge. But all meals sold as of January 4, 1982 will be at the new rate.

City Official Urges Caution

Due to the season of the year, and the re-occurrence of recent house and auto thefts, Chief of Police H.R. (Bill) Denney issues a warning to all residents not to leave their homes without locking them, to avoid a break-in.

Also, the police chief says that while shopping, do not leave the keys in your car, and lock the car before leaving it parked.

Leaving Christmas packages in the car seats induces break-ins, the Friona police chief warns. It is recommended that parcels be locked up in the trunk of the car, out of sight.

Santa To Visit City

Santa Claus will be in Friona on Saturday, to visit with the youngsters of the Friona area.

Santa will be at the Friona Chamber of Commerce office, and will be talking to the youngsters and handing out candy favors between the hours of 3-5 p.m.

His visit to Friona is being sponsored by the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

Re-Drawing Precinct Lines Is Underway

The Parmer County Commissioners are being faced in the near future with a proposed redistricting plan which will divide the county into new precincts, including splitting the cities of Friona and Bovina.

Beginning January 1, the voters of the county may see their districts being drawn up into new precincts, and with the possibility of having a new commissioner serving them.

Although the proposal has not yet been approved by the Commissioners Court, the commissioners are already seeing problems it might well present.

"Bovina will be losing their commissioner completely if this proposal goes through," commented commissioner Jack Patterson at a recent County Commissioners meeting.

New History Book Is Now Ready

The Parmer County History Books arrived this week, and distribution of the books has begun at the Congregational Church.

Those who purchased books may pick them up at the church Monday through Wednesday, December 21-23, between the hours of 9 a.m.-12 noon, and 1:30 to 5 p.m.

Then, on December 28-29, the books may be claimed again, during the same hours.

The Parmer County Historical Assn., who produced the book, announces that a few extra copies will be available, and while they last, these will be sold for \$50 each.

The 600-page book is packed with family histories of residents of Parmer County. There is also a section of tribute pages to a number of residents, living and dead.

At the front of the book is a section giving the history of each community in the county, with a history of every school, both past and present, within Parmer County.

"We are very proud of the book, and extremely happy that it was delivered in time for Christmas. While there may be some errors in the book, we feel that by and large it is something that its owners will cherish and keep for a family heirloom," says Grace Whitefield, co-chairman of the book committee.

Mrs. Whitefield and her late husband Otho were chairmen of the book committee when the project began, and Otho did considerable groundwork on the new volume, which contains a dedication page in his honor.

Blood Bank Sets Drive

The Coffee Memorial Blood Bank will be at the Community Room of Friona State Bank on Wednesday, January 4 from 9 a.m.-5 p.m.

Bessie Holt, local organizer for the blood drive, said that several local people have used blood and the bank is in need of around 100 pints to replace what has been used.

"The holiday season is the most difficult time for the bank to secure blood, and it is also the time of the heaviest use on an emergency basis," Mrs. Holt said.

An insurance program is available through the blood bank, whereby a pint of blood will insure your immediate family for all the blood needed by them for one year.

President Reagan has proclaimed January as "Blood Donor Month," and the Coffee Memorial Blood Bank is attempting to make it as easy as possible for Friona and the surrounding area to donate life-sustaining blood.

Proposed Precinct Changes



"I just can't see why the county must be so equally proportioned," was a comment from Raymond McGehee, who will take nearly twice as many miles of road over for maintenance after the redistricting is concluded.

The commissioners can reject the proposed re-alignment, but this will only give them 90 days in which to find an acceptable solution.

The redistricting is being done to comply with federal law, and the Supreme Court's ruling, calling for "one man, one vote," which requires political subdivisions to be equally divided according to population.

"They were wanting our redistricting plan approved by January 1, so that voters may be placed in the proper precincts by the tax assessor-collector. However, as many questions as we have on the proposal, I don't see a way in the world we'll have anything approved by then," said County Judge Porter Roberts.

Under the present precinct lines, Precinct 1 (Friona's precinct)

contains virtually half of the county's population. Precinct 4 (Lazbuddie) contains less than 1,000. The redistricting attempt has used an "average figure" of 2,700 residents per proposed precinct.

Under the proposal, precinct one (Ernest Anthony) would run from Deaf Smith County line down Highway 214 to Friona and take in the eastern portion of Friona. Then it would run from 214 south to Hub and then east to the Castro County line.

Precinct two (Jack Patterson) would run from 2290 into Bovina but he would not get any of Bovina, as his district would then run east on State Highway 86 to Hub and then north into Friona taking in the western portion of Friona only. Then it would run west on 214 to the Deaf Smith County line.

Precinct three (Archie Tarter) would run from the New Mexico state line to the Bailey County line west and south and then would take in Highway 2290 into Bovina, which would divide the city with McGehee, then it would go down 1731 to the Bailey County line south.

McGehee will see his precinct expand as precinct four would run from the Castro County line west on Highway 86 to Bovina and split Bovina, going from there south on 1731 to Bailey County, taking in Oklahoma Lane. McGehee will have about 1/3 of the entire county's roads to maintain.

40 YEARS AGO--DEC. 19, 1941

Parmer County farmers are being urged to check over their farm machinery at once in order to see what necessary repairs can be made before spring planting, and then get their order for repairs and parts in the hands of their dealers at the earliest possible moment. Farmers also have been asked to assist in the national scrap iron collection campaign, to help supply iron and steel scraps to

speed war industries.

35 YEARS AGO--DEC. 13, 1946

Chiefs Tip Mules For Third

The Friona Chieftains captured the third place trophy in their own invitational tournament last weekend, after a hard-fought victory over Muleshoe on the final day, 43-40.

The Chiefs had scored a 42-36 win over Springlake-Earth in first-round action, but were knocked out of the championship bracket by a tough Shallowater team, 32-28, on Friday

night.

The slow-paced Chieftain offense averaged just 37.8 points per game during the tournament, but allowed only 36 per outing.

After the three-game set, Friona's season record stood at 9-2.

In the first-round game, the Chiefs pulled away from a 12-12 tie to take a 28-19 lead over S-E. They held a 42-

32 third quarter lead.

Mike Neill scored 20 points and Rich Malouf ten to pace Friona's point-making.

Shallowater had a big, physical team, and the game was a battle from start to finish. Friona jumped ahead, 4-2 and 6-4 on baskets by Robert Escalante.

A long jump shot by Neill with 1:20 left in the quarter gave Friona an 8-6 edge at the buzzer.

Friona took its longest lead of the game at 11-6 with 5:07 left in the second quarter after a jump shot by Mark Tucker and Caballero's free throw.

But Shallowater roared back for a 12-11 advantage 2:36 before the half, and Friona hit a five-minute cold spell which proved to be fatal. The Mustangs led 14-11 entering the final minute. Neill's pair of free throws with 38 seconds left in the half trimmed the margin to 14-13, but Shallowater pulled off a three-point play with 17 seconds left, for a 17-13 halftime edge.

"Run and gun" was definitely not the style during the third quarter, in which there were only 11 points scored in all, six by Friona and five by Shallowater. The visitors still led, 22-19, at the quarter mark.

Shallowater had a 26-19 lead, their longest, with 5:59 left, setting the stage for a Friona rally.

Malouf tipped home a shot, Neill hit a jump shot, and then Anthony (Bones) Brady made a driving layup to tie the score at 26-all with 2:54 left.

But then it was Shallowater's turn. They scored six unanswered points for a 32-26 lead, and only Malouf's basket with 13 seconds left trimmed the margin.

The Chief-Muleshoe battle featured the first Friona appearance of former coach Jim Pope, now the head basketball coach at Muleshoe.

It also featured a "cousin" battle, pitting Rich Malouf against Michael

Isaac.

The game was a close one from start to finish. Muleshoe led in the early stages, 3-0, 5-2, 7-4 and 9-8 at the end of the first quarter.

But Neill's turning jump shot gave Friona a 12-11 lead. Muleshoe had a 16-14 lead 3:22 before halftime, but Malouf hit a jumper over his cousin for a 20-18 lead to put Friona ahead to stay.

However, Friona never had a commanding lead. The Chiefs did enjoy two seven-point spreads, at 38-31 and 40-33 early in the final quarter, but Muleshoe rallied to cut the margin to four points, 42-38 in the last 30 seconds.

A free shot by Joey Howard with six seconds left sealed Muleshoe's fate. The Mules scored an uncontested basket with a second left for the final margin of 43-40.

Malouf won the cousin battle, scoring ten points to eight for his taller relative. Tucker's 16 and Neill's 12 led the cause.

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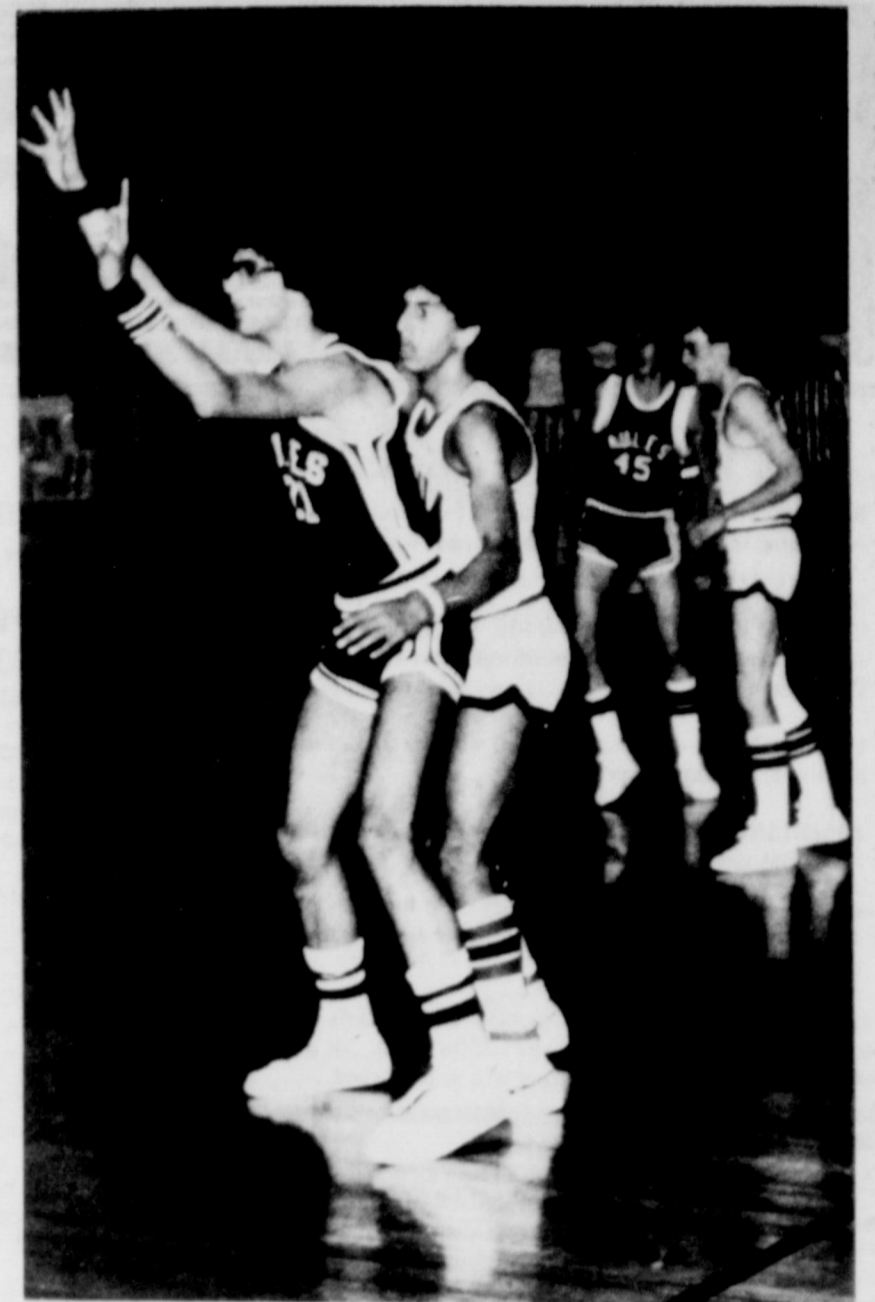

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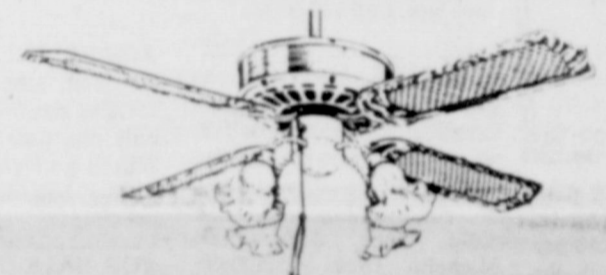

DPS Estimates 89 Traffic Fatalities

The Department of Public Safety has estimated that as many as 89 persons may perish on Texas streets and highways during the Christmas and New Year's holidays.

Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director, asked Texas drivers to make this holiday season the safest in recent years.

"Nothing would please us more than to get through these holidays with far fewer fatalities than we project," Adams said. "We can reduce the number of fatalities if more drivers will moderate their speed, refrain from using alcohol or drugs if they plan to drive and make sure everyone in the vehicle wears a seat belt."

The DPS estimated that 51 persons would die in motor vehicle accidents during the Christmas holiday weekend and another 38 people would be killed during the New Year holiday weekend. Both holiday periods are 78 hours long.

Adams said 64 persons died in traffic crashes during the Christmas holiday period last year. Motor vehicle accidents claimed 58 lives over the New Year's holiday weekend.

During the first nine months of this year, 151,261 persons received injuries in Texas traffic accidents.

"That's an increase of slightly over 10 per cent compared to the same period in 1980," Adams said. "More than 19,000 of those people received serious, incapacitating injuries."

Traffic deaths over the same period totaled 3,378, an increase of almost six per cent compared to the first nine months of last year.

The DPS director said that during the first six months of 1981, more than 98 per cent of the persons killed in passenger vehicles were not wearing seat belts.

"A head-on crash at only 30 mph

hurls a person's body forward with the same force as a fall from a third story window," Adams pointed out. "A buckled seat belt keeps passengers from striking their head or another part of their body and prevents serious injury."

Adams also recommended that before traveling, children under four years of age or weighing less than 40 pounds should be strapped into an approved child restraint seat.

"This would be a very sensible and perhaps life-saving gift for an infant or small child from a caring parent or grandparent," he said.

The DPS director said all available troopers would be on patrol duty during the fatality counting periods. For Christmas, the count will begin at 6 p.m. Thursday, December 24 and end at midnight Sunday, December 27. The New Year's period starts at 6 p.m. Thursday, December 31 and ends at midnight Sunday, January 3, 1982.

The DPS headquarters in Austin will release information on the various accidents as part of the "Operation Motorcade" program.

The commissioner of precinct one will serve 2865 persons. Precinct two will serve 2736. Precinct three will serve 2763 and precinct four will serve 2647, if the proposal is accepted.

A small portion of Bovina and Friona is to be recounted, to make sure that the same number of persons are still living there as was projected in the redistricting proposal by the attorneys. If the count is the same, the redistricting plan will fit the population division, according to Judge Roberts.

New Insurance Law Begins January 1

Beginning January 1, 1982, Texas drivers contacted by Department of Public Safety officers during traffic stops and vehicle accident investigations will be required to furnish proof of compliance with the new compulsory liability insurance law.

Under House Bill 197, an amendment to the Texas Motor Vehicle Safety Responsibility Act (6701h) approved this year by the 67th Legislature, all drivers must carry minimum liability coverage for medical expenses of \$10,000 per person (\$20,000 for two or more) and property damages of \$5,000.

Department of Public Safety Director, Colonel Jim Adams, reports troopers will accept as evidence of insurance coverage the

policy for the vehicle being operated or a document by the insurance company.

"Such a document must contain a statement that the liability coverage for the motor vehicle is the minimum prescribed by the law," Adams said. "The document must also include the name of the insurance company, the name of the insured person, the policy period and the policy number. This document may take the form of a letter or a card, depending upon the preference of the insuring company."

Insurance companies throughout the state recommend drivers do not carry their original policy or a photostatic copy of the policy declaration page or the insuring agent's binding agreement. They would rather motorists carry with them an official card or letter.

Adams has pointed out that DPS troopers will be enforcing the provisions of this law along highways and rural roads. Local police officers and sheriff's deputies have also been given the authority to request this information.

Drivers who do not maintain the specified coverage, refuse to give information or give false information to law enforcement officers risk a minimum fine of \$75 for the first offense or \$200 for subsequent violations.

Johnson Teaches New Class

Twenty-eight seniors are enrolled in a "zero hour" class at Friona High School. The class runs from 7:45 a.m. to 8:40 a.m. each morning and is taught by Tom Johnson. The first semester civics is offered and the fundamentals of free enterprise will be offered in the spring semester.

The zero-hour class was offered to give students who were behind on their credits a chance to graduate on schedule, and also to give some students an opportunity to participate in another extra-curricular activity according to principal, Hal Ratcliff.

Last spring a survey was conducted to see if there was sufficient interest to offer a class before school. The results were overwhelming. One-third of the senior class is enrolled in the zero-hour class.

New Laws Face Traffic Violators

Texas has joined 28 other states recently in a compact which will make non-resident violators receiving traffic violations in Texas pay the same penalties as in-state violators.

In a memo from the Texas DPS, it states that "Texas has joined a non-resident Violator Compact, a reciprocal agreement between 28 states and the District of Columbia. The compact assures non-resident motorists receiving a citation for minor traffic violations in a member state the same treatment accorded to resident motorists."

A procedure is established whereby a non-resident receiving a traffic citation in a member state must fulfill the terms of that citation or face the possibility of license suspension in the motorist's home state until the terms of the citation are met. The compact not only assures legal treatment for both residents and non-residents receiving traffic citations, but it also enhances law enforcement services and deterrence time spent on the highways."

Members of this compact are Alabama, Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, District of Columbia, Florida, Georgia, Indiana, Iowa, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maine, Maryland, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, Nebraska, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New Mexico (beginning April 1982), New York, North Carolina, North Dakota, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, South Dakota, Texas, Virginia and West Virginia.

Two states which are notably missing from this agreement are Oklahoma and California.

According to the release from the DPS, under the terms of the compact, the DPS will request the suspension of a drivers license of any resident of the compact states or jurisdiction who receives a citation for a traffic violation in Texas and fails to respond. The other members of the compact, in turn, may also request the suspension of the driver's license of any Texas resident who fails to respond to a citation in their receiving jurisdiction. No action will be taken under the terms of the compact on the following violations: (1) Offenses which mandate custody arrests; (2)

Weight violations; (3) Parking violations or standing violations; (4) Transportation of hazardous material violation. These violations are statutory exempt. Also no action will be taken in any violation if the date of the transmission is more than six months after the date on which the traffic citation was issued.

"I don't know who this other guy is, but he caused my grandparents to get some calls, asking 'What is Larry doing getting stopped for DWI?'" Johnson told us.
