RONALD REAGAN has been in office only a couple of weeks, but we like the things he has done in that short time. The few actions he has taken give evidence that already he is working to cut down on needless spending, and help the country's sagging economy.

The president's first major act was to declare a freeze on the hiring of government employees. This was a move aimed at cutting down on federal spending, mainly through the control of the bureaucracy.

If Reagon can accomplish nothing else during his term of office, trimming the number and size of government agencies could be the most important legacy he could leave for his country.

The work of these agencies in recent years has approached the gestapo stage, and frankly, we don't need this type of "Big Brother" activities in our country. Hopefully, these bureaucracies have not become so rooted that they cannot be pruned, trimmed, or just uprooted altogether.

For the most part, the middle class and lower middle class taxpayers are getting sick and tired of having not only to make a living for themselves and their families, but virtually add another family to their responsibility. It would be nice to trim this downward, to just your own family again, plus perhaps the very old and needy.



WATER IMPROVEMENTS City's Bond Issue Vote Set Tuesday

Friona voters will go to the polls on Tuesday, February 10, to decide the fate on a \$1 million bond issue.

The bonds, if approved, will be used to purchase a 670-acre tract of land one and one-half miles northeast of the city, to provide water for the says City Manager A.L. (Jake) Outland.

The city drilled a new well in the southwestern part of town last summer, after one city well failed and another well's production dropped. However, the new well's production ample supply of water in order to remain progressive," says Mayor B.K. Buske.

But, the president took a positive attitude toward the problem, indicating that we can "turn the corner" if we really want to.

But in the meantime, it appears that the Reagan administration will be eyeballing every possible angle for cutting costs of government. This has always been one of his priorities, and we commend the president for attacking the problem early-on in his term of office.

If the loan is approved by the FHA, it would affect a considerable savings in interest rate for the city.





Irrigation Conference Scheduled Thursday

Bailey County Electric Cooperative is sponsoring an "Irrigation Conference," a program for irrigation farmers, agricultural agencies, power suppliers, financial representatives and all interested persons, beginning at 9:30 a.m. on Thursday, February 12 at the Bailey County Coliseum on the Clovis Highway in Muleshoe.

The program is designed to provide a look at the present cost of pumping water, and will also look at the projected growth in electric powered systems, and the projected cost and availability of energy for the 1980s and beyond.

Appearing on the program will be Wayne Wyatt, manager and Dwight Adams, ag-economist, with the High Plains Underground Water District in Lubbock, and Myron Namken, civil engineer for the area ASCS office, Lubbock.

Also, Leon New, ag engineer with the area Extension Service, Lubbock, will speak on "How pump and power unit performance affect energy costs."

Don Gray, assistant director of the electric division of Hicks and Ragland Engineering, Lubbock, will speak on "Irrigation Rate, Now and Projected."

Other specialists in the field of irrigation will also be on the program.

A free lunch will be served at noon. The conference will conclude at approximately 2:45 p.m.

Those planning to be on hand for the free lunch are asked to contact the electric cooperative by noon on Monday, February 9.

The city leaders say the bond figure will include purchasing the land, building a large water reservoir on the property, plus a chlorinating and pump station, and piping the water into the city's system.

"We feel fortunate that such land was available this close to the city, due to the fact that we must pipe the water into the city's present system," Outland says.

The city manager says that if the issue passes, it is his belief that the tax increase which will result will be from the present 70 cents per \$100 valuation to just under \$1.00 per \$100.

The land, which the city has taken an option to purchase, is located a mile north of the city on the Cemetery Road, and on the east side of the road. Part of the parcel belongs to Glyn Hamilton, part to D.C. Herring and part to Glenn Herring.



varieties, sunflowers, perennial grasses, minimum tillage, wheat grazing, and new herbicides also will be discussed by scientists from Bushland and Amarillo.

Registration starts at 9:30, and the morning session entitled "Alternative Crops" begins at 10:00. Dr. Charlie Rogers, lead-off speaker, will discuss the potential of sunflowers in the Southern High Plains. Dr. H.V. Eck will detail his research with irrigated perennial grasses, and Dr. Dan Undersander will discuss alfalfa varieties. Undersander says selecting the proper variety can increase alfalfa production several tons annually.

The keynote address, "Farm Implements--A Look Into The Future," will be presented by William W. Jackson, who is in charge of planning for tillage and planting equipment, Deere and Company, Moline, Illinois.

After a Dutch treat lunch, Dr. Frank Petr, Area Agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will moderate a session on "Alternative Production Practices." Dr. B.A. Stewart, USDA Research Director at Bushland, will discuss a new system of furrow irrigation.

by Dr. Ed Runge, recently-appointed Head of the Soil and Crop Sciences Department at Texas A&M University. Research with greenbug biotype E that attacks greenbugresistant sorghum will be discussed by Dr. K.B. Porter. The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station small grain breeder found the new biotype last spring while evaluating wheat lines for greenbug resistance. Dr. Dave Hutcheson, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Animal Nutritionist, will discuss his experiments on grazing wheat. 



Ricky Barnett was the high scorer for Friona with 4 points. Martinez and Cameron led the Dimmitt team in scoring with four points each.


