Blank & Zank Make History In Debate

Mark Blankenship and Mark Zachary, Friona High School's crack debate team, pulled off a rare double last weekend by winning the state class AAA debate title.

The duo thus captured their second successive state title, winning last year in the school's final year in class AA.

At the state meet, the FHS debaters went up against the Edna "B" team, and scored a 3-0

decision. In the second round, Blankenship-Zachary were against the Edna "A" team, and scored a similar 3-0 win.

The Friona team then went against Kermit, the team they had bested in the state finals a year ago, though they had come out second to Kermit in the regional finals.

Taking the affirmative side, Friona scored a 4-1 decision for the state title, finishing with three straight gold medals in district, regional and the state meet.

The national debate topic is "Resolved that the Federal Government should initiate and enforce safety guarantees on consumer goods."

For the past two years, Blankenship and Zachary have compiled an overall record of 106 wins against only 17 losses, a winning percentage of 86.2.

Earlier this spring, Blankenship-Zachary was the only AAA team to qualify for the Texas Forensics Assn.'s state meet.

"Success equals hard work, dedication, J.E. Masters (coach of Waco Richfield's national team), and my little bit. No team, from any school that I know of, has ever captured the state debate title two years in a row. These are the best debaters I have ever had the privilege of coaching," said FHS Forensics coach Joy Morton.

Miss Morton explained that the Waco coach gave the team the idea about self-extinguishing cigarettes, as a case for the affirmative side, during the TFA state meet, and since they have used this case, the Friona debaters have not lost a single debate.

Zachary and Blankenship have worked an average of 25 hours per week for the past three and one-half years on their debate material.

"Blank and Zank" won the state title from a field of 12 debate teams. They came out first in Region I from a field of 24 teams, and started their climb by winning District 2-AAA.

The debaters said that last year they felt more confident with the negative side, (when the topic

Pam Perez Wins State

Pam Perez, Friona High School senior brought home a gold medal in shorthand competition from the state UIL meet in Austin last weekend.

Miss Perez' win added to the laurels by FHS students, since the debaters also won. Four students were entered in the state literary events, and three of them won gold medals.

Also entered was Janette Reed in informative speaking, and although Miss Reed had a good performance, she did not win a medal.

Miss Perez, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Perez of Friona, was required to take dictation at the rate of 100 words per minute for five minutes, and then to translate her dictation.

The FHS student had only six mistakes on her work, which was the best score of the 12 students competing in the state finals.

Pam had compiled even better scores at the district and regional contests, making only three mistakes in each of these events, winning gold medals each time. In those contests, however, the dictation was done at the rate of 90 words per minute.

Pam's instructor-coach in shorthand at FHS is Virginia Cleveland.

The Baccalaureate sermon for the FHS graduating seniors will be held on Sunday, May 24, at the Grade School Auditorium, starting at 8:30

p.m. Rev. Archie Echols, Methodist minister, will deliver the sermon.

Graduation exercises for the Friona eighth grade class will be held at 8:30 p.m. Thursday, May 28, at the Grade School Auditorium.

Commencement exercises for the 1981 FHS seniors will be held Friday, May 29 at the high school gymnasium.

Thursday, May 28 is the last day of school for the 1980-81 term. Friday, May 29 will be a teacher in-service day.

On Wednesday and Thursday, May 27-28, school will dismiss an hour early. These are also final exam days for students.

The honor graduates for the 1981 graduating class at Friona High School were announced this week by Hal Ratcliff, principal.

The students will each occupy spots of distinction at the graduation exercises for the Friona seniors on Friday, May 29, at 8:30 at the Friona High School gym.

It practically took a computer to separate the top two students in the 1981 class. It was perhaps the closest race ever staged for the valedictory and salutatory position, and was decided by two hundredths of a point.

When all the grades for four years were averaged, Dana Smith turned out as the valedictorian, with an average of 95.66.

Kipi Fleming had to settle for the salutatory spot, although virtually dead even. Her four-year average was 95.64.

Cindy Alexander will be the class historian. She compiled a four-year grade average of 94.48.

Parents of the honor students are Mr. and Mrs. Danny Smith, Mr. and Mrs. Ray Dean Fleming; Dr. Robert

Alexander and Mrs. Sarah Owen.

All of the three honor students have been very busy with extra-curricular activities during their high school years, as well as busy with their studies.

Miss Smith has been in the band, the flag corps, Thespians, including the musicals four years. She was in the Christmas play as a sophomore, and appeared in the contest play three years.

Dana was in forensics three years, serving as vice president this year. She was a regional qualifier in persuasive speaking two years.

Her other activities included FHA, National Honor Society; FTA, Treblaieres, was most studious nominee and voted most likely to succeed. She is a member of the Methodist Church.

Her plans are to attend the University of Texas at Austin.

50 YEARS AGO—MAY 15, 1931

Judging has been completed in the Friona Star's letter contest on the subject of "Where Should the County Seat Be Located so as to Serve the Greatest Number of Farmer County Citizens With the Greatest Convenience?" Prize winners were Joe Mimms, who received \$10 in gold, and Miss Jeannette Williams, who received a \$5 gold piece. All of the letters agreed that Friona was the logical place for the court house, and their reasons were many.

45 YEARS AGO—MAY 15, 1936

Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Roden have moved their household goods from Friona to Hereford, where they will make their home indefinitely. Ralph is connected with his brother, J.J. Roden, in the drug business here and now also at Hereford, and has been here for the past year assisting in the City Drug Store of this city.

40 YEARS AGO—MAY 16, 1941

Twenty-eight seniors will receive their diplomas on May 23 at commencement exercises at Friona High School. Leading the class of 20 girls and eight boys with an average of 94.1 is Jacquelyn Wilkison, who will deliver the valedictory. Betty Ann Taylor, with a 92.5 average, will give the salutatory.

35 YEARS AGO—MAY 17, 1946

The city, during the past week, has had a force of men at work placing

caliche on the part of Main Street north of the highway through the McMillian-Fergus Addition and grading it to afford sufficient drainage. Euclid has also been opened, and is being graded from the highway on Eleventh Street, north to the city limits. The Friona Lions Club has got a good start of Bermuda grass going on the City Park, as a club project.

30 YEARS AGO—MAY 10, 1951

Contract for the paving and curb and gutter construction on Friona streets was let Monday to the Brown and Root Construction Co. of Houston. The cost of paving some 62 blocks will be under \$215,000, Mayor Mack Bainum confirmed. Paving plans for the erection of a city hall, bonds for which were voted in the amount of \$15,000 on the same date.

25 YEARS AGO—MAY 10, 1956

Honor students have been named and dates for both baccalaureate and commencement have been set for Friona Schools. Phyllis Fairchild, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Fairchild, is class valedictorian with a four-year average of 94.11. Holding a four-year average of 93.33, Marie White, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L.R. White, is the class salutatorian.

20 YEARS AGO—MAY 11, 1961

With two fast-stepping relay teams leading the way, the Lazbuddie Longhorns rolled to the state Class

B track and field championship at Austin. Lazbuddie's relay team, made up of Odis Bradshaw, Billy Hardage, R.L. Porter and Freddie Savage took first in the 440, and second in the mile. Hardage won fourth in the 440 with a 50.4. Jimmie Seaton was in the 120-yard high hurdle finals, enroute to second place when he tripped over the final hurdle.

15 YEARS AGO—MAY 12, 1966

The Friona City Council approved the purchase of a Dempsey Dumpster trash dump truck and 40 "dumpster" steel trash boxes from the City of Canyon at its regular meeting Monday night. The trash collection system will be inaugurated in Friona's downtown area primarily.

10 YEARS AGO—MAY 13, 1971

The Friona City Council gave the final approval Monday to the annexation of the Carson Addition to the city. The annexations of the 3.03 acre addition to the city has been pending for some months, and has been held up by various details. One property owner in the area refused to join in the annexation, causing some of the delay. The property involved is most of the block between 14th and 15th Streets and Euclid and Cleveland Avenues, and includes lots in the Turner Addition.

5 YEARS AGO—MAY 9, 1976

School Has Results Of Testing

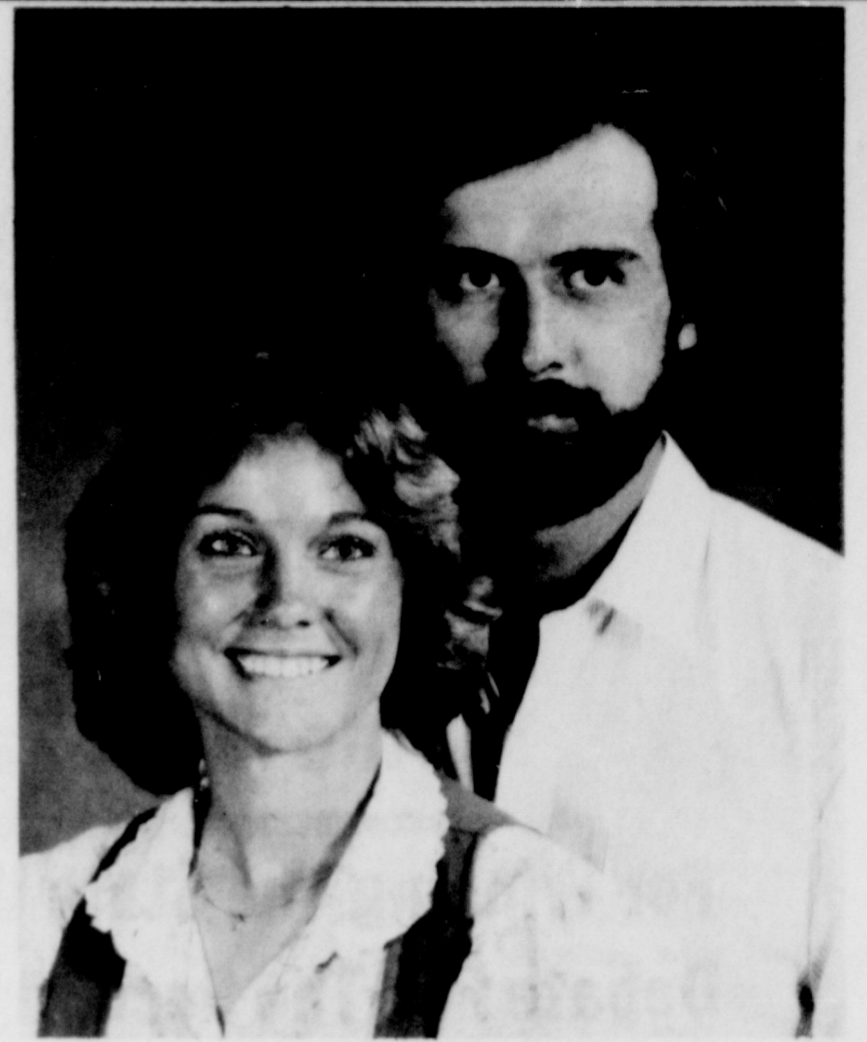
The Friona Independent School District has received the results of its spring standardized testing program, the California Achievement Test and the Texas Assessment of Basic Skills.

Commissioners Okay Expenses

Details concerning new procedures brought about by the creation of the new 287th Judicial District were discussed by the Parmer County Commissioners Court, at the court's regular session on May 8.

Due to the creation of the new district, it had been pointed out to the court in a letter from new District Attorney Johnny Actkinson that county will need to shoulder a larger pro-rata share of the salary of the District Attorney's secretary and the travel and benefits for the District Attorney's investigator.

The county has been paying on both of these items in the past, but due to the fact that the new judicial district is comprised of only two counties, Parmer County's share of these expenses needed to be increased.

A motion was passed that the county's budget be amended to show the District Attorney's secretary salary at \$8,000 per year, of which Parmer County would pay \$383.13 per month (\$4597 per year) pro rata share, according to population.

The travel and benefits of the District Attorney's investigator will be \$3,800 per year, of which Parmer County would pay \$2183 per year, or \$181.98 per month, for its pro-rata share.

Four estimates had been received for repairing and painting the ceilings of five rooms on the second floor of the courthouse. A motion was passed to accept the bid from Sherrill Lumber Company of Bovina, in the amount of \$525.

A discussion was held with Wendel Gresham, representing Ethridge-Spring Insurance Agency of Friona,

concerning insurance coverage of county buildings not located in Farwell. It was the opinion of the commissioners that these buildings should be covered, and Gresham plans to get a firm figure from his company and report back to the court.

M.C. Osborn and Duval Burton of the Soil Conservation Service met with the court to present a proclamation for consideration. A motion was passed declaring the week of May 23-31 as Soil Stewardship Week in Parmer County.
