CANDIDATES RADIO TIME

In the heat of a political campaign is a poor time to discuss questions objectively which are brought up by the candidates—matters which bear only indirectly on the campaign itself. As, for instance, Mr. Rainey's charge levelled at the radio stations that they did not give him enough time on the radio to discuss his candidacy and platform with the people of the state.

Now that the shouting is over and partnership is out of the way we think it can be said with reasonable assurance that the statement coincides with the facts, that radio listeners want less rather than more time allotted candidates on the air during election time. If the radio networks played politics or were partial to one candidate above another that is another matter. The air belongs to the radio listeners and those who are charged with the responsibility of its exploration give one candidate something they can't give another under like circumstances then a candidate does have a righteous cause when he registers a complaint.

But if the complaint is that the radios didn't allot sufficient time to candidates to discuss their view before the public over the air, the

argument will be refuted by most any radio listener in Texas during the last two or three weeks of the August primary campaign. Most of these wanted to hear less of what they were hearing and more of what they were not allowed to hear, we believe.

QUARTER HORSE SHOW

The Texas cow pony will join in the parade of champions at the State Fair of Texas in Dallas for the first time this year.

Quarter horses will be judged in the showing on October 16 and special ribbons will be awarded with the official sanction of the American Quarter Horse association. A total of 200 entries are expected.

Raymond D. Hollingworth of Amarillo, newly appointed executive secretary of the American Quarter Horse association, has been invited to act as superintendent of the division and Robert E. Hooper, Jr. of Plainview and Percy W. Turner of Water Valley, have been asked to judge the entries.

(Issue August 25, 1932)

Suits and equipment for the Floydada high school Whirlwind gridiron warriors will be issued at the high school building Monday at 8 o'clock, it was announced this week by Coach R. P. Terrell.

Preliminary arrangements are complete to stage another election party in front of the Hesperian office this week and everybody is invited. Results will be tabulated promptly on the big bulletin board just as soon as the election judges. The polls will close at 7 o'clock and the reports will begin coming in shortly after that time. The Hesperian will furnish the folks at the party with reports on all state and district races by a special wire arrangement with the Texas Election Bureau at Dallas.

A letter cautioning officials in the run-off primary against the possibility of illegal voting Saturday, was issued Saturday by the county chairman of the Democratic party, in which these officials were urged to be "scrupulously careful" that they do not permit "any votes to be cast which are illegal."

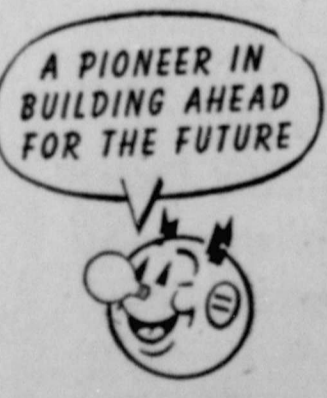

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

H. J. R. No. 63
proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 49-b, creating a Veteran's Land Board and establishing a Veteran's Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section I. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 49-b which shall read as follows:

"Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veteran's Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Legislature shall provide by law for the issuance by said Board of not to exceed Twenty-five million Dollars (\$25,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veteran's Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as shall be prescribed by law, provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum.

"In the sale of any such bonds a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various teacher retirement funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent Free School Funds; such bonds to be issued only as needed, in the opinion of the Veteran's Land Board under legislative authorization.

"The Veteran's Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm, or corporation.

"All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veteran's Land Fund.

"The lands of the Veteran's Land Fund shall be sold by the State to Texas Veteran's of the present war or wars, commonly known as World War II, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and such rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as may be prescribed by law; provided, however, that any such lands remaining unsold at the expiration of eight years after the effective date of this Amendment may be sold to anyone as shall be prescribed by law.

"All moneys received and which have been received and which have not been used for repurchase of land as provided herein by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest on deferred payments shall be credited to the Veteran's Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas Veteran's of World War II, in like manner as shall be provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of the bonds, provided for herein, for a period of eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on the bonds herein provided for shall be set aside for that purpose. After eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment, all moneys received by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest on deferred payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of said bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any of such moneys not needed shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law."

Sec. 2 The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Thursday in November 1946, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words: "FOR the Amendment to Article

III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 49-b creating a Veteran's Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veteran's of World War II."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words: "AGAINST the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 49-b creating a Veteran's Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veteran's of World War II."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date of the termination of such results and the Governor's proclamation thereof.

Sec. 3 The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4 The sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election, 27 4c.

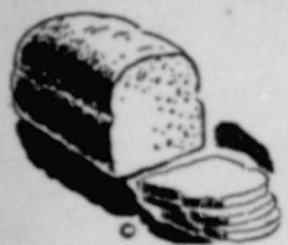

The supervisors of the Floyd County Soil Conservation district in a regular monthly meeting on Tuesday morning approved conservation plans on the farms of the following: E. J. Golden, W. J. Wood, Sid B. Thomas, C. H. Wise, B. E. Harris, Alfred B. Clark, O. C. Bailey, J. R. Belt, Jr., Mrs. Annie M. Assiter, T. E. Lee, Wayne Battey and Malvin A. Jarboe.

Applications for assistance in soil conservation work were approved on the farms of: Tom V. Rankin, M. O. Davis, I. O. Blassengame, Ralf J. Thayer, Shirley Race, L. D. Simpson, Hilburn Casey, D. J. Parkey, C. H. Jones, L. D. Simpson, Hugh Martin and R. D. Murphy.

Supervisors present at the meeting were W. F. Ferguson, W. H. Nelson, and Cecil Purcell.

The C. H. Wise and O. D. Orsburn farms located in the Fairview Conservation group are being terraced this week. The District is helping with the work which is being done in conformance with their conservation plans to keep soil from washing down the steeper slopes. Contractor on the job W. H. Cox of Colorado City, Texas.

District Cooperators Joe Reeves, H. A. Leaverton and E. L. Thomas have completed floating of land in preparation for planting alfalfa. Soil Conservation service technicians assisting the District laid out the irrigation system on these fields this week. On these farms alfalfa is being used in a long time rotation with inter tilled crops in an effort to improve the soil fertility.

Mention was made in this column in the spring of this year of some crops that were to be planted on a trial basis in the District in an effort to discover new adapted crops which can be used in a soil conservation program in this district. Some of the plantings made included hubam clover, guar and perennial sudan.

Hubam clover was planted on the Lockview farms and made very satisfactory growth. The planting was made about two months later than the usual planting date so encountered considerable weed competition. However the clover itself looked good and the trial proved that hubam clover does have possibilities in our district as a summer growing annual legume.

B. F. Trowbridge of the Harmony Conservation group secured a stand of dwarf perennial sudan after a second attempt. The plant resembles very closely standard sudan but is somewhat smaller and is a perennial. There is still a question as to whether it will survive the winters here but in parts of Arizona it has come through all right.

A. D. Bassel has an excellent stand of guar on his farm in the Belt Conservation group. This is a soil building plant, the seed from which are used in the making of a high quality paper, in inks linoleum etc.

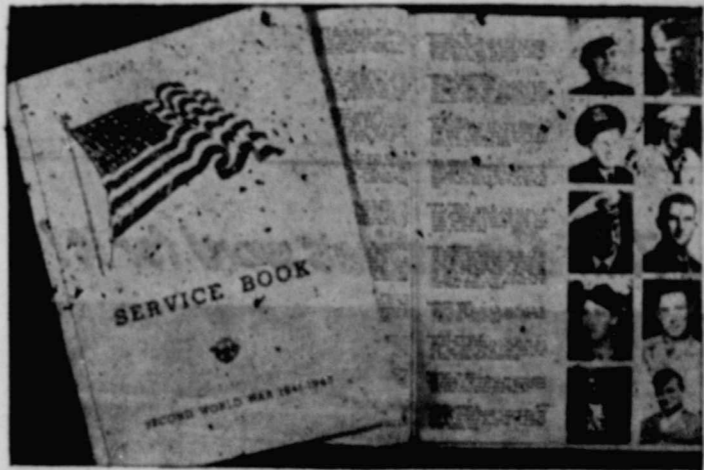

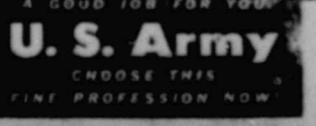


