THE ELLIS FAMILY observed an anniversary of sorts this week. One day this week I told Carol "Happy Anniversary." She looked at me with disbelief, feeling that finally I had lost the rest of my marbles, as our wedding anniversary is in December.

It was my pleasure to point out to her that 20 years ago this week, we first rolled into Friona, to take a job with the Friona Star, under the employ of W.H. (Sonny) Graham and Joe Osborn.

(See, wives sometimes forget anniversaries, too.)

Lots of changes have been made in the community since we first came here. And our family has changed considerably, too. At the time, we had our 18-month-old daughter Laura and a Cocker Spaniel puppy. We weren't sure our old Ford would make it up the north side of Running Water Draw.

During our sojourn in Friona, we have added two sons, both born in Friona. Number one son Stanley, like his sister, went all the way through Friona schools, finishing as an honor grad just this past week.

(Number two son Richard, who at first was not too sure that school was all that necessary, may decide to try it one more year. He'll let the teachers know next fall.)

It has been our pleasure to work with some fine people, both at the Star and within the community, in these 20 years. We have been able to chronicle through the pages of our newspaper, numerous achievements, articles showing the growth and advancement of our community.

It would take more space than we have at hand to list all of the nice additions our community has made in the past 20 years. We have been proud to lend our support, editorially and financially, to these community-minded projects which have benefitted Friona.

It has also been our sad duty to report some bad news along the way, and this includes the deaths of many of our area's pioneers, and several good friends and neighbors we had come to know and love. This is a part of our job we never quite get used to, but have to do it, none-the-less.

Probably the highlight of our news career in Friona was in 1967, when Loyd Shackelford and his industrial committee from the Chamber of Commerce, was nailing down Missouri Beef Packers (now MBPXL) for Friona.

Months before the plant announcement was made, Loyd kept ye editor abreast of his confidential discussions with the MBP people, and invited me to fly to Rock Port, Iowa, with the committee, to get a first-hand look at what our plant would look like, if we got it.

That was an enjoyable trip, and then I had to "sit" on the story about MBP's decision to come here until the company made it official. For one thing, there were other communities making bids for the plant, and we had to play our cards just right.

The MBP project, plus the raising of \$100,000 for the plantsite land, was a high point in our tenure at the Star.

Hopefully, we will continue to be able to announce new additions to Friona, such as we have this year in the new library. We continue to have leaders in our community who have the betterment of Friona at heart, and this is a big plus.

Back in June of 1962, we thought Friona was a nice little town. We could enjoy it here until we found something better, we thought.

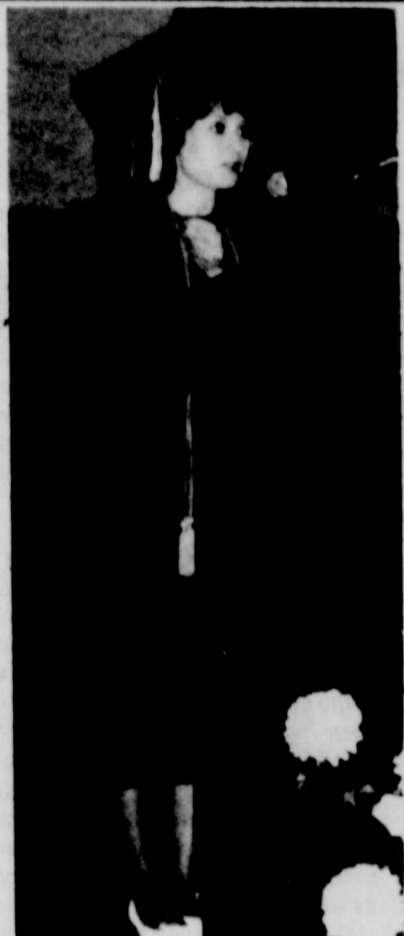
Twenty years, and 1,020 issues later, I suppose we have quit looking for "something better."

Fireworks Back 'On' For July 4

The city's July 4th celebration began to take shape this week, with the announcement of activities to be held, as well as the fact that the annual fireworks display apparently has been salvaged.

(Due to the fact that the July 4th holiday falls on Sunday this year, the Chamber of Commerce and Noon Lions Club, sponsors of the major events, plan to hold the Independence Day activities on Monday, July 5, which will be the official national holiday.)

Donations and pledges to the fireworks fund reached the \$325 mark, and it appears that enough money can be raised for the 14th annual free display to be held.

Fire Chief Ralph Shirley said that securing the permit for the annual display was the major item, and has taken steps along this line. Shirley, who has ordered the fireworks for the annual display for the last several years, said that a good display could be held for \$600 to \$700. Last year's display cost the Chamber around \$800.

Due to its financial condition, the Chamber directors voted earlier this year to withdraw its financial backing for the fireworks.

Contributors to the fireworks fund thus far include: Hardin's Tasty

Cream, \$50; Friona Star, \$50; D.L.'s Thriftway, \$50; Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home, \$50; Joe and Bonnie Wilhelm, \$50; Ethridge-Spring, \$50 and the Friona Noon Lions Club, \$50.

Another \$350 needs to be raised, in order to pay for a good display. Those wishing to contribute may mail their check to Box 789, or bring it by the Friona Star office.

At their regular meeting this week, the Friona Noon Lions began making plans for their annual barbecue meal, to be served July 5th. Barbecued beef and sausage will once again be the main item on the menu.

One idea offered, due to the holiday being on a long weekend, was to hold the barbecue as a supper, for the benefit of those planning to be out of town for the weekend. The barbecue committee was to decide on this angle.

The Friona Evening Lions will sponsor the World's Championship Turtle Race, the bicycle races and softball throw.

The Chamber will sponsor a tennis tournament, a ping pong tournament and a volleyball tournament.

As it now stands, a fine array of entertainment is being planned for the afternoon and evening of July 5th.

Municipal Pool Open For Season

Friona's Municipal Swimming Pool opened for the summer season Friday with a "splash day," in which all swimmers were admitted free.

Hours for the pool this summer will be from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. through the week, and 1-6 p.m. on Sundays.

The pool will remain open on a full-time basis until the week school re-opens in the fall, and will continue a weekend schedule through Labor Day, City Manager Jerry Lewis said.

Lynn Weiland, a member of the junior high coaching staff, has been employed by the city as manager of the pool.

Lights have been installed at the pool to enable it to extend its opening schedule. There are four 500-watt quartz lights, which should be adequate for night swimming.

The pool will be made available to groups for parties beginning at 9 p.m. each day. Lewis says he hopes to have special nights, such as "teen nights," etc., at the pool.

Swimming lessons will be offered, under the auspices of the City of Friona, with a session scheduled to start on June 21, running three weeks. Cost of the 15 lessons will be \$30.00. A second session of swimming lessons will begin July 12.

Lessons will be offered for beginners, advanced beginners, intermediates and advanced swimmers.

Weiland and his crew of lifeguards will be considered regular City of Friona employees, Lewis said. The city is currently taking applications for lifeguard positions at the pool.

Season passes are on sale at the City Hall. Prices are \$20 for children 1-12. It is \$27.50 for those 13 and over.

Family season passes are available for \$45.00.

Single admission prices will be \$1 for children 1-12, and \$1.25 for those 13 and older.

Demos Set Runoff On Saturday

The Democratic Primary runoff election will be held Saturday (June 5) from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Local and county polls will be open in the same places as they were for the May 1 primary.

Only four races are on the ballot, all state-wide in nature. Jim Mattox and John Hannah are opposing for state attorney-general. Pete Snelson and Garry Mauro are on the ballot for commissioner of the General Land office.

John E. Humphreys and Charles Campbell, Jr. are in the runoff for judge, court of criminal appeals, place 1. Bill Black and Chuck Miller are meeting for the nomination for judge, court of criminal appeals, place 2.

A very light turnout is predicted for the runoff election locally, due to the absence of any local or area races.

W.W. Wells Appointed Postmaster

William W. Wells is appointed the new postmaster at Friona effective Saturday, June 12, Sectional Center Manager/Postmaster C.T. Davis of Amarillo announced this week.

Wells, age 57, was born in Steele, Missouri and has served as postmaster at Plains, Texas for the past three years. He has been employed in the Postal Service for twenty-two years at locations in Hereford, Amarillo and Plains.

Postmaster selections are made on the basis of merit from a list of qualified candidates submitted to the Sectional Center Manager by a Review Committee. The Review Committee, composed of a district director from the same district, a sectional center director or postmaster from the same sectional center and a sectional center manager or postmaster from a different district, review the applicants for the position and recommend to the sectional center manager those candidates who best meet the position requirements. The sectional center manager then selects and recommends to the Postmaster General the best qualified person for the appointment to the vacancy.

He and his wife, Audine, will make their home in Friona in the very near future. He is active in his church and civic affairs.

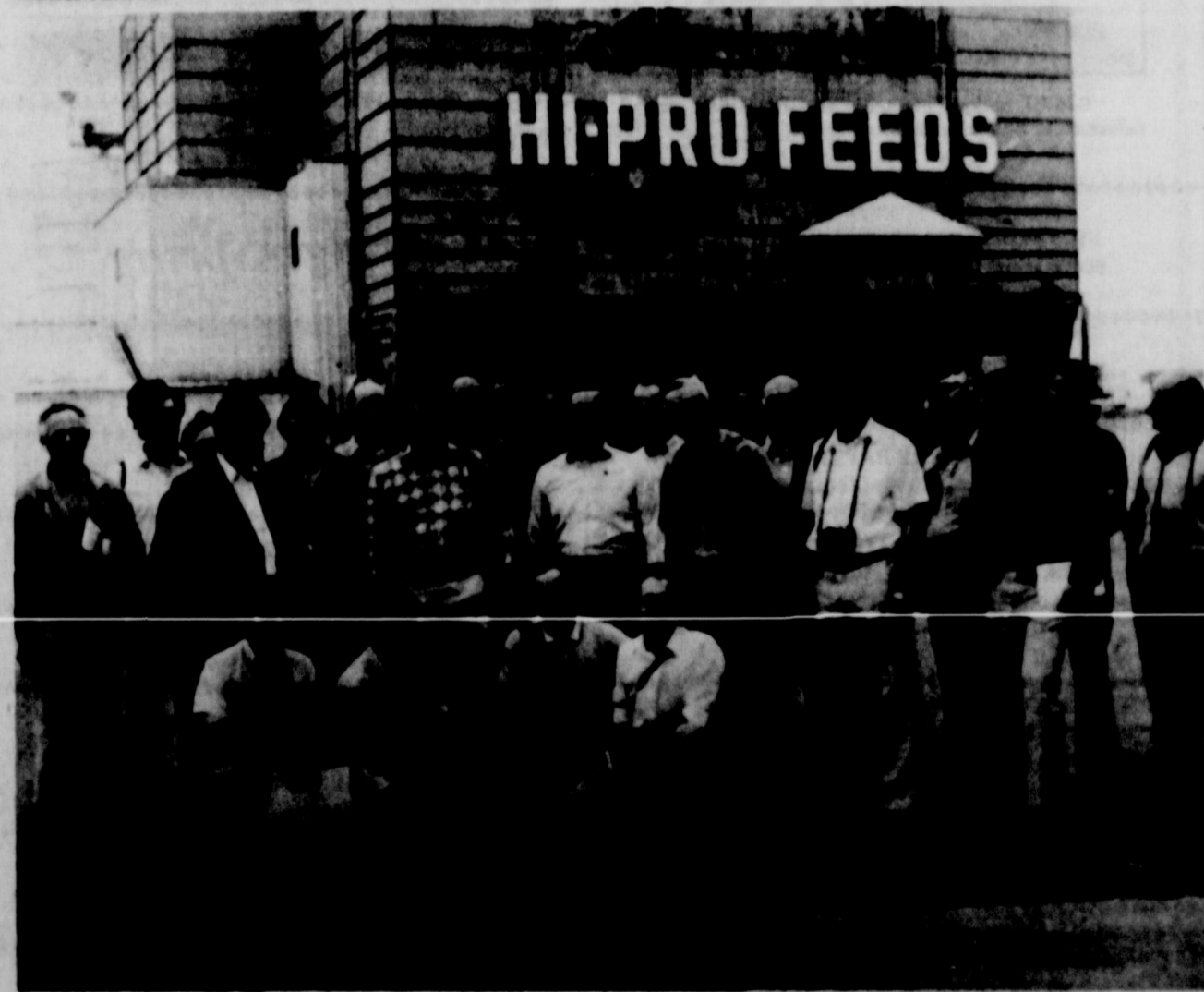
Mr. and Mrs. Wells are parents of two sons, both married. Charles, the oldest, lives in Midland, and Lynn lives in New York City.

Interest Rate Increases On Federal Land Bank Loans

Interest rates on all Land Bank variable rate loans will be increased to 1 1/2 per cent on farm loans and 12 per cent on rural residence and farm-related business loans, said Bill Liles,

president of the Federal Land Bank Association of Muleshoe.

These rates become effective June 1, 1982.

According to Land Bank President Thomas H. Benson, "Marketing conditions have prompted the Bank, with full cognizance of the problems facing agriculture, to recommend the increase."

"Refunding maturing bonds having a face rate ranging from 6.65 per cent to 8.70 per cent, with new ones in the 14 per cent range continuing to cause obvious pressure on the Bank's earnings," Benson said.

The Federal Land Bank Association of Muleshoe makes long-term real estate loans on farm and rural residence property in the counties of Bailey and Parmer.

50 YEARS AGO--JUNE 3, 1932

Word has been received by F.A. Spring, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, that the Clovis radio station, KICA, was not able to open on June 2 as it had planned to do, and that the Friona program, to have been rendered on Thursday evening, had been postponed. It is understood that the program will be given next Thursday, June 9.

40 YEARS AGO--MAY 29, 1942

District Attorney John B. Honts admonished 24 seniors of the Friona High School graduating class to lay aside normal plans and help America win the war, at the same time to be prepared to help establish "the kind of peace necessary for a democratic future for all mankind" in an address which was the feature of the commencement program last Friday night.

30 YEARS AGO--MAY 29, 1952

Hats off to the White Auto Store for bringing a television set to Friona! For you skeptics who just don't believe there is such a contraption, we invite you to inspect the receiving set over at Charlie's and Bill's. Confidentially, we're checking to see if an extension can be arranged whereby ye servants at the Star can enjoy the summer baseball games and even the political maneuvers (as long as we can stand them). 15 YEARS AGO--JUNE 1, 1967

Funeral services were held last Saturday for R.L. Bates, who first put Friona "on the map" as far as girls basketball is concerned. Bates took girls teams to the state tournament three times back during McKamie League playoffs, where 16 teams made up the state meet, all battling for one trophy. His best season record was in 1946-47 when the Squaws won 43 consecutive wins enroute to a 44-1 season record.

10 YEARS AGO--JUNE 1, 1972

Rev. Albert Lindley has been returned to begin his fourth year as pastor of Friona's United Methodist Church, according to the official appointments announced Tuesday evening.

Eight girls are entered in the Parmer County Farm Bureau queen's contest Saturday evening at Friona High School Auditorium.

5 YEARS AGO--MAY 29, 1977

Henry Kuper, 64, a long time resident of the Summerfield community, died late Monday after he had received multiple injuries in a tractor accident on his farm. He was run over by the large rear wheel of the tractor after starting the motor from the ground.

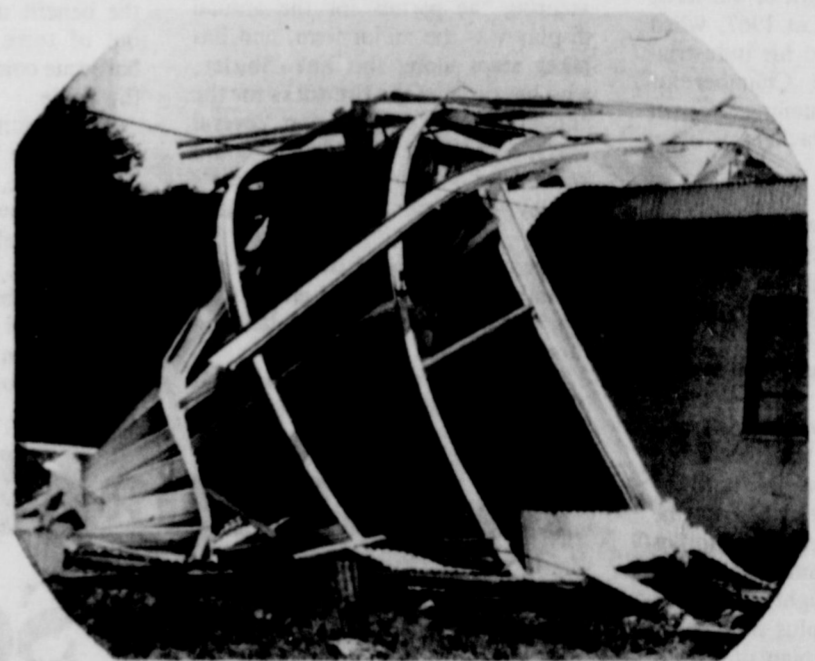

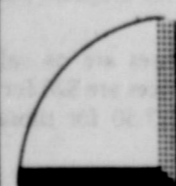

PUBLIC NOTICE OF INTENT TO CHANGE RATES

Notice is hereby given that DEAF SMITH ELECTRIC COOPERATIVE, INC. (the "Utility") intends to change rates for electric utility service effective June 13, 1982, or as soon thereafter as permitted by law. The changes are applicable to all areas to which the Utility provides electric utility service. All classes of customers are affected by the proposed changes. The proposed rates will effect a 12.28 per cent increase in the gross revenues of the Utility based upon the twelve-month period ending December 31, 1981 as the test year.

The Utility intends to change its service rules and regulations including rules relating to obtaining service, line extension and line extension charges, the provision of electric service, service fees, and discontinuance of service.

Implementation of the proposed changes is subject to approval by the appropriate regulatory authority. A statement of intent including the proposed revisions of tariff and schedules and a statement specifying in detail each proposed change, the effect the proposed change is expected to have on the revenues of the Utility and the classes and numbers of Utility customers affected is on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, and the municipalities of Hereford and Nazareth, Texas.

U.S. Akens' Rites Held On May 28

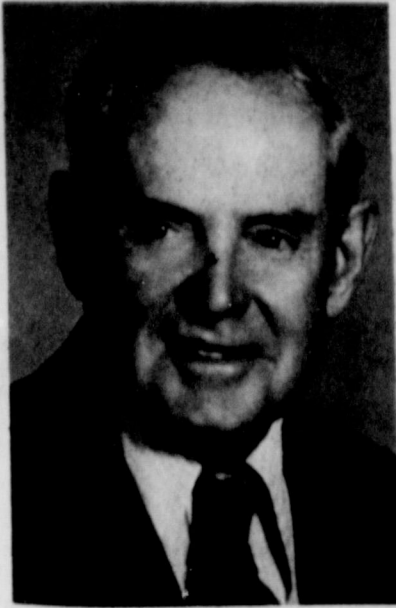

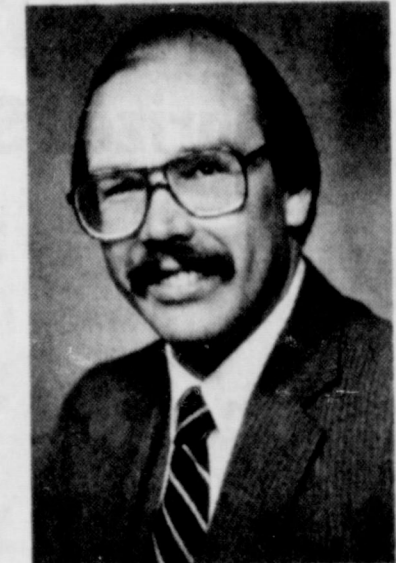

SPS Offers Annual Fed Cattle Survey

A wall poster-map showing locations of all the major cattle feed lots and packing plants in the four-state area served by Southwestern Public Service Co. is available free at SPS district offices, said Sam Thomas, SPS manager of agricultural development.
 The poster shows locations of 101 lots with a feeding capacity of 5,000 or more animals. Eighteen meat packing plants, in the Oklahoma Panhandle, the south plains and Panhandle of Texas, and in eastern New Mexico, are pinpointed.
 Indexes listing all the feed lots and packing plants also are on the poster.
 The poster-map, about 23 inches by 27 inches, is suitable for framing. Approximately 500 have been printed, Thomas said.
 SPS issued a similar map in 1976. It has been used by bankers, ranchers and farmers, trucking companies, the feed lots and packing plants, government officials and others with a vital interest in the fed cattle industry, Thomas said.
 The poster-map complements the recently released SPS annual feed lot survey, which summarizes the state of

the fed cattle industry in the area in 1981. Copies of the survey also are available at Southwestern Public Service Company offices.
 The survey reports Southwestern's 45,000-square-mile service area produced 4,045,004 fed cattle during 1981, which was nine per cent below 1980.
 The 4,045,004 head represented a farm sale value exceeding \$2.7 billion, and an area business value of \$9.7 billion, Thomas reported.
 Packing plants in the service area slaughtered 4,004,094 cattle in 1981—20,000 more than in 1980. Packing plant gross sales totaled \$2.7 billion, with a value to area businesses of an additional \$10 billion, Thomas calculated.
 The SPS annual Fed Cattle Survey has been compiled since 1966. It is the oldest continuous record of cattle feeding in the area served by the company. SPS primarily provides electric utility service to a population of more than 1 million in the Panhandle and south plains of Texas, eastern and southeastern New Mexico, the Oklahoma Panhandle and southwestern Kansas.

Crop, Livestock Reports Needed

The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service will begin interviewing Texas farmers and ranchers in mid-May on 1982 crop acreage and midyear livestock inventories, State Statistician Doug Murfield has announced.
 Results of the confidential interviews, conducted through the mail or in person by field enumerators, will be published in June.
 Murfield is urging farmers and ranchers to complete and return mail questionnaires promptly. Information will be combined for state and county estimates.
 Murfield said estimates give Texas farmers and ranchers planning information for planting, breeding, feeding, storing, producing and marketing. "Without these reports, most producers would have to depend on trade and other sources for information on crop and livestock prospects," he said.
 Reports are also used by farm organizations and legislatures to plan and develop farm programs, extension economists and farm and ranch management consultants to advise farmers and ranchers, and exporters to plan and promote sales of Texas agricultural products in foreign markets.
 Estimates are published annually for livestock, dairy, poultry, cotton, small grains, vegetables, fruits and pecans, and cash receipts from the sale of Texas farm commodities.

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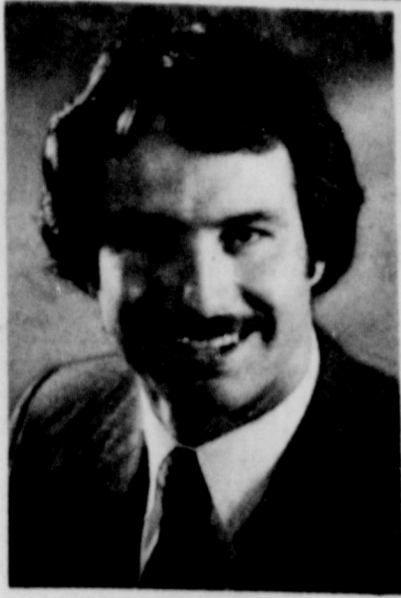

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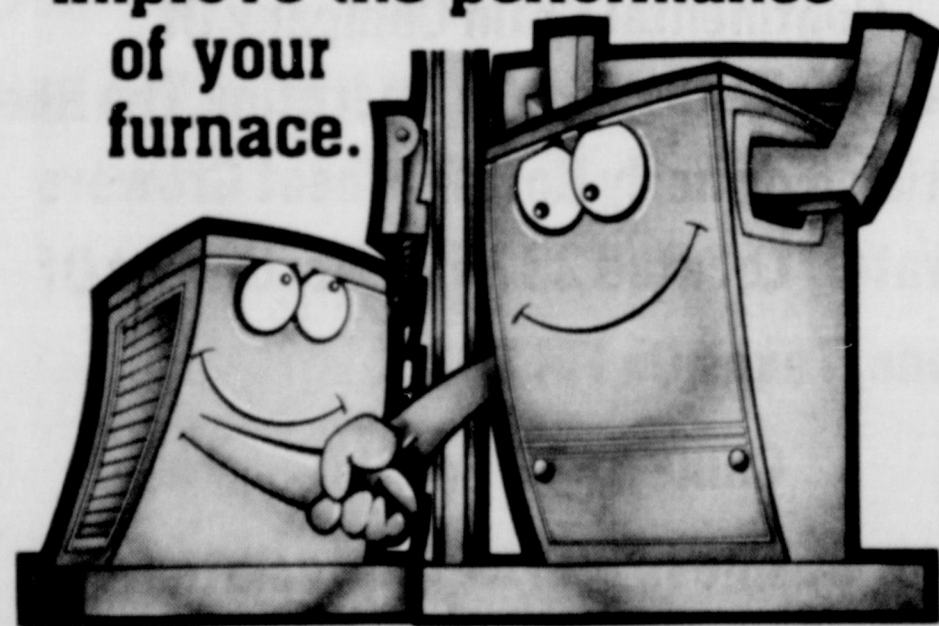
