SATURDAY IS PRIMARY election day, and Friona area residents are urged to go to the polls and cast their ballots for the candidates of their choice.

Some Friona voters, those in the northwest part of town, and many in the south and eastern portion of town, will find themselves in new voting precincts, due to the recent redistricting of the county's precincts.

The south and eastern portion of Friona, along with a two-mile strip east of Highway 214 southward to Hub, find themselves annexed to the Lazbuddie precinct, and will be called on to help elect a commissioner, either Raymond McGeHee or Raymond Treider, Jr.

Residents in this section will be voting at the junior high school on Saturday.

Residents of the northwest part of town will now help to elect a commissioner who previously has represented only Bovina and the Rhea area. Democratic candidates are the incumbent, Jack Patterson, Tommy Williams and Radford Venable. The polling place is the Friona Community Center for these voters.

Dale Hart is a candidate on the Republican ticket for Commissioner of this latter precinct, and his supporters will have to drive to Bovina in order to cast a vote in his favor (those living in the northwest part of Friona.)

All other residents of the city of Friona will vote at the high school-also other country voters represented by Ernest Anthony.

The city map showing the new voter boundaries is being reprinted on this page. Election officials have strived to let voters know where to go to cast their ballots, and it is hoped that no one will fail to vote due to the confusion which might prevail. After all, if you get to the wrong poll at first, you can't be more than a few blocks from the right one.

We would urge the Democrats of this area to go to the trouble to write in the name of Richard Collard as County Chairman. Richard did not get his name on the ballot, but has said he would serve another term if

Collard is conscientious, and we hope local voters will take the time to write his name in at the space for County Chairman.

Also, we appreciate the endorsement given this week by District Judge Jack Young and a group of attorneys on the various state-wide judicial races.

If you are like many voters who just don't know who to vote for in these races, turn to the ad on Page 8 of this issue, and see who the attorneys are endorsing.

They have rated the candidates on such matters as their records in overturning court decisions, and have come up with a set of recommendations which might come in handy before you go to the polls.

## **New Precinct Lines Enforced During Primary**

The new precinct lines, which were proposed earlier in the year and approved the by Commissioners, will be effective in the primary elections, coming up May 1, according to County Judge Porter Roberts.

Although these lines have not yet been approved by the Justice Department, these will be the guidelines that voters should go by when casting their votes.

Most adversely affected will be the voters in Friona, whose precincts have been worked around in a very

confusing maze of patterns. As far as Bovina is concerned, there should not be any real problems, as the precinct has been able to remain pretty much intact, even after the re-apportionment.

Saturday, May 1 is primary election day for both the Democrats and Republicans, but for voters residing in Friona, the question of "where to vote" may override that of "for whom to vote."



## **Grand Opening Underway At** Allsup's Store

A grand opening sale is underway for Friona's new Allsup's Convenience Store, located on West Highway 60 in Friona. The sale started Thursday, April 29, and continues through Saturday,

Customers have been treated with a free bag of groceries every half hour, from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. each of the three days. They are also asked to register for a 26-inch Huffy 10-speed bicycle, to be given away Saturday at 8 p.m.

Customers are also being offered a variety of money-saving specials during the Grand Opening Sale. See page 3 of this issue for the advertised specials.

The newest Allsup's Convenience Store, located on West Highway 60 in Friona, is number 225 in the growing chain of stores, founded by Lonnie Allsup in 1956. The Clovis-based corporation serves portions of New Mexico, Texas and Oklahoma.

Friona has played a vital role in the development of the Allsup's operation. The company's old location on Highway 60 and Prospect Street, was number seven in the chain that now numbers over 200 stores.

And the expansion of Allsup's in Friona is not finished, as a building permit has been issued, and groundbreaking is expected to begin soon on another new store on East Highway 60, two blocks east of Main Street and north of the highway.

The stores represent a capital investment of over \$500,000 each, according to Russell Haley, the company's director of real estate.

"The residents of Friona have been good customers since we have been in business there. Sometimes we have been busy expanding to new towns and have neglected updating our old locations. But we appreciate Friona, and the additions of the two new stores should be an indication of this," Allsup stated.

## County Scales Check **Shows Accuracy Rate**

Parmer County people can count on getting their money's worth in weight through the year if the products are weighed on local scales gas pumps, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown said today.

In the county there are 202 weighing devices of different types, ranging from 106 fuel pumps to 55 supermarket scales.

"Our Department regularly checks the commercial scales in the county and has found that they conform to our previous surveys across the state. Of those that were above or below tolerance, not many scales were off by significant amounts. Also, as many were giving the customer too much of the product as were giving too little. Because of frequent checks, scales are not out of calibration very long," Brown said.

"Business owners are glad to see us come in because as often as not, they have been losing money if their scales were not accurate," Brown said.

The Texas Department of Agriculture has inspectors assigned to every county. They are trained to check all different types of scales-

from those of medicines in a pharmacy to those for livestock and

The inspectors also spot check packaged goods, such as cereals and crackers, to make certain that the weight stated on the label is accurate. If on the average the weights of the packages are below the amount stated on the label, the shipment is put on a Stop-Sale order. The store owner then either returns the items to the processor or as is the case very often, them to charitable organizations. Meat packaged in the supermarket as well as processor packs are also checked by Department inspectors.







The Friona Chieftains had a banner day at the District 2-AAA track and field meet Monday in Hereford, qualifying both relay teams and seven individuals for the regional meet.

As a team, the Chiefs scored 140 points, to finish as runnerup to Muleshoe in the race for the district team championship.

"We did about as well as we expected to do, overall. We did better in some events, and not as well in others (as we thought we would)," said Steve Williams, FHS boys' track coach.

Team members came up with only four best marks of the season, in spite of a warmer than usual day for the meet (although the wind did hamper some

Junior Mike Neill and seniors Robert Osborn and Nelson Jackson, led the list of regional qualifiers.

Osborn also qualified for regional in two events, finishing second to Neill in the high hurdles in his best time of the season, 15.27, and was also second in the intermediate hurdles to Littlefield's Bill Davidson in 40.93.

Osborn also led off Friona's mile relay team, which qualified for regional. The relay foursome was edged at the tape by Littlefield, and was timed in



### **AAM Endorses** AAC April 19

American Agriculture Movement National officially endorsed the American Agriculture Clearinghouse marketing co-op (AAC) Monday, April 19, 1982.

The marketing co-op is headquartered in Monroe, Louisiana and will be offering contracts on wheat, cotton, corn, milo and soybeans for 85 per cent parity. Thus far, only Louisiana and Mississippi are cleared to sign contracts. We are working in most states to be cleared and make it a nationwide project.

We will need to sign as much production nationwide as possible in order to make it work most effectively, even though those who do sign will receive 85 per cent parity for their production. This program will work the same as if the Secretary of Agriculture actually set the CCC loan rate at 85 per cent parity. Although the whole program is a farmer's marketing co-op, the only basic requirement is to participate in the USDA-ASCS program and purchase one share of stock per member for \$100.00. Your State Delegate can give you more information.

Here are some steps to take when a tornado threatens: Stay away from windows, doors and outside walls. Protect your head.

In homes and small buildings, go to the basement or to an interior part on the lowest level. Get under something

In schools, hospitals, and public places, move to pre-designated shelter areas. Interior hallways on lowest floors are best

In mobile homes or vehicles, leave them and go to more substantial

If outdoors, with no shelter available, lie flat in nearby ditch, and shield head with arms.



## **State Crude Oil Totals Include Parmer's Well**

The tenth consecutive year of production at the maximum efficient recovery rate in nearly all of Texas' oil and gas fields pushed the state's output of crude oil and condensate last year to nearly 929 million barrels.

The total of 929,710,351 barrels included more than 897-million barrels of crude oil. Figures compiled by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association also indicate that more than 31-million barrels of condensate were produced.

Texas' drilling boom, spawned by crude oil price decontrol, continued last year. Figures from the Railroad Commission's Oil & Gas Division show 24,998 new holes drilled in the state last year, an 18.1 per cent increase from the 1980 total of 20,490 wells. Oil completions stood at 15,627, up 21.2 per cent from 1980, while drilling applications jumped 17.8 per cent between 1980 and 1981. A total of 47,940 applications were received last year, compared to 39,442 in 1980.

Last year's crude oil and condensate production total was 31.6 million barrels below the 1980 figure, a decrease of 3.3 per cent. It marked the ninth consecutive year of a downward trend since Texas' output peaked at near 1.3 billion barrels in 1972. However, 1981 production from the nation's number one producing petroleum province pushed the all-time cumulative total since 1866 to more than 46.6 billion barrels of crude oil and condensate.




