Star Lites

ONE OF OUR FAVORITE columnists, Jenkin Lloyd Jones, wrote a master-piece recently, in which he derided the country's foreign policy, and challenged the nation's leaders to turn things around, to reflect the type of attitude that the majority of Americans have on most subjects.

Many times in the past we have dipped our head at the way America lets many of the so-called "Third World powers" denunciate America—even to the point that in one case, we agreed to give up the Panama Canal, rather than have Panama's upstart dictator mad at us.

Jones pointed out in his recent piece that he felt it was about time that the United States, in its foreign policy quit "walking on eggs, turning the other cheek, speaking softly and carrying a small stick, etc."

Wonder if this type of foreign policy was not the major factor in the problem currently involving Argentina and Great Britain, in the Falkland Islands? Argentina, having seen what its neighbor Panama accomplished, probably decided that the time was ripe for them to pick the "prize plum," on which it had had its eye for some time.

The British are to be commended on their nationalism. It has been refreshing to see one of our allies stand up on its feet against communism. And, it's refreshing to see our country rally to Britain's side.

Had the Falklands issue happened in recent years, and the islands had been U.S. territory, we wonder if our cheek-turning policy would have allowed the country to have retaliated? Or would we just have increased the attacking nation's foreign aid, so they would have the capital with which to adequately run their new possession?

Speaking of the situation in the Middle East, Jones said the U.S. should send a message reading "We're tired of financing and arming old terrorists posing as patriots and religious fanatics self-billed as the Swords of God. No more aid or arms until Israel retires from its Six-Day War conquests and the Arab world swears on the Koran to let Israel live."

Another of our problem areas lies with the People's Republic of China, which would like for the United States to quit selling arms to Taiwan, and embrace the "one China" theory.

Columnist Jones suggested that we send Peking this note:

"We had a one-China policy when we thought there was still a possibility that Chiang Kai-shek could engineer the counterrevolution that would throw you Commies out.

"Now we've got a two-China policy. To hand over Taiwan, which violated practically none of the ideals expressed in the UN Charter, to a government that has violated practically all of them, is for the birds, until and unless Taiwan so chooses.

"We know you got yourselves into a mess with the Thoughts of Mao and the Great Cultural Revolution. We'd like to help you. But if the price of your friendship is our acquiescence to imposing your types of controls on 18 million presently free people, forget it."

Jones admits that polished diplomats would never say such things as he suggests, but wonders if it isn't about time for the majority of fed-up, under-polished Americans and their feelings, to at least be heard in the foreign policy chambers.

City Gets Tax Rebate

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday sent checks totaling \$35.5 million to 966 Texas cities as their share of the one per cent city sales tax for June.

Friona's check for June was \$3,701.65 compared to \$3,440 for June of 1981. Year-to-date Friona has received \$49,454.57 compared to \$43,758.18 for 1981. This is a 13.02 per cent increase.

City Council Oks New Electric Code

Naming of a new city fire marshal, and adoption of a new city electrical code highlighted the monthly meeting of the Friona City Council June 7.

Longtime fire marshal, Clyde Fields, had tendered his resignation. After discussion, Clyde was replaced through appointment by none other than his son, Roger Fields, the city's emergency operator and member of the Fire Department.

The council adopted on first and final reading the new electrical code, which updates the previous code in several instances.

In other business, the council authorized expenditures for a maintenance agreement for the city's computerized accounting system, in the amount of \$450 per year.

A resolution was passed approving free passes to the Municipal Swimming Pool to city employees and members of the Friona Volunteer Fire Department.

Dr. Lee Spring was appointed as City Health Officer.

A nominating committee was named to select nominees to the board of directors at Prairie Acres Nursing Home. The committee will be made up of Jack Hamil, D.L. Harguess and Charles Allen. The terms of Jo Buchanan and Nelson Welch will be expiring soon.

Welch, secretary of the Prairie Acres board, gave his monthly status report on the nursing facility, which continues to do well and has enjoyed a high occupancy average for a number of months.

Water Superintendent Clyde Fields gave a status report on the city's new waterfield. The 500,000-gallon ground storage tank, which has been built near the field, is in the process of being painted. Painting has been completed on the inside of the tank, and a primer is to be applied to the exterior in the near future.

The next major phase in the completion of the additional water supply for the city will be construction of a pump station, which will be located near the storage facility. It was pointed out that much of the work on the equipment for the pump station is being done at the company which will supply the pumps, and that completion of this station could go fairly rapidly once the equipment arrives in Friona.

Then, it would be a matter of digging the ditch for the water line, and the ditching operation could be completed in a relatively short time.

Depending on how quickly things proceed in relation to action by the city engineer, city officials are hopeful that the new water supply can be a reality by late August of this year.

The appointment of an advisory board for the city's planning and zoning committee was tabled.

Other items included reports on the proposed rate increases by

Southwestern Public Service (where a compromise was reached with the company), by Energas, and by General Telephone Company of the Southwest.

Commissioners Court Has Routine Business

Approval of expenditure for carpeting the County Extension offices at the court house was on the agenda at the County Commissioner's final May meeting.

The carpet was a budgeted item, and after considering three estimates, the court awarded the job to Poarch Furniture of Friona in the amount of \$1,335.03.

Approval of a bill from Bickerstaff, Heath and Smiley, on the reapportionment of commissioners' precincts, services through May 15, was granted. The bill amount was \$458.19.

TML Attacks \$110 Million GTE Rate

In testimony filed this week with the State Public Utility Commission, Texas Municipal League rate experts challenged the request of General Telephone Co. of the Southwest for a \$110 million rate hike.

The League's testimony was filed in advance of utility commission hearings, that begin April 15, on General Telephone's application for rate increases that would raise the monthly charges for some customers by as much as 71 per cent.

The Municipal League's analysis concluded that General Telephone's request for \$110 million was far in excess of the amount justified to keep the company financially sound. The cities' study of the company's books indicated that General Telephone was legitimately entitled to a rate hike of just \$23.3 million—about 21 per cent of the amount asked.

Company was approved. Approval of a small bill from Texas A&M for maps in connection with the 1980 census was approved. The bill amount was \$10.71.

It was noted that County Clerk Bonnie Warren was to attend a meeting for county clerks on June 14, the regular commission date, so that meeting was changed to June 11.

County Extension Agent Laura Jacobs reported that she has purchased a tester for pressure canners, and has already tested several home canners.

Approval was given for payment of \$6 for 4-H supplies.

Approval was also given for soil conservation work by county equipment when it was not in use and in the areas needed, for David Dalton, Leslie McCain, Carl Schlenker and Wm. Gromowsky in Precinct 2, C.A. White trust, W.L. Fritz estate and Gerald Norton in Precinct 3.

Springer Is President Of Research Group

Berl M. Springer, board chairman and chief executive officer of Southwestern Public Service Company, is the new president of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation.

The Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation (TAERF) is a non-profit research organization created to advance knowledge of energy, particularly nuclear energy. The foundation was formed in 1957 by the investor-owned electric utility companies of Texas.

TAERF is a primary supporter of the Fusion Research Center at the University of Texas at Austin. The Center houses one of the largest university experimental fusion programs in the world, and its group of theoretical physicists is considered among the best. They are searching for ways to control nuclear fusion reactions for the production of electric power.

Nuclear fusion is the source of the energy of the sun and stars. It is distinctly different from—in fact, the opposite of—nuclear fission, the process used in nuclear powered plants. Fusion reactions join, rather than split, nuclei of atoms. Harnessing the tremendous energy of fusion reactions to produce electricity would make available an almost unlimited supply of energy.

A likely fuel for fusion reactions is deuterium, which is low cost, clean, and abundant. Deuterium is available

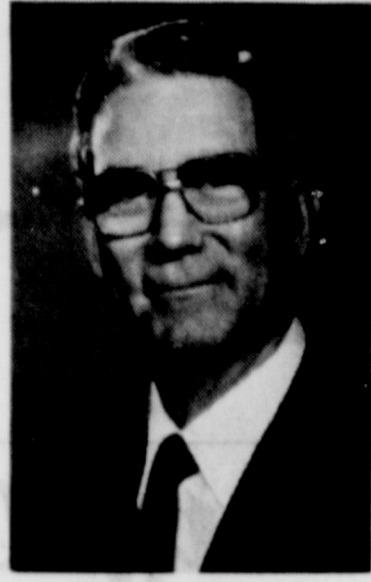
in water—which covers four-fifths of the earth.

A pitcher of ordinary water, researchers say, contains in its deuterium the energy equivalent of the electricity used in one year in a typical American home. The deuterium in a swimming pool of water could furnish all the electric energy needs of a city for a year.

However, many obstacles remain to be overcome in developing fusion technology. A primary problem is containing incredible heat generated by fusion reactions.

TAERF funds which support the research at UT-Austin are matched several times over by federal funds. But the TAERF support ensures that the interests of the customers of the electric utilities in Texas are served: The support influences the direction of the fusion research program in ways that should eventually produce the most efficient and lowest cost electrical power.

Springer was elected TAERF president May 29. He is a native of Memphis, Texas, and an industrial engineering graduate of Texas Tech University. He started his SPS career as a draftsman in 1948. He later became a statistician-engineer, rate engineer, and rate manager, and in 1969 was elected vice president of rates and budgets. He was named executive vice president in 1972, and joined the board of directors in 1974. He was elected chairman of the board

and chief executive officer in January, 1982.

Springer has been active in many local, regional and national civic and business affairs. He has served as president of the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce, co-chairman of the Amarillo United Way, member of the President's Council at West Texas State University and at Texas Tech University, and as a director of the National Food and Energy Council. He received the "Distinguished Engineer" award from Texas Tech in 1975.

Members of TAERF are Southwestern Public Service Company, Dallas Power & Light Company, El Paso Electric Company, Central Power & Light Company, Gulf States Utilities Company, Houston Lighting & Power Company, Community Public Service Company, Texas Electric Service Company, Texas Power & Light Company, and West Texas Utilities Company.

50 YEARS AGO—JUNE 24, 1932

F.W. Reeve and others of this place who were taking an active part in promoting the plan for a north and south highway across Parmer County, met with quite a disappointment in their efforts when they presented their petition to Judge John H. Aldridge for his signature as an endorsement of the project by the Commissioners Court. At a recent meeting of the court it was unanimously agreed that the court should endorse the move, but no motion, it appears, was made to that effect, and Judge Aldridge contended that he could not conscientiously sign the petition unless the matter had been made of record by the court.

40 YEARS AGO—JUNE 12, 1942

The Friona Wheat Growers, Inc., is increasing its already large grain storage space by the addition of four bins now under construction, which will augment the space by an estimated 20,000 bushels. In addition to this, plans are made for another addition on the west side of the larger elevator, which will give another 60,000 bushel space. It is hoped that the 80,000 bushel addition will be ready for service by harvest, according to Guy Bennett, elevator manager.

35 YEARS AGO—(1947 issue missing from Star files.)

30 YEARS AGO—JUNE 12, 1952

City Marshall J.W. Roberts has been instructed by the city commission of Friona to educate local drivers on proper parking with observance of the no-parking zones painted along the curbs in yellow paint. Both this and speeding regulations will be enforced here, with the marshal first reminding offenders by leaving "courtesy" tickets on cars improperly parked along these zones or across alleys.

25 YEARS AGO—JUNE 13, 1957

Friona School Board Monday night approved plans for new buildings for ten additional classrooms, offices, a grade school

gymnasium, storage space and work rooms for teachers. July 2 was set as date for contract letting. Bonds in the amount of \$350,000 were voted for the building recently.

Indications are that Friona will get a swimming pool. Even though a bond issue for building a pool failed to carry Tuesday of last week, interested groups and individuals are still enthusiastic over getting a swimming pool. A meeting of all who would like to have a swimming pool in Friona and would like to help get one will be held Friday in the Friona School study hall.

20 YEARS AGO—JUNE 14, 1962

The Parmer County Commissioners' Court, sitting as a board of equalization in their meeting Monday set the tax rate for the county at \$1.25 per \$100 valuation.

Friona cleared its final hurdle in having its public water supply declared officially approved by the state health department last week, when V.T. Hancock, state health engineer, put his stamp of approval on the local facilities.

A total of 34 persons were present for a meeting of the Farmers' Co-op Gin stockholders last Thursday, at which a permanent board of directors was elected. The men who had served on the temporary or "organizing" board were elected as permanent board members. They include A.W. Anthony, Jr., Keith Brock, Ellis Tatum, D.L. Carmichael, Charles Howell, R.J. Renner, Jr. and Raymond Schueler. Each of the 34 men present purchased one share of common stock, becoming charter stockholders.

15 YEARS AGO—JUNE 15, 1967

Friona's Piggly Wiggly Super Market, formerly Moore's Super-Market, is holding a grand opening as a Piggly Wiggly store this week.

Eddy Willmon, who has served as Work Unit Conservationist for the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District for the past two years, has resigned his position effective this week.

10 YEARS AGO—JUNE 15, 1972

A devastating hail storm cut a swath about two miles wide across the Black Community last Saturday afternoon, destroying some crops and heavily damaging others. Up to three inches of rain was received during the downpour, which assaulted crops and buildings with golf ball-sized hailstones for the better part of an hour. Farms of Wesley Barnett, Charles Bass, Ed Clark, Travis Stone, Bruce Parr, Tom Lewellen, Bill Carthel, Clyde Hays, Johnny Mars and others sustained heavy crop damage. At the Tom Lewellen place, a building being used to house an airplane and a trailer house was blown down by the gale-like wind which accompanied the storm, and extensively damaged the spray plane owned by Joe Lewellen, and the Lewellen's recently acquired trailer house.

5 YEARS AGO—JUNE 26, 1977

Thanks to a successful fund drive, Friona's Fourth of July fireworks have been reinstated for the 1977 Independence Day Celebration. As of this week, a total of \$1420 had been donated by 36 Friona businesses, clubs or individuals.

The Running Water Draw bridge on Highway 214 south of Friona was completed last week and is now in operation. The new 120 foot long bridge is five foot higher than the old bridge.

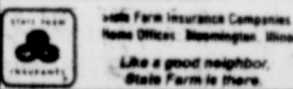

The first session of lessons will start Monday, June 21, and will run three weeks. Cost of the 15 lessons will be \$30.00.

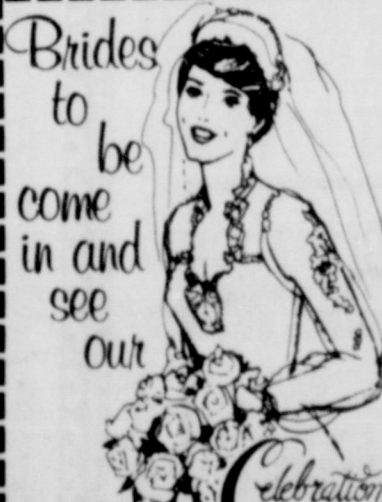

Carlsbad Caverns Expands Schedule

Carlsbad Caverns National Park's fully expanded summer schedule began Saturday, May 29 and continues through August 22.

Under the expanded schedule, complete walk-in tours of the main cavern will be available from 7:30 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. daily, and Big Room trips will be available an hour and a half longer each day, or until 6 p.m. daily. The park visitor center will also open at 7:30 a.m. and remain open until after completion of the nightly bat flight programs which are held at the cavern entrance amphitheater at about sunset each evening.

Lantern tours through primitive New Cave will also be offered on a daily basis starting May 29, with two tours scheduled on weekdays and four trips per day scheduled each Saturday and Sunday. The weekday tours are at 9 a.m. and 12:30 p.m., and weekend tours are at 9 a.m., 10 a.m., 11:30 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. The new Cave tour times are from its entrance in the Slaughter Canyon area, and about an hour and forty-

five minutes travel time must be allowed either from Carlsbad, New Mexico, or from the park visitor center. The lantern trips also require reservations which may be made by calling the park at 505-785-2232.

The park entrance fee is \$3 per carload daily, with a separate \$2 per person guide or "user" fee charged for the New Cave trips. Annual Golden Eagle permits are available and honored at the park, as are Golden Age and Golden Access permits. While the Golden Eagle permits do not cover the guide fee at New Cave, holders of the Golden Age and Golden Access passports do receive a 50 per cent discount on the New Cave guide fee. The fee for persons entering the park by commercial bus is \$1 per person.

The park has several hiking and nature trails, roadside exhibits, and a scenic ten-mile unpaved loop drive, in addition to the cavern trips.

Concession facilities available include a restaurant, underground lunchroom, and gift shop, plus nursery and kennel service.

Happy Homemaker

When you read about the computers that will soon be available, you almost begin to wonder if homemakers will soon be on the endangered species list. Surely not, since homemaking is such a noble profession as well as one of the most interesting jobs a woman can hold down.

In what other profession does a person need such a wide variety of skills, more knowledge, more versatility or more vim, vigor and vitality?

The following paragraphs were lifted from the October 1981 Montana Agriculture, the official publication of the Montana Farm Bureau. Hope everyone enjoys it and feel sure that many local homemakers can relate to it in a very personal way.

The title is "A Farmer's Wife." Does this sound like you? "On the first day of harvest my true love said to me, "With our kids to help I won't need you."

On the second day of harvest the kids all laughed with glee, 'cause the chicken chores and milking chores would now be up to me.

On the third day of harvest my husband said to me, "Help tie the tarp down, run this half load into town, pick up some salt blocks and then check the cattle 'cause WE'RE too busy!"

On the fourth day of harvest they gave a broken part to me and said, "Try the co-op at Beeler, then every implement dealer then just keep driving until you find the right pulley."

On the fifth day of harvest my husband said to me, "We're moving to the other field, you bring the pick-up, fill up the gas tanks and water jugs. Put in the tool box a can of bolts and nuts and locks and better bring dinner out this time—don't forget the iced tea."

On the sixth day of harvest my daughter called to me, "The elevator's tied up and I can't get unloaded. Take the old Chevy truck and make sure it's gassed up, check the oil and battery then get over to the west field in a big hurry."

On the seventh day of harvest my husband said to me, "We're going to bring some wheat in, will you clean out the north bin?" Then set up the auger and left me scooping breathlessly.

On the eighth day of harvest my husband gave a list to me. "Don't know if this belt will last, better get to town real fast. I need another reel slat, filter and bearing. Bring it to the field, throw in an extra scoop and don't forget the goop that makes the chain run free."

On the ninth day of harvest at 11:30 the clutch went out on the combine and my husband called on the C.B. "Find the extra log chain, get the Ford tractor and come pull me."

On the tenth day of harvest my true love snapped at me as I handed up tools to him nervously.

On the eleventh day of harvest the whole crew said to me, "Want to fill the gas tanks while we eat, take home this load of wheat and bring back one wrench, lug, another water jug and a spray bomb for the bees."

On the last day of harvest my husband grinned at me. "If everything goes right we should be done by midnight and aren't you glad you didn't have to help, Honee?"

The next time you're planning a meal for a large crowd and want to serve something a little bit different, you might like to try the following recipe:

Marinated Beef Kabobs

1-1/2 to 2 pound sirloin steak cut 1-inch thick

- 1/2 cup salad oil
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 1/4 cup chopped onion
- 1 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic salt
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper
- 2 small tomatoes
- 1 medium green pepper
- 3 small cooked onions

Mix together salad oil, lemon juice, onion, mustard, garlic salt, salt and pepper. Add meat and allow to stand several hours or overnight in the refrigerator. Drain. Cut each tomato

into 4 wedges. Cut green pepper into 8 squares. Thread each on four 12-inch skewers in the following order: meat, tomato, green pepper, onion, meat, onion, meat, green pepper, tomato and meat. Brush with remaining marinade. Place kabobs on rack in grill. Grill 3 inches from the heat for 10 to 12 minutes or until browned. Turn. Brush with remaining marinade. Cook second side 8 to 10 minutes until browned.

Allow one recipe to serve four persons you plan to have eat with you.

If you have more blade, arm, rump or round roasts in the freezer than you know what to do with, you might try one of the following recipes for Pot Roast. Any of these make a good substantial meal and all you need add is salad, drinks and dessert.

Dill Pot-Roast With Carrot Gravy

3 to 4-pound beef arm or blade pot-roast

- 1/4 cup flour
- 3 teaspoons salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 3 tablespoons lard or drippings
- 1 medium onion, sliced
- 1 teaspoon dill seeds
- 2 tablespoons vinegar
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 cup coarsely grated carrots
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 small head cooked cabbage, cut in 8 wedges, if desired

Combine 1/4 cup flour, salt and pepper. Dredge pot-roast in seasoned flour. Brown in lard or drippings. Pour off drippings. Add onion, dill seeds, vinegar and 1/2 cup water. Cover tightly and cook slowly 2 hours. Add grated carrots and continue cooking 1 hour or until meat is tender. Remove meat to heated platter. Mix 2 tablespoons flour and 1/2 cup water. Add to cooking liquid and cook, stirring constantly, until thickened. Serve with cooked cabbage wedges, if desired. 8 to 10 servings.

Pot-Roast—Herb Gravy

3 to 4-pound beef arm or blade pot-roast

- 3 tablespoons flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper
- 3 tablespoons lard or drippings
- 1 beef bouillon cube
- 1/2 cup hot water
- 2 bay leaves
- 1/2 teaspoon marjoram
- 1/4 teaspoon basil
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic salt
