

\$200,000 Revenue Bond Issue To Be Voted On December 1, 1953

The City Council Monday night at a regular meeting, voted to call an Electric Revenue Bond Election on December 1, 1953 for the purpose of refunding \$61,000.00 outstanding bonds and issuing \$139,000.00 for additions and improvements to the present Light and Power System. These bonds are strictly REVENUE BONDS and are payable entirely from the profits of the Light and Power System. They are not tax bonds and taxes cannot be levied to retire same as each bond contains this clause:

The win placed the Dogs in second place in District 13-B while dropping Baird to third.

The Dogs were successful on ground plays but were weak in the air. Heretofore they have been primarily a passing team.

Clyde drew first blood in the first period when Bill Barr scampered over from the 9 yard marker. Barr also converted to push the Dogs out front 7-0.

Baird scored late in the second quarter when Fullback George Jones broke loose for a 36-yard gainer and a TD. Tackle Kyle Meadows placed the pigskin through the uprights to even it up and that is how the half ended, 7-7.

Baird went ahead early in the third period when Halfback John Bullock scampered 32 yards to paydirt. Meadows' kick was wide.

Again Barr scored to even it up from the 7 yard marker after a 48-yard gainer by Gene Cook had set it up. Barr added the point after touchdown and moved out front 14-13.

The Clyde line trapped Halfback Charles Brame of Baird in the end zone for a safety to lengthen that lead shortly after their second TD and led 16-13.

The two teams swapped out in the fourth period to end the scoring.

Barr scored the final TD for the Dogs on a 5-yard scamper but missed the extra point try.

The Bear's tally came on a pass from Quarterback Paul Jones to End Lonnie Lawrence for 25 yards. Meadows' kick was no good and that was all the scoring.

Outstanding players for Clyde were Bill Barr, Gene Cook, and Tommy Burrow.

Outstanding for the Bears were George Jones, Bobby Poe, and George Lambert.

Both teams had District 13-B games this week. Baird entertained the Carbon Wolverines last night in the Bears Den and Clyde meets Strawn at Bulldog Field tonight.

Texas Deer Hunters To Have Audience

A quiet audience of more than 2,000 persons will be listening for distant gunfire when Texas deer hunters take to the stands Monday, November 16.

The hunters won't see them. They are patients in the state tuberculosis hospitals located at San Angelo, Tyler, San Antonio and Legion.

Last year Texas hunters sent 24 deer hides to the patients in McKnight Sanatorium, near San Angelo. It cost them nothing. Tanning and even shipping costs were donated.

"Could I make a pair of baby shoes?" was the first question asked of Mrs. Alice Coombs, director of occupational therapy for the state hospital system, when she went to McKnight to instruct the patients in making articles of the leather.

That query came from a young father who had never seen his four-month-old son. Needless to say there will be a pair of soft, baby moccasins on that Christmas tree this year.

"If the hunters in Texas would only send these patients one tenth of the hides from the deer they will kill this season, the good they can do is almost beyond belief," Mrs. Coombs said.

Last year's kill was reported to the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission as 36,423.

The hides may simply be tied, tagged and sent express collect to the Austin Taxidermist Studio, Austin, which is donating the shipping and tanning costs, Mrs. Coombs said.

Callahan County Schedules Three New Test Wells

Locations for two wildcats and an outpost have been staked in Callahan County.

A. T. Halbert, Stamford, spotted the two wildcats, both contracted for 1,990 feet with rotary. Locations are in the area eight miles northwest of Clyde.

His No. 1-C A. E. Dyer is located one mile west of the Three Aces Field. Drill site is 330 feet from the north and 1,650 feet from the east lines of Section 57, BBB&C Survey.

No. 1-B A. E. Dyer is located two miles west of the Three Aces Field. It spots 1,100 feet from the south and 800 feet from the west lines of Section 57, BBB&C Survey.

Trans-Tex Drilling Co., Longview, staked the outpost, the No. 1 Stevenson. Location is 1,340 feet southwest of Mid-Continent Petroleum Corp. No. 1 Stevenson, the lone producer in the Elmdale Palo Pinto Field in the western part of the county.

Site for No. 1 Stevenson, contracted for 3,600 feet with rotary, is 330 feet from the south and

west lines of Section 3, Block 8, SP Survey.

Allen Dykes, et al, of Abilene No. 4 Katie V. Dugan, Section 84, BBB&C Survey, was completed four and one-half miles northeast of Clyde in the Dykes Cook Sand Field.

Daily potential was 70 barrels of 42 gravity oil, flowing through a 12/64-inch choke with 250 pounds casing and 50 pounds tubing pressures. Having a gas-oil ratio of 300-1, the well is producing from an open hole at 1,548-61 feet.

Plugging report was filed with the Railroad Commission for Schkade Brothers Drilling Co., No. 1-A Buna Vista Hooks, Section 91, Block 13, T&P Survey, wildcat 13 miles east of Abilene. Total depth was 1,792 feet.

Burt Oil Co., Wichita Falls, No. 2 Olivena Loven, G. W. Denton Survey 363, four miles north of Oplin, was plugged at 1,712 feet. It was drilled 2,000 feet northwest of the nearest production in the Loven Ranch Field.

Church throughout the county will observe Christmas Seal Sunday, on Sunday Nov. 15, when clergymen of all denominations will call attention to the tuberculosis control program of the Callahan County Tuberculosis Association. The Christmas Seal Sale to raise funds for the association's 1954 program will open Nov. 16, and continue through December.

The Association plans for 1954 an extensive educational program, tuberculin tests for all school children and free X-rays for every adult in the county.

In past years, several cases of TB have been found in the early stages in this manner and because of this could be easily cured. Quite a number of borderline cases have been found, and by proper care and rest, have been prevented.

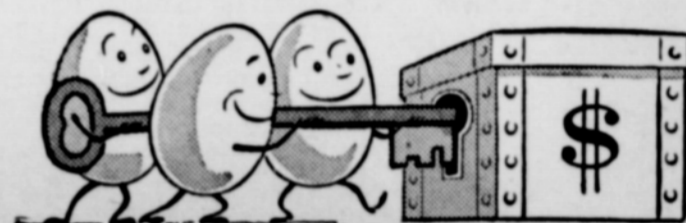

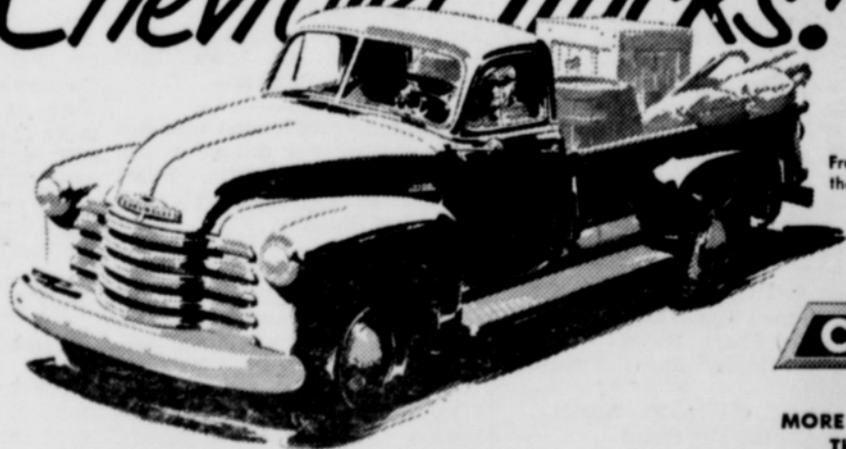

NOES: None.

THE RESOLUTION AND ORDER is as follows:

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Baird, Texas, deems it advisable to issue bonds of said City for the purposes hereinafter mentioned; therefore

BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BAIRD, TEXAS:

I. That an election be held on the 1st day of December, 1953, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this resolution and order, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted to the qualified electors of said City who own taxable property therein and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

"SHALL the City Council of the City of Baird, Texas, be authorized to issue SIXTY-ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$61,000)

"SHALL the City Council of the City of Baird, Texas, be authorized to issue ONE HUNDRED THIRTY-NINE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$139,000) of revenue bonds of said City for the purpose of constructing improvements and extensions to the City's Electric Light and Power System; said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed thirty (30) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed FOUR AND ONE-FOURTH PER CENTUM (4¼%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; said revenue bonds to be special obligations of the City, payable as to both principal and interest solely from and secured by a first lien on and pledge of the revenues of the City's Electric Light and Power System, after deduction of reasonable operation and maintenance expenses as said expenses are defined by statute?"

II. That said election shall be held at the American Legion Hall in the City of Baird, Texas, and the entire City shall constitute one election precinct.

III. That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election, to-wit:

- D. J. Anderson, Presiding Judge;
- C. E. Andrews, Judge;
- Mrs. Veda Bennett, Clerk; and
- Mrs. Tom B. Barton, Clerk.

IV. That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds in cities, as provided in the General Laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified electors, who own taxable property in the City, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote.

V. That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and conformity with Chapter 6, V.A.T.S. Election Code, adopted by the Fifty-second Legislature in 1951, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

Proposition Number 1
"For the issuance of \$61,000 Electric Light and Power System revenue bonds, and pledging the revenues of the City's Electric Light and Power System to the payment thereof"

"Against the issuance of \$61,000 Electric Light and Power System revenue bonds, and pledging the revenues of the City's Electric Light and Power System to the payment thereof"

Proposition Number 2
For the issuance of \$139,000 Electric Light and Power System revenue bonds, and pledging the revenues of the City's Electric Light and Power System to the payment thereof"

AS TO EACH of the foregoing two propositions, each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his or her vote on the two propositions respectively.

VI. In the event the said revenue bonds are authorized to be issued by a majority of the qualified electors of said City, voting at said election, and the same are issued and sold, the holder or holders of such bonds shall never have the right to demand payment thereof out of any funds raised or to be raised by taxation; and each bond issued or executed in pursuance of such election, shall contain this clause:

Rabies Infection Found In 115 Animals

Positive evidence of rabies infection was discovered in 115 animal heads autopsied by State Health Department laboratories in Austin during the past month, the Department announced today.

By species, positive heads included 104 dogs, 4 cats, 3 skunks, 2 cows, and 2 calves.

Heads from 27 counties made up last month's tabulation. Harris County was high with 73 submissions. Other counties were Austin, Brazoria, Caldwell, Collin, Comal, Fort Bend, Guadalupe, Harrison, Houston, Leon, Liberty, Matagorda, Red River, Rusk, Tarrant, Travis, Washington and Wood with one submission each.

Brazos, Cameron, Maverick, and Webb Counties submitted 2 heads each, and Bexar and Jefferson turned in 3 apiece. Waller County submitted 4, while Dallas had 6.

The tabulation was made in a regular monthly rabies report, a departmental public service which shows rabies incidence throughout the state. It lists the species involved and gives the date and county of occurrence.

Meanwhile, state laboratory officials are still surveying insect-eating bats for rabies infection. A total of 105 of the flying mammals have been checked so far with negative results in each instance.



INFLATION IS THE ANSWER

An excellent editorial on why beef prices remain comparatively high at retail—even though they are now substantially lower than they were not long ago—recently appeared in the Richmond, Virginia, Times-Dispatch, a paper which is edited by Virginius Dabney, one of the outstanding editors of the South.

The editorial said, 'The housewife's question as to why retail prices are high is easily answered. For, while the price of beef-on-the-hoof has declined, the cost of shipping beef-on-the-hoof, of butchering, processing, storing, grading, shipping of carcasses, refrigeration, handling, packaging, merchandising, plus interest and taxes, has gone up or stood still. These cost factors add the pennies-per-pound that add up to the price the housewife pays the grocer.'

Later on, the editorial answered those who think that the solution to the problem lies in a renewal of government controls. It observed, 'Price control of beef, even if it were feasible, would help neither the farmer nor the consumer, since all wages contributing to farm costs and beef processing costs would have to be controlled—a political impossibility, neither feasible nor enforceable, in peacetime.'

To take one example of what has been happening, the average wages paid in the packinghouses have increased by more than 104 per cent since July, 1945. Other inescapable costs born by the packers, which must be reflected in the final selling costs of meat, have also shown heavy rises. In other words, the inflation that followed World War II has hit the meat industry just as it did all enterprise. And no enterprise can avoid passing the higher costs on to the consumer if it is to survive.

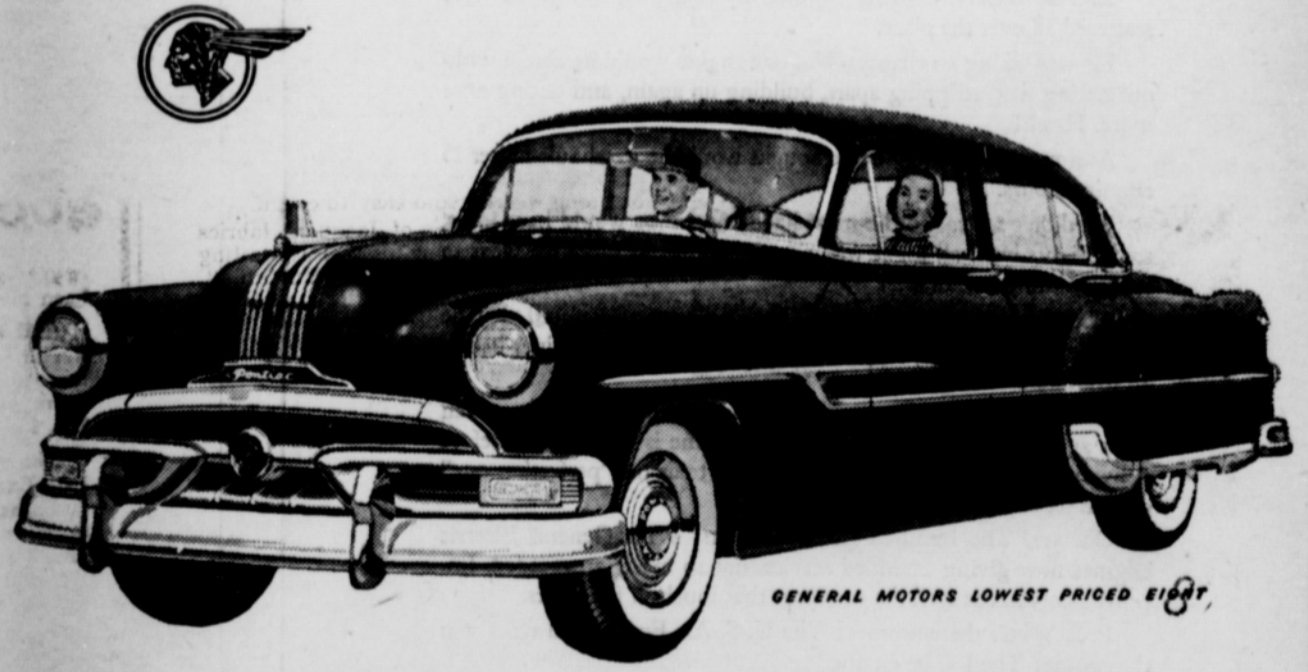

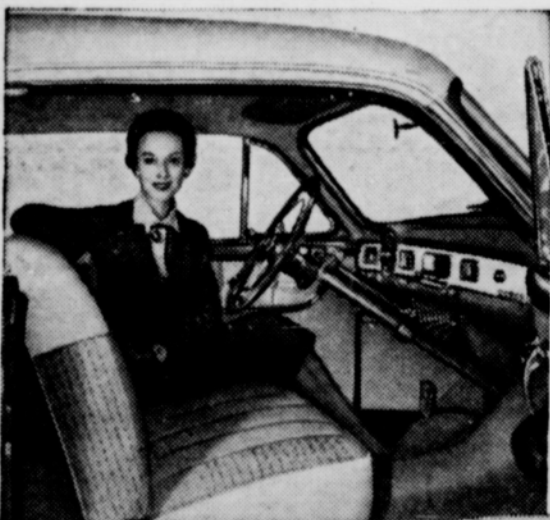
