Also the court has given notice that the budget hearing will be held Monday at 10 a.m., and the budget for the coming year will be adopted on that date.

Decision to adopt the provisions of the Weed Control Law was made by the voters of the county in an election held in July. The Com missioners have been studying the appointments to be made. Judge J. D. McBrien said the court had indicated they would name five men to make up the board at their Monday parley.

> NEW LAND TROUBLES - Who, if anyone, should pay the back taxes on land bought under the Veterans Land program, then forfeited by the purchaser?

State and local officials are in disagreement. Lack of specific legislation on this subject has resulted in two lawsuits.

In the early days of the land program a lot of veterans apparentbought land at more than it really was worth. When the drouth came and things got tough, many fell behind on taxes and payments finally had to give up and let the land go back to the Veterans Land Board. In time the board re-sold such tracts to other veterans.

Local taxing units, such as the Bexar-Atascosa-Medina Water District, says somebody has to pay the piper. It demands payment of the back taxes unpaid by the first purchaser and of the taxes that accumulated during the period when the land was forfeited to the state. Without this money, say district of-ficials, they'll have a hard time paying off their bonds.

Viewpoint of the state, however, is that taxes ceased when the land returned to the board and that the resale was free of tax debt.

Under the "minimum foundation" program the state contributes the money necessary to bring the poorer districts up to standard.

Research League pointed out that (1) under the scholastic apportionment formula (so much per pupil) some districts actually received more money than their minimum foundation needs. And (2) guaranteed state contributions discourage local efforts to improve by raising taxes. It's a system, says the League. that tends to perpetuate "educationally inadequate" districts.

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#### VIEWS AND COMMENT

Bascom Timmons reports from Washington that those who are unimpressed with the debates in the United States Senate would revise their beliefs, if they would take the trouble to read the congressional record on the running debate of the civil rights bill, which passed the senate last week. This bill, when it got to the senate from the House, would have permitted a commission to hold secret hearings on civil rights charges, in which testimony could only be made public with the commission's permission, and "leaks" punishable by a \$1,000 fine. The "North" and the "South" were at each other's throats when the discussions began. Their final vote, after minds became clearer, resulted in the first civil rights bill to be passed in 80 years. Extremists on both sides were displeased, but for the big majority the bill seemed to be one that "could be lived with." It was debate which changed minds and headed off the head-on clash between the die-

West Texas Newspapermen are on the right track when they vote in convention assembled their belief in the right of the people to know, that is for open sessions of governmental agencies-on every level from city council and school board upward. Their reasoning is logical that no board or commission is entitled to make decisions for the people without the people knowing about the decisions at the time. However, boards and commissions are entitled to have their conversations, their arguings about what is best to do without the "benefit of press or public." In practice the thing works out in a different manner to that which the newsman's editorials point.

The councilman and the school board member are entitled to "think out loud", to sound out their own thinking against that of fellow members. If it is necessary to close the door against the newsman and other citizens in order to arrive at a decision, which is to be made public (and the reasons therefor)-if it is necessary to operate in this manner to keep the mischief maker from spoiling the broth while it is brewing then we are for "secret" meetings. But school boards and commissions, city councils and the like, have a tendency to be suspicious of their very constituents and fear what "they" may say or do to block what the council or board is

publicity tends to allay this fear. People are smarter than you think. They are entitled to know about public affairs.

Whether the governor should call or not call a special session of the legislature for this fall for the particular reasons that he contemplates, might be debatable but we are in disagreement with House Speaker Waggoner Carr and his colleagues who believe 79 to 17 that a special session is not necessary. The speaker's objection is based solely on the meeting. H. J. Crawford is secrefact that the session would cost the taxpayers money which is not available in the public till, and his belief that members of the legislature should not be asked to serve for no pay. We agree that the legislators shold be paid. But a sensible water bill needs to be worked out quickly, a workable and fair bill to control lobbying, and a crime study should be instituted. We even think the governor should go farther and include the matter of the loan sharks and judicial redistricting and let the session be 30 days long and follow the first called session with another if the legislature can't work out acceptable legislation in their first session.

HALFWAY,-The castor bean appears to have a place as a cash cropon the irrigation soil of the High Plains. In an attempt to determine the best adapted variety and find the cash per acre value, twelve varietles of castor beans have been in-Wiley Rogers and Gene Hopper the High Plains Station at Halfway.

The Station scientists, in cooperation with representatives of the Baker Castor Bean Corporation, are searching for not only the most productive but also the varieties that can be harvested with minimum difficulty. They want a variety of com-bine height that can be harvested cleanly so as to leave few or no seed

Recent predictions indicate a future increase in the Castor bean market due to the need for castor oil in the operation of jets and rockets. There is also a potential tremendous market for use in the pro-duction of synthetic fibers. Nitrogea fertilizer tests on castor

beans are under way at the High Plains Station to determine the most economical rate and the time dred feet long. Each plot is being replicated four times.

Each variety received four different fertilizer treatments. These included no fertilizer, 50 and 100 pounds of nitrogen per acre at planting time and 50 pounds of nitrogen at planting time with an additional 30 pounds sidedressed when the castor beans were 6 inches high.
