

## Baird Jaycees Are Sponsoring "Pay Your Poll Tax" Campaign

The Baird Jaycees are ramrodding a "Pay Your Poll Tax" campaign, and have set up headquarters from which they will operate until the deadline for payment is reached on January 31.

The Callahan County Tax Assessor-Collector is cooperating in the campaign by appointing certain members of the Jaycees as deputy collectors.

Plans call for a member of the Jaycee organization to contact as many residents of the county as possible within the next few days as a reminder to pay their tax. The possibility that some will be missed has been discussed and arrangements made to assist that group. Those not contacted by a member of the club who wish assistance in any way in making possible their payment of the tax were asked to call Jon Hardwick or Charles Walker at the Callahan Abstract Company. The day phone number is 4-1596 and the night number is 4-1092.

Members of the club pointed out that 1962 promises to be a very interesting election year, with important offices to be filled on the local, county, state and national level. They also pointed out that it was the duty as well as the privilege of all American citizens to vote, and that payment of the poll tax was one of the requisites of exercising that right.

Tax Collector Albert Lovell said Wednesday that some 900 Callahan County residents had paid their poll tax up to that time.

Plans call also for the placing of a poll tax booth in a convenient location in Clyde on January 27th, for the convenience of residents of that area. Applications can also be made at the Peoples State Bank, it was reported. Everyone is urged to get behind the Jaycees in their effort to see that all residents have the opportunity to vote in 1962.

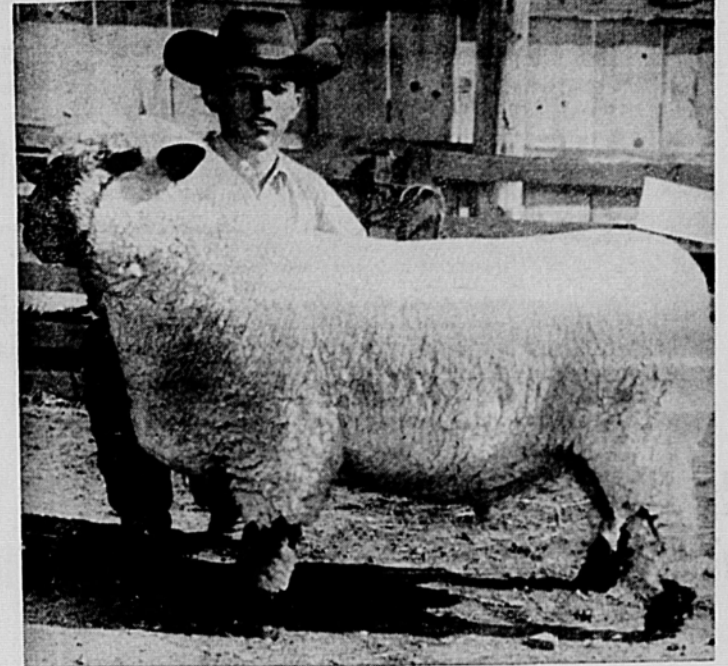

**AUSTIN**—Substantial progress has been made by the Legislature toward enactment of Gov. Price Daniel's program.

Lawmakers seeking re-election this spring are diligently at work. They want to be home by the filing deadline - Feb. 5.

Loans: House of Representatives sent a much-needed loan regulatory bill to the Senate. Bill would set up tight supervision over those who lend in amounts less than \$1,500. Exceptions are banks, credit unions, savings and loan associations and various kinds of cooperative credit groups.

Those exempt from the regulatory law would be limited to 10 per cent interest per year. All loans over \$1,500 would likewise be held to 10 per cent.

House bill allows a 3 per cent per month charge on loans under \$100 -- 2 1/2 per cent on the part of the loan from \$100 to \$200 -- 2 per cent on \$200 to \$500 -- and 10 per cent on the part of the loan between \$500 and \$1,500.

When interest allowed on a loan over \$20 is less than \$4, the lender can charge \$4 in lieu of interest.

Rural Roads: Senate passed the proposal of Sen. Neville Colson of Navasota to cut the spending on farm-to-market road construction -improvement by \$17,500,000 a year. This amount will be used or construction of secondary and primary highways.

A House rural bloc on the Agricultural Committee favored a smaller reduction. They preferred a ten year graduated cut -- to reach the goal set by Governor Daniel, Texas Farm Bureau, the County Judge and Commissioners Association and the Texas Good Roads Association.

Tourism: Large crowds turned out for the Senate and House committee meeting on these bills: (1) to appropriate \$300,000

for advertising for tourists; (2) for expansion of the juvenile parole system; (3) and for the repairs to the San Jacinto Monument.

Opposition came largely from advertising people who felt that Highway Department isn't the proper supervisor of an advertising program.

**ATTORNEY GENERAL'S RACE BEGINS** — Former Secretary of State Tom Reavley of Austin was the first candidate for Attorney General to pay the \$1,000 filing fee at State Democratic Executive Committee headquarters.

This is Reavley's first statewide race. The former Nacogdoches County Attorney was appointed Secretary of State in 1955. He now practices law in Austin.

Waggoner Carr of Lubbock, two-term Speaker of the House of Representatives, already has announced as a candidate.

Although Carr lost the 1960 race to Will Wilson, he polled a half million votes.

The Lubbock lawyer says his platform has one basic plank, "strengthening our legal framework where needed, and more vigorous enforcement of those laws, once enacted."

Les Proctor of Austin, who resigned his office as District Attorney, is expected to make a strong bid for the Attorney General's job.

Proctor won prominence as prosecuting attorney during the veterans land scandals.

Rep. Tom James of Dallas, the fourth announced candidate for Attorney General, is busy with legislative duties.

**"TOURISTS" READY TO TRAVEL**—Formation of the Texas Tourist Council became official at a luncheon here which honored state representatives. Council urged appropriation of \$300,000 for out-of-state advertising.

Tourist Council elected as its president James Gaines of San Antonio. Vice president are Glenn Alexander, Corpus Christi, Everett Fulgham of Lubbock, Ed Leach of Galveston, Charlie Meeker of Dallas, T. P. Newhall of Greenville, John Ben Shepard of Odessa and John Simpson of Austin. Ed St. John of Austin was elected secretary.

Speaker James A. Turman told the 500 luncheon guests that the old joke "it is easier to pick a tourist than a bale of cotton" is about to go stale. He said Texas must let the rest of the nation know what it has to offer.

**TEXAS CALLED BOOK DESERT** — University of Texas Chancellor Dr. Harry Ranson told members of the Texas Commission on Higher Education that the State of Texas is laboring under the label of "the book desert of the United States."

Dr. Ranson made the statement in support of a plea from Dr. F. L. McDonald, President of Lamar State College of Technology, for a more realistic appropriation recommendation for libraries in Texas' 19 state colleges.

Reappointed to the State Board of Examiners for Teacher Education were: Dr. Glenn Barnett of the University of Texas; Mrs. Kate Bell of Houston Public Schools; Dr. Arva N. Donner of the University of Houston; Dr. Frank Hubert of Texas A&M; Dr. Herbert LaGrone of Texas Christian University; Dr. Emmett D. Smith of West Texas State College, and Mrs. Florence Vaughn of Tyler Public Schools.

The Board also appointed a 16-member Junior College Study Commission on Budget Procedures and Reporting. This to comply with a bill for appropriations to public junior colleges passed in the summer session of the 57th Legislature.

Small grain crops in the area suffered heavily during the heavy cold spell last week, with most of the volunteer oats being killed and many of the others frozen back to the ground

Leaf rust has caused some yellowing of small grain, due to the continued cold and damp weather we had for such a long period of time. Warm weather and sunshine will correct most of this in time. Some green bug damage has also been reported. Parathion, Methyl Parathion and Malathion can be used for control of the insect if the buildup of them is sufficient to warrant it. Bulletin MP-339, Texas Guide for Controlling Insects on Small Grains is available in my office and gives detailed information for controlling these pests.

# About Your HEALTH



A weekly public service feature from the Texas State Department of Health.

Laboratory services offered by the Texas State Department of Health have come a long way since a State chemist and bacteriologist first began work at the tail-end of the 19th Century.

Since then, needed services have been added as the State grew and progressed. During the period of growth, many local health departments installed their own laboratories to meet the needs in their areas.

During World War II, the demand for decentralization of laboratory services, especially serology tests, was enhanced by Selective Service Commission. Quicker results were required on venereal disease serological tests because sending samples all the way to Austin and waiting for results often took several days - delaying the draft program in some areas of the State.

Also, personnel at the local laboratories became aware of

the need for greater standardization among the regional laboratories.

For these reasons, a system of regional laboratories was established. As financing became available the number of laboratories and services provided were expanded, until today there are 22 laboratories located outside of Austin and are serving nearly the entire population of Texas. Areas without regional services continue to submit specimens for testing to Austin.

The bulk of regional laboratory services include serological studies, water and milk bacteriology and some identification of disease organisms related to communicable disease control.

Biologics production - manufacture of vaccine - and rabies identification, except in Houston, are performed solely in the Austin laboratory.

Standardization is maintained among the regional laboratories

with frequent seminars and training sessions in Austin and by standardization tests. Syphilis serology is tested, for instance by samples distributed for examination which have been coded, so that the central laboratory knows in advance which are positive and which are negative.

Scores are recorded. Each laboratory must maintain a certain percentage of correct examinations.

The Needle Magic for Clubwomen program was presented by Mrs. Jack Corn, program chairman.

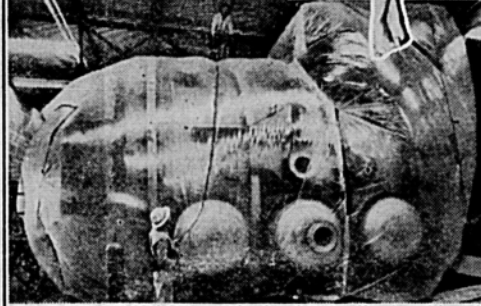

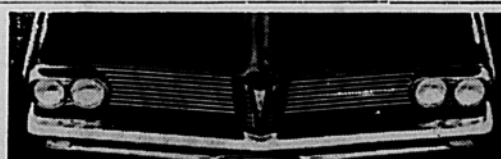
