

## Say Surprises Are In Store On '61 Cotton

College Station. — In response to questions raised by some growers about 1961 upland cotton allotments, B. P. Davenport, Jr., Chairman, Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, today explained the difference between the 1961 program and the one in effect for the past two cotton crops.

He pointed out that the 1961 national allotment of 18.5 million acres compares with the "regular" 1960 allotment of 16.3 million acres. This 1960 figure was increased to 1.5 million acres under Choice (B) elections.

In 1961, there will be only one upland cotton allotment, whereas for the past two crops growers had a choice between the "regular" farm allotment and the 40 percent-larger (B) allotment.

All eligible growers in 1961 may receive the full available price support on their cotton, whereas in 1960 the eligible (B) grower received lower support but a larger acreage allotment.

Because of the provisions of the law the effect of the increase in national allotment on the size of the state, county, and farm allotments will vary widely. Some farms may receive no increase or possibly a reduction from the available allotment acreage for 1960 primarily because of the operation of the minimum allotment provision or participation in the Choice (B) program in 1960.

Growers on 1960 Choice (B) farms and on farms with allotments of 10 acres or less should keep these facts in mind when they receive their notices of 1961 upland allotments.

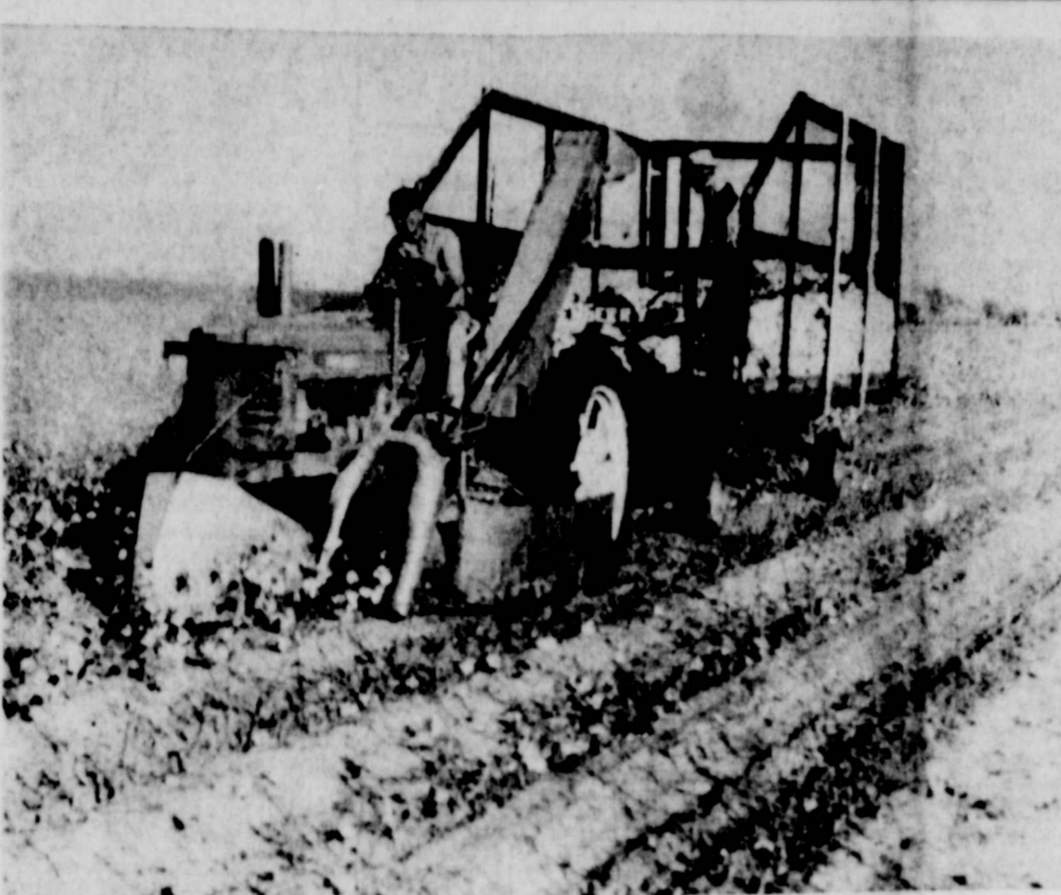
Davenport reminded farmers that the allotments will remain in effect for 1961-crop cotton whether or not growers approve 1961 marketing quotas in the national referendum to be held December 13. Allotments are used as a means of determining eligibility for the available price support.

A two-thirds favorable vote in the referendum would mean quotas for the 1961 cotton crop, marketing quota penalties on any "excess" cotton, and the price support at not less than 70 percent of parity. Opposition to the quotas by more than a third of the voters would mean no quotas or penalties for 1961 and support at 50 percent of parity to growers who complied with their acreage allotments.

## District 2-AA Organizes Admission Price Raised

Member schools of District 2AA of Texas Interscholastic League met Wednesday night, November 16, at the Otton school cafeteria. Representatives of Abernathy, Floydada, Lockney, Morton, Muleshoe and Otton were present. Those attending from Floydada were coaches Charles Tyler, Bill Curry, Superintendent I. T. Graves and Principal A. E. Baker.

I. T. Graves was named district chairman for the coming year and Baker was named secretary to serve with him. Football for the coming year was the subject that was covered in detail.

Many of the items discussed were routine and no change from the present set up was made. The district voted to use four officials for games and these are to be named by the home team and approved by the visiting team early in the season.

Game time is to remain at 8:00 p. m. unless both schools agree to change the game time. Admission prices for adults were set at \$1.25 and for students 50 cents. This represents a 2-cent increase in adult admission over this year.

In event of a tie game the winner will be determined on yard line penetrations first. In the event these are tied as well as the score then first downs will determine the winner. If all are tied the game will count as a game won and game lost for both teams in the district standings.

If at the close of the season the two teams are tied for the championship then a flip of the coin will determine the team to represent the district.

In other cases where two teams tie in the standings for the championship then the one holding a win over the other will go to the play offs. If more than two teams tie for the championship all teams involved will be declared co-champions.

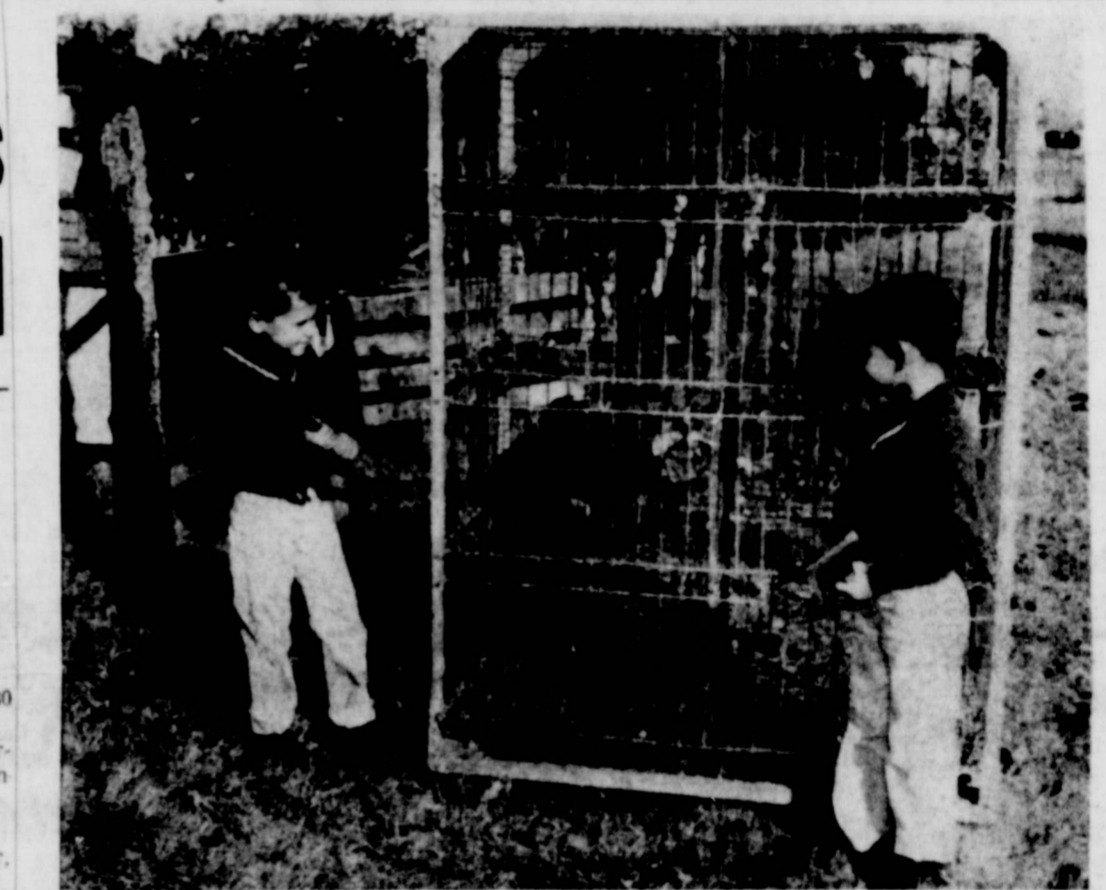
J. D. Parks and the crew of the City Power and Light Department will do the lighting. Don Hagood heads the committee erecting the Nativity scene.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN — Added to the list of lively topics for the next Legislature is the carrying out of a new Congressional district.

Final figures in the national census show Texas entitled to a 23rd congressman. State's population rose 24.2 per cent — to 3,579,677 — making it the sixth most populous state in the nation.

Population of Texas districts ranges widely: from about 227,000 to 614,000. It is highly unlikely that the legislature will undertake to rearrange the districts statewide so as to even out the differences.

Nor is it expected that Dallas County, the state's most populous district, with 614,000, will get the extra congressman.

Texas' biggest congressional district — and the nation's biggest — area-wise, is the 16th stretching all the way from Odessa to El Paso.

After the 1950 census, the Legislature dickered for awhile the question of what to do with the extra congressman by having him serve "at large" (the whole state).

For the past seven months the state has been limited to eight producing days. Independent producers, most of whom have been strong for holding production to eight days in previous months, recommended nine for December.

Earlier, TIPRO (Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners) had asked the Commission to consider whether the sharp cut-back in Texas production during the past two years actually had improved the supply situation of enabled other producing areas to grab some of Texas' share of the market.

"CONTROVERSIAL" BOOKS ADOPTED — In the enormous and often touchy job of adopting textbooks for public schools, the State Board of Education rejected one and accepted two of three books against which protests had been raised.

These are "Language for Daily Use" for grades 7 and 8 and "The Stockmen's Handbook." Haley's committee said the language book was based on too limited a vocabulary and the stockmen's book was too welfare state-ish in its discussion of farm issues.

Seven books opposed by Texans for America already had been eliminated by a teacher-composed advisory committee which screens textbook offerings before they are considered by the Board of Education.

A plan that would divide part of the responsibilities for care of the aged and mentally ill, between state and local government, may be proposed in the next Legislature.

It would take a constitutional amendment approved by the people to put the plan into effect. Legislative Budget Board tentatively approved a recommendation whereby the state would split with a city, county or district the cost of such programs as out-patient care for mental patients and nursing home care for elderly patients.

It is felt that this approach might be more economical and effective for some patients. Nearly-recovered mental patients, for example, could be released from bed space at expensive state institutions and get treatment as needed from a nearby clinic.

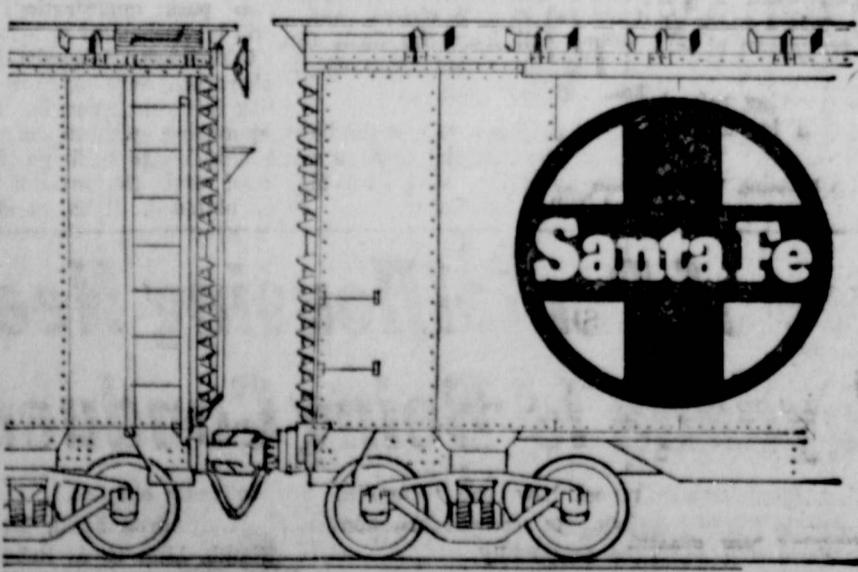

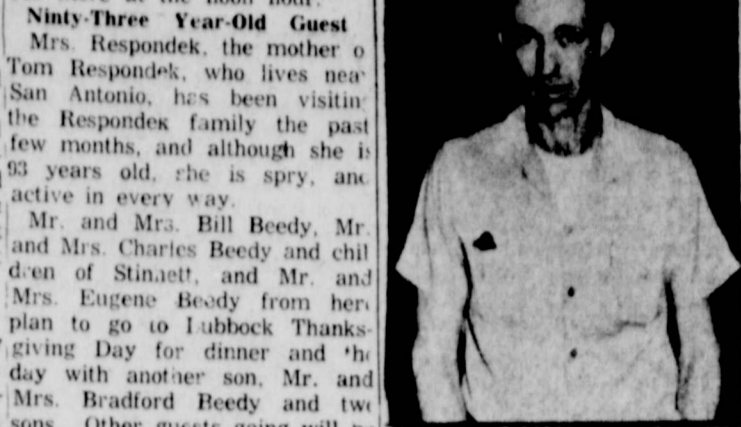

3 stiffly beaten egg whites

### HOMEMAKING HINTS

By Phyllis Roggendorf County Home Demonstration Agent

Take A Careful Look At Washable Woolens

Many wools and woolen blends today are especially treated so they wash safely. But you can't tell that by looking at or feeling them. Look for the label, and read it carefully.

Even when a woolen garment has a label which gives washing instructions, there are many important factors to consider before you say, "I'll take it."

Examine all the garment carefully to see that the styling, construction and trimmings are suitable for a garment intended for home laundering.

The styling should not be too intricate for easy pressing. All seams should be either taped or at least have extra seaming to prevent raveling. Look at the buttonholes, armholes, interfacing and hem. Will they hold up under frequent washings?

Check trimming. The less trimming and detail work the better. Any contrasting trim should be of a fabric that is equally as washable as the wool, colorfast and constructed into the garment with care.

If the garment meets these requirements, you can launder with out fear of shrinkage or felting of the wool. Most directions call for warm water and mild soap suds or cold water and cold water soap. Follow directions given on the label.

If you use the washing machine, the water level should be high with a light load. Two or three agitations in suds should be sufficient to remove soil. Always rinse thoroughly. Press the garment with a steam iron.

SALADS — Eating tossed green salads is an easy way to "take" vitamins and minerals. Dark green and yellow vegetables are excellent sources of vitamins A and C. High on this list of vegetables are fresh cabbage and other salad greens, carrots, asparagus, broccoli and green peppers. All vegetables will give a greater return on your investment when they are served fresh and raw.

Left over cooked vegetables can be put to good use by adding them to salads. Green beans, beets, cauliflower, broccoli, English peas and other cooked vegetables taste better in salads than they do warmed over. For extra flavor marinate cooked vegetables in French dressing.

# YOUR COUNTY AGENT

By Cecil Lewis

SOIL TESTING - A new soil testing laboratory will open this week at Lubbock and will work on soil testing for our area. This lab was made possible by interested farmers and business men on the South Plains in cooperation with the Texas Extension Service.

James Valentine will serve as area soil chemist and will be available to work with agents and farmers in our county. Mr. Valentine has had much experience in this work.

Samples will be received beginning this week and much quicker service can be expected. The cost of the soil testing per sample will be \$2.00. Forms to show how to take sample and other information necessary for soil testing may be picked up in the County Agent's office.

GRAIN SORGHUM - The use of Grain Sorghum residue may be overlooked in many cases in improving our soil. This is one crop that produces from two to four tons of organic matter per acre.

Many farmers are following grain sorghum with cotton and are increasing their yields with proper fertilization.

It takes about 20 pounds of nitrogen per acre to decompose grain sorghum stubble and this application will be available in the spring for cotton production.

Many apply this fertilizer in the fall and winter to speed up decomposition. This would be a good place to make a soil test for proper fertilization.

# Crosby Grand Jury Indicts Sheriff Again

According to news sources from Crosbyton, former Crosby County Sheriff J. T. (Slime) Herrington 44, who was acquitted Nov. 13 1959, on charges of theft and misapplication of county funds was indicted again last week by a grand jury.

The grand jury returned one indictment charging 31 counts of misapplication and secretion of funds with intent to misapply and theft by false pretext, according to news reports.

Herrington's case has been put down for trial Dec. 5 and in all probability District Court would order a change of venue, as in the first trial a year ago.

The sum of money named in the original indictments was \$423.84. A subsequent audit of county books early last year is alleged to have revealed \$34,085.54 unaccounted for in county funds since 1955.

The first Herrington trial was moved to Lamesa where a jury found him innocent of the charge in one of the indictments.

The former sheriff resigned from his office shortly after the investigation broke and thereafter was hired as city marshal in Lorenzo his home town. He resigned from that post recently but still makes his home in Lorenzo.

Proclamation: By the Governor of the State of Texas

Though the year which is drawing to its close, has not been marked by that degree of prosperity, which has hitherto attended the people of Texas, yet we can feel grateful to Heaven for the manifold blessings vouchsafed to us. For that protecting power, which attended Texas in its hours of gloom, and has conducted it through the path of period, we have abundant reasons to be thankful. For our present happy position, the civil and religious liberty we enjoy, the preservation of our lives and the unexampled good health which has been ours in the past year, we may seek the province of Our Heavenly Father, humbling ourselves before Him and rendering our Praise, asking in a spirit of thankfulness that the promise of the future may be realized in its that day they abstain from their generation that are to come after us, but the millions of other lands now hopefully awaiting

their deliverance from oppression Providence has ever guarded the people of the United States He sustained the hopes of our struggling fathers until we gained the liberty we now enjoy. He gave them the wisdom and prudence through which our government was formed. For eighty years that same Providence has shielded us, and amid danger from without and dissension from within, has encircled us with His protecting arm and preserved our liberties intact. Let us in the hour of Prayer, implore Him to shield us still in the time of peril, that we may preserve a united people, free, independent and prosperous.

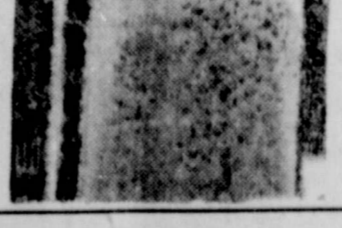
