Members of the school board will have to come up with a plan soon. They are tax payers just like you and me and they are not anxious to seek another big bond issue for a school building unless this is an absolute necessity.

We feel that these men would like to hear from school patrons from over the district before such an important decision is made. They are busy men with business and farming operations to look after, they tend to school matters mostly at night on their own time and without pay.

Some of the decisions that must be made include: to build now or to put it off, to build only a cafeteria new, to build a steel building like Della Plains for less money or a masonry type building for more money, to build at Andrews Ward campus or to go across town and build on a new site (which would cost more), to patch up a cafeteria and move some fifth grade to Junior high thus delaying the building program two or three years and still get by for a time without a large expenditure.

What do you think? Your tax money will be paying the bill and we know we must have good schools.

General Election November 6. Voters over Texas and the entire United States will go to the polls on Tuesday, November 6, for the important "off year" election. In Floyd County and traditionally Democratic Texas there will be a number of choices to make in addition to the fourteen constitutional amendments presented at the bottom of the ballot.

The Republican Party in Texas is presenting about half a state of candidates that start with John Zahn who opposes Democrat Andy Rogers for state senator and goes up to Jack Cox who opposes Democrat John Connally for Governor of Texas.

The Constitution Party lists two candidates, Jack Carswell for governor and Joseph M. Rummel for comptroller. The ballot also carries a column for the Independent Party, with no candidates listed, and a column for write-ins without a party name.

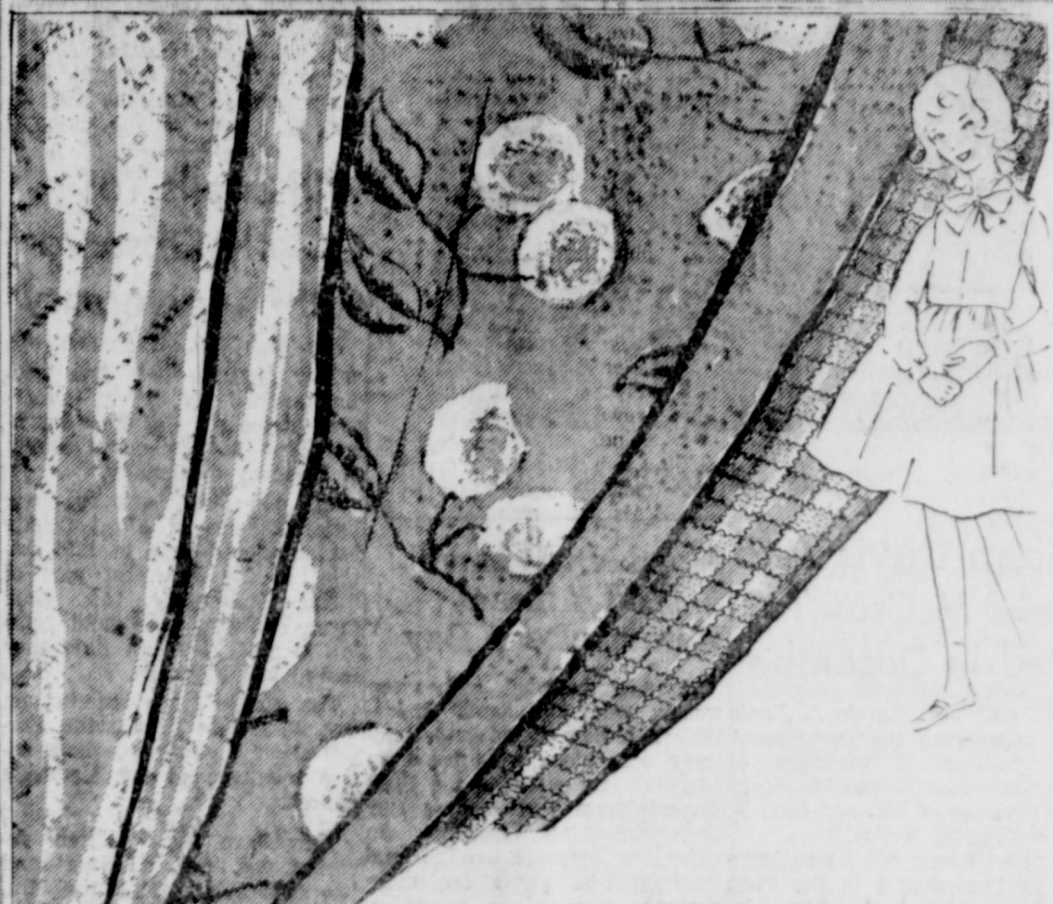

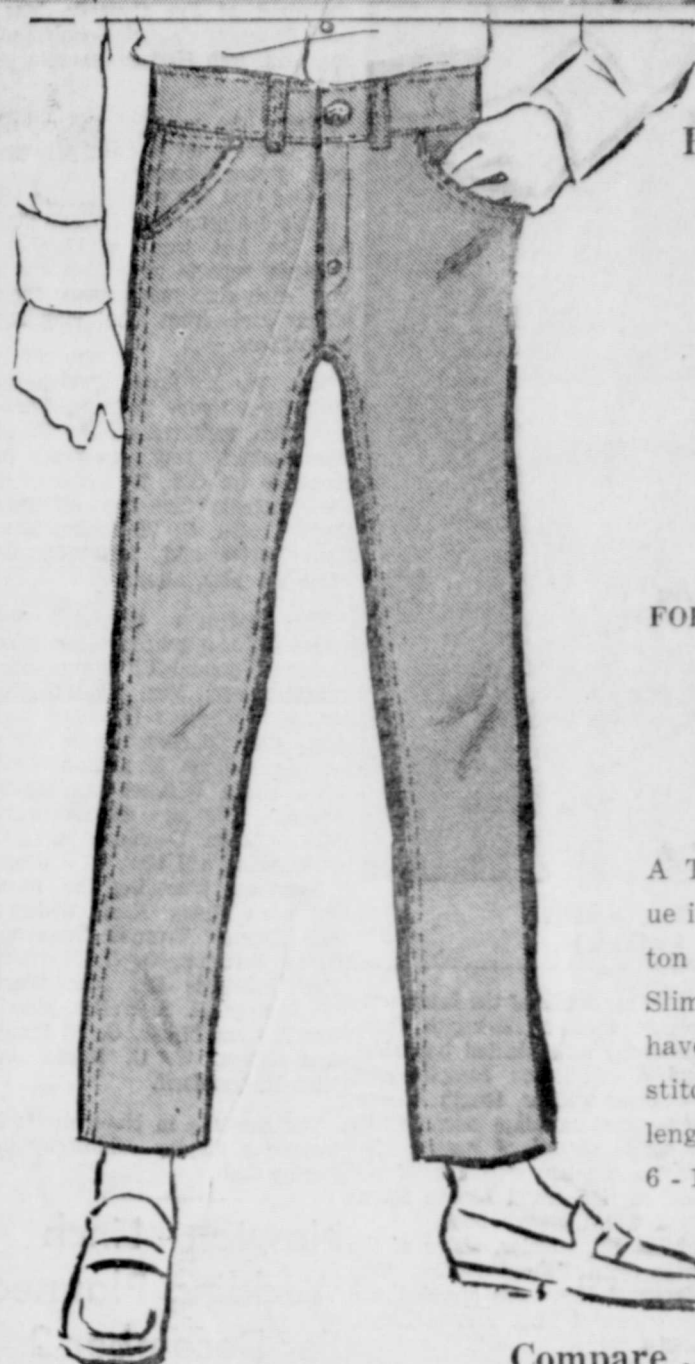

HOMEMAKING HINTS

By Phyllis Roggendorf, County Home Demonstration Agent

Teach Management Early

Many principles of good management can be taught to boys and girls early in life. Some of these principles are a cooperative attitude, sharing responsibility in the family, developing respect for resources, setting goals, time management, money management, buying skillfully, storage, equipment, lighting, and laundry.

A cooperative attitude may be taught to youngsters through learning to share one's room, responsibility in caring for it, in planning for their share of the family clothing dollars and through the respect of privacy of other members of the family.

Sharing responsibility comes naturally when a youngster has certain jobs such as setting the table, making the bed, dusting, washing dishes and preparing certain foods.

Developing respect for resources comes from seeing that the boy or girl takes good care of personal property. When it comes to setting goals — an important practice — young people must understand that to set a goal means to need or want something important to them, and make plans for getting it at the least cost of all resources required to get it.

Time management can be taught by helping youngsters see that it is best to stay with a job until it is finished — in order to be free later to do something else he wants or needs to do. Training in money management also can start early, for by the time a child is in school he already is using a considerable amount of money. Skillful buying habits can be taught with the money management.

Storage of toys and equipment also can be taught early to youngsters. Use and care of toys and equipment can be included in the management training for youngsters.

New Fiber

A new man-made fiber Orlon Sayelle has made its appearance in knit wear this fall. This is a bi-component acrylic fiber. Bi-component means "consisting of two parts". Two separate and different types of acrylic components have been fused in two sided structure. This structure is continuous throughout the entire length of the fiber. Each side maintains its own individuality within a single fiber. The fiber has a permanent spiral crimp that gives bulk without addition of extra fibers.

The fabric has the characteristics of Orlon acrylic with the liveliness and physical behavior of wool. Wash and machine dry the garments as you would any acrylic fabric. Spread loosely on flat surface to dry. The garment must be completely dry before using.

Cotton Samples On Increase At Classing Office

Sample receipts continued to increase this past week at the Lubbock Cotton Classing Office, according to Mr. W. K. Palmer, Officer-in-Charge. Mr. Palmer said the rain which began Tuesday night would stop receipts until the weather clears.

The Lubbock Classing Office classed 23,000 samples this week. The Lamesa office classed 6,600 samples and the Brownfield office classed 8,200 samples for the week.

Classing at all three offices totaled 80,000 samples to date. Last year 223,000 samples had been classed at this time.

Quality improved slightly this week. Middling counted for 60 percent of the cotton classed in the Lubbock Office. The following qualities made up the other percentages: Strict Middling 5 percent, Strict Low Middling 7 percent, Strict Middling Light Spotted 9 percent, Middling Light Spotted 15 percent, and Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 2 percent.

The average staple length was 30.2 thirty seconds of an inch this week. Staple lengths for the week were distributed as follows: 7-8, 1 percent; 29-32, 11 percent; 15-16, 80 percent; 31-32, 24 percent; and 1 inch 3 percent.

The micronaire readings for the week are as follows: 2.7 to 2.9, 1 percent; 3.0 to 3.4, 5 percent; 3.5 to 3.9, 17 percent; 4.0 to 4.4, 45 percent; 4.5 to 4.9, 29 percent; and 5.0 to 5.4, 3 percent.

Movement of cotton on the Lubbock Market improved this week with the Lubbock Cotton Exchange reporting 4,250 bales purchased with \$28 Conairad Radio Station.

any time. No one knows what tomorrow will bring. Here is the seven-point program enunciated by Kennedy:

1. The United States, "to halt this offensive buildup" in Cuba, is imposing "a strict quarantine on all offensive military equipment under shipment to Cuba."

All ships of any kind bound for Cuba are to be turned back if they are found to contain cargoes of offensive weapons. This embargo also will be extended to "other carriers" if need be—meaning airplanes.

2. Surveillance of Cuba and its military buildup will be stepped up, and the U.S. armed forces have been ordered "to prepare for any eventualities."

3. U.S. policy will be to regard any nuclear missile launched from Cuba against any nation in the Western Hemisphere as an attack by Russia on the United States requiring full retaliation against the Soviet Union.

4. The U.S. naval base at Guantanamo, on the eastern tip of Cuba, has been reinforced. U.S. dependents there have been evacuated and additional military

FOUNDERS DAY - Alumni of St. Edward's University in Austin met in 10 Texas cities to mark the 77th year of the founding of the church-related school. Founders day corporate communion breakfasts were held in Beaumont, Corpus Christi, Dallas, El Paso, Fort Worth, Galveston, Houston, Laredo and San Antonio, besides Austin.

HONORARY TEXAN - Texas has a new goodwill ambassador in Venezuela. Governor Daniel has named Miss Lolita Ines Devazado of Maracaibo an honorary Texan. The 18-year-old student of law visited the Capitol and the City of Austin for a month before returning to Venezuela.

CREDIT LIFE INSURANCE - Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler says buyers in the state's \$200,000,000 Veterans' Land Program are signing up for credit life insurance arranged by the Veterans' Land Board.

The Board, of which Sadler is chairman, secured terms of \$5-76 per thousand dollars of outstanding principal.

Same terms and conditions to age 65 apply to future purchasers, as well as the 24,000 who already have acquired tracts.

STATE TO SUE FOR PADRE - In an attempt to gain title to disputed Padre Island areas, the State of Texas will file a number of suits.

Assistant Attorney General Ben Harrison and Asst. Atty. Gen. J. reported to the House Land Study Committee that suits will be filed after additional information is collected.

AUSTIN - Texas doctors are about to open a campaign for legislative approval of a constitutional amendment bringing Texas under the Kerr-Mills program.

Through it the Federal and State governments would jointly pay hospital and medical bills of all retired persons receiving less than \$1,800 a year and unable to qualify for old age assistance.

Uncle Sam would pay 75 per cent; the State, 25 per cent.

Doctors believe there are 600,000 Texans over 65 who would be eligible.

Idea developed at a meeting between State Welfare Director John Winters, Texas Medical Association committees, insurance agents and insurance company representatives.

Plan would be to handle the proposition through an insurance company, as the medicare program for old age assistance now is done.

This would amount to an insurance premium of \$3,000,000 a month, based on the \$8.68 now paid Blue Cross for each of the 222,000 on old age assistance.

HIGHER EDUCATION - Texas Commission on Higher Education heard presidents or other spokesmen for 20 State Colleges and universities voice objections to proposed cuts in their budget requests of 1964-65.

As a result, the Commission will reconsider its recommendations at a meeting on October 23.

Three doctoral programs in teacher education were approved for the University of Houston, which will become a senior college next year.

Four graduate programs were approved for East Texas State College.

Rex Baker, Commission secretary, opposed this latter action on grounds that it went against policy of concentrating such programs, Baker said, would lead to general mediocrity.

Commission member Elizabeth Koch's reply was that they were necessary to attract teachers of eminence.

SCHOOL LAND LEASES - Latest leasing of State school lands boosted the permanent school fund beyond the half-billion mark, Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler reported.

In exact figures, it is now \$500,639,012.

During the past 21 months, \$30,300,000 has been placed in the public school available fund. State university and college lands in the same period produced \$32,694,992. Permanent fund now stands at \$385,995,002.

HIGHWAY SAFETY - Official commendation and appreciation of the State were expressed by Gov. Price Daniel to Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the State Department of Public Safety and chief of the Texas Rangers.

Tribute was paid Garrison for winning the Paul G. Hoffman Award for distinguished professional service in highway safety.

Governor Daniel said the award, presented only five times before to nationally recognized experts in traffic safety, was a "crowning achievement in a lifetime career of outstanding police administration and public service" by Colonel Garrison.

The governor said he felt Texas could trace much of its progress in traffic safety to the sound foundations laid by the public safety director.

BUILDING DEDICATION - A ceremony dedicating the new State Board of Insurance building on the southeast corner of the Texas Capitol campus will be held on October 19.

Bud D. Hayes, Louisiana insurance commissioner, will be principal speaker.

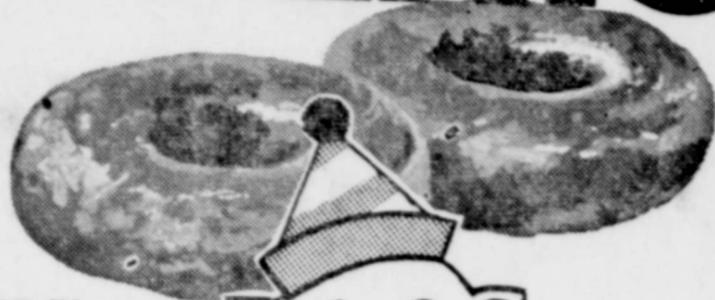
