The deceased is Sidney J. Lat-'a, 72, who resided three miles east of Floydada on Highway 70. Mrs. Latta, the other occupant of the Buick, is still in a Lubbock espital and on the critical list.

The Overstreet car was tarveling toward the west enterng Floydada. The point of impect was in the south lane, acording to Chief of Police Bill Taylor.



The plaintiffs claim that Judge Bills, who heard the suit against the board in 110th district court here, did not have the authority to release the tax rolls which allowed the people in the school district to pay their school taxes on the basis of their 1964 tax assesment. However, had the roll not been released, the school would have no funds to operate during the year 1964-65.

1. Economy over hand labor reduces the farmer's cost and raises his profit.

2. In some creps, such as corn and grain sorghum, yields have been increased because the root system of the plants were not disturbed by conventional cultivation.

3. Continued use of flame cultivation will reduce weed and grass populations as deeply buried seeds are not plowed to the surface where they will germinate, and the present weed crop is kill d before it can produce new seeds.

4. In certain crops such as young cotton, there is evidence of a reduction in the insect population. (Flame cultivation is not a complete insect control measure).

5. In caster beans, there has been noted a reduction in Alternaria leaf spot disease after flaming. 6. When a eash crop and weeds come up together and are the same size, crops such as grain sorghum and corn may, at the proper time, before the terminal bud (growing point) emer ges above the soil surface, be "flamed off" with all surface vegetation killed. The cash crop will renew growth within four to, six days, but most weeds will not. This saves replacing costs,

soil moisture, and gains valuable growing time. 7. Flaming equipment can be taken into a field after a rain much quicker than convertional cultivators can operate.

8. It is safe to use because it does not poison crops or contaminate water supplies. There are no harmful residual effects to the

soil by using flame cultivation on crops. 9. Service and maintenance of flame cultivators is very simple if clean fuel is used.

10.It is an aid to mechanical harvesting:

(A.) Lower leaves of the mature cotton plant are destroyed, thereby yielding a cleener, nigher grade cotton.

(B) Destruction of above-ground foliage on below-ground producing crops, such as potatoes, at harvest time makes harvesting of the crops much easier and cleaner.

(C.) Tests on field drying of grain sorghum have shown promise of earlier harvesting of grain, especially on dry land sorghum. (D.) Field drying of grain sorghum dehydrates the leaves and it can be exmbined at a faster speed.






