### - The Hesperian Goes On Round-Up!



A Hesperian reporter went on a Roundup last week on the Montgomery Ranch, which is located about five miles southwest of Lakeview, down in the Blanco Canyon.

The cowboys had rounded up the cattle by the middle of the morning, had them in the corrals, ready to begin separating the cows and calves when the reporter arrived.

Ranch manager Jay S. Hale, Jr. and Ranch foreman Q. D. Williams were there to meet the Hesperian reporter and explained the various steps in "processing each calf." The calves are a cross breed of Black Angus Bulls and White Face Hereford cows. Most of the calves were "natural mulies" no horns) so did not require dehorning.

After the cowbovs got the bawling mama cows in one corral, They systematically pushed the calves through a long chute into a portable metal clamp working table. The calf is clamped into the mechanism which is tilted up and makes a nice "operating table" for the four cowboys.

The cowboys Dehorn, Vaccinate, Castrate, Brand and Clip the ear of each calf and averaged about a calf every two minutes.

At noon the dinner bell was rung by Mrs. Q. D. Williams and all the cowboys plus the hungry Hesperian reporter took off for the ranch house. As everyone entered through the screened in back porch, four or five home made pies were observed cooling and a charcoal broiler was sizzling big sirloin steaks at the other end of the porch.

At noon time there was much joking about one cowpoke whose hoss bucked him off during the round-up and talk about some area horse races. Mrs. Williams was a gracious hostess and (just to editorialize a little) a very good cook.







### 'Profit With Price'

In talking to a number of onion farmers this past week, it seems "Pink Root Rot" is their main problem. The Pink Root Rot is a soil bearing spore, which your onions contact one way or the other, (1) The spore was present in the transplant, or (2) the plot of ground the transplants were set on, the spore was present.

In talking to Dr. George Elle of Texas Tech, there are only two things to do. (1) Keep the onions moist and, (2) Have plenty o ammonia (NH3) present for the onions.

This coming week we will be doing flame cultivating with onions at the Jay S. Hale, Jr., farm and Guy Ginn farm. Should anyone be interested in seeing the work, you can contact me at YU 3-3721 for further information.

With soil temperature rising, it won't be long until planting time for grain sorghum. Get your seed lined up, so you can get it in the ground, in order to stay ahead of the "Midge". Should you want to, I have some research work on planting dates, as to when to plant in order to avoid the midge problem.






