



tricity and the damage from the wind and dust. The thrip are still present. Check your patches regularly, for if they get to doing too much drainage you should be ready to spray.





Our Future and Water

Distillation of sea water at a reasonable cost rough the use of nuclear energy should be regarded as an essential investment for the future.

A recently concluded study dispels any doubts that the salty waters of the world's oceans can be converted at a cost which compares favorably with that of obtaining potable water from other sources

That such efforts are needed can be seen by the growing requirements for water and the substantial drop of ground water tables in almost every part of

The study, made by the University of California for the Office of Science and Technology, shows that a publicly financed nuclear powered plant with a daily capacity of 620 million gallons per day can produce water at a cost of 30 cents per thousand gallons, including conveyance to a reservoir.

The plant could also provide 1.4 million kilowatts of electricity daily, sufficient power to meet the needs of nearly two million people at the cost of 2.4 mills per kilowatt hour.

Cost of constructing such a plant is estimated at \$840 million. But the future saving and critical need for such plants make such investment a necessity for the country's future growth.

Wallace's Vote

The amazing vote received by Governor George Wallace in Wisconsin reveals there is currently a groundswell of conservative sentiment in the country. It was apparent a major conservative trend was present in 1960, when the late President John Kennedy barely managed to squeak in, with all his campaign eloquence, organization and charm.

And it should be remembered that in 1960 the com plexion of Congress turned more conservative in the election, not the reverse. Yet since that time all the emphasis in Washington has been on liberalization, more and more liberal legislation.

Is the nation in step with those pushing the trend? The Wisconsin vote causes one to doubt it. In spite of denials that the vote means something, quite obviously it was a bombshell and is significant.

The fact that a Dixie Governor, one not even a good image in more sophisticated Dixie States, could poll this outstanding number of votes (30 per cent) in a State like Wisconsin is almost unbelievable.

Had anyone wanted to bet on this, he could have obtained 100 to one odds prior to the voting Wallace himself said he would be tickled if he got 25,000 votes. He got more than ten times this number, more than a quarter million!

Conservative strength in the nation must be stronger than some politicians have assumed.






